Notice to Followers Intimates Matters of Urgency.

LONDON, Feb. 9 .- The prime minister to-night issued the customary Men to Get Increase-Morning Times letter to his followers, asking their attendance at the opening of parliament, "as matter of urgent importance will

Mr. Asquith's Letter disposes of the umor current recently that the question of the lords' veto might be pro-ceeded with even before the address in reply to the king's speech was moved, by explicitly stating that the address will be moved immediately the king's speech is delivered.

In influential quarters it is stated that the king's speech will refer to no legislative proposals whatever except thost for limiting the veto of the house of lords, that the veto bill will be largely based on Sir Henry Campbell-Ban-nerman's resolution and that no separation will be made between the financial and legislative veto.
