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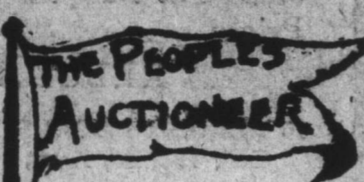

"You look very happy, Evadne," she said.

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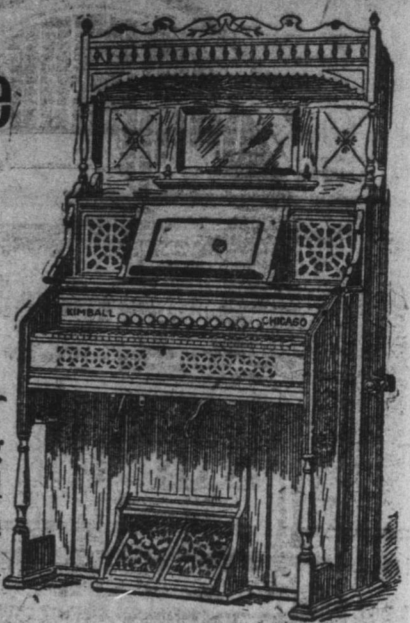

DEPORTING L.W.W. AND GERMANS SYDNEY AUSTRALIA, Oct. 15. (Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—Parliamentarian who arrived here in June failed to convince the Alien Board that he is not a member of the L. W. Mr. Gardiner said that Mr. Asquith had no gift for advertising which was a very important part of the makeup of the modern politician. Parliament was now at a lower ebb than at any time during the last hundred years.

And the Worst



"The Fighting Trio!"

On Their Return From Bell Island
-- Drawn Through Streets of the City--Enthusiasm at Fever Pitch
-- West End L.P. Also Take Part.

The fighting trio, Higgins, Vinnicombe and Fox, the candidates of the Liberal Progressive Party, who had been visiting Bell Island and Portugal Cove, returned to the city last night and received a reception such as never before had been tendered candidates in the history of St. John's East. Spurred by the knowledge that the outside sections had done their part by giving the favorites unsurpassed meetings in every point visited, the city proper measured up by giving a demonstration that was equal to any given before, even at the close of an election. Early in the night the crowd began to gather at the Committee Rooms in the C.C.C. Hall and at 10 o'clock the Committee in parade, numbering about five hundred, started for the King's Bridge to meet the conquering heroes, as they are now acknowledged to be by all. Headed by a volunteer band, consisting of members of the C.L.B., C.C.C., Salvation Army and City bands, the parade started off amid the firing of many guns. The very composition of the band is an evidence of the solidified feeling in St. John's East in support of the Liberal Progressive candidates. At the residence of Sir M. P. Cashin and Sir J. C. Crosbie the procession stopped and after selections by the band, lusty cheers were given for the Premier and winner in Port de Grave District. As the parade passed along many joined in and on arrival at King's Bridge another vast gathering of those belonging to that neighborhood was met. Guns resounded in all directions, the houses in the vicinity were illuminated, stage power was burned and a great display of fireworks given. Never before was such a scene witnessed at the historic King's Bridge. The crowd continued to grow, and with the addition of a large contingent escorting Messrs. Bennett, Mullaly and Martin, the candidates for St. John's West, had reached several thousands when the "Fighting Trio" arrived. The latter, who were accompanied by twenty-seven motor cars filled with supporters who had gone out of town to welcome them, had been cheered all along the road from the Cove and at Kenny's Pond in particular. There, a great gathering of the voters of the neighborhood had assembled and as Higgins, Vinnicombe and Fox came along, three cheers made the welkin ring, while guns blazed and stage powder burned on all sides. At the King's Bridge, as the candidates arrived, a roar of welcome went up that must have struck terror to the hearts of their opponents, if any such were in the vicinity. The band struck up a lively air, volleys of musketry resounded and old men in the gathering forgot their years and vied with their juniors in the cheering. The crowd passed round their auto, all anxious to personally greet the candidates and on all sides were heard calls for them to speak. Mr. Higgins arose and after the applause had subsided, sketched briefly the meetings held by himself and colleagues at the different points on Bell Island and at Portugal Cove, assuring his hearers that the vote there would be solid for them. Hon. J. R. Bennett, in answer to the persistent calls of the crowd, also spoke, telling of the work in the West End of St. John's and promising a similar result there. He congratulated the Fighting Trio on the splendid, clean campaign they had waged and also their committee on the magni-

ficent manner in which they had welcomed them back to town. Both speeches were frequently interrupted by outbursts of applause. His opponents have said that Higgins is weak in St. John's East, but last night's reception was the answer to that. At the close of the remarks by himself and Hon. J. R. Bennett, a horse was quickly unharnessed and the candidates of both sections of St. John's literally lifted into the carriage, to which ropes were attached and laid hold of by as many as could possibly do so. Then the parade started city wards, proceeding via King's Bridge Road, Military and Queen's Roads, Theatre Hill, New Gower and Hutchings Street to Water Street, thence east to Adelaide and by way of Duckworth Street to the Committee Rooms. Stops were made during the march at the residence of Sir M. P. Cashin, Sir J. C. Crosbie, Mrs. Higgins, mother of the East End team leader, at Rawlins' Cross, the nearest point to Hon. J. R. Bennett's home, and at Messrs. Mullaly's and Martin's, at each point lusty cheers being given and selections played by the band. All along the route a welcome was tendered by people who hastened to their doors or windows. At the hall fireworks were again set off and the candidates had difficulty in entering the place being filled to capacity, despite the late hour. Mrs. Arthur Hiscock presided, and on the platform were the different candidates and Mr. Jonas Barter, Secretary of the East End Committee. The chairman, on behalf of the candidates and committee, thanked the gathering for the wonderful reception they had given the "Fighting Trio," which he considered a sure indication of their return on polling day. At his request Mr. Higgins then gave a brief description of what had transpired at Bell Island and Portugal Cove. At the latter point, which the team did not leave until a few hours before, he said, their meeting was the greatest in the history of the place. It was held in the school room and practically every voter was present. Mr. Ed. Somerton, the veteran Liberal chairman presided, and the speeches of himself, Messrs. Vinnicombe and Fox were received with wonderful enthusiasm. The latter particularly excelled himself, and in clear, irrefutable manner killed the low down attempts of the opposition press to injure him in the district. The settlement simply went wild in honor of the "Fighting Trio," the hills resounding with volleys of musketry from the time of their arrival till departure, while the people turned out en masse and gave them a great send off. He was assured Portugal Cove on polling day would vote the straight ticket for Higgins, Vinnicombe and Fox, as he had the personal assurance of many there after the meeting that such would be the case. Continuing, he thanked all for the reception accorded at King's Bridge, which he took above all as an expression of loyalty to Sir M. P. Cashin and the cause for which he stood. Himself and colleagues were honored to be the ones fortunate enough to represent that leader and his policy and therefore be welcomed so enthusiastically. During the visit to Bell Island and Portugal Cove, the campaign had been conducted by himself and colleagues on clean, straightforward lines, only one name being mentioned, that of Sir M. P. Cashin, which had always been

ticket vote was the thing, and he asked for it in both St. John's East and West. Let the districts be divided in name only, as St. John's must stand as it always did, for the true Liberal policy. Fish That Breathe in the Mouth.

There are mouth-breeding fish (Paratapia multicoled). It belongs to the fish family called "Chichlids." They are found wild in ponds near Alexandria, Egypt, and were first introduced into Europe as an aquarium fish at the beginning of this century. Their size is from two inches to two and one-half inches in length. The female is more heavily built than the male in the fore part of the body, especially back of the head, where the breeding bag is located. In this bag the eggs, and later, when hatched, the young female is about to produce her eggs she and her mate build their nest, a shallow hollow in the bottom and between the plants at the aquarium. After the female has laid her eggs the male fertilizes them, and then the female gathers them into her mouth and, by moving her jaws as if she were chewing something, constantly keeps fresh water circulating round them until they are hatched. This takes from 15 to 20 days. The number of young varies from 10 to 50, or more.

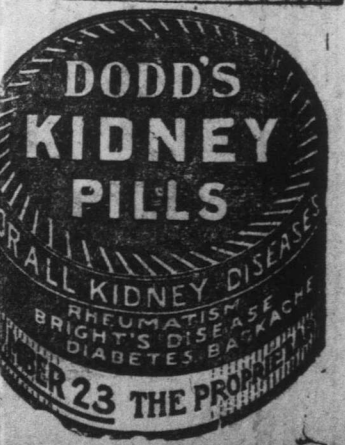

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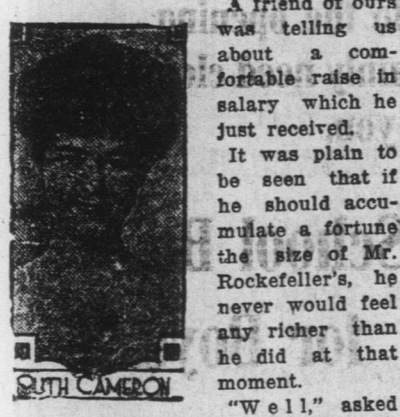

Refrigeration in New Zealand.

The fisheries of New Zealand, as well as those of Australia, are in course of development, the fishing grounds being of great richness and the demand for fish considerable and growing. It is also desired that an export business be built up, especially with the Far East, so far as concerns the cheaper varieties of fish. One of the chief things aimed at by the Fisheries Department is to establish fishery stations with cold-storage equipment and ice-making plants at various places along the coast. It is proposed officially that a State system of loans should be inaugurated on favorable conditions in regard to interest and repayment. A short time ago a special commission was appointed by the government to investigate the northern fisheries of New Zealand. One of the results is the government scheme on the lines mentioned for the provision of refrigerating establishments.

A Contrast.

In Sir M. P. Cashin's manifesto, we have a clear-cut, definite policy of what is intended by the Government candidates, after the election on November 3rd, in the matter of agriculture. We ask all thinking men to see the difference between the expressions of Sir M. P. Cashin on this subject, and that of Hon. R. A. S. Sir M. P. Cashin promises to improve the existing means of encouraging agriculture, and to adopt a system of bounties whereby the land may be more quickly cleared. This means that strong inducements will be held out by the Government in the form of money-grants or bounties, to finance men to work on the land, in a similar manner to that done in Canada and elsewhere. The Government candidates also promise to provide for the transportation of products from the farm to the market, and also to teach both the scientific and practical side of agriculture by the best possible means. Here then in this agricultural policy we have a great chance of fulfilling a war-time slogan, "back on the land," for in this policy we find outlined all the necessities to make this industry more and more profitable, and more and more of a national asset as the years go by. One of the drawbacks in the agricultural schemes of past governments, has been the absence of sufficient inducements to men to take an active interest in agriculture, on any large scale, but this will be remedied by the Cashin Party. The equally important aspect of transportation facilities to and from the farm and market, is likewise considered, and a remedy promised, and with Cashin, to promise means to perform, so that there is in this question alone almost sufficient reason why Cashin should be elected.

What a contrast is there in the few definite words of Sir M. P. Cashin and the long-winded article on agriculture in the so-called manifesto of Hon. R. A. Squires. The sections in the two manifestoes present no comparison whatever. Long-winded as is the rest of the Opposition manifesto, there is however, nothing clear in the long discourse excepting the substance of the present agricultural system of Newfoundland, and the personal proposal to reorganize the agricultural department as well as the other Governmental departments of the Colony. It is quite true that Mr. Squires does mention the construction of a model farm, with an attendant annual agricultural exhibition. It is current topic moreover, that the enthusiast (?) who is to run the model farm of St. John's East is the 'Doc' himself. Possibly this explains why the medicine was able and willing to give up \$5,000 a year so that by later posing as an agricultural enthusiast and judge, he might get a yearly \$10,000 stipend out of the Government treasury. As is the policy of Squires on the agricultural prospects of Newfoundland, so is his proposals on all of the great

questions affecting this country's future. He has committed himself to nothing definite, and consequently the voters will not listen to one who pledges to do little for the advancement of his own country. The development of our land resources is more than a minor matter to Newfoundlanders, and the promise given out by Sir M. P. Cashin of greater attention to this important work is favorable to all, and indicative of the man's true interest in his country's advancement. Already this question alone has been the means of securing voters to the Government side, and as people realize more and more the shallowness and insincerity of Squires, hundreds more will back up the Government candidates.

Much discussion has been caused on this land question in the past, and efforts have been made to grapple with it. It is now proposed by the Cashin Party—the winning team—that the question be further considered, and our land now lying idle be utilized. In conjunction with this we might state that soldiers and sailors wishing to engage in farming pursuits, may be enabled to pursue the avocation, of their choice, as there will be just as good and as big inducements given in their own country as in Canada or elsewhere. What a future is thus unfolded. The vegetables which Squires talks about, but does not promise to secure, will be plentifully reared, and not only vegetables, but big strides will be made in the growing of some of the more hardy cereals, as demonstration has proved that even wheat can be grown here. The initial outlay thus expended by the Cashin candidates will be more than repaid by the practical results of the encouraged farmers, and the people to be benefitted will not be those akin to Prince Edward Islanders nor other foreigners, but sturdy Newfoundlanders. If enthusiasts are wanted we can supply them, and it is unnecessary to add that the annual agricultural show will be an assured thing because the products of the country will then warrant an exhibition far more than they will under the lengthy, non-committal and vague treatise of Mr. Squires on the subject. Apparently the section in the Squires manifesto on this very matter, was the work of the ardent Doctor, but even his knowledge of farming, as produced on paper, is insufficient to attract the serious attention of the electorate, and so, on this point as on others, the vote will be given to Cashin and his party because they deserve it, and because their programme spells agricultural progress, increased revenue and independence, while that of the Opposition is nothing but empty words.

Still Dropping.

The ill results of the confederation and taxation cries by the Opposition parties have confounded those who are trying to defeat the Government teams, and so the Advocate has had to revert to the policy of the Telegram as material for its scarry (?) front page. Of course the attack on this paper is unworthy of attention, because no one takes the Advocate or its writers seriously, but the incident in question is illuminating of the desperate straits to which the Opposition is pushed. The Telegram has not gone back on its former principles, but it is still an advocate of Liberalism, but not of the Coaker-Squires type of liberalism which guarantees the price of fish, at a possible lower price than the law of supply and demand warrants, and which guarantees entails extra taxation to the country. The Telegram, as always, favors reduction in tariff rates, but not at such a time as this when the present tariff rate is necessary if we would tide off the dangers of Coakerism, Squiresism, Bolshevism and Confederation.

Low indeed, must be the hopes of the Opposition when personalities only are indulged in. Where now are all the candidates, so sure of election by the supporters of the Opposition party? Echo answers where? The Opposition has admitted its own defeat unwittingly, and the Advocate writers, seeing the handwriting on the wall, have at last published the fact that the cause of the Coakerites is lost, and that the country is in favor of the Liberal Progressive Party, of which the Telegram is proud to be a supporter.

Dr. Hall at Port aux Basques.

At a representative meeting of prominent citizens convened to meet Rev. Dr. Hall, of Toronto, Senior Chaplain to the Naval and Merchant Marine Institutes of Canada, it was decided to establish a Sailors Institute for Port aux Basques and Channel. Magistrate Robert T. Squarey was appointed President; Mr. E. H. McKay, Vice-President; Mr. D. R. Manser, Hon. Treasurer; and Mr. Frank Pike, Secretary. The first list of donations was handed in and the Institute will be affiliated with the Canadian National Sailors Councils represented by Rev. Dr. Hall, who promised \$300 to the scheme.

Prisoner Acquitted.

The trial of the man Ridout occupied the attention of the Court yesterday. The trial lasted till late last night, when the accused was released. Mrs. Ridout, wife of the accused was the last witness to be called for the defence. Mr. Gibbs, K. C. for the accused addressed the jury after tea, pleading for the acquittal of the accused. Mr. C. E. Hunt followed on behalf of the Crown, his address occupying about three quarters of an hour. After being charged by Chief Justice Horwood the jury retired. After a deliberation of three hours the jury men filed back into Court and announced that the prisoner was not guilty. Mr. Gibbs asked for the prisoners release, which was granted.

Girl's Narrow Escape.

At five o'clock yesterday afternoon a young lady came very near being killed or badly injured on Water St. when a barrel that rolled down a lane, onto the street, missed her by inches only. This barrel, which contained bottled beer, rolled down McMurdo's lane and right across Water Street, smashing to small pieces and scattering the particles of glass in all directions.

Broke His Arm.

Master R. Press, son of Mr. G. Press, of the E. N. Co.'s office, met with a painful accident yesterday when he fell off a motor truck, and broke his arm. He was taken to O'Mara's drug store, Rawlin's Cross, and afterwards driven to his home where the limb was set.

It has been pictured to the country as a terrible offence for Sir Michael Cashin to give a script, because he is not a doctor; but this raises the question whether doctors who are not in regular practice should avail of the opportunity afforded them by the Act, to issue scripts, either.

We raise this question because we have documentary evidence in our possession, and will show it to any person who care to call on us, that Dr. Mossell has been issuing scripts within the past three months. One of these is a script for 24 ozs. of spirits issued to a prominent young business man of Water Street on August 10th, and another is a script for 24 ozs. issued to Mr. J. T. Meaney, on August 14th, and we understand that this practice of giving out scripts is fairly continuous on the part of Dr. Mossell.

Dr. Mossell is not, we understand, the family physician of this young business man, and while he is probably strictly within his rights as a medical man in issuing this script, the question arises whether it was a proper thing for him to do, in view of all the surrounding circumstances. In the script as issued, there is no prescription as to any dose to be taken by the recipient. All that appears on the face of the script is "24 ounces spirits for medicinal use and not as beverage." This script is marked "Special" by which we understand that the recipient is to have a large bottle, only given in pneumonia cases.

Mr. Squires, in his speech at the Public Meeting in the Casino Theatre last Friday night made a great parade of the fact that Sir Michael Cashin had given somebody a script or order for some liquor from the Controller's Department, and Mr. Squires denounced it most vehemently. Since then his papers have been sounding the same note and Mr. Squires himself despatched on this subject very exhaustively at a meeting at the Ropewalk on Tuesday night.

It has been pictured to the country as a terrible offence for Sir Michael Cashin to give a script, because he is not a doctor; but this raises the question whether doctors who are not in regular practice should avail of the opportunity afforded them by the Act, to issue scripts, either.

We raise this question because we have documentary evidence in our possession, and will show it to any person who care to call on us, that Dr. Mosdell has been issuing scripts within the past three months. One of these is a script for 24 ozs. of spirits issued to a prominent young business man of Water Street on August 10th, and another is a script for 24 ozs. issued to Mr. J. T. Meaney, on August 14th, and we understand that this practice of giving out scripts is fairly continuous on the part of Dr. Mosdell.

Dr. Mosdell is not, we understand, the family physician of this young business man, and while he is probably strictly within his rights as a medical man in issuing this script, the question arises whether it was a proper thing for him to do, in view of all the surrounding circumstances. In the script as issued, there is no prescription as to any dose to be taken by the recipient. All that appears on the face of the script is "24 ounces spirits for medicinal use and not as beverage." This script is marked "Special" by which we understand that the recipient is to have a large bottle, only given in pneumonia cases.

Mr. J. T. Meaney, who received the

time Dr. Mosdell is himself giving out scripts, as shown by these two citations, though he is not engaged in the regular practice of his profession, but is Editor of the "Star" and Political Bottle Washer General for the Squires party.

We specially regret having to refer to this young business man, and we refrain from giving his name to-day but if challenged will do so. Under the circumstances which surrounded the case in the month of August, it will evoke the sincerest sympathy of the public generally, and promote a feeling of indignation against the hypocrites who shout about the enormity of Sir Michael Cashin's offence, that will go far to overwhelm them.

Mr. Meaney stands in a different category. He has been and is an active politician and was offering himself for the District of St. John. He has gone into this transaction with his eyes open, and he must have realized the consequences of the fact becoming known that he was getting scripts from Dr. Mosdell.

It will be interesting to see what the defence of the Squires' papers will be to this exposure.

While we are at it, we might make reference to a report current in the city the past day or two to the effect that the script of which Mr. Squires claims to have a photograph, and which he says was issued by Sir Michael Cashin, was really given to a member of Team 16 of the Methodist Educational Campaign Committee.

We are not in a position to vouch for the correctness of this rumor just yet, and therefore give it for what it is worth, but we are assured that this Team 16, of which Mr. Squires was the Captain, was abundantly supplied with liquid refreshments of undisputed strength during the time the campaign was on, and that nightly meetings were held to report progress and plan new methods of getting money at no less a place than the residence of Mr. Squires himself.

We have also heard it said that these gatherings were somewhat of a convivial character, that "rounds of drinks" were the order of the evening, and that speeches, more fluent than eloquent, marked the proceedings.

One cynic, indeed, has gone so far as to suggest that the liquor which was the subject of Mr. Squires' outburst, and the order of which he claims to have a copy, may have been sent to Mr. Squires' house and drunk there by his associates in this drive. In this connection we fully absolve some gentlemen of Team 16 from any participation whatever in the gatherings.

In the light of the foregoing, perhaps Mr. Squires will say whether he has any knowledge that this script was given to a member of Team 16 or not; also whether the members of that Team met together at his house nightly; whether liquid refreshments such as whiskey, were partaken of, and if so, where the liquor came from that proved the lubricant for the wheels of the machinery utilized to make their share of the Drive go through successfully?

Before going further, we pause for a reply.



FOREIGN PRESS OPINION

A New World.
One hears, of late, a good deal about the "Intelligenzia," a word spreading from Russian into general use; and thanks are therefore due the editorial writer who has defined the term in a more intelligent fashion than that of the growing American tendency to translate it "highbrows." The "Intelligenzia," says he, are "betwixt and betweeners"; they include "professors, artists, writers, professional men, teachers, journalists," and others who are, generally speaking, "not embarked on a money-making career." Relatively few in number, and widely scattered in occupation, they have in common that their work tends to deal with things of the mind, and is unlikely to provide at most more than a fair livelihood. "Intelligenzia," in short, is a misnomer, for the conscious conviction of mental superiority that marks the "highbrow" is not a necessary characteristic.—Christian Science Monitor.

What is Truth About Russia?
The French Reign of Terror lasted

fifteen months, ending July 27, 1794, with the execution of seventy or more Terrorists or leaders of the Commons and Jacobin Club. Thereafter the revolution settled into processes bearing a semblance to orderly government and respect for life.
The Russian Reign of Terror under the Bolsheviks is now well beyond its fifteenth month of indescribable anarchy and confiscation and robbery and starvation, and massacre, compared with which the performances under the French commune were hardly more than a suggestion. But as yet it gives no appearance of burning out. It rather appears to be spreading. It is now raging westward through the Ukraine and already is reported to have possession of the principal cities. It has reverses, but they are occasional and spotted. Its advances have been widespread.

Is this the work of a few desperate men supported by less than 10 per cent. of the people? That is the repeated assertion of the Russian opponents of Bolshevism. But if they

are right, what have they got to say for themselves? A greater self-condemnation for incapacity to organize resistance or for lack of spirit to resist there never was than is thus set forth on behalf of 90 per cent. of the Russian people.
What is the truth about Russia?—New York World.

London The Press Meets.
Most British writers, more especially newspaper men with futures before them, find their way sooner or later to London, and there abide. Edward Russell, who has just been made the recipient of high honors owing to the work he has done for the British provincial press, is a notable exception to this rule. For many years Lord Russell has been connected with the Liverpool Daily Post; only for three years in his long career was he an inmate of Fleet Street. It was during that time that he was connected with the famous Victorians, John Bright, Justin McCarthy, and John Morley, on the London press. It is well known that before anybody had heard of Irving, Russell had predicted for him a great future in the dramatic world.—Christian Science Monitor.

Brighter Outlook for Scribes.
Authors and readers have just turned a bad corner in France. It really looked as if the publishers had resolved severely to discourage the buying of books. If this was not their aim, why should they have stamped on the covers of even the meaneast of publications the positively hair-raising price of 7 francs? Representations were of no avail. The Pharos of the book trade had hardened their hearts and there seemed no prospect of alleviation, when something happened. A proposal was received by the Societe des Gens de Lettres for the consideration of a cooperative publishing and book-selling scheme. The idea was discussed in a good many centers, and then the publishers took fright. They promptly climbed down, the book fell to 4 francs 90, and authors and readers breathed again.—Christian Science Monitor.

ENGLISH.
Who Won the War?
War has been won by the heroism of France, who gained time for us to prepare, whose armies were foremost in the fight, and whose generals were chosen for the supreme command by all the Allies; by the devotion of Belgium, who was ready to sacrifice everything but her immortal soul; by the nobility of Italy, who in one of the darkest hours came to our aid; by the immense efforts of the United States, who entered the war at that critical time when Russia failed, and whose troops at Chateau Thierry, in the breaking of the Hindenburg line and in the Argonne won such laurels last year. It has been won by the patience, tenacity and faith of the British peoples and of the splendid soldiers from Home and the Dominions, whom they sent into the field. We chose, when the hour of decision came, to risk all we had for freedom. "We must be free or die." And we fought at the last, with all our strength—in every element, sparing no sacrifice.—London Daily Mail.

Unlucky John.
Of all names John has the reputation of being the most unhappy with Royalty. We remember that when John Stewart ascended the throne of Scotland he changed his name to Robert, but even this did not avert the calamities that overwhelmed him. The record of John, the English King, we all know John I. of France, reigned only a few days and John II., having lost the battle of Poitiers, died a captive in London. And thus through the past centuries of history we see the melancholy processions of Johns dogged by disaster and misfortune, in Constantinople, in Sweden, in Russia and in Bohemia. The two exceptions in the tragic gallery are John of Portugal and John Sobieski.—London Daily Chronicle.

Fines for assault on a girl must serve 14 years in Penitentiary.

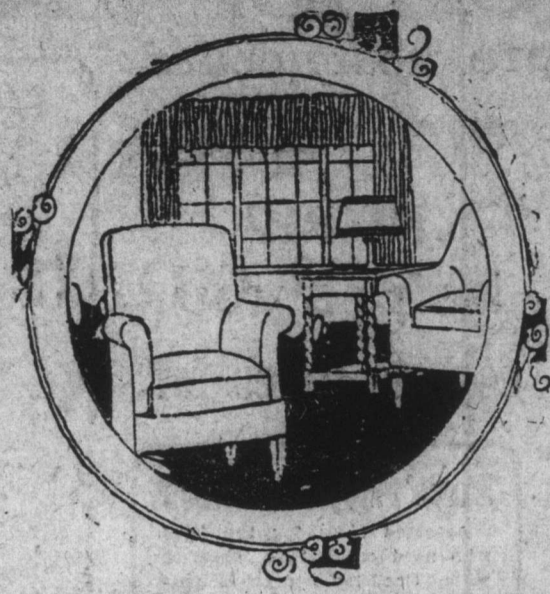

Bennett, Mullaly and Martin ADDRESS COMMITTEE MEETING.

The West-End Winning Team Tell of Their Triumphal Progress Through The District.

Hon. J. R. Bennett, J. J. Mullaly and J. T. Martin, the Liberal Progressive candidates, met their committee in the T. A. Armoury last night and told of their campaign work outside the city. All the candidates were unanimous in their opinion that the extern settlements would vote at least 90 per cent. for the Liberal Progressive Party, and against the Squires-Guppy-Coaker corporation team that were offering for election in St. John's West. In Broad Cove, the Southside and Petty Harbor public meetings were held during the last week or so, and during the sixteen years that Mr. Bennett has represented St. John's West, he and colleagues never received such a whole-hearted reception. Hon. Mr. Bennett and team were fully sure that St. John's West would roll up the biggest vote on record against the Squires-Coaker candidates when the ballots were marked on Nov. 3rd. On all sides there were practical evidences of an overwhelming success for the Liberal Progressive trio. The committee, who have been actively at work in the city, assured the candidates that the voters were not going to allow Hon. J. R. Bennett and his colleagues Mullaly and Martin to be robbed of their seats in St. John's West. Before the meeting closed further campaign work was outlined, and some of the deplorable tricks and outrageous promises of the Coaker team were exposed. After the meeting closed the committee walked to the King's Bridge to take part in the wonderful reception that was later accorded Hon. W. J. Higgins, N. J. Vinalcombe and C. J. Fox, a report of which appears elsewhere in this evening's issue.

Cashin Will Come Back. To-day's Messages.

GERMANY CO-OPERATING WITH ENTENTE. BERLIN, Oct. 15. Kreuz Zeitung learns from well informed quarters that the Government will, in all probability, agree to join in the blockade of soviet Russia, proposed by the Entente Powers.

BIG STRIKE IN BERLIN. BERLIN, Oct. 14. Berlin experienced a brand new strike this afternoon when 15,000 clerical workers in the municipal offices walked out, demanding higher pay. Among the departments directly affected is the Bread Card Distribution Bureau, with 246 branches; also the coal, milk, butter, fat and meat control departments, as well as the Municipal Savings Banks. The movement is said to have originated in the ranks of the auxiliary workers, who are dominated by the Radical element. The City Council held an emergency session to-day to devise means for keeping the city's food and fuel organization in operation.

EDINBURGH, Oct. 16. Sir Donald Maclean, M.P., in a speech last night to his constituents at Penfoulk, said that England's present financial situation is most appalling. The deficit for the first six months of the present fiscal year, he said, is two hundred and eighty-one million pounds, exceeding by fifty million pounds the deficit for the whole year as estimated by Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer. Later, Sir Donald added, he would have to borrow three hundred million pounds to balance his accounts, and this situation, he contended, is serious enough to warrant an ad interim budget.

AFFAIRS IN IRELAND. DUBLIN, Oct. 16. An order was issued yesterday, signed by Chief Secretary and Commander-in-Chief of the forces in Ireland, prohibiting assembling in Dublin City and County of Sinn Fein, Irish Volunteers and Gaelic Leagues. The twelfth annual convention of the Sinn Fein had been fixed for commencement at Mansion House, Dublin, to-day.

BOLSHEVIKS IN TIGHT PLACE. LONDON, Oct. 16. Forced back by onslaughts of enemies on four fronts, the armies of the Soviet Government of Russia appear to be facing a period pregnant with disaster. General Denikin's Cossacks from the south, Polish forces from the west, northwestern Russian legions from northwest, and northwestern Russians from north have during the last few days forged ahead until it seems the Bolshevik armies are between upper and nether millstones.

INDUSTRIAL SITUATION IMPROVING. CHICAGO, Oct. 16. The industrial situation at the steel plants in Chicago districts was reported better than at any time

since the steel workers' strike was called nearly four weeks ago. Many of the mills were said by company officials to be running at fifty per cent. or more of their usual capacity, while virtually every plant affected by the walk-out was operating on at least reduced scale.

STRIKERS RETURNING TO WORK. PITTSBURG, Pa., Oct. 15. Large numbers of workers who went out on strike September 22 last, when a nation-wide walkout of steel and iron employees became effective, are returning to work daily in Pittsburgh district, according to representatives of companies, who claimed to-day that mills in this region were fast returning to normal conditions. Production is on the increase they declared and situation so far as companies are concerned is assuming brighter aspect each day.

Masculine Beauty.

Indianapolis News: A Chicago beauty parlor has opened a department for men. In advertising the new institution the proprietor insists that men do not pay enough attention to their personal beauty and that becoming beautiful is a business matter. The beautiful man, the advertiser avers, is more successful in every walk of life. Apparently it is easier for him to sell goods, make contracts, win lawsuits and solve the nation's problems. Doubtless the new beauty establishment will be well patronized.

It would be hard to visualize Abraham Lincoln getting a message while somebody trimmed his nails. In George Washington's time the men wore powdered wigs, knee lengths and silk hosiery, not to mention the silver buckles that adorned their shoes. After that came the period of stern reality, when American men were bronzed by the wind and sun, and when a hair cut was only an incidental. Perhaps we are reverting to colonial times. If that is true, it is to be hoped that the modern man, in making himself beautiful, will keep alive the traditions that inspired the fathers of the country.

Learning How to Spell.

(From the Detroit Free Press.) The business man's complaint against the new stenographer is that she cannot spell. He hates correcting her letters rather more than he dislikes phonetic spelling in his business correspondence, and lays the blame on the schools, a convenient scapegoat since something or somebody must be held responsible.

As a matter of fact, there was never a better way of teaching spelling than the old-fashioned and now obsolete method of the "little red schoolhouse," where the importance of spelling was recognized—perhaps overestimated—and pupils "toed the mark" and engaged in daily competition. Those who could not spell—and there are those who have no sense of alphabetical relationship in words—were always at the foot of the class.

Spelling and the multiplication table duty new fashions; both are matters of rote and memory. The child of twelve who spelled the name of her street "Pencilvania" demonstrated in her own way that symbolizing of ideas and sounds is a dual function of the written word, but that a purely phonetic spelling involves a host of difficulties.

In the endeavor to mitigate the terrors of spelling, scholars have more than once attempted philological reforms. In 1873 a society of college professors compiled a list of 3,000 words which were to be changed in spelling—if the public could be persuaded. In 1900 a society for simplified spelling became temporarily active, and spent considerable money in alteration propaganda.

F. Sturgis Allen, general editor of Webster's International Dictionary, and a lexicographer of reputation, tells the Yale Review that the difficulties of our present spelling have been greatly magnified and that it will never be possible to spell correctly according to any system without study, adding: "A little analysis and computation show that the average educated man carries in his mind without difficulty a million or more of the words in his reading and speaking vocabulary."

If therefore takes neither years nor tremendous mental effort to learn to spell, a difference in spelling is often the guide to a distinction in meaning, thus "rhyme" and "time," though pronounced similarly, mean very different things.

We object to the use of symbols for words that distract the attention because of their strangeness. Ability to spell, according to present established standards, is essential in so many employments, the inability in so few. It is taken as an evidence of lack of education, that the present generation should not wait for a simplified spelling, but learn to-day's method.

Are You Superstitious?

By Imogene Burch in Vancouver Sun. A professor at the University of Michigan says that with one exception he has to do as an explanation for every ghost story he has ever heard. This exception, told by the late Professor Vetch, of the University of Glasgow, is an account of the incident as it happened to him:

After a hard journey, Dr. Vetch arrived at the old castle in Galloway, where he was to make a week-end visit. Being exhausted from his journey, his hostess suggested that he sleep late in the morning.

The next morning he was doing, it being already broad daylight, when he was surprised to see the door of his room open slowly. There entered an elderly woman dressed in a curiously antique gown and carrying a bunch of keys.

The thought that ran through his mind was this—she is the housekeeper; she does not know of my presence, she is wearing the Sunday gown of her mistress some years' back.

But, to his amazement, the woman apparently seeing him plainly, did not retire with any apology, but crept around to the foot of his bed and leaned towards him with the most devilish glance of hatred he had ever seen on the face of a human being. Then, seemingly satisfied, she walked out and closed the door.

In due time Vetch appeared for luncheon, and over the coffee cups he proceeded to inform the hostess of the incident, saying:

"Your housekeeper must be a very curious person."

"Would you know the woman if you saw her again?" his hostess asked.

"Assuredly," said Vetch, "I never saw such a concentrated hatred on any face in my life."

"The upshot was that he was taken into the picture gallery and told to scan the family portraits to see if the 'housekeeper' was there. This he did, selecting the portrait of a woman who was wearing the very dress and who had the same expression on her face as the visitor who had puzzled him.

"Yes," said the hostess, "that is our ghost. A couple of hundred years ago this lady murdered her husband in the very room which you occupied."
