Turks Walk Armenians To Death, Doctor Reveals

SUBMITS DIARY OF ATROCITIES TO JOINT ALLIED COMMISSION

Refugees Driven At Point Of Bayonet Back and Forth Along Roads Until They Perish of Starvation and Exhaustion.

Special to London Advertiser.

London, July 13 .- Tragic pages from a doctor's diary tell how the Armenian nation is being literally walked to death. The horrors he describes are continuing.

Dr. Mark H. Ward, relief worker in Armenia since 1915, recently expelled by the Turks, has laid the diary before the joint allied commission for investigation of Turkish atrocities in Asia

Instead of outright murder and massacre, the Turks are driving refugees at the point of bayonets back and forth along roads until they perish of starvation and exhaustion, says Dr. Ward. Ninety per cent of the victims are women and children.





THE GREAT WHITE SOUTH. By Herbert G. Ponting, F.R.G.S. With 164 photographic illustrations by the author, eleven by Captain Scott and others, a map and two drawings and an introduction by Lady Scott. New York: Robert W. McBride & Co., publishers. \$7.50.

THE story of the British Antarctic expedition in the diary of Cap-tain Scott has passed into history. It is a record of heroism and devo-tion to science that is unsurpassed in tragic and inspiring interest. Of all tragic and inspiring interest. Of man's adventures in exploring the far and inaccessible places of the earth none will live longer in memory than those that are recorded in "Scott's Last Expedition."

For the most poignant and authoritative record of that immortal enterprise we must always turn to the leader's own story, but the present volume is a notable contribution to the literature of the expedition which vas destined to end in success and tragedy.

Mr. Ponting was the official photographer of the Scott party, and he rought to his task enthusiasm, zeal and consummate skill. The film record which he carried back from the Great White South is one of en-grossing scientific interest and esthe-He has captured in its most striking aspects the magnificent scenery of that Third World of which the geographers once dreamed but of more importance is the unique story of nature life in the Antarctic which is told us by the illustrations of this book.

The "stills" before us represent only one phase of his work and serve whet our curiosity regarding the cinematographic results of his tireess industry and resourcefulness.
