A provision that no more than a plurality of State Presidential votes should be required for a choice would avert the contingency of an election by the House of Representatives, except in the case of a tie. In such a contingency the vote is taken by States as represented in an old House of Representatives, a majority of all the States being required and each State having one vote, which must be cast by a majority of the delegation (if consisting of more than one member) or cannot be cast at all. Such a contingency has arisen but twice—in 1801 and 1825.




