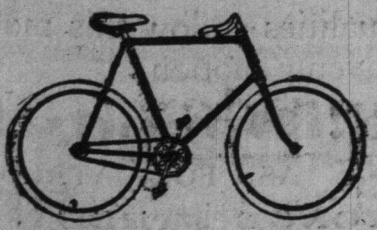

THE SITUATION. The political situation is fraught with momentous issues.

The political situation is fraught with momentous issues. Visions of great national expansion and increased national glory loom up before us.

But with this modified tariff, new features are introduced. Three such features particularly are noticeable. We propose to examine them in turn.

Let us take the first one, that of preferential trade. This feature of the tariff is ambiguous. It is open to two interpretations, a narrow one and a broad one.

Let us take the second one, that of the 14-foot waterway. The completion of the enlarged system, which is promised by the opening of navigation in 1899, will mark an epoch in Canadian history.

Under the present system it costs just as much to carry a bushel of wheat through the 130 miles of the Lawrence in the vicinity of the canal as it does to carry it all the rest of the distance from Port Arthur to Montreal.

The completion of the 14-foot system will usher in an entirely new condition of affairs between the Maritime Provinces and Ontario and Manitoba.

The Liberals may be satisfied to raise the question in order to have Canada's rights and powers in regard to tariff control and commercial independence defined and widened.

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FEARFUL FIRE AT NEWPORT NEWS

One and a Half Million Dollars Worth of Shipping Property Swept Away—Some Narrow Escapes.

Newport News, Va., April 27.—Fire broke out at Pier No. 5 of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company today, and before the flames were gotten under control pier 5 and 6, crowded with valuable merchandise, had gone up in smoke, and the Chesapeake & Ohio tug Wanderer and the half-tanned German barque J. D. Blackford were burned up.

The crew of the tug Wanderer had a narrow escape from a horrible death. Their craft was on fire before they were awakened by the alarm.

The members of the crew jumped overboard and swam ashore, but the tug immediately started to effect its escape, and ran around to the south side of Pier 5.

The flames were burning with a fury that defied the efforts put forth to stop them. The tug was compelled to run the nose of the craft against the pier.
