GOVERNMENT CONTROL OF LANDS

Some of our contemporaries have been discussing the question—Can the government, i.e., the people, review, and if advisable, amend the contract with the syndicate? A correspondent has put this question in answering it in the affirmative. Members of parliament and cabinet ministers are but the servants or agents of the people, to whom a certain degree of authority is delegated because it is inconvenient, and in fact impossible, for the people to exercise that authority directly. The parliament of primitive peoples comprise the whole of the nation or tribe, while in more modern times the people are represented by a municipal or parliamentary body.

Then again the distinction made between the rights of the people and the rights of the parliament is a distinction that is not real. The people are the sovereign, and the parliament is their agent. It is necessary to speak and vote through deputies, but it was never intended by the founders of representative institutions that any body of delegates should have the right to review, amend, or repeal the legislation of their predecessor, upon more or less explicit instructions received during the election campaign and at the polls. Abandon this right and there is an end to all improvement and reform.

The public domain is the heritage of the people, which cannot be conveyed away from them upon any pretext, save with their own consent. 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THE FAILURE OF RAILWAY COMPETITION

John Idington, barrister, of Stratford, writes to one of our city contemporaries to deplore the failure of railway competition as a remedy for the injustice to which the producer, the shipper, and the traveller are systematically subjected by the great railway corporations, and to suggest a remedy that cannot fail.

His line of argument is that the people of this province, in particular, have for years been initiating the example of the boy who believed the story that there was a cup of gold at the base of the rainbow's arch, but whose long and toilsome journey to find it was as far distant from his objective point as he was at the outset. We have expended millions of dollars in endeavoring to create railway competition, only to find that we have a little less left than before. Every projected road has been fought by the established corporations until their every resource was exhausted, when they took their revenge by grabbing up the property, created by the failure of the people. The railway corporations of Stratford and the county of Perth spent \$150,000 in building the Port Dover, Stratford and Lake Huron line in order to obtain competition with the Grand Trunk, and now the latter corporation owns the new line, which was handed over to them by the former corporation. Mr. Idington proposes the creation of a board of court, clothed with power to re-
