London, June 8—The fiercest fighting of the war so far as the Baltic provinces of Russia, are concerned, occurred a few days ago in a battle for the mastery of the Dubysa River, according to the Post's Petrograd correspondent. The river changed hands five times in one day and at nightfall the stream was completely choked with the bodies of thousands of dead. Reported Captured Taken in British Nets in Firth of Tay While Attempting Raid--Austrian Sunk Near Dardanelles

New York, June 8—Four German submarines were captured in the Firth of Tay, on the east coast of Scotland, in a recent raid, according to officers of the liner Cameronia, which arrived from Glasgow today. These undersea craft made a raid up the Firth and passed under the Tay bridge and were caught on their return in nets spread by the port authorities.

The submarines were kept entangled sixty-two hours, said Cameronia officers, after which they were allowed to come up. The crews were found to be exhausted and surrendered immediately.

Paris, June 8—A submarine, believed to be an Austrian, has been sunk by the Angio-French fleet at the western entrance to the Dardanelles, says a despatch from Mitylene. The presence of an Austrian submarine in the Dardanelles sphere would indicate that Austria, as well as Germany, is placing her war supplies at the disposal of the Turks.

Boston, June 8—Federal investigation of the alleged activities of persons interested in obtaining recruits for the British army among Americans, has brought to light four cases in which inducements had been offered youths to ship abroad, according to a statement by congressman, Peter F. Tague.

Two young men located by federal agents yesterday said they were told they would receive a bonus of \$100 besides free transportation to England if they would become British soldiers. Another, James Pope, fifteen years old, said he crossed to Liverpool as a hostler on a transport steamer and enlisted there, who also enlisted, were instructed by a recruiting sergeant to say that they were Canadians and nineteen years old.

The British consul general at this port, Frederick P. Leay, disclaimed any connection with the matter, saying the responsibility lay with the United States immigration officials.

Congressman Tague announced that he would go to Washington today to discuss the situation with Secretary of State Bryan and officials of the department of justice. He said he had letters from the parents of sixty young men in this state who had enlisted in England.






