

### PROTECTING THE HEALTH OF LIVE STOCK

### Report of the Animals Branch of The Dominion Department of Agriculture

The Report of the Health of Animals Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture for the year ending March 31st, 1913, is out. This is the first report issued by Dr. F. Torrance, as Veterinary Director General. This Branch of the Federal service has assumed large proportions covering as it does, the control of import quarantine stations; the control of movements of animals within the Dominion with regard to contagious diseases and the inspection of meats and canned goods.

In the course of a lengthy statement regarding inspection conditions the report says:—  
The necessity for a rigid inspection of meat-food animals is apparent when, in establishments under inspection, there were condemned as diseased and unfit for human food, 7,288 carcasses and 624,882 portions; yet the number slaughtered in these establishments represents only about fifty per cent of the total kill in the Dominion. The animals brought to inspected plants are selected and apparently healthy, the managements knowing well that to slaughter an animal affected with disease means its condemnation and loss, yet, in spite of the care exercised by their buyers, diseases found on post-mortem were responsible for the destruction of the number of carcasses and portions above mentioned.

The conditions surrounding the slaughter, and the healthfulness of the meat obtained from the other fifty per cent of animals, slaughtered without inspection or supervision of any kind, may be imagined when it comprises animals refused by packers as suspicious, as well as those showing unmistakable ante-mortem evidences of disease, together with its quota of those, the healthfulness of which can only be decided by a careful post-mortem examination conducted by a qualified and trained veterinary meat inspector.

It is to be regretted that Boards of Health have been so long neglectful of this matter, although there are no doubt many difficulties to overcome in establishing a proper system of local and municipal meat inspection. It must come, however, but until municipal bodies bestir themselves, so long will a great percentage of disease-causing people be served with unclean and unwholesome meat foods which cannot be other than a menace to health.

### Rev. Dr. Van Allen Severe in His Denunciation of Present-Day Fiction

(Boston Advertiser).  
The club was celebrating the 102nd anniversary of the birth of Charles Dickens. Dr. Van Allen's topic was "Dickens and Human Sympathy."

He declared that the art of to-day was inferior to the art of the Renaissance, or the 13th century. Buildings built in that time, he said, are still standing, and to-day people still made long pilgrimages to see the wonderful works of art.

"Imagine people making pilgrimages to see our American buildings 700 years from now," said he. "Most of the buildings of to-day will be in ashes 300 years from now."

Speaking of Dickens's work, he declared: "It isn't art, it is the real thing, life. The characters he pictures are living flesh and blood. This is the supreme test in story writing."

Dr. David Studholm, in sharp contrast to the statement of Rev. Mr. Van Allen, declared that the modern novel and short story are now the most vital art we have.

Rev. Edward A. Horton classed modern day writings, for the greater part, as divided in three bad kinds which came upon the people like an avalanche. The three kinds are Incoherent, or effervescent writing, introspective labyrinthian metriculous and contagious.

### DEBT OF CANADA INCREASED LAST MONTH

Revenue in January Shows a Decline While Expenditures is Not Curtailed

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The debt of Canada increased last month almost eleven million dollars, the exact figures, according to the statement of the Finance Department being \$10,821,765. This brings the net debt to the handsome figure of \$314,883,870. While the debt is swelling, the revenue is shrinking. Last month it amounted to only \$11,629,763, while in January, the year before, the revenue was \$13,442,978, the falling off in revenue for the month, therefore, amounting to almost two million dollars. Expenditure for the month is given at \$17,100,446, an increase of about a million and a half.

### THE AGRICULTURAL GAZETTE OF CANADA

With the coming of the New Year, there has appeared in the field of Canadian journalism a new agricultural magazine which promises to serve a most useful purpose. At no time in the history of the world has the cause of agriculture been accorded the support it now receives from legislative bodies, and in no country has the industry been more wisely or generously helped than in Canada. The Dominion and provincial governments exercise the utmost diligence and concern in their efforts to solve the problems that confront the farmer; to this work increased impetus has been given by the coming into force of the Agricultural Instruction Act, which serves as a medium for co-operative effort.


With a view to bringing together information concerning the work of the federal and provincial Departments of Agriculture there has been commenced the publication of the Agricultural Gazette of Canada, the first number of which has just made its appearance.

While this magazine is edited and published at Ottawa its value is greatly increased by the co-operation of the officials of the Provincial Departments. The January number is evidently preparatory for what is to follow, as it is devoted chiefly to accounts of the organization and development of the several departments of Agriculture in Canada and statements of appropriations by which they are enabled to carry on their work. It contains also the full text of the Agricultural Instruction Act, the agreement with each of the provinces and a statement of the appropriations under the Act for the present year and the work made possible thereby.

In his "Foreword" the Honourable Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, points out that the magazine is not to enter into general circulation, but is to supply the press and those engaged in official agricultural work with facts and information relating to the educational and scientific side of agriculture. To these it is supplied free. For others a small additional number of copies will be printed from month to month, for which ten cents per copy or one dollar per year will be charged.

The magazine, which is clothed in a dignified cover, presents a very attractive appearance, being printed on high class, coated paper, which does full credit to the photo engravings of the Dominion and Provincial Ministers of Agriculture that appear in the first number.

### GLoucester POPULATION SHOWS INCREASE

#### Statistics Show Natural Increase of Over 900 For Year 1913

As will be seen from the above figures, the population of the County increased naturally during the year by 924, which compares very favorably with 1912's increase of 800. Bathurst parish did very well with a net increase of 173 or about 3 2-3 per cent. The increase of 924 in the whole county figures out at about the same rate as the parish of Bathurst, 3 2-3 per cent. The Protestant population of the County increased by 22 during the year, and the Roman Catholic by 902. In the census of 1911, there were 15 Catholics to every one Protestant in this County. The natural increase for 1913 is at the rate of 42 Catholics to every one Protestant.

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

**GREAT LUMBER MILL IS NOW COMPLETE**

Plant of Mr. A. E. Hammond is One of the Largest in Maine—Very Large Capacity

The Bangor Commercial says: An important development in the lumber manufacturing industry of Maine has just taken place in Van Buren in the completion of the large mill by A. E. Hammond, who was formerly at the head of the Van Buren Lumber Co. Mr. Hammond sold his holdings in that company to the Stearns, Cutler Co., which owns and operates large mills in St. John, N. B., Van Buren and Ashland and began last season on the erection of the plant which is now completed.

The new mill is located at Allandale, a mile and a half from the Van Buren post office on Violette stream, a tributary to the St. John river. The stream was dammed at a point just below the mill site, making a wide pond which extends about four miles up stream and affords a large storage for logs.

The main mill is 210 feet long by 60 feet wide, and the engine room is 25 feet wide and 45 feet deep, and a small detached pump-house that is 12 feet square. A well equipped machine shop has been built, this building being 25 by 50 feet.

The shingle shed is 200 feet long and there is a storehouse 90 feet wide. The loading platform is 300 feet long and 50 feet wide.

The entire equipment of the plant is new and modern in every particular, and was selected after thorough investigation in some of the largest plants of the country to determine the best to be used for the purpose. The boilers at the plant, which is run by steam are of 600 horse-power capacity and the engines at 550 h. p.

An intimation of the size and importance of this plant on the northern boundary of the state of Maine may be had from the figures which give the annual capacity in product of the mill. These figures were furnished by Mr. Hammond. It will turn out annually 15,000,000 feet of long lumber, 20,000,000 shingles, 7,500,000 laths and 1,000,000 clap-boards.

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**THE IMPROVIDENT WASTE OF WATER**

Needless Consumption in North American Cities Equals Hundred Gallons Daily

That the per capita consumption of water in most cities of North America is inordinately high, can be shown by a comparison with centres of population in Europe. The tables below give figures taken from representative cities on both sides of the Atlantic, and furnish a good basis for such a comparison.

Average 159.8. It will be seen from the above that the average consumption per head in America is between three and four times what it is in Europe. This tremendous difference can only be accounted for by assuming that the greater portion of the water consumed in New World cities is simply wasted. A consumption of 50 gallons per head per day ought to be ample for all purposes, and would still be about 43 per cent greater than the European average. Taking the American average as 150 gallons, we see that cities on this side of the Atlantic are using 100 gallons per head per day more than is necessary.

**PARCEL POST SYSTEM NOW IN OPERATION**

For First Three Months The Weight Limit Will be Six Pounds

At midnight Monday the new parcel post system came into effect.

For the first three months the limit of weight will be 6 pounds. After the three months organization period is over the limit of weight will be increased to 11 pounds. The general limit of size is 30 inches long with one foot depth or width, but parcels may be accepted up to 3 feet 6 inches in length provided the combined length and girth do not exceed six feet. The range of articles is provided for in a general way as follows: Farm and factory products, merchandise of all descriptions, such as dry goods, groceries, hardware, confectionery, stationery, seeds, rattings, bulbs, roots, bedding, plants, sections for grafts, and all other matter not included in first class, and not excluded from the mails by the general prohibitory regulations with respect to objectionable matters.

During the first three months 5 cents additional will be charged on each parcel mailed for local delivery where the letter-carrier system is in operation.

The rates on parcels addressed to any post office within 20 miles of place of mailing are: 1 lb., 5c.; 2 lbs., 6c.; 3 lbs., 7c.; 4 lbs., 8c.; 5 lbs., 10c.; 6 lbs., 12c.; 7 lbs., 14c.; 8 lbs., 16c.; 9 lbs., 18c.; 10 lbs., 20c.; 11 lbs., 22c. To any post office beyond 20 miles, but within the Maritime Provinces, which are considered one zone, the charges from 1 lb. up to 11 lbs., run as follows: 10, 14, 18, 22, 26, 30, 34, 38, 42, 46, 50 cents. The 20 mile zone includes into the province of Quebec.

To any post office in Quebec the charges on from 1 lb. up to 11 lbs., are as follows: 10, 16, 22, 28, 34, 40, 46, 52, 58, 64 70 cents. To any post office in Ontario the same range of weight from 1 lb. to 11 lbs., runs as follows: 12, 20, 28, 36, 44, 52, 60, 68, 76, 84, 92 cents. To any post office in Manitoba the charges on the range of weights are as follows: 12, 24, 34, 44, 54, 64, 74, 84, 94c., \$1.04 and \$1.14. To any post office in Saskatchewan, Alberta, or British Columbia, the charges are 12, 24, 36, 48, 60, 72, 84 96c., \$1.08, \$1.20, \$1.32.
