The Russian Exile System.

The bark Catharine Sudden has arrived at Port Townsend from Siberia. Her commander, Capi. John Thomas, has sent here a description of the Russian exile system as witnessed by him. He describes a brutal scene he witnessed on Saghalien Island, a famous Russian exile prison. A large party of exiles of all ages, heavy manacled, were being taken to the island. A few old men whose strength gave out fell from exhaustion. The driver, acting under orders from his superior, shot the unfortunate men and removed their chains. No mercy was shown. Wives saw their husbands shot beshown. Wives saw their husbands shot be-fore their eyes; mothers saw their daughters outraged and insuited. The exiles were driven like cattle, a heavy whip being used to urge them on. The prison cells were filthy and the treatment barbarous.

The case of Hugh McLeod, aged almost 107, which has lately been published, illustrates in a remarkable manner the truth of these observations. Here in New York the American girls have been driven out of the clothing shops altogether by the Polish, Russian and Hungarian women, who work ten hours a day seven days in the week for \$4. The average wages paid the factory girls by suit, cap, cloak, feather, flower and underwear manufacturers is \$3.70. Perhaps 300 forewomen get \$25 a week, and a number are able to earn \$6 after ten years' service, but there are thousands of little girls and young women who begin at \$1 and are raised at the rate of 75 cents a year.—[New York World.]
