## MANAGERS' REPORT.

There has been little really new in the temporals of the Congregation during 1900, yet, for all that, the review you will find to be decidedly gratifying. However, there is one unique feature in the retrospect, by way of spice, that is, its view point, from the portal of a new century, where none of us ever before stood, nor will we likely ever again stand, on this side of the Grand Boundary Line. Father Time has landed us on the shore of the Twentieth Century, where, probably, there will be giants to conquer, as well as milk and honey to enjoy. Congregationally, we enjoy a fair share of the things represented by the latter figure, whilst the former, in their temporal aspect, are not worthy of the title, being below, rather than above, the average size.

Those of us who are sufficiently interested in the affairs of the Congregation as to attend its Annual Meeting, or even to peruse its printed Reports, will know that we commenced the home run of the late century handicapped by a deficit of about \$100. It was greater at the time of our last Annual Meeting, but the arrears brought it down to something less than a hundred, waiving some minor claims that were for the time left in abeyance to the then present emergency.

Besides keeping abreast of current expenses, we have, by one or two timely spurts, been enabled to overtake and pass a little bit at the very close, the deficit of a year ago. Placing arrears to the year to which they belong, the contributions of 1900 exceed those of the previous year by fully \$300. We feel like returning thanks all round, but surely it becomes us to especially acknowledge the hand of our Provident Father in Heaven. All this does not for a moment mean relaxation, but, rather, that more energy be put into the regular contribution pace, so that special efforts may not be necessary. Our authority for such figures of speech is too high to require an apology.

While we speak in this Report from a financial point of view, it will scarcely be thought by anyone to be in a mercenary spirit. Accordingly, we may say that the Congregation lost several good friends about the beginning of the year, and, on the other hand, new names have appeared on the Weekly Envelope from time to time through the year, and at the same time an increase in open collections has been effected.

Open doors, Open pews, and Offerings by Open Hearts, Orderly received and disbursed, has been our motto.

Let Love and Loyalty to Jesus Christ, our King and Priest, and to one another, be our rallying word and inspiration, and the finances will, no doubt, rise to the occasion as it presents itself.

The small square envelopes in which the W. O. is made, and on which contributors are earnestly requested to mark amount enclosed, are on table of vestibule, where each one may supply himself, or be supplied by speaking to one of the ushers.

## SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT FOR 1900.

In presenting this Annual Report we must express regret at the loss the Sabbath School sustained by the removal of Mr. J. C. Kirkwood, who for several years filled the position of Superintendent with such efficiency and zeal. The congregation is under a deep obligation to Mr. Kirkwood for the interest he always showed not only in the Sabbath School, but in all other departments of church work.

We are pleased to be able to report that the School is in a satisfactory condition, though still far from being ideal.

The year just passed has been altogether an encouraging one. The teachers and officers have been regular in their attendance and efficient in the discharge of their duties, while the attendance of scholars has been about normal. Owing to the removal of some families from the Congregation, the number of Scholars on the roll is somewhat less than last year, being 182 as against 191 a year ago. The average attendance of Teachers and Scholars was 133, as against 138 last year, or 62 per cent. for both years. We feel that to the matter of more regular attendance special importance should be attached; 62 per cent. is not high enough—not nearly so high as the rate of attendance of virtually the same pupils at the Public school. To remedy this, greater co-operation on the part of the home is necessary. No one is educated in the truest sense who is ignorant of the Bible, yet it is an undoubted fact that in too many homes careful instruction in the Bible is not only neglected, but is systematically ignored. They look to the Sabbath School to supply this need, and too often fail to recognize any privilege. We are willing to assume the responsibility, and it is surely not too much to ask that parents should have their children as regular in their attendance at the Sabbath School as at the day school.

There is no preparation for life that is more necessary for them than a knowledge of the Bible, and none that may be more important in its results on the future well-being and happiness of both parent and child.

The offerings for the year have been sufficient to meet all our obligations, and leave a balance on the right side of each account. The two special offerings granted by the Congregation amounted to \$27.64, which was some \$10 less than in 1899, and \$37 less than in 1898.

We have a good Library, which, we are pleased to say, is used by many in the Congregation as well as by the Sabbath School scholars; but if its present efficient state is to be maintained, we must set aside a sum annually for additions, as, with so much handling, books become worn out and have to be replaced. This year \$37 were expended on new books.

The day set apart as Children's Day by the General Assembly of our Church was observed as a special day in the Sabbath School. On this occasion we were favored with the presence of a large number from the Congregation. It would be a source of pleasure and encouragement to all of us to have the older members of the Congregation visit us oftener.

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The Sabbath School is universally recognized to be a good institution, a necessary adjunct to every congregation. It is, as has been noticed, the only place where many children can acquire a knowledge of the Bible by the systematic study of it, and it is, we believe, the means in God's hands of bringing many souls to Christ; but to teach the Bible, to lead in the study about God, immortality, and man's duty to his fellow-man, is one of the greatest privileges of a Christian's experience. Will you enlist under the leadership of Christ in working for the Kingdom of God?

**Sixteenth Annual Report of Brampton Auxiliary to the W. F. M. S.**

Meetings have been held during the year on the first Friday of each month, with the exceptions of the months of July and August.

At the beginning of the year the Executive met and decided to send a written invitation to our meetings to every lady in the Congregation, with the hope that our membership might be increased. We regret to say that it was not effectual, as our membership, including 13 members of the General Society and 11 Scattered Helpers, is 57—less than that of last year. The average attendance is 28.

The total amount of money contributed is \$193.73. During the year an appeal was made on behalf of India's starving millions, and \$67.15 were sent to the Treasurer of the Famine Fund.

We regret to state that only 70 copies of The Tidings are in circulation this year, and there is a larger deficit in The Tidings account, showing that there are fewer subscribers also.

The bale for the Northwest was valued at \$25.65. \$7.00 in cash was also contributed.

The meetings on the whole were interesting and profitable.

Our pastor, Mr. Clark, was present at our September meeting, and addressed us on "Mission Work at Home."

Our Annual Thank Offering Meeting was held in November. The attendance was larger than usual, and the offering amounted to \$40.75.

We were privileged to have with us Mrs. Goforth, who spoke of her life and work in Honan, China. She was listened to with great pleasure by all present.

In reviewing the work of the past year, there has been much to encourage us, and we trust that the dawn of the new century will be marked by a greater zeal and activity on the part of the individual members of the Society.

## Twelfth Annual Report of the McLaren Mission Band.

During the year fifteen regular meetings have been held.

The meetings were held on the first and third Fridays of each month, and were devoted alternately to the study of the Life and Work of Alexander McKay, of Uganda, and to the making of quilts and scrap books.

Short programmes gave additional interest to the meetings.

The number of names enrolled as regular members was forty-six, and the average attendance was seventeen.

Rev. Mr. Clark, our pastor, delivered a lecture on "Burns," under the auspices of the Mission Band. The proceeds of the lecture were given to the Century Fund.

The members of the Band contributed voluntarily at each meeting held during the year.

The total amount of money raised was forty-one dollars and eighty-five cents (\$41.85). Of this amount twenty dollars (\$20) was contributed to the Famine Fund by the Sunday School, through the Mission Band, and ten dollars (\$10) was given to the Century Fund.

A bale valued at twenty five dollars was sent to the Northwest.

Our Report is, in many respects, an encouraging one. May it stimulate each member to greater effort in the work for which we are banded together.
