

PIERRE MILLS WRITES OF THE FUNNY FRENCH DUELS He Has Fought Many, Has

Paris, Sept. 19 .- M. Pierre Mille, who has fought in duels and acted as second for others, gives his impressions, not as a duellist, but as a second, and the conclusion would be that the practice had better be abolished for the sake of the seconds, if not for the principals. He had just been called upon to be one of the seconds cor a friend of his when he sat down to pen his feelings "A duel," he wrote, "is nearly always for some tomfoolery or other. The practice keps one busy either preparing to fight one ourselves or to second some of our friends. You sit down to your desk and find a lot of work before you. The day is not long enough to finish it, but you go at it with zest, thinking that this time nobody will disturb you. The bell rings, and a letter is handed to you. It is from a friend, who has himself re-ceived the following letter: We have been commissioned to domand from you an apology or reparation in loyal combat.' There it is. All work is over for that day, and for some days to come. You, have to rinder your friend the service required. Another second has to be found. Where is he to be got at this season, when all Paris is empty? Telephone calls, telegrams, messengers — everything is tried. It is no use; you have to go out yourself and look for the other see ond. You drive about town in company with the friend who has been challenged. He is the most unpleas ant companion at such a time. He thinks of nothing but his case; he turns it over; he discusses it in a thousand ways, and when it has do he begins all over again. ICELAND DECIDES TO LICENSE A LOTTERY

Copenhagen, Sept. 18 .- With the view of increasing its revenue, the Icelandic government has granted a concession to a lottery promoting syndicate. As the Icelanders have tittle or no money to spare for lotteries, the syndicate has obtained the right to sell tickets in Denmark, where a more profitable field is afforded for their enterprise. Lotteries are increasing in favor i Denmark, and the Danish governmen which already guarantees four suc ventures, feaps a substantial revenu from this source, and also from gam-bling on race courses, of which the state gets a fixed percentage.



ngested parliament. Mr. Churchill intimated that he favored a number of smaller local parliaments. There-would be one for Ireland, one for Scotland, one for Wales, and a number for England. For instance he suggested a parliament for York, another for Lancashire, one for the county of London, and one for the Midlands.

These different districts, with the exception of Vales, are about equal in population, each district having about four million people, which is about twice the population of the province of Ontario. The change suggested will be an important one, but a very reasonable one. As the districts will be created after the central government instead of before, as was the case in Canada and the United States, doubtless they will receive less extensive powers than the provinces or states did, which will not be disappointing or unfortunate.

The time has come for some internal change in the administration in Great Britain and the move suggested by Mr. Churchill is a very reasonable

THE OUTLOOK OF COL. HUGHES

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"If you in this Christian world have to guard against those who would violate law and order, why should we not expect to find a similar spirit splayed among the nations of the earth?"

Col. Sam Hughes made use of the words just quoted in an address in Britain at the launching of a war ship. That evidently is the political doctrine and foreign outlook of the Canadian minister of militia. From his address one would imagine that he is quite firmly convinced that the whole world is divided into two classes, one being the people of the British Empire and the rest a band of goats of a particularly warlike disposition. Col. Hughes evidently has the idea that the British people alone are anxious to avoid war, and that all other nations are waiting for the time when, John Bull ceases to spend his earnings in building expensive armaments and then will walk across and butt the British Empire to pieces. But the fact is that other nations are quite as anxious to avoid war as Great Britain. Financial men, busmess men, artisans, agriculturists and others of

every class in every nation are seriously opposed to war. The war class in every country includes a very small percentage of the real people and is about as large proportionately in one country as another. They are able, however, to play upon the temerity of their countrymen to such an extent that they get very much of what they want in
