



Ottawa, Aug. 9. - The government have reached several important decisions in regard to the Yukon country, and the working of the gold fields there. They are determined to leave nothing undone that is possible to do in order to maintain law and order and enforce the regulations. It has been decided to appoint an ad-

ministrator for the district, who will have entire charge of all the officials there and be the chief executive officer of the government. This will be a very important appointment, and there are not a great many men who can fill the

THE MAN. There is one man, however, fitted espegially by training and experience, se name has been suggested. This Major Walsh, of Brockville, who recently declined the appointment of deputy warden of the Kingston penitentiary, offered to him by Sir Oliver Mowat. Prior to 1883 Major Walsh commanded the frontier divi-sion of the Northwest Mounted Police, which had practically all the active work there was to do, and made such a reputation that when the rebellion broke out in 1885 the federal govern-ment sent for Major Walsh, but it was too late, and he would not go up. Combining courage with rare good judgment and discretion, Major Walsh is the very man needed in the Yukon country at the present time, because he has a large experience of the rough frontier life of the west, and is accusmed at the head of a few men-to face large bodies of hostiles and quell disturbances. Canovas' Death.

Secretary Sherman Speaks of Its Effect on Spanish Policy.

Canovas Was a Strong Partisan-Sena tor Morgan Thinks Spain Will Become a Republic.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 9.-Secretary of State Sherman who was interviewed n the murder of the Spanish premier said: "This deplorable event will have some effect of course on the political affairs of Spain, but to what extent I cannot say. The death of one man is not necessarily going to change the sentiment of the whole country. Spain is a very tenacious country. Her money is gone. Her resources have been exhausted. But she means, evidently, to hold on to Cuba. Just how she can do it under these circumstances I cannot see. Yet she is opposed to yielding a point. Premier Canovas was a strong partisan. He was the chief exponent of the element, which was determined to keep the islands at all hazards. Seemingly, Spain is almost a unit on this. Canovas was a strong factor in the government of Spain, but it is not impossible that another will be found to replace him in that important office, having similar views and the same pronounced ideas. How it may be in this case, I am not able to say, but the effects, political, of such an event, are not essentially far-reaching, and have not always produced radical developments. As to the consequences of the conflict in Cuba, I do not care to talk, I have no official information of the assassination, and must refrain from venturing guesses as to what it may effect in the future." Senator Morgan, a member of the ommittee on foreign affairs, predicted in an interview last night that the assassination might be the forerunner of a complete change of government, republic replacing the monarchy. This he thought, was the present ten and yesterday's event he regarded as evidence of the disintegration of the Spanish government.



Washington, Aug. 7 .- The pension roll of the United States has almost reached the million mark. Commisioner Evans has just issued a statenent showing that at the beginning of this fiscal year the pensioners numbered just 983,528, an increase of 12,850 for the past year.
