## PREMIER HUGHES HAS LITTLE HOPE

Antis Have 160,000 Lead With 300,000 To

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 21—Although Premier Hughes of Australia has little hope that conscription will carry, a few optimistic ministers expect later returns to turn the scale in favor of national service, says a cable to the Vancouver World, from Sydney, N. S. W.



Devotion To Soldiers-Tears and Triumph Mingle at Polls and in the City Streets

(Toronto Globe.)

"Ye know, I never thought I'd like women in politics-but I do. It gives them a touch of home, like."

It was an old man in Vancouver whe said that, a year or more ago now, when some of British Columbia's women en-tered the political arena in the hope of making things better for their fellowwomen; and his words came out of memory's recesses yesterday as the

memory's recesses yesterday as the homes of Toronto reached out and touched its polling booths.

You found the home touch everywhere. The woman who had run out to vote for her boy between "reddin' up" after breakfast and "getting the old man's dinner," as she told the friendly poll clerk, a being who wore a white crepe de chine blouse, and was much more self-possessed than the youthful masculine who scrutineered beside her. There were two women, hurrying homemasculine who scrutineered beside her. There were two women, hurrying homeward, congratulating themselves that the ballot was cast and a good hour and a half left before the children would be home from school, and, "It'll be fine telling them I voted for their daddy while they get their dinner," said one as she reached her, doorstep.

A third group of voters surrounded one elderly woman who told them that

one elderly woman who told them that she had voted for union because she said:
"If it please God to send my boy home, I want him to have a free home



## VICTORIA CRÓSS FOR CANADIANS

Lieutenant Strachan Led Brilliant Charge on Machine-gua, Sabred to Death Entire Crew of Seven, and Then Fought Way Back to British Lines With Prisoners - Lieut. Shankland Broke up Counter-Attack and Saved

London, Dec. 22-According to official anouncement today, the Victoria Cross, most coveted of all war decorations, has been awarded to two Canadians, Lieut. Robert Shankland, who enlisted at Winnipeg in December, 1914, and Lieut. Henry Strachan, of the Fort Garry Horse, who enlisted in July, 1915, at Canterbury, England, and who, although of English birth, was for many years a rancher in the Canadian North-

the Flanders front. A mounted squadron was galloping towards the enemy lines amid a hail of machine bullets, when the leader toppled from his horse fatally wounded. Lieutenant Strachan jumped into the breach, and, mounting the horse of the dead leader, led the squadron through the enemy line of machine gun posts. corporation of incorporated company can only be made or sold with the approval of the minister of finance by his certificate in writing. The regulation also applies to any new issue or offering of shares, whether preferred or common, of any incorporated company.

It is expressly provided that nothing in the order-in-council shall affect the trading in any bonds, debenture, securities or shares of capital stock heretofore issued and placed upon the market. In other words, the order applies only to issues made from this time forward. Provision is made whereby any issue or sale in contravention of the prohibition of the order may be restrained and heavy penalties are provided for violation of the regulation.

The object of the order is to conserve the Canadian financial market for the war issues of the dominion government, and to prevent issues being made for purposes which may well be deferred until the end of the war. Issues which are absolutely necessary may be made, with the consent of the minister of finance, who will probably appoint a commissioner or a priority board to advise him as to the necessity for new issues and the time when they should be made. 




