ENGAGE IN NEW WARS HASTILY

France, Britain, U.S. and Japan Bind Selves To Arbitrate Before Fighting.

DEFINITE PERIOD FIXED

Terms of Undertaking Provide For Abrogating the Present Anglo-Japanese Treaty.

Washington, Dec. 10.—The Washing-on conference was prepared to an-nounce to the world today its first najor achievement—the four power agreement designed to preserve peace the Pacific and providing in direct terms, it is understood, for abrogation of the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

The conference was called to hold its forth plenary session at eleven a.m., to receive the declaration of the United Great Britain, France and Japan of their acceptance of the agree-ment binding them not to go to war over any dispute arising in connection with the Pacific islands until the elapse of a definite period giving opportunity for peaceful discussion and settlement. The delegates were hurriedly summoned to meet in plenary session by Chairman Hughes after his meeting with delegation spokesmen last night, on receipt from Paris of the French acceptance of the properties. Mr. Spender made this statement in answer to a question. He had previously touched on the Anglo-Japanese al-liance, which he said he understood was the cause of some uneasiness in Canada. The questioner asked that if in the event such a war broke out. and the Japs took Alaska, would Great

ritain side with the Japs.

Mr. Spender's immediate reply was Mr. Spender's immediate reply was that one of the proposals of the conference at Washington was that there should be a six-month cooling period lefere rations could go ty war, which period was to be spent in negotiations. And he did not think that in the event of such Canada would find Britain with the Japs. Earlier in his address he said that he thought that the Japanese alliance will be superceded by another agreement, equally extingularly to the Japanese and satisfactory to the Japanese, which will be much more acce to Canada than the present one.

Most interesting was his explanation s to the underlying reason for the ontinuing of the alliance at present. and he suggested that Canadians should take these reasons into consideration



hours. A plenary session of the arms conference has been arranged for tomorrow.

Already the task of drafting the treaty into final form is well advanced. Its text is brief, providing in direct terms for abrogation of the alliance and for a "cooling-off" process should war be threatened over questions of the Pacific islands

The details yet to be settled are said to involve only minor considerations. It is the expectation of some of the delegates that the coming plenary session will also see a publicly-announced agreement between the United States, Great Britain and Japan on the "5-5-3" naval ratio. Japan has not yet assented to it, but her cabinet is sitting in Tokio with an apparent prospect of favorable action

Discuss "Status Quo."

A third element of the Washington which have become intertwined as the which have become interwined as the time for momentous decision arrives, also has been advanced to a point where the attitude of each interested delegation is well understood. This element involves future fortifications in the Pacific and informal discussions of it have established the "status quo" as an acceptable basis of agreement.

There remains only the chance of serious controversy over the problems of China as a possible barrier to a far-reaching understanding in which the national spokesmen can come to-gether on all the major points at issue here. With the sealing of such an understanding the rest would become a matter of detail. Most of the principa delegates believe that they could go home by the end of the year and leave the specific terms of the several remaining agreements to be worked out

by special commissions.

Indications have not been lacking that Japan might want to delay final action on the four-power treaty and the naval ratio until the devious problems of China and the Far East have reached a stage where they can be lumped into a general round-up

agreement. Despite much talk and the adoption of Despite much talk and the adoption of many resolutions, such questions as Shantung and the Japanese leases in Manchurla remain unsettled. Whether that circumstance is to delay the agreements now near consummation is a question only Tokio can answer. It is the belief of Washington that it will

Concession Conditional.

Outcroppings of the old troubles of the Orient have been apparent more than once since the question of a new deal for China came before the conference. At today's session of the Shantung negotiations Japan agreed to give up the public utilities of Kiao-Chow, but made the concession conditional on reference of some points to Tokio. A Chinese delegate pointed out that although nominally the conversations had made much progress, "strings have been tied" to almost all the decisions. Another point of serious disagreement as yet practically untouched by the conference is Manchuria.
