Thinks Production of No Use Tells Commons General Should Have Come To Him First With Allegations-Asquith Declares He Is Not Intriguing Against the Premier.

> London, May 9.—Premier Lloyd George was cheered loudly when he arose to speak. He said he had been treated unfairly. It was the business of Gen. Maurice to come to the cabinet and point out where the ministers had made mistakes, he declared.

Ship Insurance For Sub Zones Ordered Reduced By McAdoo

Washington, May 9.-Reduction from three to two per cent in the war risk insurance rate on hulls and cargoes of U.S. steamers traveling through the war zone from this country to Great Britain and the Atlantic coast of France was ordered today by Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo. London, May 9.—Former influential officers in the German army, supporters of Gen. von Moltke, the former chief of staff, are agitating against Field Marshal von Hindenburg on the ground that the German successes on the western front have not reached expectations, according to reports in The Hague, transmitted under reserve by the correspondent of the Daily Mail.

Ludendorff and the crown prince on one side, and Chancellor von Hertling and Foreign Secretary von Kuehlmann on the other.

FLANDERS PUSH ST

German Gain of Wednesday Retained Only a Few Hours, Counter-Attacks Restoring Area to Allies-Germans Storm Again This Morning, Pressing the British Back Slightly at One Point-Allies Make Further Advance During Night Between the Somme and the Ancre.

London, May 9.—By a counter-attack delivered last night by British troops, the Germans were driven from the portions of the Allied front line they had entered on the Flanders front in the La llytte-Vormezeele sector, the war office announced today.

Further progress was made last night by the British on the front east of Amiens, between the Somme and Ancre rivers.

Yesterday's attack on the Flanders line was carried out by wo German divisions. Heavy casualties were inflicted upon them by the British forces.

BRITISH PRESSED BACK.

London, May 9 .- A new German attack was made this morning on the Flanders front north of Kemmel. The enemy pressed back the British line slightly at one point.

HAIG HOLDS MOST OF GROUND.

With the British Army in France, May 9-(By the Associated Press).—Fighting was still in progress this morning near Vierstraet, on the front southwest of Ypres. At one time the British were forced back slightly by machine-gun fire. All the rest of the original defences, however, appeared to be again in the hands of the defenders in the Vormezeele-La Clytte sector.

BIG GUNS ROARING.

Paris, May 9.—Heavy artillery fighting on both sides of the Avre River, on the front below Amiens, is reported in today's official communication.

The text of the statement reads:

'Spirited artillery fighting occurred last night north and south of the Avre. "German patrols attempting to approach our lines in the re

gion of Campelle-St-Aignan were repulsed. "There is nothing to report from the remainder of the front.

REPEATED SMASHES FAIL.

After their first success in yesterday's fighting, the Germans were unable to gain further ground, despite repeated smashes tre, but were repulsed elsewhere, the at the Allied line. Bitter struggles took place about Kleine Vierstraet, west of Vierstraet and in the Ridge Wood, but the British clung desperately to their positions.

The British organized a counter-attack during the night, which was so vigorous that the Germans were unable to withstand it, and gradually fell back until they had abandoned all the ground gained

LONDON, May 8 .- "After a heavy bombardment on a wide front in Flanders, the German infantry this morning launched an attack south of Dickebusch Lake, which lies between Ypres and strong effort to penetrate this line, and Kemmel," says Reuter's correspondent at British headquarters.

"The attack apparently was only in divisional strength, but it may develop larger proportions. The enemy seems to have penetrated our front line between the lake and ridgewood and some parties of Germans are reported in the eastern wood itself. The fighting continues in fine weather and under good visibility

"We still hold the major part of the wood and also Kleine Vierstraat. The technical objective of enemy operations seems to be an attempt to clear the way for a thrust toward Scherpenberg from the northeast, and it may prove to be the beginning of further fierce fighting in this region.

Send in Your Problems and They Information by The Advertiser.

J. J. D. Q.—Can a young man of 22 years without category be examined any day, or must he wait until called?

A.—He cannot be examined unless he wishes to report for service. He can report before being notified, or wait till notified he wishes. A. L. R. Q.—Is there a military school of massage in Toronto or elsewhere?

A.—Write to the assistant adjutant-general of Military District No. 2, To-conto. None are known of elsewhere. G. B. S. Q.—1. I am an A2 man ordered to report for service. I have a brother just returned from the front badly wounded, and a sister a trained nurse who has been in France for two years, also another brother at home, who is in category E. Have I any chance to obtain an

E. Have I any chance to obtain an extension leave to enable me to complete the course I am taking? 2. If not, can I by going to London a few days ahead of time Join the Tank Battallon?

A.—1. You may be able to secure a leave of absence by applying to your officer commanding when you report for 2. No more recruits are being taken here for the Tank Battalion.

J. W. H. Q.—Can a married man, who is unfit for military service, cross to the United States? Can a woman cross the line on a visit without permission?

A .- The man would need passports, and the woman would be wise to get them also. Write to John Riggs, Do-minion Immigration Office, Carling Block, London, Ont.

C. L. Q.—I was placed in category A2 and exempted. I am on my own farm and was 22 years old and single when I received exemption. I was married in January, 1918. Would I come in the first draft of the unmarried men between the ages of 20 and 22?

A.—Yes; though you may secure furough until June 1 for farming.

J. S. N. Q.—Would a young man of 24 years, unmarried, owning and working alone a farm of 320 acres in the West, be called in the first draft? Or will he be called at all? He has been exempted for farming, and has no brothers in the war. A.—He will not be called at present, as he is over the age of 23. Should the exemptions of men of his age be cancelled, he would then be called, and if fit, would be required to serve.

A. A. R. Q.—Would a man aged 32 and exempted come in the third draft if he were married on May 1, 1918?

A.—No; he would still be a member of class one, for all men married after July 6, 1917, are considered unmarried for purposes of classification.

F. B. L. Q.—I am a railroad man and got exempted. I have received notice to report in May. I am the main support of my father and mother, who are not able to work. Could I claim exemption? If not, could I claim the patriotic fund or the separation allowance for my parents?

A.—If you were 20 and had not attained the age of 23 when you claimed exemption last fall, and if you are in category A, you cannot get exemption. You might get leave if you have other members of your family in the service at the front. Any soldier who can prove that he was the sole support of his mother can secure separation allowance. He would also be able to secure the aid of the patriotic fund, if needed.



PEACE TREATY WITH RUMANIA IS PUBLISHED

Armies Must Demobilize to Small Proportions—Name Consuls Later.

AMSTERDAM, May 8.—The peace treaty just signed between Rumania and the central powers consists of eight the central powers consists of eight clauses, says a Vienna dispatch today. The first clause deals with the re-establishment of peace and friendship, and reads:

"Article 1.—Germany, Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey, on the one hand, and Rumania on the other, declare the state of war ended and that the contracting parties are determined henceforth to live together in peace and friendship.

"Article 2.—Diplomatic and consular

"Article 2.—Diplomatic and consular relations between the contracting parties will be resumed immediately after the ratification of the peace treaty. The admission of consuls will be reserved for a future agreement.

"Clause 2.—Demobilization of the Rumanjan forces.

"Clause 2.—Demonstration of the Rumanian forces.
"Article 3.—The demonstration of the Rumanian army which is now proceeding will immediately after peace is signed be carried out according to the prescriptions contained in articles 4 and 7 Retain Certain Divisions.

Article 4.—The regular military bureau, the supreme military authorities and all the military institutions will remain in existence as provided by the last peace budget. Make a white sauce of the butter, flour and milk. Add the grated cheese. As soon as the cheese is melted remove it from the fire, add the diced cheese and seasoning. Spread the mixture in a shallow pan and allow it to cool. Then out it into squares, cover it with egg and cracker crumbs and fry it in hot fat in a skillet. Farina Croquettes.
