



"The call to service today in Canada has never been equalled in any land at any time. The interdependence of individuals is becoming more and more intensified as a result of the progress of science and invention. Today, a single accident may cut off light and water from an entire city.

"Today, even the making and returning of social calls has become systematized to certain days and hours, whereas in older days anyone dropped in for a social hour at another's home whenever one felt so inclined,

Dr. Locke said he was not in favor of a compromised mechanical mixture to replace the imperfection in present-day educational systems. Ideas are the great essential in life. The boy or girl who is brought up in the city is handleapped in life. The boy in the city home has nothing to do, Moral training as such is a mighty poor thing. Today, as never before, is there a great need for men who can stand the test of fintegrity against the strength of the great corporations.



### OSTRICHES STAND RIGORS OF PENNSYLVANIA WINTER

Traveller Imports 53 Birds and Expects to Produce 100,000 Birds Before Many Years-Feathers Bring as Great a Sum as \$50,000.

About three score ostriches on a reservation near Bloomsburg. Pa., are the forerunners of what, according to the predictions of the man responsible for their appearance there, will be one of the largest collections of these highly priced birds in this hemisphere. The story of the transportation to this country of this big bag, of, ostriches begins with an experiment made a year ago by W. H. Hile, a traveller. Hile had long held the idea that the common belief that the ostrich could thrive only in a warm climate was a fallacy.

had long held the idea that the common belier that the ostrich could theire only in a warm climate was fallacy.

So he determined to try cautiously the effect of the harsh climate of the east on a few selected ostriches. He went abroad and obtained the birds for his first experiment and established his farm at Bloomsburg, where the winters are unusually severe, this bieing in the mountainous district of Pennsylvania. No care was taken to keep the birds protected during the ensuing winter. They were turned loose on the snow and exposed to all the rigors of the bleak winds and zero weather that belonged to the place and season. It would have been a costly experiment had the birds died for ostriches are worth a lot of money, but none died.

Brings Over 53.

The next step after this triumph, was to augment the little troop at Bloomsburg with a substantial troop, and Hile has just done this by bringing over 53 additional ostriches of various figs.

One significant fact in connection with the importation of these birds is that this importation will end with the Bloomburg batch. All countries through which the ostriches have been transported are unanimous in putting restrictions on their removal, and no more birds can be brought out of the country unless they are smuggled out. In describing his experiences while collecting the birds Mr. Hile said:

"It started my actual hunt from Jibutt, or the east guilf of the coast of Somalliand, being the only white man in the party. I had with me 54 natives, and for four months we stayed in the interior getting out birds. The methods were exceedingly simple. In the initial stages of the operation of this farm, the commanding general of the division considered the enterprise of the subsistence department of raising potatoes for the troops in the division had so far succeeded as to warrant measures to place the farm on a more permanent basis, and with a view to avoid delays and interruption placed it directly under the control of the chief commissary of the division, with Lieut. J. M. Walling, 3d infantry, in charge of the work as superintendent, responsible for the equipement, animals and buildings, as well as the work. Among the principal causes for the unsatisfactory results obtained were the unsultability of the seed potatoes to the ground, and the soil itself was poor on account of the constant raising of rice (which requires the same constituents for its growth as potatoes do, both being starchy, and needing fertilization), and the cogan and tule grass roots choked and poisoned the potatoes, making it necessary to get rid of the roots. 

Government Conducts Tests Hoping for Their Extermination.

The brown rat has reached Mani-The brown rat has reached Mani-toba. According to the statistics of the department of agriculture of the province there is an area ninety miles long abutting the United States on its northern frontier and sixty miles wide in which the rats have made their ap-agrance.

Mr. Golden, the deputy minister, estimates that the damage done this year by the brown rat is \$1,000,000, says the U. S. Consular and Trade Reports, and it will proportionately increase unless the people generally awaken to the seriousness of the situation.

According to the deputy minister, the rats in the province move in a radius of fifteen miles each year, and he has compiled many valuable stathe rats in the province move in a radius of fifteen miles each year, and he has compiled many valuable statistics relating to the rat. Two years ago the department conducted a series of investigations and produced virus that it was thought would eliminate the pest. There was quite a considerable amount of interest at first and many applications were made for the virus. Reports indicate that thousands of rats were destroyed by its use but that public interest lagged after a while, and no systematic method now seems to be followed by the farmers.

Mr. Golden conducted some interesting experiments at Gretna, a town a few miles from the frontier of the United Statés, last year to determine the amount of food the rat would consume a day and at the same time to test the virus. Two rats were caught and one of them received an injection of the virus. Within two days it died, and the other rat, not having been provided with food, proceeded to devour its dead comrade. Within 24 hours it had consumed all of the dead rat with the exception of hair an inch of the tail, and it succumbed within a few hours to the poison which had been injected into the other rat.

Among other interesting experiments, Mr. Golden found that the rats, while at present confining themselves to the cities and towns, made frequent visits into the fields and destroyed quantities of grain. Along the southern border of Manitoba corn is raised to a certain extent and this spring a farmer found sixteen rats in a shock of corn, which demonstrated that this scolony had lived in this particular place throughout the long, cold winter and had fed upon the grain and staks of the corn.



CURIOSITIES OF A CHINESE CENSUS

"The Thunderer" of More Than One Hundred Years Ago, Reports Movements of Ships During Battles From Official Accounts of Vice-Admiral Cunningham-Some of the Old-Time Advertisements.

A local gentleman has in his possession a copy of the London (England) Times, for Thursday, Nov. 7, 1805. The leading article is an account of the battle of Trafalgar, and the death of Admiral Nelson. It is signed by Vice-Admiral C. Collingwood, and is credited to the Official Gazette of the previous day, as follows:

"Sir,—The ever-to-be-lamented death of Vice-Admiral Lord Viscount Neison, who, in the late conflict with the enemy, fell in the hour of victory, leaves to me the duty of informing my lords commissioners of the admiralty that on the 19th inst. it was communithat on the 19th inst, it was communicated to the commander-in-chief, from the ships watching the motions of the enemy in Cadiz, that the combined fiest had put to sea; as they sailed with light winds westerly, his lordship concluded their destination was the Mediterranean, and immediately made all sail for the Streights' entrance, with the British squadron, consisting of twenty-seven ships, three of them sixty-fours, where his lordship was informed by Capt. Blackwood (whose formed by Capt. Blackwood (whose vigilance in watching and giving notice of the enemy's movements has been highly meritorious), that they had

not yet passed the Streights."


