HUN THROWN BACK BY COUNTER-ATTACK

LLOYD GEORGE CHARGES MAURICE UNFAIR

PREMIER SAYS BIGGER FORCE IS MORE VITAL THAN FARMING

BRITISH PREMIER CLAIMS UNFAIRLY TREATED OVER THE MAURICE CHARGES

Thinks Production of No Use If Reinforcements Not Adequate. DOESN'T EXPLAIN DELAY

Tells Commons General Should Have Come To Him First With Allegations—Asquith Declares He Is Not Intriguing Against the Premier.

Declares Canadians Are Facing Overwhelming Numbers On Western Front.

London, May 9.—Premier Lloyd George was cheered loudly when he arose to speak. He said he had been treated unfairly. It was the business of Gen. Maurice to come to the cabinet and point out where the ministers had made mistakes, he declared.

Ottawa, May 9.—"If a scattered and broken remnant, overwhelmed because not reinforced, should return to the side it would profit little to tell them our production has been largely increased." In these words the prime minister, in a statement made in the House of Commons today, explained his reaction to the order-in-council cancelling the exemption of Class A men between 20 and 22 years of age inclusive.

London, May 9.—In the House of Commons today, former Premier Asquith denied that his motion respecting the Maurice affair was designed to obtain a vote of censure of the Government, saying it was absurd to describe it as such. Should he find it his duty to censure the Government, he said, he hoped that he would have the courage to do so in direct and unequivocal form.

Border's Statement. Since the passage of the order-in-council of April 22, 1918, empowering the governor-in-council to call on men of specified ages regardless of their industry, numerous representations have been received by members of the Government expressing the view that proposed action will tend to injure the war effort.

HAIG DRIVES OUT GERMANS FROM FOOTING SECURED WHEN NEW FLANDERS PUSH STARTS AND MOVE AHEAD ON SOMME

German Gain of Wednesday Retained Only a Few Hours, Counter-Attacks Restoring Area to Allies—Germans Storm Again This Morning, Pressing the British Back Slightly at One Point—Allies Make Further Advance During Night Between the Somme and the Ancre.

London, May 9.—By a counter-attack delivered last night by British troops, the Germans were driven from the portions of the Allied front line they had entered on the Flanders front in the La Clytte-Vormzele sector, the war office announced today.

BRITISH PRESSED BACK

London, May 9.—A new German attack was made this morning on the Flanders front north of Kemmel. The enemy pressed back the British line slightly at one point.

HAIG HOLDS MOST OF GROUND.

With the British Army in France, May 9.—(By the Associated Press).—Fighting was still in progress this morning near Vierstraet, on the front southwest of Ypres. At one time the British were forced back slightly by machine-gun fire. All the rest of the original defences, however, appeared to be again in the hands of the defenders in the Vormzele-La Clytte sector.

REPEATED SMASHES FAIL.

After their first success in yesterday's fighting, the Germans were unable to gain further ground, despite repeated smashes at the Allied line. Bitter struggles took place about Kleine Vierstraet, west of Vierstraet and in the Ridge Wood, but the British clung desperately to their positions.

KING VISITED CAMPS OF THE CANADIANS

London, May 9.—The British statement follows: "Successful counter-attacks launched by British and French troops yesterday in the La Clytte-Vormzele sector drove the enemy from the portions of the Allied front line in which he had gained the footing secured during the morning and re-established the positions originally held by us. We captured several prisoners."

FAMOUS TORONTO YACHT CLUBHOUSE IS BURNED

Toronto, May 9.—America's greatest fresh water aquatic clubhouse, the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, was destroyed by fire early this morning, and now the handsome building, that was one of the beauties of Toronto Island, is but a heap of rubble. The loss is estimated at over \$100,000.

TO CO-ORDINATE WORK OF SPECIAL SERVICE IN CITY BY COUNCIL

Question Comes Before Meeting Friday Afternoon.

EXPERTS WILL EXPLAIN Representatives of Many Organizations Will Be Present at Conference.

The official Ontario Department of Agriculture report on crop conditions, issued on May 6, includes the following: Spring seeding is being pushed forward vigorously, and the work generally is much ahead of the average at this date. In some localities all the grains are sown, but in the more northerly sections considerable delay remains to be done. The land never worked better, the seedbed being almost perfect, and a good catch is looked for. In fact, much of the spring grain is already up and is looking very promising. The prolonged open ground so far has greatly favored work and consequently seeding and other farm operations have not been so affected by the shortage of labor as was at one time feared. It has also helped the extension of the area of spring crops. Elgin County reports a bigger acreage has been prepared for corn, and also states that early potatoes have been planted.

YUKON THAWING OUT.

Dawson, Yukon, May 8.—The opening of the Yukon River, sealed for the winter by heavy ice, will occur within a few days and the localities are busy with the preparations. This spring came unusually late, and it is only within the past three weeks that the snow, which fell last winter to an unprecedented depth, began to melt and clear the hills and flood the valleys.

GEN. MAURICE'S LETTER.

GEN. MAURICE has caused a furore in Britain by his assertion that the Government, as represented by Premier Lloyd George and Andrew Bonar Law, has been guilty of misleading the nation by misstatements concerning decisions reached at Versailles and other military matters.

To seek to pre-determine whether Gen. Maurice is justified in his stand would be foolish; that can only be decided after full investigation. To doubt that Gen. Maurice believes himself justified would be unfair to the man who is sacrificing his assured career in what he conceives to be the national interest.

Every patriot will regret that any condition has existed which could bring about the present crisis, for crisis it is. In these times of national peril the expectation, or at least the hope, is cherished that nothing will occur in internal affairs to distract attention from the grave international situation.

We can hope that if misstatements have been made they will be proved due to forgivable mistakes rather than to intention, and that if the general is at fault his motive will be taken into consideration by the Government, the people and by the army council. It would be a sad blow to learn that, in spite of all protestations to the contrary, the truth was being obscured purposefully.

DECEITFUL STATEMENTS.

WARNINGS have been issued by many war writers to the effect that any peace talk emanating from Germany at present must be given no attention, as it is intended merely to disguise preparations under way for a third and most desperate attack on the Allied lines in the west.

No one in his calm senses will believe that this is an honest expression of the writer's opinion. The most sanguine and optimistic Britisher is well aware that the Teutonic offensive has not been crushed, although he has every faith that it will be so eventually. The most that can be said now is that it has failed and has been stopped temporarily, but fearfully powerful blows may yet, and it seems safe to say will yet, be delivered by Ludendorff's armies.

There can be only one reason for the Vossische Zeitung's statement. It is inspired by German authorities for their own purposes. It may be that they have given up hope of reaching Paris and want to prepare their people for the failure, but it is more likely intended for consumption by the Allies in order to lull them into a false sense of security against a renewal of the heavy assaults and to lessen the speed with which the workers in Britain are producing munitions.

There is no danger of the Allied military leaders being deceived by German words, but there is a possibility of the people at home becoming impressed. That is something against which every precaution must be taken.

A DANGEROUS PROVISION.

IT HAS BEEN recommended by a city council committee resolution that motorists be not compelled to stop or await the traffic officer's signal at corners where one is on duty before proceeding, if it is their intention to turn to the right.

The idea of the mover is that if a motorist were proceeding west along Dundas street and desired to turn north on Richmond he would not have to await the officer's signal. At the northeast corner of this intersection there is a crowd of people, large or small, at almost every hour of the day. Street railway employees gather there at certain times, and there are poles standing which interfere with the view eastward.

All these busy crossings ought to be protected thoroughly, and it is little to ask of motorists that they stop and await the traffic officer's motion before proceeding.

THE PERSONAL TOUCH.

WHAT HAS become of a certain sort of "sketchy" writing that appeared in the newspapers at one time? It is a sort of observer of tendencies in life. We suppose he meant the odd little human touches that were the products of more leisurely days in journalism.

the sparrows. The man or woman who was able to weave a story about these little creatures, one that would stand out from among the hundreds that had been written, was in a fair way to a desk in the editorial room. Writers were more anxious to tell of personalities than of events; odd characters were frequently quoted, Peter Finlay Dunne found Mr. Dooley in a Chicago saloon, and made him into "a character" worth a column a day.

We suppose one of these writers would have found his keynote for a story in the sight of an old Indian and a little white girl walking together the other day. The "original Canadian" was bent and lame. The child was flax-like in form and face, with blue eyes and flaxen hair.

HELLO, brethren of the press! This is the season for opening up in a big-hearted way and saying with one voice "Gaze upon us, dear people, we are the great tribunes of democracy. Did we not slam it to the title holders and just about put 'em with their ermined backs to the wall? Did we not swat the dukes and barons and work confusion among the givers of great favors?"

PLUG HATS! That's the next great journalistic drive. Smash 'em, swat 'em, squash 'em, punch 'em or kick 'em—the plug hat, brown-bered badge of self-elected righteousness or mighteousness. Can anyone answer the question, "Why is a plug hat?" To confer distinction on the wearer? But we saw a fine clergyman mistaken for a cabdriver by a small boy all because it was socially and sartorially decreed that he should don a length of polished stove pipe, fitted with eaves, it being selected at the same time as the de rigueur thing for the man on the box of a coupe to wear.

Nicaragua takes its place among the civilized countries of the world. Gas expert believes gas will win the war, but this need not encourage talkers to think they are doing their bit.

It seems improbable that Major-Gen. Maurice would take his military life in his hands by making charges which are untrue. W. A. Clarke, M. P., North Wellington, says the loyalty of Sir Wilfrid Laurier is questionable, which stamps Mr. Clarke for what he is.

Category B men are finding it hard to get exemption from military service. Galt tribunal refused to release any one of the twelve appearing before it on Tuesday. Dr. Michael Clark, M. P., says some businessmen are asking to be taxed more in order to help the war.

Germany will not derive much satisfaction from the Maurice-Government dispute in Britain when she has to think of the suffrage trouble at home and the famine in Austria. Helpful optimism is that of the man who says we cannot lose if everyone will do his utmost to win.

Some papers attempt to excuse the breaking of the Government's pledge to farmers on the ground that they were not singled out but were included in the order which cancelled all exemptions between certain ages. Moral: If you break all promises, you are guiltless; if you break only one, you are guilty.

Mr. Nickle, M.P., deserves the thanks of the public for precipitating an interesting debate on the question of titles. The discussion in the House on the question will be beneficial in many ways, but it did not go far enough.

The character of our institutions and of public sentiment is growing more and more decidedly democratic, and with many people this is a strong argument against the bestowal of titles in this country. Whether or not this is a sufficient ground for the discontinuance of recognition to Canadians, there is one question that should be answered, and in such a way as to be conclusive, not only to the premier of Canada, but to the people of Canada.

Public attention has been drawn to three possible avenues of approach by applicants for honours, the governor-general, the Canadian prime minister and the colonial secretary in London, and an insinuation is clearly intended that in some cases one or all of these mediums has in individual cases been influenced and, of course, improperly influenced. This is a serious insinuation. The discussion in the Commons was not carried to its logical conclusion. In view of the questions asked and the insinuations thrown out something more than curtailment should be considered. Besides declaring for a time limitation on hereditary titles, those in possession of them should be compelled to prove before a judicial tribunal that their honours came to them in a way that relieves them from any possible suspicion.

Service to the Empire is supposed to be the basis of every bestowal by the sovereign, and those who advise his majesty carry the responsibility for their recommendations. It may be that services have been rendered, of which the public is not at the moment cognizant, but these should be known to the premier, and where necessary disclosed by him.

It has been said that those who object to titles are animated by jealousy, but even if this were true it would not apply to all objectors, and the question is serious enough to call not only for the utmost care and circumspection in the future, but searching inquiry with reference to the past.

Sir Robert Borden is justly credited with very high principle and there is reason for an inference from the debates that he has been greatly surprised, if not shocked, at some of the bestowals on Canadians. This is his only possible inference from his own words. There should be a searching inquiry, and the government-general would be thoroughly justified in recommending to his majesty the rescinding of every title which is found to have been improperly recommended. The Star thinks Sir Robert Borden owes it to the Canadian people and to himself and colleagues to have this matter probed and acted upon to the very limit of his ability.

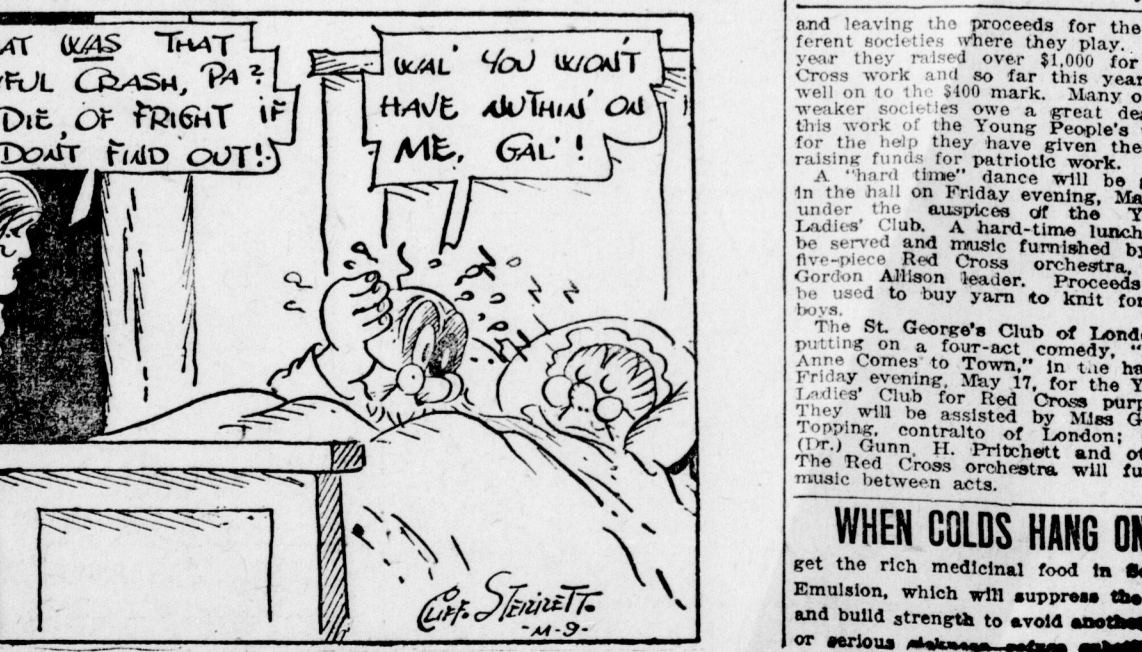

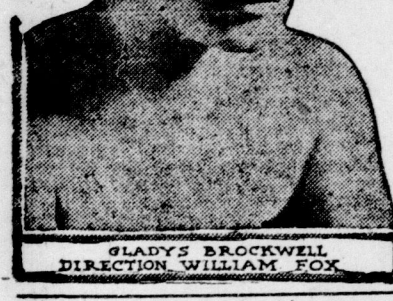

CLERK BELIEVES BOARD OF HEALTH ONLY AFFECTED ONE
Legislation Against Dual Office Holding Restricted.
Apparently, the amendment to the Municipal Act, passed by the recent session of the Legislature, preventing members of commissions or other bodies from sitting on the council, and which led Controller J. H. Saunders and Ald. G. B. Drake to resign from the board of health, was legislation of the city's seeking.
Last year the mayor, H. A. Stevenson, had several members of the council appointed to the board of health with the idea, it is said, of having a closer control of the board by the council. Strong objection was taken to this and this led to the case being placed before the Ontario Government, which promised that legislation would be enacted to cover the point. Evidently this promise has been kept.
City Clerk S. Baker says that, in his opinion, the board of health is the only organization affected. The fair board and railway commission are not bodies appointed by the council, while the London and Port Stanley board is really a sub-committee of the council and in the opinion of more than one alderman, "a joke."
