The Six Months' Boist Defented, 72 to 71-Pavoritism for Party Purposes Charged Against the Government's Distribution of Public Buildings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.-This was somewhat of a ous day in the House and there was citement to-night over Mr. Brown's elty to animals and birds bill, which got its second reading by the close majority of 1 in a House of 143, and it now stands for consideration in committee of the whole. All but Sir Adolphe supported the bill by their vote and the Minister of Justice, is addition warming defaudd the ministice of Justice. in addition, warmly defended the principle of the bill. Sir Richard Cartwright voted against the bill and Mr. Charlton supported it. Mr. Laurier was not present owing to illness. Nearly all the French members voted against the bill. Mr. Brown is greatly elated over the success of the bill in receiving a second reading and he left the chamber on stilts after the vote was mechanic.





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


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
