January will be the best time for bringing out-bonds, when divi-dends, are released and money is flowing into London, New York and Berlin; but Sir Michael Hicks-Beach is a slow going financier who requires time in order to pull himself together." About two years ago the deceased was taken with a species of neuralgia of the head, complica-tions set in and it was from this disease that death finally resulted. Sub-Chief Beckingham was almost 60 years of age, having been born in Halifax on March 7. 1840. It was on July 1, 1859, that he joined the Montreal Fire Brigade. It is needless to say that the brigade was a nuch different one than it is to-day. On Feb. 4, 1867, the deceased was appointed a guardian on the force. On Jan. 24, 1881, he was appointed foreman of the salvage, and appointed assistant-chief on Sept. 8, 1800. Sub-Chief Beckingham was looked upon-in the Fire Department as one of the most efficient and falthful officers who ever worked for the corporation. His cour-age at fires was proverbial. As a man he was retiring in habits, broad in his sym-mathes and just to the men under him. Deceased was a most ardent Mason, and he expressed a wish some time ago that he shuld be burled with Masonle honor when death came. This wish will be re-spected. 


