YEAR TRIP TO ARCTIC REGIONS. Winnipeg, Sept. 26-Harry V. Radford, of New York, the noted explorer and scientist, who but recently returned from four teen months' stay in the district south of Great Slave lake, is in the city en route to Edmonton, from whence he starts on Oct. 1 on a five-year trip across and around the top of the North American

Radford, who is a great friend of Peary, has been exploring an unknown country and in particular studying the habits of the wood bison which hitherto have evaded the scientists. Incidentally this intrepld explorer mapped out a large area untrodden by white men since 1877; and he has presented the results of his expedition to the Dominton government.

The more ambitious trip he is now undertaking leads across

the continent from Fort Smith, where he spends his first winter, to Lake Baker, on Chesterfield Injet, Hudson Bay, where he spends his second winter. It is probable that the R. N. W. M. P. next year will lay him down supplies at that point.

From there he travels by canoe and sled round the edge of the Arctic ocean and in two years more expects to make the mouth of the Mackenzie river, whence he will pass across Alaska, returning to civilization by the Pacific coast.
