

# Would Use Oil On Suffragettes

London, March 13 .- Home Secretary McKenna in the House of Commons today replied to the question of J. King, of which notice was given on Wednesday, as to the effect of pump-feeding on the suffragettes, and whether it would not be a good idea to apply dugong (sea cow) oil where the women went on hunger

The minister said he understood that cod liver oil had often been applied for malnutrition in infants, but he was doubtful as to its success. Anyhow, the prolongation of life by such means would be very limited.

Mr. King retorted that he had heard of many cases where lives had been saved by dugong oil. It was different from cod liver oil. It had a much more pungent smell. This last remark reated much laughter.

Mr. Rowell at the outset regretted that an adequate discussion of the financial affairs of the Province would not be possible while the reports of the hydro-electric commission and the Northern Ontario Railway were not ready. He pointed out that the limited amount of information which had been given to the members was entirely insufficient to enable the members of the Opposition to deal with the budget in any comprehensive manner.

Referring to the praise claimed by the Government for the success of the hydro-electric scheme Mr. Rowell said that the movement was the outcome of an urgent appeal by the municipalities that something should be done, and the first committee appointed to deal with the matter was composed of three Liberals. # MANY NEW SHIPS IN PROGRAM OF THE BRITISH NAVY

Five Dreadnoughts, 8 Cruisers, 16 Destroyers and Some Submarines.

Number of Officers and Men To Be Increased to 146,000; Estimates, \$231,546,500.

London, March 13. - The British haval estimates for 1913-14, which vere announced today, total \$231,-546,500, as compared with \$225,377,-000 last year.

The new building program provides for five battleships, eight light cruisers, sixteen torpedo-boat destroyers and a number of submarines.

The personnel of the navy is to be ncreased to 146,000 officers and men. There will be under construction on April 1, 11 battleships, 3 battleship cruisers, 13 light cruisers, 35 torpedoboat destroyers and 21 submarines. During the year now closing 4 battleships, 3 battleship cruisers, 5 light cruisers, 15 destroyers and 3 submaines were constructed.

California Laws.

Hughes, judge of the juvenile court of Sacramento County, Mr. Hunt says: That every man having sufficient ability to provide for his wife's support or who is able to earn the means of such wife's support who wilfully abandons and leaves his wife in a destitute condition or who refuses or neglects to provide such wife with neessary food, clothing, shelter or nedical attention, except justified in bandoning her on account of her misconduct, is punishable by imprisonment in the state prison or county jail for a term not exceeding two years or by a fine not exceeding \$1,000, or by

Different From Canada,

"This differs from the provisions of he criminal code of Canada," said Sheriff Cameron, "In its operation the Canadian act is found to lack the authority for any other person than these named to institute prosecution, while he difficulty of obtaining statutory information from the wife or child is

Must Give Security. "The provisions permitting a wife to

take action," continued the sheriff, "further extended to children and further provides that if the defendan shall appear before the court and enter into an undertaking with suf ficient securities, conditioned that the defendant will pay to the person hav ing custody of the wife or child such sum per month as may be fixed by the court for a period of six months the court may suspend proceedings or sentence and the undertaking is valid and binding. The order of the court commands the defendant to provide his wife or child, whichever the case may be, with the necessary food, shelter, clothing and medical attention and if the defendant fails to comply with the undertaking the court may pass sentence or for a good cause shown may modify the order and further suspend proceedings or sentence for a like period of six months. Any parent who fails without lawful excuse to furnish the necessities for his or her child is liable to imprisonment in the state prison or county jail for two years or a fine not exceeding \$100, or both. Law Needed Here.

"This law, if in effect in Canada, would diminish the number of cases of wife and child desertion that occur annually," said the sheriff, "as the moral effect of the statute would be equally as effective as the legal effect because the careless and indifferent husband or father, knowing that he is liable to prosecution, would be deterred from a course of conduct towards his

family that is now too common."
"Representation," he continued, "has already been made to the minister of justice to have the criminal code amended along these lines. The city of Toronto is very active in the effort and has on more than one occasion sent delegations to Ottawa to urge similar action. Such an action upon the part of the citzens of London would be welcomed as meeting a condition that is much more prevalent than it should be."

# WILL FORCE STRATFORD TO TAKE HYDRO POWER

Railway Committee Refuses to Allow Special Clause To Be Struck Out.

Toronto, March 14. - The city of Stratford must stand by its agreement to take its power from the hydro-electric commission. Yesterday the city's bill allowing an escape from the agreement, with a view to starting a municipal street railway system came before the railway committee of the Legislature, and the clause that would have "turned the trick" fell by the

The troublesome clause that the company "shall obtain its power from the hydro-electric commission, provided that the rates are as favorable to the company as those obtainable elsewhere, and otherwise. When it came up Mr. W. K. Mc-Naught, on behalf of the commission protested vigorously against its adoption. He declared that the adoption of the clause meant a breach of the present agreement with the commission, and opened the way for other

municipalities to follow suit. President Ferguson, of the Stratford Board of Trade, and Mr. William Preston, representing the manufacturers, declared that to free the city from the hydro agreement would be detrimental to the city's interests. There was some argument upon the point, but finally the committee decided to strike out the clause, and

hold Stratford to its agreement. In the bill, which was introduced by Mr. James Torrance (North Perth), the city asked the Legislature to ratify and confirm a bylaw passed by the ratepayers on Jan. 1 last, and which gave power to the Stratford Railway Company to build an electric line on certain streets of the city.






