CANADIAN RAILWAY TO RUSH PRINT PAPER TO NEW YORK

Montreal, May 19-A fast freight service for hauling newsprint from mills near Montreal to publishers in New York City will be started on June 1, the Canadian National Railway announced to-day.

The service, it was said, would enable New York newspapers to run the paper from their presses within three days of the time it leaves the mills at Shawinigan Falls and Grand Mere.

MORE N.B. FARMS ARE ABANDONED

A falling off in the number of occupied farms in the province of New Brunswick is shown by the ensus of agriculture which was takes in connection with the census of population in June, 1921. The number of occupied farms in 1921 was 36,655 as compared with 37,755 in 1911, and 37,006 in1901. Farm acreage in 1921 was 4.269,560 as gainst 4.537.999 acres in 1911 and 1,443,400 acres in 1901. The average size of farms in 1921 was 116.4 acres as compared with 120.2 acres in 1911 and 120.1 acres in 1901.



Panama canal tolls for April amounted to \$1,878,987.

About \$2,300,000 is to be spent on the construction of roads and bridges the province of British Columbia

The Customs and Excise revenue for April amounted to \$20,500,000, an increase of \$5,000,000 over the receipts of April of last year.

Emigrants numbering 15,000 left Scotland for Canada during the first four months of the year, according to consular estimates in Glasgow.

Canadian flour has at last been placed on the Panama market. One boat has just loaded the first con-signment of any size, 1,000 barrels being taken.

Seventy-five per cent. of the copper produced in Canada in 1922 was the output of British Columbia mines. The Canadian production for the year was 43,221,402 pounds, of which British Columbia accounted for 32,432,521 pounds.

The famous Chateau Frontenac husky dog team, remembered by visitors during last winter's sports season, is being perpetuated. One of the dogs has just given birth to three pups, and if the youngsters turn out to be like their parents the Chateau Frontenac team is likely to continue winning dog derbys. continue winning dog derbys.

Fishing licenses in the Maritime Fishing licenses in the Maritime Provinces have been reduced. The special fishery regulations for Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island have been amended to provide that in many instances where the license has been more than a dollar it will now be one dollar.

No limit will be set to the help to be offered to new settlers in the agricultural sections of the province of Quebec, according to Premier Taschereau. The latest government provision is to pay colonists at the rate of \$4.00 per acre for land cleared on their colonization lots since 1920. \$7,000,000 have been voted for provincial colonization.

The decision of the Canadian Pa-cific Railway Company to scrap agreements of sale with 30,000 Can-adian farmers in the west and enter into new contracts with them, extending over 34 years on an amortization basis, will affect agreements of a value of approximately \$100,000,000, and relieve many farmers of heavy, pressing debts.

The new motor ferry operated be-tween Victoria, B.C., and Belling-ham, Wash, develops a speed of 14 hnots in adverse weather. This motor driven vessel, recently launch-ed, is the first of its class to be used in this service and the first to be added to the Canadian Pacific fieet. It has a capacity for 50 auto-mobiles.





ANTS ON MARCH THE FLOWER

Seeming Proof That Instinct Is Not Infallible.

Small Creatures Dragged Themselves to Death Because No One of Them Had Any Initiative.

At six o'clock in the morning I was starting for a swim in a British Guiana jungle when, at the foot of the laboratory steps I saw a swiftly moving, broad line of army ants on safari, passing through the compound to the beach. I traced them back under the evants' quarters, through two clumps of bamboos, to an outhouse.

Later, I followed along the column to the river sand, through dense mass of underbrush, through a hollow log, up the bank, back through light jungle—to the outhouse again; and on a large fallen log, a few feet beyond the spot where their nest had been, the ends of the circle actually came together. It was the most astonishing thing, and I had to verify it again and again before I could beleve the evidence of my eyes.

It was a strong column, six lines

wide in many places, and the ants fully believed that they were on their way to a new home: for most were cartying eggs or larvae, although many had food. For an hour, at noon, during heavy rain, the column weakened and most disappeared; but when the sun returned, the lines rejoined, and the revolution of the vicious circle con-

Careful measurement of the great circle showed a circumference of 1,200 feet. We timed the laden ants and

round in about two hours and a half. All the afternoon the insane circle revolvd; at midnight, the hosts were still moving; the second morning many to write on a label or small piece had weakened and dropped their burdens and the general pace had very appreciably slackened. But still the nd grip of instinct held them. On, on, on, they must go! Always before in their nomadic life there had been a goal—a sanctuary of hollow tree, snug heart of bamboos; surely this terrible grind must end somehow

Through sun and cloud, day and was found no ant with individual initiative enough to turn aside an ant's breadth from the circle that he had traversed perhaps 15 times.

Fewer and fewer now came along the well-worn path; burdens littered the line of march, like the arms and accoutrements thrown down by a re-treating army. At last, a scanty single line struggled past-tired, hopeless, bewildered, idiotic and thoughtless to the

Then some half-dead ant straggled from the circle along the beach, and threw the line behind him into confusion. The desperation of total ex-haustion had accomplished what neessity and opportunity and normal others follife could not. Several others fol-lowed his scent instead of that leading back toward the outhouse; and as an amoeba gradually flows into one of its own pseudopodia, so the forlorn hope of the great Eciton army passe slowly down the beach and on into the

jungle.

They have been is liable to forget these things after the spring has gone, a good plan is of wood the kind of plant which is desired in each place where improvement can be made; then when the proper time comes for planting, if such a plant is put there, it will not be long before a marked improvement will be seen in the garden in spring, and this method can be followed with good results for the whole season.

Let all who love flowers, then, plan for improvement in the garden next spring; a little improvement each year would soon result in a great change and make the home grounds much more attractive.

Ships Are Warned Of Atlantic Ice Menace




