Citizens of Berlin, Ontario, Would Change City's Name

CANADIANS ARE HARD TO BEAT AND ARE DOING SPLENDID WORK

Men Are Cheerful, Confident and Optimistic, Food is Good, and Trenches Are in Excellent Condition—Perfectly Ready to Meet Germans Every Time They Come Out—Canadian Infantry Superior to Enemy's, and Artillery is in Fine Fettle.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—Thru the courtesy of the war office and the Canadian headquarters in the field, the third party of Canadian journalists have today concluded a two days' tour of the Canadian lines...

most invariably includes good, fresh beef every day. Corroborating this statement, men told me themselves that their rations could not be better or more plentiful.

On Monday night we dined with Corps Commander General Sir Edwin Alderson, whom we found highly optimistic regarding the general situation.

Comparatively little change has taken place in the locations held by our forces twelve months ago. In many cases they are holding precisely the same positions on an undulating front which now extends for a distance of some miles.

Enemy Reports Circulated. Reports of closing of the Dutch frontier and amazing troops on that front are of frequent occurrence, and undoubtedly emanate from enemy sources.

Change Has Come. D. B. DeWeller acted as chairman and made a few remarks at the opening and said that since the war began a marked change had come upon the name of Berlin here and elsewhere.

These improvements naturally have exercised a tremendous influence on the morale of the men. I found them quite cheerful, confident and optimistic. Recently one of the members of the coalition cabinet on his return from a visit to these lines said that nowhere had he found such undiluted optimism prevailing.

On Tuesday morning I was privileged to see the Canadian artillery at work. The positions ingeniously concealed, and were most impregnable.

BRITAIN MAY APPOINT MINISTER OF AVIATION

Policy of Vigorous Character Believed to Be in Contemplation.

LONDON, Feb. 11, 4:40 p.m.—The Evening Standard, referring to its previous statement that the government is considering the appointment of a minister of aviation, who will have complete control of naval and military air service, says that if such appointment is made the minister will be assisted by a strong committee of experts and that a vigorous policy will be pursued by the ministry.

BRITAIN NOT ALARMED BY GERMANS' BLUSTER

Policy of Arming Merchantmen Will Not Be Discontinued.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—There is no evidence that the British Government or her allies propose to change the status of their merchant ships, or the policy of arming merchantmen on account of the Austro-German declaration. The government as yet has not formally considered the subject, but the consensus of opinion as shown by newspapers and authorities who have been interviewed is that Germany's declaration of policy means no alteration in her practice except that it may operate to keep neutral off the ships of the belligerent powers and thus give a clearer field for submarines to sink merchantmen.

BRITAIN MAKES DENIAL OF LOSS OF CRUISERS

Treachurous Tribesmen Were Made to Pay for Unprovoked Attack.

Special Cable to The Toronto World. LONDON, Feb. 11, 10:42 p.m.—Treachurous Arabs paid dearly for an attack upon British forces, according to a statement issued by the war office tonight. Tribesmen who had professed friendship attacked a British scouting party and in a sharp fight which ensued the British lost nearly 400 men. As a reprisal a British force razed four Arab villages.

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PETROGRAD, via London, Feb. 11, 5:05 p.m.—Although a general revival of activity is officially reported along the entire Russian front the only developments of more than local and temporary importance are the Russian advance in the Stripa region, south-east of Isebroff, where the Russians succeeded in capturing heights commanding the district in which runs the main railway line between the Chodorow and Strv Rivers, and the occupation by the Russians of the heights east of Tchemerine.

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HUNS ALLOW EXODUS OF MANY CIVILIANS

Men Unfit to Fight Can Leave French Territory Occupied by Foe.

BERNE, Switzerland, Feb. 11, via Paris.—Germany, because of representations made by the Swiss and Spanish Governments, has agreed that not only women, children and old men may be allowed to leave the French departments occupied by Germany, but that all men unfit for military service may leave. Under this decision the transportation of 20,000 additional persons begins today. Already 95,000 French civilians have been sent to France by way of Switzerland while 2200 Germans and 2800 Austrians have been liberated from France. The conveyance of these persons required 465 special trains.

On the night of Feb. 4-5 Lieut. Shepherd, with Corps. Waiters and Ford, and a patrol of the 21st Eastern Ontario Battalion, entered a German sap and in spite of the proximity of enemy sentries, made close examination of the enemy defenses.

Hostile aeroplanes have been unusually numerous over our lines, and more than one occasion bombs have been dropped without effect.

As a result of effective patrol work and successful minor operations carried out by units of the Canadian corps, Lieut. S. Dalenness of the 26th Chasseur, a pilot of the French army, has been temporarily attached to our second infantry brigade to observe our methods.

A party of five Canadian journalists have arrived in France and arrangements have been made to allow the correspondents to spend a full day and night in the trenches, and the weather has been fine and warm.

REWARDS FOR RAIDERS.

IS NOW JUNIOR MAJOR

Work Done in the East End Storm Sewer

Pape Avenue Residents Send Big Deputation Before Works Committee.

ACTION IS DEFERRED

Committee Will Consider Removing Street Lighting From Fire Department Control.

Works Commissioner Harris' recommendation that a storm overflow sewer be constructed on Queen street, between Pape avenue and Leslie streets, and that the cost of same be charged to the ratepayers of the vicinity as a local improvement, was the cause of a large deputation waiting on the works committee yesterday afternoon.

Thomas Fletton of the firm of Robinson, Godfrey & Fletton who addressed the committee on behalf of the deputation, argued that the storm sewer in question should be charged against the city as a whole in the same way that the storm sewers constructed under the bylaw carried in 1910 were charged, and pointed out that as the residents in the section affected were paying their share of the general city system of storm overflow sewers, they should also share the benefits to be derived from same.

Commissioner Harris informed the committee that the new sewer would cost about \$43,500, of which amount \$24,710 would be paid by the ratepayers and \$18,790 by the city at large.

AD. McBride championed the cause of the ratepayers, as did A. J. Robbins and W. G. Macgregor, the latter moving that the city at large bear the cost of the sewer. Ald. McBride, however, made an amendment that the matter be referred back and that the commissioner be instructed to bring in separate reports one for the regular sanitary sewer and one for the storm sewer. The amendment carried.

The floor street bill was again discussed, and the board decided to proceed with the bill for the completion of the work.

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BELGIANS KILLED SPY FOR BETRAYING NURSE

Nels de Rode, Who Delivered Miss Cavell to Germans, Shot in Street.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 28.—Further details are reported from the Belgian frontier of the assassination of Nels de Rode, the Belgian who is alleged to have betrayed Miss Edith Cavell, the English nurse executed at Brussels, to the German authorities.

According to this story, the body of a young man who had been killed by two revolver shots was found in a street at Schaerbeek, a suburb of Brussels, early one morning. He was at once recognized as De Rode, a man of 25 years, son of a retired major of the Belgian army. The body lay before the door of the man's parents, but the father refused to receive it and it was taken to the public mortuary.

Immediately the German authorities heard of the case they gave strict orders that the affair should be kept as quiet as possible, but instructed the police at the same time to make every effort to discover the assassin.

Long Suspected Spy. The slain man, it is said, had been suspected for a long time of spying for the Germans. It was reported that he, together with an individual of the same name, had made a specialty of enticing young men to take service in the Belgian army and then, when they were on the point of leaving the country, of delivering them to the Germans.

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BERLIN GIVES VERSION OF RAID MADE ON KENT

Bombs Dropped Freely on Harbor Works, Factories and Barracks.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—An official statement issued by the German general staff is forwarded by Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent as follows: "On the afternoon of Feb. 9 some of our naval aeroplanes dropped bombs freely on the harbor works, factories and barracks at Ramsgate, south of the mouth of the Thames."

The official British account of Wednesday's daylight raid said bombs were dropped in the vicinity of Ramsgate and the neighboring town of Broadstairs, and that the material damage was confined to the shattering of glass. Two women and one child were injured.

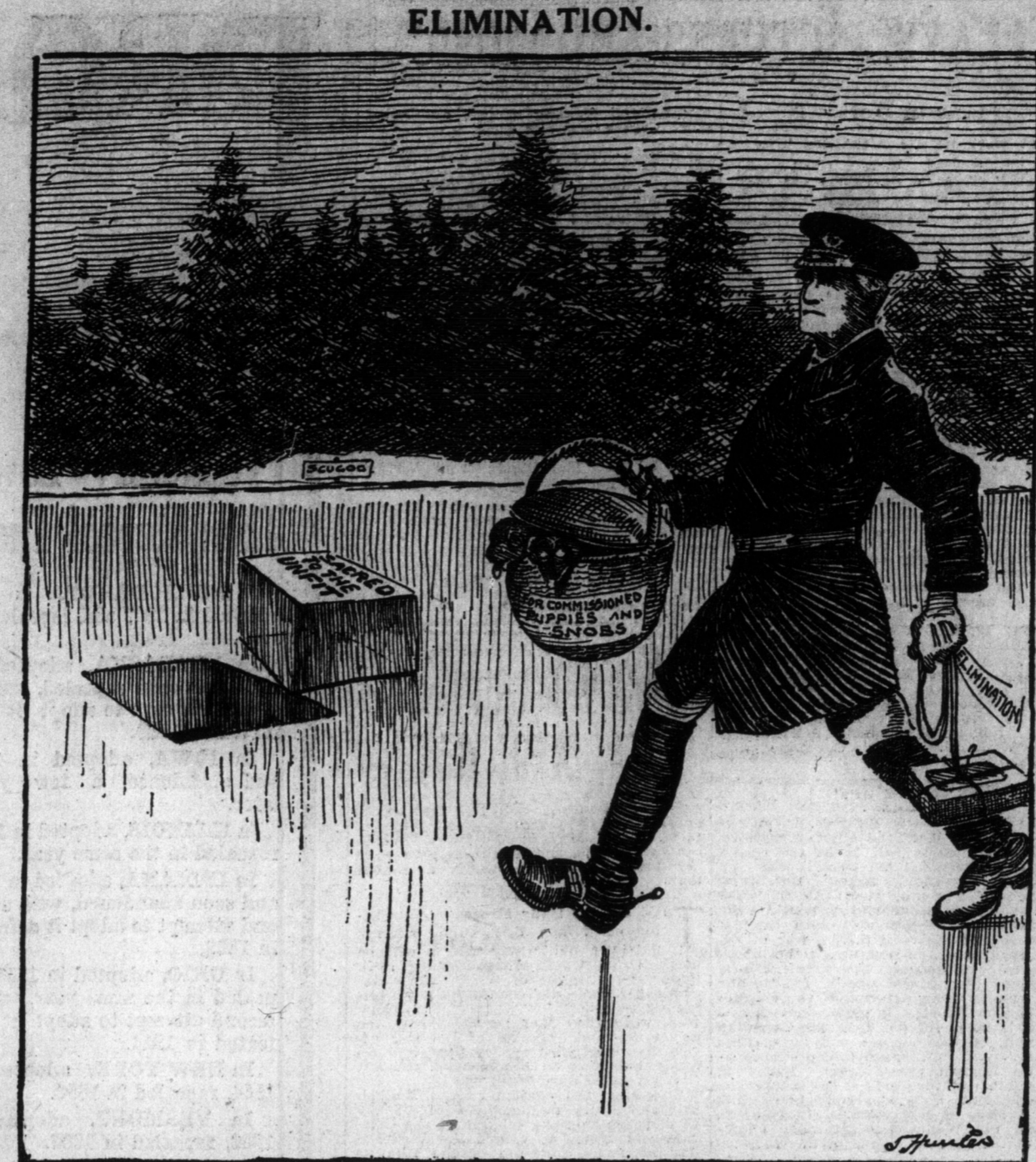

BASEBALL HAS TREATED CHIEF BENDER WELL

Indian Pitcher Collected a Fortune in Time He Was in Big Leagues.

A few figures relative to Chief Bender's earnings in baseball compiled from actual contracts the Indian has enjoyed since becoming a big leaguer, will dispel the feeling of sorrow for the reason over his "bad treatment" from the majors.
Bender started out with the Athletics in 1905 and worked for that tribe 12 years. His average salary was \$4500 a season, starting with about \$2000 and ending with \$7000. Thus the chief collected about \$54,000 for his contract in addition to \$11,764 for world series extra cash. Counting the \$6000 he received from the Peds for part of last year, his total runs well over the \$75,000 mark. This gives him an average of little more than \$6000 a year for 13 years, for a trade that occupied only six months of the year.
Bender is engaged in several other enterprises, one being the conducting of a sporting goods store in Philadelphia, so that there is little need of sympathy for him now that he has reached the end of his string. Bender was never credited with being too careful of his physical condition, either, so that he took life free and easy, cleaned up a fortune and is far better off than a lot of his fellow workmen.

George Stallings is one of the busy men at the National League meeting this week trying to land a catcher and one or two other players to boost the Braves.



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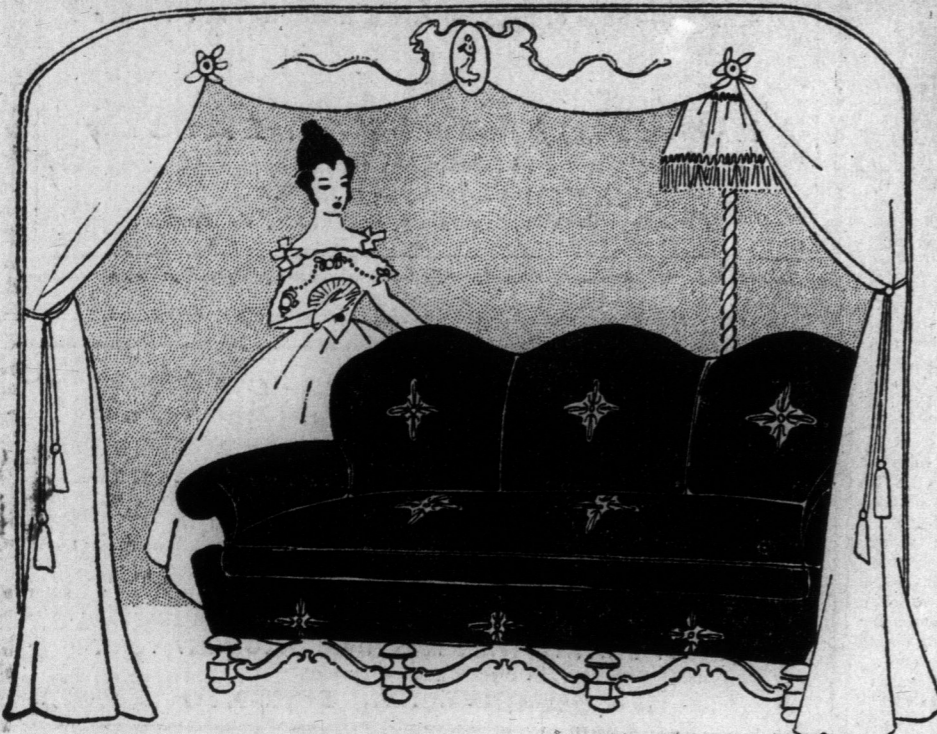
