Senator O'Donohue and other "influential" agents of the Dominion Government were sent up to put the Catholics right, but the counting o, the ballots showed that the Catholic v. ters stood fast by their Liberal prin-ciples and polled their votes so strongly in favor of Ross as to secure his return by the handsome majority of 167. At examination of the vote polled shows that while Mr. Ross's vote was almos identical with that polled in his favor 1879, Mr. Johnston obtained nearly 250 more than Mr. Kelly. It should not require much figuring on Mr. Kelly's part to convince him that a large section of the Tory party quietly gave him the drop in 1879, though they expected to use him for their own advantage in 1883.
