

This is the first case finished of 17 against the Whiteway members. It is believed the general principles underlying the judgment render the disqualification of the whole

Woods and Moores we re found guilty of spending many thousand dollars illegally, employing hundreds of men on useless and unprofitable public works in the district to secure their votes and making election promises to the same end. They were also found guilty of personal bribery, and cannot contest again during the continuance of

the present assembly. Intense excitement prevails here. The Government is in an extremely awkward position. Every member of the executive is involved. All may be disqualified within a few weeks, and it is believed the Government will resign.


