





Popularity Papers—Being the Fourth of a Few Little Talks on the Ingredients of Popularity.



One of the most important characteristics for the person who wants to be popular is tact, which has been most cleverly defined as the fine art of picking things up by the handles. The tactless person is never popular.

No matter how good his intentions, if any one goes about snatching things up without heed to their handles and stepping on folks' mental corns, people will not be glad to see him coming. Besides, I do not think that tactlessness ever does co-exist with really good intentions, or at any rate with any grave effort to put these intentions into action. You sometimes hear people say, "Oh, dear, I'm so unlucky. I always say the wrong thing. I wish I were tactful, and I try to be, but somehow I seem to put my foot in it. I'm just unlucky."

What a very queer idea of luck some people have.

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**Noah Webster.**

The name of Noah Webster is gratefully remembered by thousands of stenographers as the author of that pleasing work of fiction, 'Webster's Unabridged Dictionary.' This was a work of inspiration, requiring a good command of spelling, but it is rather monotonous when published in serial form, as it has no plot to speak of.

Noah wrote this book between meals, as it were. Whenever he thought of a word which hadn't occurred to anybody else, he would jot it down on his cuff and weave it into his romance later. Every once in a while he would think of a new way of spelling some word with which everybody was perfectly satisfied and rush into the house and transfix it on the typewriter before it got away.

Noah was a very unsocial man, as he was always correcting somebody's spelling or finding fault with their pronunciation. He seldom went to church, because it pained him to hear an illiterate clergyman pronounce some of his best words with the accent on the peanut instead of coming in on the third beat of the measure.

Noah's book is a handy work to have about the house, as it makes a pleasing substitute for the baby's high chair and will hold down one corner of a refractory rug with perfect ease. Many a girl has learned to play the reed organ as the result of uneasy contact with Noah's book.

There is a good deal of sameness to Noah's writing, and at times he becomes quite wordy, but he has a graceful, six-syllable style. A great many writers have succeeded in copying Noah's style, but no one ever got by with as few mis-spelled words as he did.

Noah was a perfect crank on spelling. He was the only man in this country who could spell such words as "selze," "wierd" and "separate" without taking a scolding start. It was a popular diversion at social gatherings to back Noah up against the wall, underneath a crayon portrait of Brother Henry in a string mustache, and ask him to spell himself down.

Noah's book is issued in vest-pocket form, consisting of nine pounds of Russian calf and eighteen pounds of fascinating prose. It should be in every home.

**Virtuous Indignation.**

The Morison organ throws up its hands in holy horror at our expression of satisfaction that Sir Ralph Williams is leaving Newfoundland, and of regret that he is not going before February next. We are used to the Hon. John Alexander's affectation of virtuous indignation, and the only interest we have in it are the occasions on which it is displayed and suppressed. For instance, as a supporter of Mr. Morison in 1904, he could not retain his indignation with Sir Edward but vented his feeling as follows:—

"The attitude of Edward P. Morris is even more inconsistent than that of his colleague and master, Sir Robert Bond. So strongly did he believe in the 1898 contract that he deliberately left Mr. Bond to support Sir James Winter and Mr. Morison, and yet he dared to join with the same Sir Robert in a denunciation of the same contract, and actually voted for the 1901 contract which gave millions of dollars to Mr. Reid. As a friend of the contractor he was certainly consistent, but to his pledges he was wholly recreant."

During the past four years, Mr. Robinson has managed to suppress his indignation with Morris, and for that period he has managed to withhold all sarcasm about Morris being consistent as a friend of the contractor.

It appears therefore that John Alexander possesses the virtue of self-control. For instance, he positively can refrain from mistating, or even hinting that "no one, endowed with the rudimentary instinct of a gentleman could condone" the writing of the Orange Bay letter by a man who occupied at the time the office of Attorney-General, but he cannot refrain from expressing an opinion that "no one, endowed with the rudimentary instinct of a gentleman, could condone" criticism of a Governor although His Excellency has whitewashed the writer of that letter.

But what can be expected from the organ of Morison, the wrong-doer, or the organ of the Premier who retains the wrong-doer in his Executive to the disgust of the public and even of members of his own party.

**Whaling News.**

Word has just been received saying that the whaler Cachelot, operating at Hawke's Harbor, Labrador, had secured nineteen whales to date and that one of which was a large, valuable, sperm fish. This is the best steamer has done since she started whaling. This time last season the Cachelot had only three fish and up to the last of September her total was only equivalent to what it is now. If her present average continues the owners will realize profitable dividends at finish up time. The captain of the Cachelot reports conditions adverse since the voyage began.

Within the last few days the price of whale oil has advanced considerably and the prospects are good for a still higher price. On the whole we learn that the aggregate number of whales are far behind last year and the possibilities for a decided increase are gloomy according to reports from the different whalers. However, the reduction in the catch will be counteracted by the excellent price offered for whale oil.

**GOT EIGHTEEN MONTHS.**—Const. Goodland arrived by the express to-day from Bay St. George with a young man aged 21 for the Penitentiary where he will spend 18 months. He recently committed a criminal assault on a little girl of 12 years, and was sentenced by Magistrate McDonald. The particulars of the case are sensational but unprintable.

**MARRIED TO-DAY.**—This afternoon Mr. Reginald Dowden, reporter of the Evening Herald, will be married to Miss Gertrude Roberts. The ceremony will take place at Wesley Church.

**Great Memorial Service**

FOR THE LATE GENERAL BOOTH, IN OLYMPIA, LONDON.

Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, To-day.

The funeral services of the late General Booth was held in Olympia last night without pomp or any symbols of mourning, but with the most moving fervor and impressiveness. Thirty-four thousand people participated. Nearly half wore blue coats and red jerseys, or bonnets with Red ribbons so familiar on the streets of the cities of several nations. The service itself was not only a memorial but a mammoth meeting of prayer and praise. No other congregation comparable with it ever occurred in London, if in the world, save at the funeral of the General's wife in the same hall twenty two years ago. The most solemn events of the long meeting were when the coffin was borne along the centre of the hall to snorous music of the "Dead March in Saul," immediately before the body, the Brigadier bore aloft the crimson flag which the General raised at Jerusalem and under which he died at Hadley Wood. Following the body marched the officers of Canada, Sweden, Germany, America, Switzerland, France, Denmark, Norway, India and Australia. The service was conducted by Commissioner Howard. The most impressive scene of all was when all the soldiers of the Army rose and recited the covenant of fidelity, pledging themselves to be faithful servants of the Lord.

**Narrow Escape.**

Monday night Mr. N. J. Murphy, undertaker, of Bambrick St., and John Kelly, marble worker, had an experience they will not soon forget. They were fishing in Fanny's Pond and took a small frail boat out in the lake. Suddenly they noticed her to be leaking badly and they rowed shorewards. It blew strong and for a while matters looked desperate for them for the boat was sinking. Messrs. Vetch and Mitchell who had no means of helping them stood on the bank distracted as the boat sank in the water further and further. They pulled with might and main and when within twenty yards of the shore the boat completely collapsed and went under them. The men had to swim for it and reached the shore utterly exhausted greatly to the relief of the two men watching them. Had the accident occurred further out in the lake where quite a sea run nothing could have saved the men.

**Here and There.**

**LATE LEAVING HALIFAX.**—The S. S. Florizel is due here this afternoon. She was delayed at Halifax taking aboard freight and did not get away from there until 6 p.m. on Tuesday.

**GOOD TRAPPING.**—People in by to-day's express from Twillingate say that there are several traps out yet and doing good work. 10 to 12 qts. being the quota each day despite the fact that the season has so far advanced.

**LOST TRAWLING GEAR.**—The banker J. S. Munn arrived from the Grand Banks last night with a good deal of trawl gear gone. Since leaving the home port, Burin, on August 5th, the vessel has only secured 200 qts. of fish and has now stocked 900 qts. to date. The vessel retires here.

**INVERMORE'S PASSENGERS.**—The Invermore arrived at Port aux Basques at 7.55 a.m. to-day. Her passengers were: Rev. Dr. S. W. Whalen, Miss M. Thornhill, L. C. Bibnam and wife, R. O'Reilly, Mrs. A. **Mayor's Lament Cures Diphtheria.**

**Killed at Sydney.**

Several Cars Passed Over Thomas Mullaly's Body and He Died in Hospital.

Another fatal accident occurred at the plant of the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. at an early hour this morning, shortly after the day shift had begun work.

About seven fifteen after he had finished his night work on the pier and was returning home Thomas Mullaly aged about forty, employed as one of the car haulage men, while trying to cross the track was struck by a car, thrown on the track, while several cars passed over his body. The man was alive when picked up. He was placed on the ambulance, but died shortly after being taken to the Brooklands Hospital.

Mullaly who is a native of Newfoundland was endeavouring to cross the track at pier No. 2, at the head of a train of coal which was backing in on the pier. He miscalculated the distance, apparently, and was struck by the moving train as he was trying to get by.—Sydney Post, Aug. 26th.

**Treatment For Falling Hair.**

A great many people who are troubled in this way wait too long before beginning treatment. If you wish to save your hair you must take it in time. A tightness of the scalp, perhaps with itching and heavy dandruff, are among the first signs of the trouble. She is a wise beauty seeker who waits for no further symptoms, but begins operations immediately.

Scalp treatments at the hands of a skilled beauty doctor are of course highly desirable, but the woman who finds it impossible or extremely inconvenient to receive professional treatment, need not despair. She can do much for herself, provided only she is systematic and persistent in her efforts.

Before beginning on any course of scalp treatment, it is highly important to determine the condition and needs of the scalp. If the scalp is dry and lacking in oil, it is evident that more oil should be supplied. If, on the other hand, there is an excess of oil, a tonic of a drying nature is needed.

The hair should be shampooed frequently—probably once in every two weeks—during the treatment. If the scalp is extremely oily, it may be necessary to shampoo every week. For a dry scalp, a tar soap should be used—for the oily scalp, sulphur soap.

For dry hair, the following tonic is highly recommended: Forty-eight grains of resorcin, one-fourth ounce glycerine, diluted alcohol to fill two ounce bottle.

For oily hair, try the following: Forty grains of resorcin, one-half ounce water, one ounce each of alcohol and witchhazel.

The method of applying these tonics to the hair is just as important as the tonics themselves. They are not to be dabbed on in a careless and haphazard fashion, but massaged into the scalp scientifically every night.

Part the hair into fifty strands, and apply the tonic along the partings and around the hair line. It is well to use a medicine dropper for this purpose. Then work the tonic into the scalp with the tips of the fingers.

And now a word of caution: Do not be alarmed or discouraged if your hair should appear to fall out worse than ever for a little while after you begin treatment. It is simply that hair that has been previously loosened at the root, and so, already doomed, is being worked out by manipulation.—Mme. Jeanne La Place in Woman's World for September.




