Few industries in Scotland have suffered more from the war than the fishing industry, upon which such a large portion of the population depends for its livelihood, writes Consul E. Haldeman Dennison, Dundee, Scotland. In normal times nearly 00,000 persons are engaged in Scotland in occupations directly connect ed with the fisheries, of which the herring fishery is much the most important branch. 
