GREAT LAKES VESSEL BURNS AND GOES DOWN IN HIS FATAL FALL

New York Gambler Was About to Cancel Life Insurance When Accident Happened

New York, N.Y., Dec. 30.—Chance favored Richard Canfield, a gambler and art connoiseur, even in his death from a fall down the steps of a subway station about a year ago. It was learned today that Canfield was on his way at the time to surrender his life insurance bolicy and to obtain a check for \$10,445, representing its surrender value. The accident, which resulted in his death, prevented him from signing a release to the insurance company. The executor of his estate sued the insurance company for the value of his policy and obtained a judgment yesterday for \$83,833.





More than this, thousands of our men are over there in the trenches facing hardships, suffering and death. They are doing this for us and for our Empire. "More than this, there are thousands whose homes are desolate who have given and lost their dearest sons, husbands, fathers. Do not these deserve our consideration? Surely it would be an act of heartless folly, a cruel mockery of their suffering in our common cause, if public revelry be held here at this time. Such a revelry would be an offence against good taste, against the decency of the world's society, an exhibition of heartlessness and selfishness so great that I cannot bring myself to believe that any but the most depraved would be guilty of so gross a public outrage. Even in gay Paris, such revelry has been forbidden this year."
