The first and most important step was to value the insurance certificates outstanding at 31st December, 1919. The amount of nsurance outstanding was \$8.-302,825.76. The valuation basis used was the National Fraternal Congress table of mortality with an nterest assumption of 4 per cent, pgether with a liberal provision for excess mortality above that called for by this table of mor-


