THE BOSS LAND SWINDLE.

The Edmonton Bulletin, a courageous and breezy little journal, comes out strong on the great land swap between the syndicate and the English land corporation of which the Duke of Manchester is president. Coming from the far west, almost under the shade of the Rockies, it gives an opinion which is in all respects worthy of quota-

The buying up of eleven million acres in payment for which the corporation give bonds which are given them by the syndicate is the same thing as the syndicate selltwo companies are pretty much one and the same affair; so that the transaction is simply a hand over of syndicate lands to the syndicate itself under a different name. in order that the Iands may be sold at an extortionate figure, for which the syndicate would not assume any responsibility. The Bulletin assigns two reasons why such a sale as this would be made and why it would be made in this way. One is that the syndicate is financially too weak to subscribed capital of \$6,000,000 for the good to let off their superfluous bile now building of a road estimated to cost at least \$100,000,000; it was therefore good policy to ally themselves with wealthy Eng-lish capitalists who would aid in building the road as well as selling lands at a large

The other is that the regulation price of the lands to actual settlers was too low to suit the syndicate, so that by ostensibly placing them in other hands they would not be responsible for overrates in selling.

"What." it adds, "will be done with these lands, may be judged from what the Duke of Manchester announced as his reason for coming to Canada. He said he did not come to plant colonies but to purchase land in large quantities and sell it out at an advance in smaller quantities. His grace, or his lordship, or his honor, or his majesty, or whatever his handle is, must at least be allowed credit for honestly avowing his purpose. It is speculation pure and simple and on an immense scale."

"There is no swindle in the syndicate acquiring an encimous land-grant nor in their selling a portion of it to the Duke of Manchester or any one else, who has a perfect right to do as he likes with his own, but the Canadian people in parting with their lands as they are doing, giving them away, throwing them right and left, calling on speculators from the four corners of the earth to come and take them, are swindling themselves.

This sensible platform is all the more interesting as coming from a district where operations similar to the above are being already carried on, on a smaller scale. It looks as if the bulk of our Northwest lands were going to be one vast uninhabited stretch to be withheld from struggling humanity by rates which no sane man would and no poor man could pay.


