



# **Civic Board Meets.** M. H. O. BREHM JOINS R.A.M.C.

A lively meeting of the Civic Board was held last night. A letter was read from Hon. J. C. Crosbie refuting the idea that he built shed on wharf contrary to law. He would have applied for permit if he had thought it necessary. The work of extending the Board of Works building without permission was next introduced. Council are taking action.

I. G. Hutchings has directed the police to caution shop-keepers against weeping dust and paper into the treet; he also suggested that the Council send around circular letters, as they did ten years ago.

The Secretary then read a letter from His Excellency the Governor to the Mayor stating that Dr. Brehm, Medical Health Officer, had offered himself for enlistment in the R.A.M.C. He was accepted and would be leaving here shortly. Dr. Brehm had asked that, including pay and allowances from the Army, his salary be augmented from the amounts now voted him from the Government and City, to equal his present salary; also he recommended that Drs. Fraser and Scully do his work during his absence, the former to do Health work and the latter laboratory duties. Coun. Dr. Tait objected to granting the financial request and intimated his intention of discussing the matter fully at the next meeting. Others he said, had given up good jobs to join the R.A.M.C. without such guaran-

Coun. Morris disapproved of Dr. Brehm nominating other physicians o do his work, as the matter was one ntirely for the Council to decide. The Mayor explained that the letter was only to show that Dr. Brehm was leaving and that the matter would be referred back to the Council for onsideration.




