SHELDON AVENUE SEWER WORK COMPLAINED OF BY RESIDENTS

Ald. Potter Addresses a Few Plain Words to the Council in Reference to Public Works-Mayor Cowan Points Out Irregularity in the Presentation of Accounts - Other Matters Dealt with at Meeting of City Council

Ald. Wm. Potter took occasion at 1 last night's meeting of the City Council to address a few plain words to the Board in reference to the unsatisfactory way in which sewers have been and are being constructed in the city and urged the necessity of a change in the present mode of precedure. There is something precedure. wrong, he said, and it should be made right at once.

The matter came up in reference to the complaints made by ratepayers on Sheldon avenue about the manner in which the sewer is being put down on that street.

A letter was read from J. B. O'Flynn, acting for Sheldon avenue residents, in which it was pointed out that the people were paying \$135 more than they should and the work is very unsatisfactory.

Mr. Thompson, one of the residents, was heard. He said the intakes were open with no lights to warn pedestrians or horsemen; pipes have been put in when the inspector was not there. One man working on the sewer said that from Brock street to the second concession it was all right, but he would not swear for the rest of it; the inspector was not present at times when he should have been there; there are men on have been there; there are men on the street who are perfectly capable to inspect the sewer and the job should have been given to one of

them.

The Mayor—If this letter is correct the people have a grievance and should receive redress.

should receive redress.

Ald. Edmondson—I understand that sometimes only two men were working on the job and there was a man there inspecting and drawing \$2.50 per day. The sewer should be completed now and I would be in favor of making the contractor pay the inspector.

CONCERNING COMPANY.

Perfect and Genuine Hospitality May Be a Very Simple Matter.


As a rule, the chief anxiety of a hostess seems to be how she shall feed her guest. Now, while food is necessary and good, it is not the most important thing in life, and a visitor ought to care more for the society of her hostess than for an elaborate dessert or complicated dish. It is of course only natural to wish to give our friends the best, but let it be the best of ourselves rather than of material things.

The most perfect hospitality I ever experienced was that of a college chum who, some years after graduating, managed to get three classmates together for a couple of days at her summer home. On her way up from the station she said: "The market here is not very good, and Hannah is the plainest of plain cooks, but we will eat just what she provides, for I am not going to waste any time on food while you are here. I want to spend every min-ute enjoying you, for we may never be all together again." So we had an abundance of sin:ple food and were perfectly happy in seeing each other. We four have never been together again, and it is probable that we shall never have such another opportunity, but we look back on those two days and feel that we have had one perfect visit. The guest who is worthy of being entertained at all comes to see you not to eat your food or to upset your ordinary ways of life. The tendency is to make it all too much a matter of show rather than of friendship. It is no wonder that our maids do

not receive the announcement of approaching company with enthusiasm. Why, indeed, should they? All the trouble falls to their share and none of the enjoyment. Moreover, much of the trouble is quite unnecessary. I know a family where all the "waiting on table" ordinarily required of the one maid is to remove the dishes between the roast and the dessert, with no more uniform than a clean apron over her calico dress; but, when there is com-pany, behold a startling change! The usual plain dinner of two courses is expanded by the addition of soup, salad and coffee, and the maid, hustled into some sort of black garments, has to cook the meal and also serve it as if she were "second gir" instead of "general housework." Is it any wonder that company is not considered an

unmixed blessing in that kitchen? It is delightful to have our meals nicely served by a well trained waitress, but If we are not accustomed to so doing every day any departure from our usual methods is sure to prove unsatisfactory. It is largely our own fault if we make hospitality a burden to ourselves and others. It ought to be the source of the purest pleasure.— Ethel Williams in Boston Cooking School Magazine.

New Hampshire Custard Pie. Custard pie is always a favorite, and very tempting variety of it is the Hampshire article, for which Boston Cooking School Magazine gives the following recipe: Beat four eggs until light and thick. Then beat in half a

teaspoonful of salt and three-fourths of a cup of sugar and, gradually, three cups of rich milk. Bake in a deep earthen plate lined with pastry in a moderate oven until the center feels

Oyster Soup.

Pour a cup of cold water over two quarts of oysters; look over one by one to remove bits of shell. Strain the liquid through a cheesecloth, add a pint of chicken liquor and heat to the boiling point. Then add the oysters and again heat to the boiling point. Skim out the oysters and add, with the strained liquid, to a soup made as fol-lows: Cook two-thirds of a cup of sifted flour, a teaspoonful of salt with a dash of black peoper and half a cup of butter and stir into three pints of milk scalded, with two slices of onion, two stalks of celery, a sprig of parsley and a bay leaf. Stir and cook until smoothly thickened, then stir occasionally for twenty minutes and strain over the oysters and liquor. Finish with half a cup of hot cream and two tablespoonfuls of butter, stirred in at the last in little bits. The quantity will serve from ten to fifteen persons, according to an exchange, which gives this recipe.

A Fuel Item. After experimenting all last winter to find a suitable fuel for our grate we discovered that the soft coal common-ly used on railroads is productive of the greatest heat, says a Good House-keeping correspondent. It comes from the dealer at a price not exceeding that of stove coal and consists of large chunks mixed with a fine powder which burn to a glowing solid mass and leave no ashes to be sifted. It requires far less attention than the ordinary grate fire, remaining cheerful for a long time after the blower has been removed.

Lamps of the decorative class are more popular than ever, especially for country houses, where the soft glow produced by silken shade and stained glass is very artistic and desirable.



Russia Has Served Notice on the Polish Nationalists.

hat Country Is An Integral Part of the Empire of the Czar-Emperor Proclaims Martial Law In Poland Until Such Time as They Get Over Their Political Intoxication-Creates a Panic on the Bourse.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 14.—Poland is not to be permitted to become a sec-ond Finland. The Russian Government in a strongly worded communication published yesterday morning serves notice on the Polish nationalists that the ancient kingdom of Poland has now become an integral part of the Russian Empire, and that while the Government intends to fully observe the national rights of Poland, any at-tempt to wrest Polish autonomy from the Emperor would be considered an

act of revolt.

The ukase says:—"In accordance with the ukase of December 25 last the exceptional laws hindering the free development of the nation were

abrogated and the Poles were given the same rights as the Russians. "The general measures adopted by the Government were extended to Poland, which also was given the right of participation in the douma and free dom of meeting. Finally, on October 30 the Poles were fully recognized as free citizens, thereby obtaining ful opportunity to prove their capacity. Dangerous and Insolent.

"Forgetting the painful lessons of the past, the politicians who are di-recting the national movement in the Kingdom of Poland are making at-tempts as dangerous for the Polish population as they are insolent toward Russia to bring about the separation

russia to bring about the separation of the empire.

"There could obviously be no question of realizing pacific principles in a country in revolt. Therefore, for the restoration of order all the districts

of the Vistula are temporarily declared to be in a state of war. "The future of the Polish people thus depends upon themselves. The thus depends upon themselves. The Government having a desire to continue safeguarding the integrity and national rights of the Polish people, extended by recent legislative acts, expects the people to recover from the political intoxication which has come over the kingdom of Poland, the population of which has become a prey to the agitators, while at the same time it is putting the people on same time it is putting the people on guard against entering a dangerous path which, unfortunately, they have not for the first time trod."

Bourse in a Panic.

The formal proclamation of martial law throughout Russian Poland and the promulgation of the Government's intention to suppress the Polish movement to secure autonomy almost created a panic on the bourse yester-day, imperial fours again, falling to 86. Industrials seem to have no bot-

The city was full of rumors to the effect that the imperial ukase was issued over Count Witte's head at the instigation of the reactionaries, which is equivalent to the count's retirement, but it can be stated with positiveness that the action was taken upon the Premier's advice.

Assurances of Support.

It is generally believed here that both Germany and Austria have given Russia assurances of support, but of what nature cannot be learned. The present move in Poland certainly will or receive the sympathy of the Governments beyond the western border.

The danger is that the Poles may

provoke an active measure which would mean nothing short of civil war. The number of troops, 600,000, in Po-land, however, is sufficient to cope with the situation
