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



PASTORAL LETTER.

My Dear Friends :--

We have every reason to look back with gratitude upon our congregational history throughout the past year. During my long absence from you, it gladdened my heart, and I believe, helped forward my recovery, to learn from time to time of your faithful attendance upon the public services of the church and your zeal for its interests. I feel a great indebtedness to the brethren who came to our aid, and rendered such efficient service in the pulpit and in pastoral work; and I rejoice to know that, apart from the unusual burden of expense imposed upon you by my domestic afflictions, no substantial injury was otherwise sussustained. Your most cordial welcome on my return, completed the acts of kind remembrance which I shall always associate with that period. And though the past year was one of much trial to me, I believe it will be instrumental in binding us still closer together, as pastor and people, in the bonds of christian sympathy.

Each year, while it brings new faces around us, takes away some with whom we have long held sweet fellowship, and some, too, who were just beginning lives of christian promise. What the near future has in store for those who remain, God alone can tell. We shall best cherish the memory of those who are gone before, by earnest service in the Master's vineyard while it is called day.

Since I resumed my duties, I have been much encouraged by the regular presence of most of you at the Sunday services. There are some, perhaps, who might be with us twice who are there but once; and I ask you to guard against the growing tendency of our time to secularize the evening hours of the Lord's Day. While it is a great pleasure to all of us to welcome the large number of strangers who join our worship, it is to the members of the congregation that I look chiefly for that constant attendance and personal sympathy which are such great aids to effective preaching. As it is my main business to try to instruct those who come to church, I invite your assistance in bringing to the house of God, any who from indifference or carelessness or other cause, needlessly absent themselves from it. There is no reason why

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we should not have scores of pastors in this large congregation, and I gratefully acknowledge the help which some have given in this way.

I could wish that a larger number frequented our Wednesday evening service. Legitimate duties may sometimes prevent you from being present; and all I ask is, that you will use your best endeavours to keep this one hour in the midst of the week's toil, for prayer and the study of God's Word.

Believing as I do that the hope of the church lies in its young men and women, I rejoice in the faithful work done by the Sunday School and Bible Classes, and in the means afforded by the Young People's Society for intellectual and spiritual training, and I look for continual increase among those who profess their faith in Christ as the result of these agencies.

The work of the various church organizations is described in separate reports which I hope you will read carefully. They have all done noble service during the past year, and I invite others to share their labors as they have opportunity.

There is a slight increase in the number of those who give to the various benevolent and missionary enterprises in which the Presbyterianism of Canada is engaged; but there are still some names not found on the subscription list which might reasonably be expected there. Let me invite your generous offerings both to the maintenance of this church, and to works of christian charity elsewhere. A special effort will be made this year to collect your gifts in monthly or quarterly instalments in order to avoid that unhealthy congestion of effort which has marked the closing days of each annual financial period. I am sure that your active co-operation will not be sought in vain to render successful this much needed reform.

It has been the good fortune of St. Andrew's Church more than once either directly to establish mission stations or to aid materially in their formation. For some time past a Sunday School has been held in the Glebe Hall under the efficient care of Mr. Chrysler; and now we have succeeded in organizing a mission station, and in securing the services of Rev. T. W. Winfield as its first pastor. The growth of population in that suburb affords bright prospects for the future, and under the able and faithful guidance of Mr. Winfield, the prosperity of the mission is assured from the outset.

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In entering upon another year of church work, let us gird ourselves to greater diligence in the Master's service, and to a more complete illustration day by day of the grandeur of christian principles. By God's blessing I have been restored to duties which are dear to my heart. The enforced inaction of many months has only served to deepen my belief that it is impossible to throw too much zeal and effort into the varied tasks of the gospel ministry. I am conscious how very far short I fall of the ideal which is always before me, but I rely upon the strength of the Divine Spirit and upon your earnest and cheerful co-operation that our beloved church may have true prosperity, and our united labours not be in vain in the Lord.

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KIRK SESSION REPORT.

In presenting their annual report the Session desire to recognize the goodness and forbearance of God in continuing to bless the Congregation with the quiet enjoyment of many privileges and much apparent prosperity in most of the departments of our Church life and work, notwithstanding our great lack of diligence in the use of them.

The absence of our Pastor during the first half of our church year, and the consequent interruption in the discharge of his pulpit and pastoral duties, was, at first, a source of anxiety to the congregation and its office-bearers; but this solicitude, in so far as it concerned the securing of ministerial supply, was soon dispelled by the expressed sympathy and promised assistance of prominent ministers of the Church. The Session are especially indebted to the Rev. Principal Grant of Queen's University, not only for the Sunday services which he conducted, but also for the valuable assistance which he so cheerfully rendered in securing acceptable pulpit supply; the thanks of the Session are also due to Messrs. Rollins, Peck, and Laird, graduates of Queen's University; and to the Rev. Prof. Ross, of the Presbyterian College, Montreal; Rev. Dr. Barclay, Prof. MacAdam, of Montreal; the Rev. Dr. Gregg, of Knox College, Toronto, and to the Rev. Thomas J. Thompson and Rev. T. W. Winfield, who were entrusted with the pastoral oversight of the congregation for the greater part of the time that the Rev. Mr. Herridge was absent from his charge. The Sunday and other services of these ministers were highly appreciated, and it is matter of congratulation that the attendance at all our public diets of worship, has been at least equal to that of any previous year in the history of this Church.

Towards the end of September last our pastor was restored to his flock so much improved in health that he was enabled to resume and continue his ministerial duties with renewed energy. This has been a source of satisfaction to the congregation generally, and the Session would heartily unite with them on this occasion in expressing the pleasure which his return has afforded, and in recording their thankfulness that the Great Head of the Church has been pleased to restore him to such measure of health as has permitted him to continue his pulpit and pastoral work with his wonted vigour. Their prayer is, that he may be spared for many years of Christian service, and that his work in the ministry may be blessed by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit,

so that he may be instrumental in the upbuilding of christian character in this sphere of his labours; and in extending the Kingdom of Christ in the world.

The Session have to report, that while the ordinary church services have been extremely well attended, the quarterly communions of the past year were not observed by so many of our members as usual; the average attendance having fallen to (243) two hundred and forty-three, which is (26) twenty-six less than the average number reported in the previous year.

The Session have also to report that the number of new members enrolled during the year is less than the number of removals so that the numerical strength of the congregation has been slightly diminished since last report. The membership at the commencement of the year numbered (543) five hundred and forty-three. Since that time (32) thirty-two have been added to the roll; (21) twenty-one on profession of faith, and (11) eleven by certificate from other congregations; and during the same time (33) thirty-three have been removed from the roll: (12) twelve by certificate, (9) nine by death and (12) twelve by action of the Session, thus leaving at this date a membership numbering (542) five hundred and forty-two persons in full communion with the Church. The revised roll of these members is appended as part of this report and the address of each is given so far as known by the Session.

The retrospect of the past year is clouded by the shadow of sorrow and bereavement which has fallen on so many families of the congregation. In the course of the year death has removed from our fellowship some of the oldest members and adherents of this church, whose presence and aid in the christian work of the congregation will be greatly missed. The Session would now convey to the bereaved relatives, their sincere sympathy and commend them to that unfailing source of comfort and consolation which is ever found in Him who is the father of the fatherless, the husband of the widow, and the orphan's stay—our compassionate Heavenly Father, who is too wise to err and too kind to cause His children needless tears.

The statements of the Treasurers of the funds in charge of the Session show that the plate collections at the regular services on the Lord's day were rather less in amount than those of the previous year; and that the total amount contributed through the medium of the church schedules is about (\$100) one hundred dollars more than the amount

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rge of the es on the vious year; the church ne amount reported for the previous year; but a marked difference will be noticed in the smaller sums given to the Schemes of the Church, and the larger amount allocated towards interest on our church loan. This increased allocation to interest has been made in compliance with the expressed wish of the contributors, and in consequence of this, the Session have not been permitted to allocate to the missionary and benevolent schemes of the Church, as large sums as the congregation has been accustomed to give towards these objects in former years.

The total of these allocations amounting to the sum of three thousand three hundred and eighty dollars.

The Session have pleasure in reporting that the efficiency of the Choir has been well maintained throughout the year. Mr. F. C. Smythe, M.B., having resigned the position of organist and choirmaster of this church, the Session were fortunate in securing the services of Mr F. M. S. Jenkins, as his successor in that important office, and under his conductorship the musical portion of our church service continues to be an attractive feature in our public worship. The congregation is much indebted to the members of the choir for the assistance which they have given in conducting our public service of praise. The Session would also recognize the valued aid which the Sunday School orchestra has rendered, not only to the Sunday School and Young People's Society, but also in leading the service of song in the mid-week meetings of the

congregation, thereby imparting additional attractiveness to the devotional and educational elements which should be the predominating characteristic of these meetings.

The District Visitors present no annual report of their church work, but as usual, they have been very helpful to the Session, especially in collecting the promised contributions to the schemes of the Church, and in reporting to the Pastor cases of sickness in families of the congregation requiring pastoral visitation.

The Session refrain from giving further details of our church work, as these will be fully dealt with in the reports of the several organizations which will be submitted to the congregation and which should be worthy of careful perusal by the members and adherents of the Church.

The Session are enabled to report that the mission work in the Sunday School Hall on the Glebe property has been confined chiefly to Sunday School work under the superintendence of Mr. Chrysler. In July last, a mid-week prayer meeting was commenced under the care of Mr. Back, a student of Queen's College. This meeting has latterly been conducted with encouraging attendance by the Rev. Mr. Winfield. The Session desiring to extend the usefulness of this mission, made several efforts to obtain the permission of Presbytery to hold regular Sunday services, but without success, until the meeting of Presbytery on fourth February last, when the matter was again brought before that Court, by a petition from residents of the Glebe. The Session resolved to present and support this petition in terms of the following minute:—

That the Kirk Session of St Andrew's Church having been informed that a number of families, resident upon the Glebe and adjacent lands are desirous of having Sunday services held in the Glebe Mission Hall, and having examined the character of the petition which they propose to present to the Presbytery of Ottawa to that end, record their hearty approval of the action of the petitioners, and request that the Presbytery take immediate steps to give effect to the movement, under the terms and conditions already presented before the Presbytery, by the Kirk Session of St. Andrew's Church.

In pursuance of this resolution, the Session presented and supported the above petition before the Presbytery, and the following resolution in regard to it, was adopted by that Court. School sons, reguarante toward of St. A stipend ers, recogning place Session, them as until the

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and supfollowing "That re the petition for church services to be held in the Sunday School Hall on the Glebe, signed by one hundred and fifty-two persons, representing sixty-nine families; with a subscription list and guarantee, together promising the sum of five hundred dollars toward support of ordinances, and a further promise on the part of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, to make up any deficiency in the stipend of a minister:—The Presbytery grants the prayer of the petitioners, recognizes them as a mission station under the care of the Presbytery and places them under the Session of St. Andrew's Church as an interim Session, with instructions to form a communion roll, and to organize them as a station, and to take the general oversight of the station until the people are ready to call."

The residents of the Glebe immediately thereafter petitioned the Session to secure the continuance of the Rev. Mr. Winfield as minister in charge of the Glebe Mission. This petition was considered at a meeting of Session held on 9th February, when it was resolved—"That the report of the special committee recommending the appointment of the Rev. T. W. Winfield, to supply the Mission Station on the Glebe, be received and adopted; and that, inasmuch as the signers to the petition for services there have guaranteed a minimum of (\$500) five hundred dollars towards the stipend, this Session undertake to supplement their offerings in the meantime, by such sum as may be necessary to raise the total amount to (\$1000) one thousand dollars."

It was further resolved—"That inasmuch as St. Andrew's Church undertakes to contribute a considerable sum to the stipend of the Rev. T. W. Winfield, as minister in charge of the Glebe Mission Church, this Session will expect that the Moderator shall be at liberty to call upon Rev. Mr. Winfield for such pulpit exchanges and such pastoral assistance as he may be able to render."

Copies of these resolutions were sent to the Rev. Mr. Winfield, and he replied by letter, dated 12th February, accepting the charge of the Mission and engaging to carry out in every respect the several resolutions in regard thereto.

The Mission Station was formally opened by the Moderator on Wednesday, 12th February, and on the following Sunday the first regular services were held, at which the Rev. Mr. Winfield officiated. The attendance has been encouraging.

The terms and conditions under which the Presbytery has authorized the organization of this Mission Station, and placed it under the temporary care of this Session are not quite the same as we desired; they are, however, the best that could be obtained, and the Session are hopeful that the results of the Mission will justify the action which has been taken in this matter with the approval and concurrence of the Temporal Committee and Glebe Trustees, and they trust that this joint action of your office-bearers will receive the cordial approval and financial support of the congregation.

Moved by F. P. Bronson, Esq., seconded by C. C. Ray, Esq., that the various statements and reports read be received and adopted.—Carried.

Moved by L. Crannell, Esq., seconded by A. W. Fleck, Esq., that a committee composed of the Rev. W. T. Herridge, Messrs. Hamilton, Gibson and May be appointed to attend to the publication of the Annual Report and the distribution of the same to the congregation.—Carried.

Moved by P. Larmonth, Esq., seconded by A. H. Taylor, Esq., that Messrs. A. W. Fleck and Wm. Scott be recommended for the vacancies on the Temporal Committee and Hon. E. H. Bronson for the vacancy on the Glebe Trustee Board, and that suspending all rules to the contrary the Secretary be instructed to cast a ballot for them.—Carried.

Secretary cast a ballot, Chairman declared them elected.

Moved by Lt.-Col. J. Macpherson, seconded by Robt. Cassels, Esq., that the thanks of the congregation of St. Andrew's Church are hereby tendered to the Ladies' Aid Society for their valuable services during the past year.—Carried.

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Rev. Mr. Herridge thanked the congregation for the leave of absence granted at the last annual meeting.

REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church :-

The Temporal Committee herewith submit their statement of receipts and expenditures for the last year, duly audited, the balance of cash on hand at date being \$401.14. The accounts for the current year have been paid, with the exception of \$1,089.00, being mainly for interest falling due this month.

As will be noticed, there have been some unusual expenses this year in connection with the manse, it being necessary to put in a new boiler at a cost of \$314.50. Your Committee had reason to fear that the drains, etc., in connection with the manse were not in all respects satisfactory, so during the last year your Committee has had them thoroughly over-hauled, at an expense of \$215.00. We trust that the outlay for these two items will prove to be money well spent.

REPORT OF THE GLEBE TRUSTEES.

In presenting the Sixth Annual Report, the Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church are pleased to be able to state that they have succeeded fairly during the last year in carrying out the objects of the trust.

The number of lots sold have not been large, but quite a number of the lots previously sold have been built upon. Streets have been opened and sidewalks constructed, and the portion east of Bank street is being rapidly built up.

Prior to the 1st of March, 1895, the Glebe Trustees had sold from the property on the west side of the Canal 279 lots for the price of \$73.260.00. During the current year they have sold in all 37 lots, some of them in Spencerville, for the price of \$9.275.00, making a total of \$82,535.00, which, added to the sum of \$7,000.00, being the amount of the sales formerly made by the Temporal Committee and transferred to the Trustees, amounts to \$89,535.00, which is the total amount of the sales of the property to date. These figures are not strictly accurate, but are approximate.

In addition to the unsold lots, the Trustees have as assets the amount due for principal upon mortgages, \$34,575.74, and in case \$10,557.88. During the year the Trustees paid \$3,000.00 on account of the mortgage to the late Mr. Samuel Howell, thus reducing the balance on his mortgage to \$17,000.00, and gave notice last summer of their intention to pay a large additional amount, but owing to the illness and death of Mr. Howell they have not been able to complete the payment, which will be made out of the \$10,557.00 cash on hand. It is intended to make this payment in a short time; as soon as Mr. Howell's executors are legally authorized to receive it. During the year a further sum of \$2,000.00 was paid to the Temporal Committee for completing the balance due for the Sunday School Hall and the completion of the Glebe Mission School Building.

After providing for these sums they have also handed to the Temporal Committee on account of interest the sum of \$800.00

A statement is appended showing the number of lots sold and unsold upon the Glebe property, also a statement of the mortgages upon the church property and of the assets of the Glebe Trustees, and

also a statement showing the amount paid from the Glebe funds for congregational purposes during the past four years.

These to form the Executive Committee and to be ex-officio members of all Committees.

Several important changes have taken place in the Society since our last report was presented. The annual meeting, which has always been held in October, is now held on the Friday preceding the first Monday in March, the day of the annual congregational meeting.

When the Society resumed work after the summer vacation the question of continuing the weekly meetings was seriously discussed. Owing to the growth of the city and the increased number of public institutions, the demands upon the time of the ladies has so multiplied it seemed absolutely necessary to hold fewer meetings. It was therefore resolved, that unless some special need arose, to meet but once in the four weeks, and the second Friday of every month was the day appointed.

The most important change, however, has been adopting, in the place of entertainments, a systematic method of raising money. This scheme has already been set before the congregation in a circular letter dated the 23rd of November, in which it was requested that each member, and all others wishing to help, would once a month enclose a sum of money—no matter how trifling—in one of the envelopes to be found in the pews, and drop it into the boxes provided for this purpose in the vestibules of the church. The reasons for this change are very largely due to the fact that at the present day every church in the city has its own entertainments; and the multiplicity of these has lessened their success; the past year having shown how unsuccessful, from a financial standpoint, were our efforts to raise money by such means.

The response to this appeal for voluntary contributions has been

very encouraging and has caused the ladies to feel hopeful that the many calls which come before them will be fully met.

On the 15th of last March, before the ladies had come to this decision, a sale of fancy and useful articles was held, at which was realized the sum of \$103.00.

While entertainments as a means of revenue have been abandoned the Society has not ceased to care for the social welfare of the congregation, and with this end in view an "At Home" was given in the church parlors on an evening in the month of April, to the young people of the congregation. A large number were present and a very enjoyable evening spent.

The anniversary social held on the 24th of January was, in spite of the inclemency of the weather, attended by a fair gathering. An excellent programme of music was rendered by members of the choir and Sunday School orchestra, followed by an address from the Rev. Mr. Herridge. This, with the good supper provided by the ladies, combined to make the evening one of more than usual cordiality and cheerfulness. On the 10th of February, Mr. and Mrs. Herridge gave an "At Home" to the young men of the congregation in the church parlors, and at Mr. Herridge's request the ladies also assisted as hostesses.

The Society in carpeting the infant class room, and providing matting for stairs and gallery in the Sunday School Hall have completed the furnishing of this building. Ten dollars were donated the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Protestant Hospital. Forty dollars to the Home for the Aged, and twenty-five to the Rev. Mr. Gourlay, to assist in building churches in the Lake Dauphin mission district.

Infants' blankets and hoods have been made by the ladies for the Maternity Hospital. Cotton for sheeting has been given to the Home for the Friendless, and at the last meeting of the Society it was decided to present a "Communion Service" to the newly formed Mission Church on the Glebe property.

The Society has had to regret the departure of Mrs. Romaine, the esteemed secretary-treasurer of the Poor Relief Committee, for Germany. Miss Gibson has very kindly undertaken this very arduous office. The Poor Relief Committee still hold their meetings weekly, the hour being half-past four, except the day on which the Society meets, when the hour is half past two.

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Report of the Home Missionary Society.

It is with feelings of joy and thankfulness that we are again permitted to meet together at the close of another church year, and dwell for a time on the measure of success that has attended the work of this Society.

The meetings have been held regularly on the second Friday of each month, and after the usual business routine is over, there is generally a letter from the missionary to read giving full details of his work, and in this way the interest is maintained, and on many occasions, various wants supplied. The Rev. Mr. Gordon did much good, earnest work in the year that he was in charge and his letters breathed a very evident spirit of zeal and honest christian endeavor not exceeded by any other missionary in this field. Many new members joined the church, and the Sunday School afforded Mr. Gordon much scope for energy, as he was greatly interested in the young and took much pains to improve the singing. He was succeeded in May by Mr. Gourlay, who still holds the office, and whom many of the ladies have recently had the pleasure of hearing, Mr. Gourley having been commissioned by the people to come east and endeavor to raise money to help build five small churches at the stations of Gartmore, Wilson River, Cumberland, Ochre and Willow Loop, the only Presbyterian Church now being at Dauphin. The people there have agreed to raise half the amount and provide lumber and labor, if only the other half may be subscribed. With the exception of two out of the seven stations, the services are held in the houses of the farmers, and in some cases, the one living

room is so small that many of those attending service are obliged to be in the upper room and cannot even be seen, so that preaching under these circumstances must indeed be trying to pastor and people alike, and it seems hard to learn that Mr. Gourlay's request for assistance in three of our cities has not met with the desired response. We trust that knowing these facts, the efforts of the Society will be redoubled in this new year; but in order to do this, all must work with a will, and new members must be brought in, as our resources all depend on voluntary contributions.

In February last, at the suggestion of our Honorary President, Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen, a public meeting was held in the S. S. Hall to enable Rev. Mr. Gordon of Winnipeg to give an account of his work in the Northwest. A report of the work of this Society was given, after which Her Excellency addressed the meeting and expressed her thanks "for the honor of being allowed to co-operate with those who try to forward the work of Home Missions." Through her travels in the Northwest and residence for a time in British Columbia, she had had opportunities of becoming acquainted with mission work. She referred to the loneliness of those who are striving to build up homes in new districts; they require much heroic courage, and hail with joy the beginning of church work in their midst, and the effect of literature sent among them is wonderful. The Rev. Mr. Gordon's address was listened to with much interest; he spoke very feelingly of the immensity of the work to be overtaken. He said the churches of Canada were responsible for the future of the Northwest, and the Presbyterians in particular, as there are more of this denomination west of Lake Superior than any other. The collection taken in behalf of the Society amounted to \$31.00.

In March we had the pleasure of having Miss Baker of the Foreign Mission Board at Port Arthur address the meeting, and she gave much interesting information regarding her work among the Indians.

In April our usual thank-offering was held, and on this occasion the meeting was graced by the presence of our Honorary President, Her Excellency, who was much interested in the work of the Society and spoke a few encouraging words to the members, and seemed especially interested on being made aware of so much reading matter being sent out, as she knew how welcome it would be. The result of the thank-

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s occasion sident, Her Society and especially being sent the thankoffering was very gratifying, the sum of \$155.75 being contributed. At the close of the meeting tea was served and a pleasant half-hour spent in social intercourse.

The May meeting was rendered more than usually interesting by the presence of Dr. Robertson, who is so thoroughly versed in Northwest mission work, and who expressed his gratitude to the Society for its timely help, as the money already voted, \$275 00, was placed in his hands for the missionary. He said it was a time of great depression and the resources of the Board were taxed to the utmost to meet expenses and many salaries had to be cut down. He cited the case of one minister's wife who sold bunches of prairie grass at 10c. a bunch and in this way raised \$60.00 for her own church.

In November, Mrs. Fleck, one of our members, gave an "At home" for the benefit of the Society, which was much appreciated. Mr. Herridge gave an outline of the Dauphin work, music by some of the choir followed and a very pleasant hour spent, and the funds of the Society were the richer by \$30.00.

In December the 'Xmas box or boxes were sent, as owing to the ready response of the ladies for contributions, two large boxes, containing a most useful array of clothing, toys, books and magazines were sent out, free of charge, and have, we trust, ere now gladdened the hearts of the children in that lonely settlement.

Such is a sketch of the year's work, and we close with a sense of thankfulness for its many lessons and mercies, and hope that the new year will be still more abundantly blessed.

The Young People's Society held its second Annual Meeting in November.

The receipts for the year amounted to \$86.84; expenditure \$13.43, leaving a balance on hand of \$73.41.

The plan adopted last year of engaging in a distinct line of bible study at our prayer meetings, proved so successful, and the consideration of the life of St. Paul resulted in such spiritual profit to all of us, that it was decided to continue the method for this year, and "The early ministry of our Lord" was chosen. The attendance has averaged about the same as the year previous. It is to be hoped that this year, many more of the young people of the church will take advantage of these opportunities for prayer and bible study. On account of the small attendance, the leaders for our meetings have necessarily been confined to a few, but these have cheerfully done what they could to make the evenings pleasant and profitable.

The "At Home" to the young people of the church on December 16th was largely attended, and a very pleasant evening was spent. After an excellent programme had been rendered, refreshments were served.

A reception was held January 27th, to which were invited the students from the Normal School, Coligny College and the Harmon Home and Day School. Both programme and refreshments were heartily enjoyed by our visitors. During the year, two other smaller socials were held, which were just as pleasant and enjoyable as these.

For two years we have been holding a prayer meeting every Monday evening, and some of the members thought it advisable that a change should be made; accordingly, after some discussion, it was decided to reserve the last Monday of each month for a literary or musical evening. The first one "An evening with Tennyson" was held in February, and proved an intellectual treat. A lecture was also given on another occasion by Professor Robertson which was very interesting and instructive.

A box containing 14 dolls, 17 work-bags, 42 needle-books, 6 scrap-books and about 30 articles of clothing was sent to the Indian school at Birtle. A letter has been received from Miss McLaren saying how much they were appreciated.

Flowers have been sent to nineteen homes where there was illness. Several small presents of fruit, groceries and clothing have also been given away from time to time. The balance on hand, March 1st, 1895, \$7.93; received during the year, \$6.55; expended during the year, \$9.12, leaving a balance on hand, March 1st, 1896, of \$5.36.

May our Master in whose name this work was done, bless it exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think.

The festival last month was highly successful. Lime light views of the Trinidad Mission, explained to the audience by our pastor, proved an interesting and instructive feature.

Two delegates, Miss Ross and Miss C. Strachan were sent to the Provincial S. S. Convention at Toronto in the month of October. An excellent report of the Convention was presented by the delegates at a social meeting of the teachers and officers subsequently held.

The orchestra continues to increase in numbers and efficiency, and renders valuable assistance in leading the service of song both in the school and at the mid-week service, and at the social gatherings of the church.

The hall in which we meet is comfortable and attractive, and we are greatly assisted in our work by its convenient arrangement. We would suggest, however, that to adapt it more thoroughly to the work, curtains for the class rooms upstairs should be provided. Also that the wall behind the platform would be much improved by some texts of Scripture being painted upon it.

We note with great satisfaction that during the year a considerable number of our pupils have joined the membership of the church in full communion. We endeavour to impress upon the baptized children of the church that it is their duty and privilege at an early age to make a personal profession of their faith in Christ, and to identify themselves fully with the life and work of the church.
