WASHINGTON, March 31.—In an officia te dated to-day Baron Fava, the Italian Minister, declared to the Secretary of State that the United States Govern not having given assurances that the murderers of the Italian subjects acquitted by the jury and murdered in prison while by the jury and murdered in prison while under the immediate protection of the authorities of New Orleans would be brought to justice, the Italian Government has found itself under the very painful necessity of showing openly its dissatisfaction by recalling the Minister of his Majesty from a country where the Italian Representative is unable to obtain justice. The Baron will soon leave the United States, leaving the Secretary of Legation in charge only of the current affairs. The action of the Italian Government caused

THE DEEPEST SURPRISE in official circles here when the fact became known. It had been generally supposed that the Italian Government would at least await the action of the New Orleans grand jury, which is charged with an investigation of the bloody episode at the jail. It appears, however, that the information received from its representatives must have led that Government to the conclusion that the grand jury investigation would fail to result in the punishment, or even indictment, of any berson connected with the killing of the talians. Gov. Nicholl's letter in reply to Secretary Blaine was also, it is thought, regarded as evasion of the real point at issue—reparation for an alleged wrong—and the Governor's assurances that further bloodshed would not follow, unaccompanied by any excuse for the failure of the State or municipal authorities to take precautions to prevent the killing, was, it is said, regarded by the Italian Government with extreme dissatisfaction.

A SIMILAR CASE.

The situation between the United States and Italy as it stands to-night is the same as that between the United States and Austria at the time that Austria declined to receive Minister Kiely under the Cleveland Administration. The only difference in a diplomatic sense is that Kiely simply was not received. The refusal to receive Kiely was resented by the United States, and another Minister was not sent to Austria by our Government for fully one year. The result of that was that the Austrian Minister to Washington was given what was called a leave of absence and left Washington. He never returned, and subsequently died in retirement. When diplomatic relations were renewed Austria sent a new minister. The relations between the United States and Austria were in consequence for a long period strained and there was a complete severance of diplomatic relations; but no one talked of war and the consuls remained at their posts. The commercial relations between the two countries were not interrupted, although the diplomatic relations were suspended.

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



THEY SHIVER ON THE BRINK. A Washington dispatch says that the hitch in the matter of sending the Dominion Commissioners to Washington to negotiate a reciprocity treaty is due to two things: First, to the inability of Sir John Macdonald and Secretary Blaine to come to an agreement as to the articles which shall be considered; second, to the fact that Newfoundland and the Dominion have not come to an understanding.

It is known that Secretary Blaine has refused to enter on negotiations for reciprocity in natural products alone, in accord with his declared policy to have all-round reciprocity or nothing. But it must not be supposed that even reciprocity in natural products is wanted by the Dominion Government, if indeed it knows what it does

In the West, the Conservative leaders lenounced the idea of reciprocity in farm products as inimical to the interests of the agriculturists. If they proceed with reciprocity in natural products, these men must belie their words, and leave supporters like Mr. Marshall in a strange quan-Then in the East the Conservative leaders pledged their party's support to the continuance of the duties on coal, no mat-ter how seriously they handicap the railways and the manufacturers in these great central Provinces. It is true that Sir Charles Tupper, when he attempted to bribe the Grand Trunk manager into intimidating his employes to vote solidly for trade restriction, professed to believe that Sir John Macdonald favors the removal of the tax on coal. A Mob Attacks Mrs. Jackson's House and Tries to Burn Her in Effigy-Her Relatives Accused of Conspiracy.


London, March 31.—The Jackson family imbroglio, the latter phases of which were the abduction of Mrs. Jackson by her husthe abduction of Mrs. Jackson by her husband at Clitheroe, a few weeks age, as the lady was emerging from church, the unsuccessful attempt of her friends, led by her brother-in-law, a lawyer named Baidwin, to storm the house of Jackson's brother in Blackburn, whither Mrs. Jackson had been conveyed, and her subsequent release by Jackson, upon an order of the Court of Appeals, has taken a new turn. When the abduction occurred popular sympathy was largely occurred popular sympathy was largely upon the side of Mrs. Jackson, but as the facts in the case became known, 99 per cent. of the people espoused the cause of largery

Mrs. Jackson inherited a large fortune from a Mr. Anderson, who sought her hand in marriage prior to her engagement to Jackson, but whom she refused. Nevertheless, when Anderson died, a short time atter her marriage, it was found that his will bequeathed the bulk of his estate to Mrs. Jackson dying without issue, her estate would fall to her nearest relatives, Mrs. Baldwin and Miss Hall, her unmarried sister, who is a member of Baldwin's family. Mrs. Jackson is childless, and the people of Clitherce hold Baldwin responsible for the estrangement between her and her husband, in the first place, and for the subsequent attempts which have been made to keep them apart and prevent a reconciliation. Mrs. Jackson inherited a large fortun

ation.

The popular feeling against Mr. and Mrs. Baldwin and Mrs Jackson has rapidly increased of late, and on Saturday evening a mob of indignant residents of Clitheree attempted to burn Mrs. Jackson in effigy. In response to a call quietly circulated hundreds of persons gathered in the market place and marched in procession through the chief streets bearing the effigy aloft. The police became aware of the purpose of the mob, and when the crowd arrived at the house occupied by Mrs. Jackson they found the constables guarding it in strong force.

Finding themselves foiled in their original purpose, the mob became furious. After a hasty consultation of the leaders, the street lights were extinguished, and the crowd attacked the house with stone and other missiles, smashing the window. and other missiles, smashing the windows and doing other damage, the utmost efforts of the police being necessary to prevent the rioters from effecting an entrance to the building. The maddened people then proceeded to Mrs. Baldwin's house, which proceeded to Mrs. Baldwin's house, which they pelted with stones, mud, sticks, etc., breaking many windows, and, but for the timely arrival of a large posse of police, would have battered down the doors. The mob fought desperately in their attempts to get into the house, but the police finally succeeded in dispersing them.



Ottawa, April 1.—By nearly every New York mail Mayor Sherwood, commissioner of Dominion Government police, receives a batch of letters from alleged dealers in counterfeit money, which, instead of being delivered to the green goods men in New York, are stopped by the postoffice authorities there and forwarded to Ottawa. The latest dodge of these swindlers to escape detection was explained by Mayor Sherwood on Saturday. The circular sent out by the New York sharpers is constructed pretty much on the old lines. It offers counterfeit United States Treasury notes at the rate of \$3,000 in bad bills for \$300 in good money, or \$10,000 worth for \$650. The counterfeit paper is said to be printed from genuine plates stolen from the Printing Bureau in Washington, and in proof of this a newspaper clipping is inclosed which tells of the astounding revelations which followed the death of a supposed poor man who was found to have been really worth millions, all made by handling counterfeit notes printed from the stolen notes.

The clipping includes what is alleged to be the sworn report of the United States Treasury experts, setting forth the so-called facts of the theft of the plates, and the impossibility of detecting notes printed therefrom. The method of escaping detection through the vigilance of the postoffice officials is this: With the circular is inclosed a memorandum which the recipient is advised to "keep for future reference." It read:

"Sond your telegram to Charles Towns, 209 Elm street, New York city, Your password and sign is 'Coal 88." Do not sign anything else.

"Caution.—Be sure you have the numbers plainty written on the telegram after you sign land, and the proper is sign anything else.
