An Interesting Trip Through the

Oil Region. Mr. Hyman Shoots a Well - The Pro-

cosses of Oil Refining Witnessed-A Sarnia Manufacturer Wants & Chance at the American Market-Handicapped by the Duties.

The hospitality for which Patro'sa s pre-eminent was extended yesterday to Hon. W. S. Fielding, the Minister of Finance, Hon. W. Paterson, the Controller of Customs, and other distinguished visitors who accompanied them. The express due to leave London at 11:12 a.m., being two hours "Great Christopher! Lister, M. P. for West Lambton; Mr. Charles MacKenzie, ex-M. P. P. for West Lambton; Mr. Harry Gorman, editor of the Sarnia Ob-server, and Mr. Frank Ward, of Wyoming, a leading oil dealer.

The whistles of the refineries shrieked a welcome as the train pulled into steel? Petrolea. At the station the visitors were met by a large concourse of prominent citizens, and driven to the agnificent (Hotel Iroquois, where capital dinner had been ordered by son, John Kerr, Geo. Moncrieff, A. Shaunessy, J. E. Perkins, John Walker, Frank Smith, and James Kerr (Sarnia).

The trip to Petrolea was not a part of the pre-arranged programme of the Tariff Commission, but Mr. Fielding, with his usual thoroughness, wished to inspect the oil region and acquaint himself with its character and magnitude, which can scarce be compre hended through any description, however graphic. The oil men decided to at short notice. They therefore arranged to give their guests as much pleasure and profit as could be squeezed into an afternoon, and very admirably they succeeded.

The visitors, directly after dinner. vere driven in comfortable carriages through the business portion of the oil district. The forest of derricks. dotting the landscape, planted in farms, orchards, meadows, moors, lanes, ditches, front yards, back yards, bounding the horizon, north, south east and west; the incessant movement of miles of shafting and thousands of pumps; the multitude of tanks, engine houses, refineries, and other tokens of this immense industry, formed a spectacle which, if not aesthetic was wonderfully impressive, and must have been a revelation to those who saw it for the first time. One glimpse of this territory is more effective a hundred times, than the bald statement that it contains 8,000 wells, prorepresenting \$10,000,000.

MR. HYMAN'S GOOD SHOT. Several stops were made to allow the party a close examination of the modus operandi of oil production. Messrs. Fielding and Paterson first tramped through the clinging mud (which shared the affection shown everywhere toward the Ministers) to see the process of drilling a well on l the property of the Ontario Oil and Land Company. Nearly 400 feet of perpendicular shafting was drawn from the bowels of the earth with remarkable dexterity. The visitors were next privileged to witness an even more interesting thing—the shoot-ing of a well on Mr. J. L. Englehart's territory. Mr. C. S. Hyman's reputation as a good shot earned him the honor of applying the fuse. The muffile has done once it will do again.

ed explosion of the nitro-glycerine was followed by a huge geyser of black fluid, which shot up 50 feet. The results were pronounced highly satisfactory by experts. Some time was also spent in Mr. Englehart's fine pumphouse, where resides the power that works 200 pumps. The ample and cleanly machinery was much admired.

AT THE IMPERIAL WORKS. After another detour through avenues of derricks, the carriage pulled up at the Imperial Oil Company's huge works, which cover 60 acres of ground. Nearly an hour was spent in the various departments, studying the complicated processes to which petroleum is subjected, admiring their ingentity and compand. genuity and rapidity, and commend-ing the system which governs the di-verse branches of the establishment with automatic regularity. The visi-tors were shown, in order, the tin shops, the bleaching house, where the oil is bleached before shipping, the barreling and shipping shed, the rooms where paraffine, wax and candies are made; the central pumping station and boiler rooms, where oil is pumped to the different places; the jumbo agitator, where 1,200 barrels of oil were being chemically treated: the twenty stills, with their roaring furnaces; the condenser, the paraffine and lubricating oil works: the saw and stave mills, capable of turning out 400 barrels per day; the press house, and lastly the freezing room—the only spot where the Ministerial party were coldly received during their Petrolea

DOWN ON THE DUTIES. The Hotel Iroquois was reached at 5:15 p.m., after a most delightful out-ing, and just as the shades of night began to fall in thick, oily flakes. Here Messrs. Fielding and Paterson kindly granted an audience to Mr. John Goodison, of Sarnia, proprietor of the Tunnel City thresher works, which employs from 35 to 40 men. Mr. Goodison said he manufactured threshers, bean threshers, plows and cultivators His raw material was pig iron, bar iron and sheet steel. He complained of the high price of iron and steel here, compared with that over the border. Bar iron cost him \$1 80 and \$1 85 per 100 pounds; just across the river, at Port Huron, it sold for \$1 20 and \$1 25. For one quality of steel, with iron finish, he had to pay in Canada \$2 60; the same steel, delivered at their shops, cost his American competitors only \$1 25. For rolled steel he paid \$2 65; the American only \$2 20. Mr. Fielding-Do you buy American

Mr. Goodison-Yes. Mr. Fielding-Why don't you buy Canadian steel?
Mr. Goodison—The other is better. For pig iron, Mr. Goodison said, he paid \$19 per ton, from the Hamilton furnaces; at Port Huron it was delivered for \$13. If he bought it in the United States it would cost him \$14 40, Mr. Fielding-So that the Hamilton furnaces give you iron at the American price, with the duty added.

Mr. Goodison—Yes.

Mr. Fielding-Can't you use the iron made further east? Mr. Goodison-No; it is too far away.
