REVENUE NEARLY UP TO FORECAST

Deputy Minister Sees Improvement in Lumber Industry for N. B.

Fredericton, Aug. 4.—T. G. Loggie, I. S. O., Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, on instruction of Hon. C. W. Robinson, Minister, issued a statement, today, concerning the revenue collections in his department during the present year, and also made a forecast for the ensuing year. The estimated revenue in the Dept. of Lands and Mines, as presented to the House of Assembly in April last, was \$738,500 for the year ending October 31, 1922. Of that amount the Department has received, up to the present time, an amount in the vicinity of \$500,000. The receipts from stumpage total about \$220,000 and from mileage, about \$60,000. At present, scarcely half the mileage has been paid but payments are being received steadily and it is believed that the end of October the amount will all be received.

The Deputy Minister, with regard to prospects for the ensuing year, said they were rather bright. He felt able to forecast a revenue of one million dollars for the year ending October 31, 1923. Possibly that amount would be exceeded. Much would depend on the rate of stumpage. The prospect was for a general improvement in the lumber situation. Delay had been encountered, said Col. Loggie, in the matter of receiving statutory declarations from operations on crown lands as by law provided. Such declarations are to be forwarded by May 1, each year in many cases operators take every advantage in delay. Col. Loggie said that the great problem confronting the Department at the present time was connected with the timber killed by the budworm. There was the problem of its removal from the woods and that of the rate of stumpage to be charged.

GREAT BRITAIN AND

IT'S TITLE PEST.

After reading of the discussion

which has been taking place in the

British House of Lords respecting

titles one is more than ever inclined

to agree with the request of the Canadian

House of Commons some years

ago, to the effect that no more titles

be given to Canadians. The war and

its aftermath has had an evil effect

upon this title business and goodness

knows it was bad enough in pre-war

days. For every little service, no

matter how trivial, titles of great and

small degree have been spread broad-

cast in the Old Country. It has got

so that it takes all of one's time to

dodge them. Advertise yourself

efficiently as the buyer of a large

amount of war loan, and bang comes

a knighthood or a baronetcy. Writing

a goodly amount of patriotic

"bosh" was another sure way to

knighthood.

But worse than all this is the fact

that titles are purchasable with hard

cash. Of course, there is this to be

said for the cash down principle, it

indicates that the buyer of the bauble

has some capacity, else he would not

have accumulated the money, while a

lot of people in England who have

titles have neither capacity nor any-

thing else that commends them. That

titles are purchasable for gold has been

charged both in the British House of

Lords and in the Commons on in-

numerable occasions and has never

been denied. It has usually been a

case of an easy method of augment-

ing party funds. In the present dis-

cussion in the Lords the name of Sir

James Robinson of South Africa who

was to have been handed a peerage,

for what goodness knows, came prom-

inently to the fore. It developed

that General Smuts, who really de-

serves a title, but probably would not

accept one under present conditions,

was obliged to tell the South African

House of Assembly that neither he

nor his ministers had been consulted

in respect to bestowing this Robinson

person into the peerage. Whereupon

the fit was in the fire and Robinson

felt called upon to write the British

authorities and begged to be excused.

Canada appears to have been for-

tunate in shutting off the tap just in

time.—Toronto Saturday Night.

In the bestowing of titles, in Can-

ada, where they are not given as a

public recognition of worthy deeds

performed, but simply as a means of

collecting an election campaign fund

from persons who have an overplus

of money and vanity, would it not be

well to legalize the granting of titles

and use the revenue derived therefrom

to help pay the interest on our war

debt. For instance in the case of

such a man wishing to be designated

"Sir", just charge him about \$10,000,

and if he wishes a peerage and can

afford it and forever after be dubbed

a "Lord," charge him about \$100,000.

In that way part of the burden of

taxation could be shifted from the

main springs of the country's indus-

tries to the purse strings of wealthy

vanity.

The proceeds of the sale of senator-

ship might also be diverted from the

channel of campaign funds to legiti-

mate revenue.—Cor.

been one of the young, inexperienced

police, but everyone liked Doak and

he was a fine man in the country and

everyone feels badly. There was

boy, but we hope he will be punished

further east, and it will be a lesson to

them all. The police cancelled their

trip to Norman, so we won't get any

mail now until the boat comes in in

August or September.
