the hostess the best she had ever tasted!

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the shops." All decently attired persons who encountered the rioters were maltreated, wearers of silk hats meeting with particularly rough usage. Lord Randolph Churchill appeared at the window of the Carlton Club building. When the mob reached there he was loudly hooted and menaced with clenched fists by the rioters. The most violent acts were committed on north and south Bailey and Oxford streets. Probably three or four shops were seriously damaged and about fifty shops pillaged, including jewellers, bankers, butchers and wine shops. Hundreds of inoffensive people were maltreated. The police were powerless at first but ultimately succeeded in restoring order by breaking up the ranks of the rioters into small squads. The military were kept under arms all the evening while policemen patrolled the streets.

BELLEVILLE UNDER WATER.

BELLEVILLE, Feb. 4.—Bel was in the situation in the district yesterday, it has later materially for the worse within the last few hours. The intense cold that has prevailed for the past three nights, namely 17° below zero on Monday night, the same on Tuesday night, with a maximum of 3° below yesterday and a maximum of 16° below today, by causing the formation of an ice in great quantities, almost completely blocked up the mouth of the river, and dammed back the water to a height of about eight feet above its ordinary level. Not a furnace in the district is at present able to burn. The basement of many of the stores on Front street, from the bridge south, the principal business portions of the city, or on Bridge street, has been submerged, and immense inconvenience has been caused.

The water has flooded into Coleman street in front of the Methodist Church and covers the road-bed and sidewalks to a distance of about 500 yards; it runs westward to Everett street, and has flooded four houses on the north side of Bridge street. On Everett street the water is a foot deep. At Bridge street, across which street it, for the first time, made its way today, a few houses to the south, which had heretofore been clear of water, have now been flooded, but were vacated to-day. The foot bridge is closed to traffic, the eastern approach being under water. The water is steadily rising, and it is now feared that the water will reach the foot bridge, and the business of the city will be brought to a standstill. It is estimated that about 100 families have been rendered homeless, and sixty-nine of these families are dependent on public charity.—*Montreal Witness.*

MISS GLADSTONE'S MARRIAGE.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Miss Mary Gladstone, daughter of Hon. W. E. Gladstone, was married this morning to Rev. Harry Drew, of Harwarden. The ceremony was performed at St. Margaret's Church, Westminster. Mr. Gladstone gave the bride away. Among the persons of note present were the Prince and Princess of Wales and their sons and Lord Leconfield. The bride's dress was of white muslin with Brussels lace. She wore a wreath of orange blossoms and lilies. The crowd gathered outside of the church witnessed the wedding party on their arrival and departure. The weather was very pleasant and the sun shone brightly.

WICKHAM, Pa., Feb. 6.—It is now seven weeks since the occurrence of the terrible disaster in Slope 1 of the Susquehanna Coal Company at Nanticoke, by which 26 men lost their lives. Every effort that human ingenuity could suggest has been made to recover the bodies but without success. The work of clearing up the gangways and recovering as rapidly as when first begun, as the calm and quicksand are now one compact mass, which is very difficult to remove. It is thought that it will be weeks and possibly months yet before the spot where the bodies are supposed to be can be reached. It is thought that when the fourth counter, which is now 500 feet away, is reached, the work will be done, and the bodies will be recovered. It is thought that the drilling of the hole is done only to satisfy the relatives of the unfortunate men.

PORTLAND, OREGON, Feb. 6.—To-day, as if by a programme laid out, the Chinese are being driven out of Seattle, W. T. It is understood that the Knights of Labor are at the head of the movement. The Chinese are marched to the steamer Queen of the Pacific, lying at the wharf, and the strikers pay the steamer passage to San Francisco for each one put on board. The steamer plies regularly between San Francisco and Puget Sound. At this hour (2 p.m.) about 100 Chinese have been put on board. On an attempt being made by rioters to force Chinese on board without paying fare, which is \$10 in each case, the captain stationed men with hose prepared to throw streams of boiling water into the mob if such an attempt is renewed. The mayor of Seattle and other prominent citizens telegraphed to Vancouver barracks asking General Gibbons, commanding the department of Columbia, for troops. Gen. Gibbons has telegraphed to the war department but no authority has yet come from Washington to send troops. Vancouver is 150 miles distant from Seattle and transportation would be effected by load and rail. The shortest time in which troops could be transported is seven hours and even if they should start to-night it would be too late to prevent an expulsion of the Chinese. Chief Justice Green, of Washington territory, has telegraphed Attorney General Garland.

SUDDEN DEATH.—The Madawaska correspondent of the *Carleton Place Standard* writes: Last week John White was found dead in his bed at Grand Falls. On the 28th January, Mrs. Belliveau, an elderly woman, was found dead in her bed, at St. Leonard's, and on the 31st January, at St. Basil, Odile Daigle was found dead in his bed. He had just come from Minnesota to sell his farm and settle up his business to return, when he suddenly died. On the Cummo Ridge, St. Leonard's, on last Friday night, Michel Michaud got burned out, losing every thing, the family barely escaping with their lives, having to seek for shelter, bare-footed and nearly naked, with their children.

NOVA SCOTIA SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The grand division, S. of T. for Nova Scotia, met at Hopewell, on Tuesday afternoon. Twenty-two were initiated. The officers' reports show solid progress during the quarter. There are now 306 active divisions in Nova Scotia with 179,780 members. Eight divisions were organized with 257 charter members; five inactive divisions were reactivated; four have been suspended. Receipts from divisions, dues and supplies, \$1,061; agency receipts, \$424. Members unanimously favor Dominion legislation that will make the Scott Act effective.

RICHMOND, Feb. 6.—The train which left here yesterday week returned this afternoon. The road is now considered in a fair condition. Much dissatisfaction is expressed at the management of the railroad in Kent. St. Louis is entirely wrecked.

NEAL DOW'S NEW CRUSADE.

PORTLAND, Jan. 19.—General Neal Dow this morning caused the arrest of Robert Costello of Boston, engaged with dealer, when at home, a wholesale liquor dealer, and with soliciting orders in Portland. This is the first arrest ever made under the stringent provisions of the law, forbidding any one to go from place to place carrying or offering for sale intoxicating liquors. For each time a drummer makes a sale of liquor or tries to make a sale, he is liable to a fine of not less than \$20 or more than \$500, one half to go to the party making the complaint and one half to the county. General Dow will be in the municipal court to-morrow when this case is called up, and will have with him a small army of witnesses, for Costello is said to have pushed his business in a very vigorous manner and to have taken or tried to take many orders. General Dow believes that it will be possible to completely break up the business of selling liquor by sample in this state or even of soliciting orders. "Any way," said the general, "we propose to try."

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

HIS HEAD CUT OFF BY A TREE.—The Santa Cruz Surf of January 10th, says: Coroner Davenport received a despatch from Glenwood this morning stating that a man named Charles Haines had been killed at Dougherty's mill, and requested him to come up. At 1.30 o'clock this morning while Haines and a companion were asleep in their cabin near Dougherty's mill the companion was awakened by a terrible crash and at the same time he received a heavy blow in the side. Upon procuring a light he found that an immense redwood tree had been blown down by the wind and had crashed through the cabin roof, striking Haines across the top of the head with such force as to cut it completely off. He reached Haines, who was sleeping on the opposite of the cabin, within five minutes after he was struck, but the man was stone dead and from appearance must have died instantly. Chas. M. Haines was a native of New Brunswick, coming from St. John River to that State about four years ago. He was a single man, about 29 years of age, and has been at work at the mill about one year and a half. His brother married a granddaughter of Mrs. Mary Boyle, who lives on Locust street in this city.

THE MICHIGAN PINEHILLS.

THE LOG CROP OF THE SAGINAW DISTRICT.—EAST SAGINAW, Mich., Feb. 1.—The Saginaw Courier this morning published a statement of the district log crop of 1885 and estimates of the output to supply mills for 1886. The total quantity of logs floated out of streams in the Saginaw district last season was 465,284,045 feet, hauled by rail direct to the river, 177,933,222 feet making a total product of 643,177,267 feet. In 1884 the total raft of logs floated was 771,000,000 feet, of which 25,000,000 feet of old logs, 25,000,000 feet of new logs, and 500,000,000 feet of the Upper Peninsula and Gordon Bay, a total of 771,000,000 feet, were floated. The total raft of logs floated for the supply of the Saginaw River mills next season.

THE POLES MUST GO.

PRINCE BISMARCK MAKES A REMARKABLE SPEECH.

BERLIN, Jan. 28.—Prince Bismarck to-day, in a debate in the Prussian Landtag on the expulsion of Poles from Germany, made a remarkable speech, occupying two hours. He said the primary cause of the government's action was disloyalty of the Poles to the German crown. They were, he said, constantly engaged in intrigues against the government, and had made themselves a steady annoyance to Prussia. In order to make the colonization insure permanently to the benefit of the empire, the Poles had to be expelled. The cost of the undertaking would be about three hundred millions of marks (about \$75,000,000), but the state will lose no more than ten per cent. in this state or even of soliciting orders. SCOTT ACT CONVICTIONS.

There were five convictions in Fredericton last week under the Scott Act, and fined \$50 each. The parties convicted of violating the act were: Harry Morris, J. R. Russell, J. Alf. Russell, Robert B. Segge, and James Hanlon. Sergeant Vanlandine laid the information in each of these cases. There were none cases before the court which will be tried this week. The chief magistrate, Judge Marsh, remarked in a conversation with him lately on the subject that "under a recent decision there was no appeal from the magistrate's decision, and that all the fines would have to be paid, or the parties go to jail."
