
The grand jury in London on the 25th inst., returned true bills against Sir Roger Casement, leader of the Sinn Fein revolt, and Daniel J. Bailey, the former British soldier, who is held as his accomplice. The action of the grand jury follows the preliminary hearing before a police magistrate, at which Casement and Bailey withheld their defence, and were held without bail, pending the grand jury deliberaions. Seventy-five jurors were summoned before Lord Chief Justice Reading on the 25th, and from their number 23 were selected to decide whether or not indictments for high treason should be returned against the prisoners. Their decision was reached promptly.

Sanderson of Greenwitch, St. Peter's Bay, who enlisted in the 55th Battalion, in May of last year and had since been serving his country in the trenches of Belgium, and France, arrived home on Saturday. Private Sanderson is the son of Garbard Sanderson, of Greenwitch, and is 20 years of age. 




