## BERNSTORFF GANG PLOTTED RAID ON CAN. PAC. RAILWAY TO STOP TRAFFIC

Kaiser's Ambassador To U.S. Had Instructions To Wreck Great System and Carry On Widespread Sabotage Activities In Canada and United States.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 10.—Secretary Lansing said today the telegrams exposing von Bernsforff had not been sent through the state department, thus leaving the inference that they must have moved through one of the neutral legations.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 10 .- Further exposition of Ambassador Bernstorff's activities in the United States, including the destruction of the Canadian Pacific Railway at several points, was given today by Secretary of State Lansing, who made public three telegrams which passed between the ambassador and the German foreign office.

## STATES RAISES **COAL EMBARGO** BY LAKE PORTS

Shipments of Fuel Can Now Be Forwarded to Canada.

STATEMENT BY GARFIELD

Fuel Administrator Says Canada's War Industries Must Be Kept Going.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 10. -The embargo on coal shipments to Canada was lifted today by the fuel admini-stration, which declared that shipments can go forward through lake ports without endangering the supply of the northwestern states.

Must Keep Canada Golng.
"This action was taken," it was announced, "because it is vital that Canada's war industries be kept going at full blast in order that she may, remain an effective ally of

may remain an effective ally of America in the war. The American Northwest will be properly supplied. "Canada got approximately 19,000,-000 tons of coal, anthracite and bituminous from this country last year. This year she will receive the same amount, plus an increase pro-rated on the excess over last year's production, substantially as though she were a state function. The fuel administration is working on the pro-rating plan."

## LOSSES OF GERMANS ESTIMATED AT 20,000

British Headquarters in France, Oct. 10.—No estimate of the German losses is possible, but they are believed to have been exceedingly heavy. The British and French losses are reported to have been light. Conservative calculation was that the German losses aggregated 20,000.

Paris, Oct. 10 .- A further advance has been made by the French troops which took the offensive yesterday in Belgium in conjunction with the British. Papegoet Farms has been captured, the war office announced, and more prisoners have been taken.

FORCED BACK SHORT DISTANCE. London, Oct. 10 .- Several counter-attacks were made by the Germans last night in the neighborhood of the Ypres-Staden railway. ## PLANNED MUTINY

The guilty parties have been arrested and have received their just desert, the minister added.

## HYDRO SHORTAGE IS ALARMING ONE, BELIEVE MEMBERS

Union Meets in Torento On Tuesday To Consider It.

EXPORTING CONTINUES

No Ban To Be Placed On the American Use of Power Is Belief.

A meeting of the Ontario I ower Union has been called for Tuesday next in Toronto. The shortage of power is the theme of discussion. Mayor Church, Toronto, and other members are alarmed at the lack of power, and want something done to relieve the situation.

"There has been a shortage of power for some time," explained Philip Pocock today. "Last year we were badly in need of more power, and we succeeded in getting 80,000-horsepower additional. The demand has increased during the year, and we will need a great deal more. How we are to get it is the problem. I do not know how it will be done, but we will secure it somewhere."

OTTAWA, Oct. 9 .- An interesting ottawa, Oct. 9.—An interesting statement, giving the graph of the C. E. F. during and wastage in the C. E. F., of which number 17,451 joined the ranks of the infantry. During the same period, the wastage of men from various causes totaled 91,804, leaving the loss to the C. E. F. for the eight months of 42,625 men. Total enlistments and wastage by months were as follows: February enlistments 6 209: wastage

enlistments, 6,407; wastage enlistments, 6,348; wastage st enlistments, 3,117; wastage,

August enlistments, 3,117; wastage, 322.

Includes Discharged Men.
The number of enlistments in Engdid for the C. E. F. from February 1, 315, to June 30, 1917, a total of 1,452, a added by the militia department to the totals given above, making the grand total of 49,179. Under the head of "wastage" are classified all these men who have been discharged in Canada, discharged in England, have been returned to Canada for discharge. The statement declares that figures transmitted by Sir George Perley show the percentage of infantry casualties from January 1 to July 1, 1917, as 89,24.

During the month of September a total of 3,588 men joined the ranks of the various units/classified as infantry, artillery, railway construction and forestry, and miscellaneous, as against a total wastage of 10,990 men. Of this number 1,252 were recruited in the United States, 2,310 in Canada and 26 in England. The net loss during September was 7,402.

For the period from the 16th to the 30th of September, 648 men were recruited for the C. E. F., while the wastage totaled 3,237, leaving a net loss of 2,589. Of the 600 men recruited d45 were enlisted in the United States, 194 in Canada, and 9 in England.



MONTREAL, Oct. 9.—Asserting that the urgent insistence of strict food control was not yet understood in Canada, Lord Northcliffe, warmly defended Food Controller W. J. Hanna, in the course of an address to the Canadian Club this afternoon. His lordship said that Mr. Hanna had been subjected to the same series of attacks that were showered upon the British and United States food controllers.

"The food controller in a democratic country," said Lord Northcliffe, "needs the courage of a lion, the eye of a hawk and the hide of a buffalo."

It amounted to this, remarked his lordship, that unless the food question was taken up as vigorously in Canada and it has been in Great Britain there must be a cutting down of the rations of the soldiers at the front. There must not only be an elimination of all waste, but the farmers must be stimulated to increase the production of beef, pork, cheese, butter and milk.







WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Germany's military strength now shows a clear decrease for the first time since the war began, according to a review based on the data of the French general staff, made public here review based on the data of the trong tonight by the French high commissioner.

"Worn down and driven back by the never-ending pounding of the Allies on the western front," the statement says, "the Germans have made their supreme military effort after drawing heavily upon their inactive armies in the east and calling out their 1918 and part of their

"Thus, while the Allies have reached and are prepared to maintain their full strength awaiting the coming of America's great army, the enemy's resources are diminishing at the very moment when the military

situation demands that they increase. "This shows," concludes the statement, "the decisive character attending the operations in 1918, when three great democracies—Great Britain, France and America—will unite their entire strength in attacking the enemy in conformity with the only sound principle of war."
