GRAMMAR SCHOOL BADLY DAMAGED

Janitor Said to be Responsible for Flooding Upper Rooms Monday Morning.

The Campbellton Grammar School was badly damaged by water Monday morning when the janitor unscrewed one of the valve caps in a class room, allowing the steam and water to flow out until the room was flooded, and water ran down into the rooms below. It is said that the janitor turned water into the boiler, and forgot to turn it off until the boiler and many of the radiators were filled. He then went to the room in question and removed the valve cap, and steam and water prevented him from replacing it. Fortunately a plumber and a young man who knew something about such heating plants arrived on the scene and replaced the cap, but not until much damage had been done. The water ran to the lower rooms and the books of many of the pupils were practically destroyed. Principal Titus at once dismissed all the rooms until afternoon, and some of them until Tuesday morning.

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CLEVER MISS PANKHURST.

Some of the Things She Will Do For Women.

Miss Christabel Pankhurst is evidently a woman of perception, says the New York Sun. She realizes that most of the political cause-and held out to the voter, and particularly the Socialist movement, have looked favorably. They have been abstract in their offerings, whereas most people want the concrete. Miss Pankhurst goes into particulars as to what the women of Great Britain will get when there is a woman's regime; not what they will get in the way of placing on the Australian budget but what they will get in their own homes.

The British Parliament will be responsible for the electricity that turns the mangles, cooks the meals and warms the houses. Why should women drag coal scuttles about, stand over steaming washbasins, spend hours over old-fashioned ranges, which not only eat up coal but cook the cooks, when by legislation and electricity the burden of the world could be lifted?

What could make a better appeal to the women, not only of Britain, but of every land where electric lights have been turned on? Women, we said, but the Glasgow nature is fascinating to men as well. Every commuter, as well as his wife, knows that a world ruled by Queen Elizabeth would be a happy place; a joyous land of volts, watts, ohms, but not switches and incandescent light-bulbs, buttons everywhere, and not a bit of work. One dinner, dressing occasionally, would make a life worth the living.

The electric water, it is day-light and he snaps off the electric light, but he has his hand laying in their distant house since 2 a.m. A push of a button closes his bedroom windows. Another button doubles the heat from the electric furnace. A tap of the finger and the cat is let in and the dog let out. Within easy reach of the bed a percolator of coffee begins to bubble. A button is pushed and his box of razor blades is gently warmed. Electricity, at the desire of the consumer's thumb, heats his bath water.

Mrs. Compton, slipping her preliminary coffee, reaches for a switch at her bedside—an electric switch—and her Pankhurstian kitchen begins to operate. The orange squeezer, the oatmeal pot, the automatic butter dropper and its companion the electric griddle; the electric egg breaker and the electric plate warmer—all these take up their labors. In due time an electric elevator takes the family to the dining room or brings a tray upstairs. Meanwhile electricity has gently dragged Mr. Commuter out of bed and, through a magnetic device, has put the buttons in his chest. Mr. Commuter, connected with the thermometer and barometer, tells him the state of the weather. While he is putting on his collar, a feat which electricity will never perform for him, he pushes buttons which attend to the feeding of the chickens, the milking of the cow and the pumping of the tire.

To make the detail perfect we should have an electric voice calling to the man as he steps into his electric car. "Haven't you forgotten your consultation ticket?" But in that day of free electricity there will be no consultation tickets, railroads will be free too. So, without a care, he will drive off, waving gaily to his wife on her way to press the buttons that attend to the dish-washing, the dusting and the sewing of the new crepe mink party dress.

A "Golden" Pippin.

Sir Robert Borden had a practical illustration since his arrival in London of the cost of living. On Recent Street some fine apples in a fruit store attracted his attention and appetite. But when he found they were selling for 11 a pound he decided to leave his appetite for this luscious fruit unsatisfied until he visited Grand Pre on his return. This price, of course, was abnormal, but apples of the poorest quality cannot be purchased for less than 25 cents per pound. Eggs enter largely into the living of every person and are a fair indication of the cost of living. For the past two weeks eggs have been selling in London at \$2.16 per dozen. An attempt is being made to fix the price at \$1.35 per dozen, but with little success. Meat does not show such an enormous increase in cost as compared with Canadian prices, being about 50 per cent. higher without regard to quality. Bacon sold in London would not be related here. Practically all the beef and the fall and winter is made into bacon by salting it to a degree that the unfortunate householder is paying an exorbitant price for a very inferior article. Potatoes for the past two weeks have not been obtainable in more than four-pound lots, and cost about \$2.50 per bushel. A greater and cheaper supply is promised. It is estimated that the purchasing value of a pound is only seven shillings compared to pre-war prices.

Sims' Flag Caused Excitement.

Most harmonious is the working of the two navies, British and American. Admiralty House is quite a home for the Americans, and, needless to say, the British vice-admiral, with his years of sea life, is an interesting figure to the young officers from the United States. So close is the co-operation of the two services that when the British vice-admiral was on leave some time ago, Admiral Sims, the senior American naval officer, hoisted his flag at Queenstown, and through the island went the rumor that Ireland had been handed over to the United States!—The London Times.

Soldiers Provided With Work.

Each British soldier will be provided with employment after the great armies in the field have been demobilized, according to comprehensive plans which are now being worked out by the Government.

Shipbuilding In Inverness.

Inverness, the largest town in Scotland, north of Aberdeen, is taking a forward step in connection with the development of shipbuilding.

POTATOES CHEAPER.

The St. John Telegraph says:—The potato trade in this Province has been depressed considerably this month. Dealers up the St. John river have marked down the price to \$1.75 a barrel to producers. 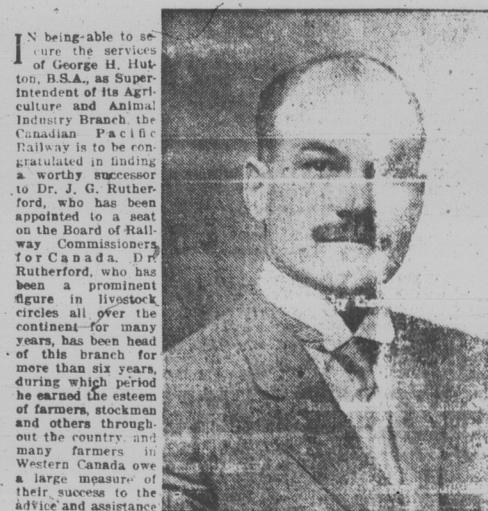

New Head for C.P.R. Demonstration Farms



G. H. HUTTON

IN being able to secure the services of George H. Hutton, B.S.A., as Superintendent of the Agricultural and Animal Industry Branch of the Dominion Government Experimental Station at Lacombe, the C.P.R. has been fortunate in finding a worthy successor to Dr. J. G. Rutherford, who has been a prominent figure in livestock circles all over the continent for many years, has been head of the branch for more than six years, during which period he earned the esteem of farmers, stockmen and others throughout the country and many farmers in Western Canada owe to him the introduction of a large measure of livestock success to the advice and assistance given by him. His appointment to the post of Superintendent of the station has been a great and useful loss to the work, there was also a very valuable one in the live stock industry in the province.

Mr. Hutton has been connected with farming in some way or another since he first began. He is a thoroughbred practical farmer. During his boyhood days he did those tasks which are still the lot of a boy brought up on the farm. Later he went to college where he obtained his B.S.A. degree in 1906. After obtaining a year's experience in Eastern Canada for about six years, he went back to his home in the Dominion Government Experimental Station at Lacombe, where he has been since his appointment with the Canadian Pacific. This has been done by showing the immense possibilities of the country and by proving in the practical manner how favorable the conditions are for the raising of live stock and dairying. Sent to Lacombe to operate the Government Experimental Station with a view to ascertaining and demonstrating the varieties of grasses, grains, fruits, and vegetables most suitable to local conditions, and the best methods to employ to secure most economical results. By so doing that if there was a great and useful field in this work, there was also a very valuable one in the live stock industry in the province.

Few men have done more than he in promoting and farming industries among the farmers of Central Alberta. This has been done by showing the immense possibilities of the country and by proving in the practical manner how favorable the conditions are for the raising of live stock and dairying. Sent to Lacombe to operate the Government Experimental Station with a view to ascertaining and demonstrating the varieties of grasses, grains, fruits, and vegetables most suitable to local conditions, and the best methods to employ to secure most economical results. By so doing that if there was a great and useful field in this work, there was also a very valuable one in the live stock industry in the province.

The information gained as a result of the experiments conducted at Lacombe have been very valuable to farmers throughout Western Canada. Hog-raising, sheep-raising, beef and milk production are all subjects that have had most careful attention. During the last three years more than three thousand hogs have been used on the farm in tests of various breeds and methods, which were the most successful producers under the conditions. In a grading experiment with sheep now being conducted more than four hundred ewes are included. An excellent herd of Angus cattle has also been established, and the foundation laid for a first class herd of Holsteins. From the sale of live stock the farm has a revenue running into many thousands of dollars annually.

Mr. Hutton's work with the Canadian Pacific will be along lines similar to those along which he has previously been engaged. His new duties will include the supervision of demonstration farms operated by this company, at which settlers in Western Canada may receive advice, based on the experience of many years as to the best farming methods to employ, thus giving the new settler a chance to avoid many of the mistakes likely to be made by farmers coming from a country where different conditions prevail. Probably no other private company has as many demonstration farms as the Canadian Pacific. It is a great and useful field in this work, there was also a very valuable one in the live stock industry in the province.

Lieut. O. J. Lawson, Provincial Secretary of the N. B. Provincial Command of the G. W. V. A. with headquarters at St. John, N. B., who was spending a week-end at Campbellton delivered an able address to the Restigouche Branch of the G. W. V. A. at their rooms at Murray Hall at a special meeting Sunday afternoon last.

Lieut. Lawson's address was most interesting and exhaustive concerning the matters he touched upon and was very much appreciated by the large audience present and at its conclusion a hearty vote of thanks was passed thanking Mr. Lawson, the founder and organizer of the Restigouche Branch of the G. W. V. A. for his instructive address.

It might be stated that Lieut. Lawson is a strong temperance advocate and highly commended the local Branch for not advocating the abolition of the prohibition law not in effect in New Brunswick. Lieut. Lawson informed his comrades that he never asked for nor did he receive a cent of salary for doing the work of Provincial Secretary of the N. B. Command of the G. W. V. A., which he had been doing for about a year and he also informed them that he was resigning from that position owing to ill-health contracted on the battlefield.

Lieut. Lawson's services as Provincial Secretary were very much appreciated by his comrades throughout the Province and his loss will be keenly felt. It is to be hoped that his health will be speedily restored enabling him to take up his old position again, as he is a hard and conscientious worker.

J. Ramsay MacDonald Is Condemned by Many People But Remains a Leader

He came to London in 1888 and became secretary to Mr. Thomas Lough, a post which he occupied till 1891. He began to take an interest in the Socialist movement early in life, and a natural gift for hard and careful expression won him a place as a foremost exponent of Socialist doctrine. He turned out much of the Socialist propaganda, and spoke in its interests. He was on the council of the Fabian Society, one of those distinguished members is Mr. Bernard Shaw, who also sat on the council of the Labor party. From 1901 to 1904 he was a member of the London County Council.

He made two unsuccessful attempts to get into Parliament, contesting Southampton in 1895 and Leicester in 1900. He was finally elected in Leicester in 1906.

Ramsay MacDonald is largely responsible for the organization of the Labor movement in Great Britain. He has a genius for organization. His power of clear exposition helps, too, to win for him a foremost position as leader of the workers. He was leader of the Labor party from 1911 to 1914. Formerly he had been chairman of the Independent Labor party (1906-9) and from 1909-1911 he was secretary of the party.

Ramsay MacDonald's attitude throughout the war made him one of the most disliked men in the Empire. The most conspicuous fact about him, the Londoners would just one remarked, is that he is out of jail. He was the champion of the conscientious objectors. He could not see any jurisdiction for the war beyond the point where the democratic forces of the world were ready to take things into their hands. The war's main aim, he thought, was not the destruction of the German Empire, but the destruction of the existing social system.

It was these views that made him such a strenuous protagonist of the "peace by negotiation" movement, and a termination of the war by concentrated action on the part of the Socialists of the world, including those of Germany.

Ramsay MacDonald, since he became a leading exponent of Socialism, and a leader in the Labor party, has traveled widely and moved in the best social and intellectual circles. He has given an intellectual trend to the workingman's Socialism, lifting it out of the mere impracticalities of the "soap box" school. Here is his own definition of Socialism, taken from a book which he wrote on the subject for an educational series. "Socialism is the creed of those who, recognizing that the community exists for the improvement of the individual and for the maintenance of liberty, and that the control of the economic circumstances of life means the control of life itself, seek to build up a social organization which will include in its activities the management of those economic instruments, social, land and industrial capital that cannot be left safely in the hands of individuals."

In 1895 MacDonald married Miss Margaret Gladstone of the Westminster Industrial Council, a daughter of a distinguished man of science.

War to Peace

To Solve Canada's Employment Problem

EVERYONE in Canada should understand just what the Government is doing to solve the unemployment problems that may arise through the demobilization of our fighting forces.

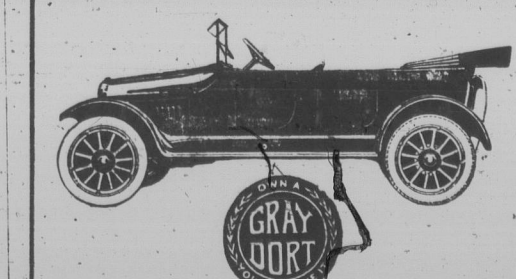
(1) **Employment Offices.**
So that everyone—male or female, soldier or civilian—can get quickly such jobs as are available the Government is co-operating with the Provinces in establishing a chain of Public Employment Offices. Employers are being urged to make use of these offices to secure any help they need. Farmers, for example, who need hired men should apply to the nearest office. There will be a Public Employment Office in every town of 10,000 people—and wherever the need for one exists. There will be 60 different offices in all—one-half are already in operation.

(2) **Employment Opportunities.**
The war held up much work that will now be carried on at once. Public works, shipbuilding, roadbuilding, railway work—construction of bridges, improvement of road-bed, making of new equipment—these will provide new opportunities for employment. In addition, the Government has sent a Trade Mission overseas to secure for Canada a share in the business of providing materials and products required for reconstruction work in Europe. It has also set aside the large sum of \$25,000,000 to be loaned through the Provinces to encourage the building of workmen's houses. This will mean much new work in the spring.

(3) **Land and Loans for Soldiers.**
To help soldiers become farmers the Government has developed a programme that includes the providing of land, the granting of loans, and the training and supervision of those inexperienced in farming. At present, the soldier is granted, free, in addition to his ordinary homestead right, one quarter-section of Dominion lands. He also receives a loan up to the maximum of \$2,500.

These original plans are now being broadened. If Parliament passes the new proposals during this session, the Soldier Settlement Board will be able to buy suitable land and re-sell it to the soldier at cost.

Land up to the value of \$5,000 may be bought by this plan—the money to be repaid in 20 years. The low interest rate of 5 per cent. will be charged. These new proposals will also permit the Soldier Settlement Board to loan the soldier-farmer up to \$2,500 for purchasing equipment, etc., in addition to \$5,000 loan on his farm.

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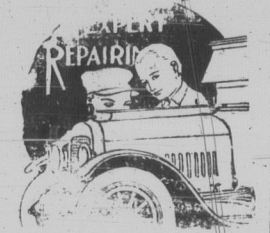
