The Referendum Body Now Declares Open War CONSTANTINOPOLE TO BE TAKEN OVER BY ALLIED FORCES

Four Programs As to Canadian Navy Are Now Suggested

The Famous Sea Fighter Favors the Laurier Plan of Some Years Ago—Does Not Recommend the Plan Costing the Least Money.

OTTAWA, March 11.—Canada's naval policy will be one of local administration and control, based on a worked-out plan of co-operation with the British Government, in the way of co-ordinating all building programs, fleet operations, training and personnel to a common end, if the Government accepts in its entirety the report of Hon. C. C. Balfour, in the House of Commons.

It is the Laurier policy extended to meet the modern situation, except that in an Imperial officer, the report leans at important points to policies which would make the influence of the British naval authorities at all times paramount in important questions.

In each such case however, he points out that if Dominion susceptibilities were hurt by such measures there are alternatives to follow.

Centralization of command in time of war would be combined with local equipping of authority to meet emergencies. Briefly stated, Lord Jellicoe recommends the establishment of a Canadian Navy Board, consisting of: first, a naval member, who would be

chief of the naval staff; second, the Minister of Naval Affairs; third, a second naval member, and fourth, a civil and finance member each member taking an important branch of the board's activities into his full charge.

Four building programs are suggested, the plan ultimately to be followed to be decided according to the amount of outlay which the Dominion is willing to make in building and maintaining a fleet. The programs outlined are based respectively, on the annual expenditure of five, ten, seventy and a half and twenty five million dollars a year when building program is complete. The most expensive plan includes all the building done by the other plans, so that it is possible for the government to adopt the minimum plan, and increase its program whenever it thinks fit or finances permit.

The minimum plan calls for eight submarines, four local defense destroyers, eight "P" boats and four trawler sweepers. Admiral Jellicoe assumes that there would be an expenditure of only \$1,625,000 on the first cost of these, because there would be so many gifts of vessels from the Imperial Government and a maintenance cost of \$4,022,500.

Will Soon Lift Smallpox Ban At the Bridge

Prospects for an early lifting of the smallpox ban are bright. President Mason of Niagara Falls, N. Y. Chamber of Commerce today received a telegram from the Bureau of Public Health Service at Washington saying that following an investigation of conditions, it is likely that the ban on travel will be removed within a day or two.

The evidence the Crown will use against Mrs. Greenwood will be the cheques which were found on her when arrested, all ready, the police say to commence operations in St. Catharines stores.

Ontario Has Had to Depend On Its Fish Supply From The West This Winter

So severe has been the winter in Ontario, that had not the lakes of the northwest froze over, this part of the country would be without any fresh fish at the present time, according to a local fish dealer. Usually it is the custom for the fishermen to get in large catches of herring and white fish and put them in cold storage in the fall. This supply then does the province for the entire winter or until the fishing season opens again. Most of the herring comes from Lake Erie, but so quick and unexpectedly did the winter set in that very little fish was stored.

Premier Drury Says He Will Endeavor to Make The O. T. Act Effective

TORONTO, MARCH 11.—Several hundred delegates from the provincial prohibition convention descended upon Hon. Mr. Drury and his ministers at Queen's Park to make a "demonstration in force." The deputation presented a memorial but the visit to the parliament buildings was more in the nature of a declaration of support of the requests already made to the government by the executive of the referendum committee and the Ontario Alliance for restrictive legislation.

GIANTS A FAMILY HEIRLOOM SAYS CHAS. STONEHAM

HAVANA, March 11.—When Charles A. Stoneham purchased the New York National league baseball team, it was done primarily for the purpose of handing down the club as a legacy to his son. Mr. Stoneham made this statement to-night to set at rest rumors which he said were current in the States and Cuba that the Giants were for sale. I would not part with the Giants for several million dollars," he said adding that he hoped New York would be given a championship team this year or in the near future.

GIRL TRIES TO HURL CHAIR AT MAGISTRATE Bites Patrolman's Hand as Being Taken to Jail; Sent to Mercer.

WINDSOR, March 11.—Margaret Crews, known as "the worst girl in Michigan," is again under arrest here. She was arrested yesterday. When arraigned in police court she first refused to speak, and then attempted to hurl a chair at Magistrate Miers. She later bit the hand of Patrolman Blair, who took her to the county jail at Sandwich. Margaret will serve six months in the Ontario Reformatory.

RURAL CREDITS ARRANGED

WINNIPEG, March 11.—As a result of his trip to Eastern Canada, for conferences with the heads of Canadian banking concerns, Hon. Edward Brown, provincial treasurer, has set on an undertaking that banking houses will continue to loan money to the rural credit societies of Manitoba at a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent per annum.

Slick Stranger Tried to Work Check Game

Chief of Police Greene this morning received a telephone message from the Chief of Police at Niagara Falls, Ont., stating that a stranger giving his name as Lieutenant Arthur Nieler, representing himself to be a United States marshal from Washington, D. C., had tried to cash a cheque for \$36 in Niagara Falls last night. He did not succeed.

He was a man of six feet tall, about 24 years of age and carried a revolver. He wore a dark overcoat and light trousers. He is a smooth talker, the Falls chief said, and was also smooth shaven.

Bogus cheques were passed at Niagara Falls, N. Y., yesterday afternoon and the chief of police there thinks the stranger was the man who passed them.

The Plan For Elections in Local C. of C.

WOMEN TO CONFER WITH THE SENATE

Will Discuss Amendments to the Criminal Code.

OTTAWA, March 11.—The Executive Committee of the National Council of Women has decided that a delegation, to be appointed by the President of the Council, shall confer with the members of the Senate to discuss the amendments to the Criminal Code suggested by the National Council, on behalf of the Women Citizens' Association of Ontario. These amendments were passed by the House last session, but were rejected by the Senate, and it is the intention of the Council to give first-hand information as to their reasons for requiring these changes.

It Will Be Known as the Disciplinary Occupation of Constantinople to Distinguish it From the Ordinary Occupation Following Armistice.

LONDON, March 11.—The Daily Chronicle's Peace Conference representative writes: "The disciplinary occupation of Constantinople as it may be called to distinguish it from the ordinary occupation which followed the conclusion of the armistice, has been definitely ordered by the allied powers, and will be carried out at once. For the present it will consist of posting allied contingents at strategic points of the city

on both sides of the Golden Horn. For this purpose there are troops enough on the spot, and more can be brought up in a few days.

"Any question of further measures will be answered according as this unsensational demonstration is or is not effective in bringing home to the Turkish Government the determination of the allies that the provincial disorders shall cease and that the terms of the Peace Treaty shall be executed scrupulously."

Plebiscite On Bone Dry Legislation Will Be Demanded By Committee

Open war with the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance in convention at Massey Hall, Toronto, was declared last night by Dr. A. S. Grant, Chairman of the Ontario Referendum Committee. Whatever the decision of the Provincial Prohibition Convention at Massey Hall, Dr. Grant declared that his organization would go on with the plebiscite on "bone dry" prohibition. The present convention he characterized as one "without policy or program."

"The position yesterday," said Dr. Grant, "was that they wanted to meet with the referendum body, and we met in conference with them. We stated our position and we practically came to an agreement in a committee of fifty in which the majority were Alliance men, that they would ask for

a vote." But apparently when they went into convention they altered that, as they did not ask for that but asked for amendments to the Ontario Temperance Act, such as the committee asked for before and were refused. So the convention has put themselves in the position of the Referendum Committee.

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ALLIES DECIDE PLAN TO SAVE CENTRAL STATES

LONDON, March 10.—The economic manifesto of the allies was signed yesterday and will be published simultaneously in Paris, Rome and London. This means that the French objections have resulted in a compromise agreeable to England and Italy after weeks of debate, investigation and consideration of confidential reports, and following nearly a two weeks conference at No. 10 Downing street by the allied premiers.

England, France and Italy have finally agreed in their diagnosis of causes of the present world economic crisis, and what is more important they have united upon a program for remedying conditions.

Two main Paris in effect this important manifesto may be considered an interpretation of the economic clauses of the Versailles Treaty and a modification of its terms, particularly as they affect Germany. The document which is much longer than the usual diplomatic memorandum, despite the fact that it has undergone many changes since it first was discussed by Premier Lloyd George, Nitti and Millerand, is understood to be divided into two main parts, one presenting the causes of present conditions and the second remedial measures to enable Germany and all Central Europe to regain an economic footing. For the allies have decided that the reconstruction of Europe cannot begin until the former enemy nations obtain raw materials and money with which to start their industries.

ALLEGED FORGER ON WAY TO SEE GIRL IN PLANE

CLEVELAND, March 10.—William McMullin, 28 years old held here for the grand jury on two charges of forgery told federal officers today that he deserted from Kelly Field, Tex., in an army airplane.

"I started for Chicago to see my girl, but was forced to abandon the plane when the gas gave out," McMullin said.

SIX MILLION JEWS ARE FACING DEATH

Starvation and Disease Cause Indescribable Suffering in Eastern Europe.

The hardships of this winter will mean death to thousands of Jews in Poland, unless outside aid intervenes at once according to Lieutenant Sholom Wright of the American Red Cross Commission to Poland, recently returned to the United States after months of relief work in eastern Europe.

He painted a vivid picture of this half-starved people, clad in rags, who are now creeping back toward their devastated homes after months of wandering, and dying of starvation and typhus along the roads, as they go.

"Outside starvation, numerous diseases, attributed to malnutrition and typhus have killed men and women and children like flies," he said. "I remember a family trying to live under an overturned wagon by the roadside. The mother was dead under a tree a few yards away—she had been dead for days. The father was stretched upon the ground dying of typhus. He died that day. Under the wagon two little children, both under five, sick with typhus. An older child sat stupidly beside them—a girl driven out-of-her mind."

Many of the people are driven to making "soup" out of cleaves and other parts. In spite of the fact that the American Jewish Relief agencies are spending almost \$2,000,000 a month now on their relief work in Poland, and that the Red Cross is doing its work on so vast a scale, hundreds of thousands of Jews and Poles will die during the winter unless more aid comes.

Every basket full of refugees returning to their homes has in it those who die along the way, and those who have contracted typhus," Lieutenant Wright said. "The people try to avoid disease by keeping clean, but it is impossible to do so, under existing conditions. Even our nurses and doctors fall ill of typhus, a disease caused by filth and lice."

The Red Cross and the American Jewish Relief agencies are doing their utmost to keep both the Jews and the Gentiles in these stricken lands alive. Six million Jews in eastern Europe face death unless immediate shipments of food, clothing, and bedding from Canada and the United States reach them before the cold weather sets in.

An appeal for funds is to be made in Ontario and a generous response from this district is confidently expected.

MOBS OF CHILDREN CRAVING FOR BREAD

Gaze Into Bakeshop Windows for Hours at a Time, Hoping for Something to Eat.

"The saddest thing in all Eastern Europe at the present moment—worse than all the other instances of starvation and even of death and disease on every hand—are the child-mobs one sees outside of the few bakeries that are able to keep going in Warsaw," Sholom Asch, the famous Yiddish playwright and poet reported to the American Jewish Relief Committee upon his return from Eastern Europe, where he went as a commissioner of the Joint Distribution Committee of American Funds for Jewish Sufferers from the War.

"In the bakery windows are a few loaves of bread, and sometimes cakes, that are sold at a simply prohibitive price," he explained, "and even if these were as cheap as in Canada and the United States, their taste would still be unknown to the hungry Jewish children, who live on the cup of soup a day they get from American Jewish relief agencies. But the youngsters tantalize themselves with the sight of food, when they cannot get the taste of it."

"They press up to the window, and at first merely stare respectfully at the bread, an untidy little crowd of gaunt small folks with old faces and suffering unchildish eyes. Perhaps it is raining, or the wind is blowing coldly through the lattice that they wear, that little barefoot army, but they huddle together for warmth, and do not stir. The sight of the bread has fascinated them, it is so rarely seen."

"A customer comes out, leaving the door ajar for a moment, and the warm fragrance of the bake-shop drifts out to the little ragamuffins, maddening them. They press closer to the window, their thin little faces against the glass. Those in front put out their tongues and lick the glass, as if, by so doing, they could taste the bread behind. No poet could ever write into words the listlessness of their faces as they do it."

"One of the men from the bakery comes out and drives them away every few minutes, else they would break the glass. They are afraid of him, and for a few minutes they stand at a distance, their eyes still upon the bread. Then hunger overcomes their fear, and they press up to the bakery window again. Soon they are eagerly licking the glass once more. And this goes on all day every day in front of the bakery window."

DESTITUTION IN EUROPE TERRIBLE

Long Processions of Starving, Ill-Clad Children Seen Daily on the Streets.

Long processions of little Jewish children in Eastern Europe, bearing their tin cups in their hands, daily walk from their villages to the nearest town in which there is a Jewish relief station, according to relief workers in these stricken lands, sometimes journeying five or six miles in order to get the cup of soup with a piece of hardtack, or the mug of milk, which is often their sole food of the day.

Those tin-cup processions emphasize, as nothing else could do, the relief workers say, the terrible destitution of the Jews in Eastern Europe at present. The children in them are barefoot, almost without exception. Reports received by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee say that both boys and girls are wrapped in burlap, or dressed in clothing made from the sacks in which the relief supplies have come, or in the rags which they have worn during the five years of the war, their gaunt little bodies showing through the tatters. They do not walk as children usually do, without effort or restraint, but drag themselves along wearily, and occasionally lift their dead, ghostly faces to stare at the hungry processions throughout eternity.

Arrived at the relief station, the children are so tired and so weak that they sit down upon the pavements to await their turn in line. Upon the faces of every one of them there is an expression of unchildlike anxiety. It has to do with the only really vital question in the world to them—whether or not the soup or milk will hold out, until their turn comes. Every day some of them have to be turned away without food, since their numbers are so great that the funds at present on hand are not always sufficient to care for them all.

MILLION CHILDREN ARE CLAD IN RAGS

Their Wasted Bodies Show Thru Tatters, Result of Starvation and Misery.

The art of making two flowers bloom where only one bloomed before isn't half so hard as that of making two garments exist where only one existed before, yet even this can be accomplished, according to reports recently received by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee from relief workers abroad.

Cloth of any kind, either cotton or wool, is particularly impossible to obtain in Eastern Europe, except at prohibitive prices. A row of little Jewish children in these unhappy lands are clad in the rags that they have worn all through the war, their wasted little bodies showing through great tatters. Some of these children are still sleeping on the streets, since there are at present neither orphanages nor funds for all.

Miss Harriet B. Lowenstein, of New York, sent to Europe as a commissioner of the Joint Distribution Committee of American Funds for Jewish War Sufferers, was able to purchase more than a carload of pajamas from the salvage department of the American army in France. These were sent to Eastern Europe, and in the workrooms opened there were made over into clothing for children. Each pair of pajamas made at least two Russian blouse suits for little boys it was reported. The larger pieces left over in the cutting were used for the cloths that the children of Eastern Europe bind around their feet in lieu of shoes.

MILLION PAIRS OF SHOES ARE NEEDED

Destitute Jewish Children of Eastern Europe Use Rags to Protect Feet From the Cold.

A million pairs of shoes are needed by the destitute Jewish children of Eastern Europe to-day, according to reports received by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee from relief workers abroad.

At least that many of the helpless and hungry Jewish youngsters of Eastern Europe are absolutely without footwear of any kind, their relief agents say. Thousands of others have rags sewn around their feet in lieu of shoes.

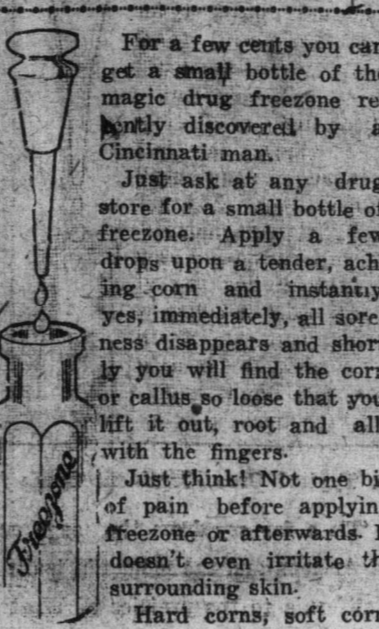
Several carloads of shoes that formerly belonged to Allied soldiers in France were purchased there by the Joint Distribution Committee of Funds for Jewish Sufferers from the War, for the Jewish women of Eastern Europe. But it was impossible to buy the shoes in sizes that could be worn by the children, and all others sold in Europe are at a prohibitive price. So a million youngsters are barefoot during the hard winter of Eastern Europe.

There is a great lack of every conceivable kind of clothing, as well as shoes. In Serbia, a common child's costume just now consists of two sacks, with holes cut through for the head and feet. In Poland, four sacks and sugar sacks sent with supplies to the destitute Jews by Jewish relief agencies are all being made over into clothing, and even small salt sacks are pieced together, and used for this purpose.

Party-Line Consideration

Two-party line is a single circuit, shared in common by two subscribers. It is not reserved for a single user and should be used on the share-and-share-alike basis.

On a two-party line it is impossible for both users to try to talk out on the same circuit at the same time. There is also the liability of both being wanted at the same time to receive incoming calls.

Therefore, there are special considerations which we urge a party-liner user to keep in mind:

- 1. Long conversations prevent the use of the line by the other subscriber, therefore party-line talks should be as brief as possible.
2. Whenever another party-line subscriber requests the use of the line for an emergency, courtesy should be prompt, the first user temporarily to give up the use of the line.
3. Whenever a party-line subscriber takes the receiver from the hook and finds the line in use, the receiver should be replaced at once in a careful manner.
4. At the end of a conversation the receiver should be replaced upon the hook immediately, otherwise the other subscriber cannot signal the central office.
5. Be sure always to give the operator the letters W or J in calling a party-line subscriber.

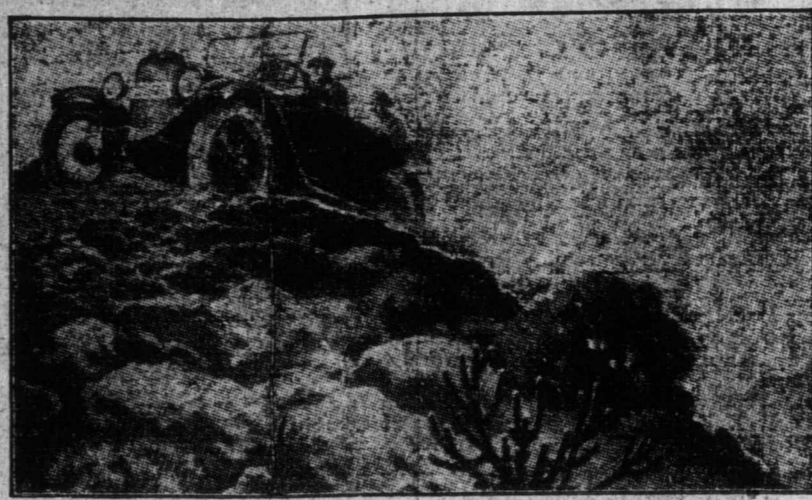

SPRING CALF FEEDING

**How to Feed and Handle the
Young Arrival.**

The Dam's Milk the Best First Food
—Skim milk should gradually
Replace Whole Milk—Grass or
Stable for Calves?
(Contributed by Ontario Department of
Agriculture, Toronto.)

THE calf that comes in the
spring, comes just at a time
when everybody is so busy
getting the spring work
done that he is very liable to be neg-
lected to a certain extent. Young
calves are very susceptible to disease
com—on to young cattle and a little
lack of attention to spring calves is
liable to cause serious trouble to them.

There are two menaces to calves
in spring and summer, and those are
extreme heat and flies, and one is on
a par with the other. Arrangements
should be made whereby the calves
are kept in during the day and al-
lowed to run out in a paddock at
night. By this means they are
afforded a liberal amount of exercise
and good pure fresh air, and also
they are allowed to get some of the
nice juicy green grass, which is the
nearest thing to a complete and bal-
anced ration that can be found out-
side of milk.

When the calf is dropped it may
be well to leave it with the dam for
a few hours in order that it may get
the first milk (or colostrum) which
is so necessary on account of its ac-
tion on the digestive tract. When
the calf has received sufficient colos-
trum to set up the necessary action
it should be removed from its mother
into a separate stall, or it may be put
into a stall with other calves of the
same age or nearly so. If, by any
chance, the cow's udder is inflamed,
the calf may be left for a few days,
because of the beneficial effect that
the calf's punching has upon it.

For a few days the calf should be
fed whole milk, but when it is two
to four weeks old a change should be
made, skim milk gradually replacing
the whole milk, from eight to ten
days taken for the change. When
the whole milk is totally replaced the
milk may be increased to eighteen
or twenty pounds per day for a calf
six weeks old. The best kind of
skim milk for calves is warm, just
when it leaves the farm separator.
However, everybody may not have a
separator, and then this is not pos-
sible. In any event the system start-
ed with the calf should be followed
as nearly as possible at all times,
because radical changes in diet are
sure to cause serious digestive trou-
bles. Pails and all feeding utensils
should be kept very clean to elimi-
nate any danger of disease from
bacteria which might be lurking with-
in. Skim milk feeding may be contin-
ued on as long as it is thought ad-
visable, up to eight or ten months
old. Good thrifty calves may be
weaned as early as three months old,
providing good substitutes for the
milk are used.

The most frequent trouble in rais-
ing calves is indigestion or common
scour. This trouble is usually caused
by overfeeding, feeding milk too
cold, feeding milk heavily laden with
the disease germs, or by keeping the
calves in a dark, poorly venti-
lated quarter. The calves should be
watched carefully, and if they show
signs of scour, immediate steps
should be taken to effect a cure. The
ration should be reduced and a little
lime water put into the milk. If
immediate action is needed, about
one-half cupful of strong black tea
or one cupful of strong coffee should
be given for the calves. Colled
oats are good, and if they are getting
no whole milk a little linseed oil
cake should be added. The oil cake
has a laxative property as well as
supplying a little fat to the ration.
A good meal for calves: 100 lbs. of
ground oats, 50 lbs. bran and oil
cake (nutted) 25 lbs. Good clover
hay is essential at all times, giving
enough to allow the calves to pick
out the nice succulent parts, and still
not be wasteful. J. C. McBeath,
O. A. College, Guelph.

**Should Calves Go Out to Grass or
Remain in the Stable?**
Generally speaking, calves are bet-
ter kept in the stable during the
first summer, except where stable
conditions are not good, and where
there is not enough labor to look af-
ter them and keep them dry and
clean. The only other exception is
in the case of calves dropped in the
early winter and which have had
three to six months of milk and more
or less dry feed. Such calves may
be all right, if turned out to grass
as soon as the pasture is good and
the weather warm and pleasant. Par-
ticularly in this case where milk
and other feed is scarce on the farm.

The chief advantages of keeping
calves in the stable, the first summer
are:
1. They can be fed milk and other
feed as required, which is often neg-
lected when calves run with the cows,
or are pasturing some distance from
the barn.
2. Calves in a clean, well-ventilat-
ed stable are protected from the hot
sun, storms and flies, which often
prevent that good growth which is
essential for a well-nourished thrifty
calf.

3. If allowed to run with the herd,
the older animals are likely to
"bully" the calves and may injure
them, or deprive them of their proper
share of feed.
4. Cases of sickness, such as indi-
gestion or "scours" are more likely
to be noticed, and properly treated,
if the calves are inside where they
are seen frequently.
5. As a result of this better care
and feed, better cows are more likely
to be reared, which means larger
returns to the owners of cows.—Prof.
H. H. Dean, O. A. College, Guelph.

At the dinner given in London by the Lord Mayor on Washington's birthday, attended by 300 prominent Americans and Britons, Mr. Davis, the American Ambassador, said there was no reason why Britons and Americans everywhere should not "rededicate themselves to the ideals for which Washington stood," and he added:

guage, should prostitute his God-given eloquence to the cause of pulling down everything good in our constitution and in our framework of society, doing all he can to make the satisfied dissatisfied, to set class against class, to fan the flames of discontent until they break out in very revolution.

Andrews read from the Labor paper of April 18 a report of Ivens' speech at the Labor Church. The address had been reported by Staff-Sergt. Roames off the R.N.W.M.P., whose report read:

"It is hard to conceive of a more scathing indictment of capitalism than the speaker meted out. He spoke of it controlling the press, controlling the Legislature, entering the judiciary."

Mr. D. D. Mackenzie, who was last year Liberal leader in the Commons wants Canada to be independent in its fuel supplies. He says the Dominion should not depend on the United States.

Because promised legislation affecting the wages paid to letter carriers has not yet materialized the Toronto letter carriers are becoming anxious. They are wondering what has become of the promise.

DURABILITY IN A PIANO
