ENGINEERS ARE EXPELLED

District Trades Council Say They Should Not Have Instructed Non-Union Firemen.

The Trades and Labor Council had an exciting discussion last night over the action of the stationary engineers in connection with the Brewery Workers strike. The firemen in the brewer-ies /went out, but the engineers did not, and they instructed the substiutes in the duties of the firemen. They, in reply, charged the firemen with having gone out on an hour's notice and not acting fairly with their employers. The matter was referred

employers. The matter was referred to the metal trades section, which reported last night against the engineers and recommended that their delegates should be expelled from the council. This was endorsed by \$1 to 9, five of the minority being engineers.

The engineers have members who belong to the Stationary Engineers' Association, a national organization, opposed to the strike and conflicting with the international body. The action of the council was based on the fact that the engineers instructed the new men in the duties of a fireman, it not being within its jurisdiction to question their attitude in regard to a sympathetic strike.

The council also discussed at length the question of local option, and the action to be taken in reference to making an endeavor to create a favorable sentiment toward it. It was decided to appoint, a committee, which will present a report at the next meeting of the council

how the Terra Nova and the Morning the ships which sailed last winter to the relief of the Discovery in the Antarctic, raced for the honor of reacharctic, raced for the honor of reaching the ice-bound vessel first is told by Mr. William Smith, second engineer of the Terra Nova.

Mr. Smith, in a letter to his family at Dundee, states that when the packice was reached, soon after last Christmas, the Terra Nova took the lead, smashing up everything that came in the way.


