Ground squirrels probably brought the disease to Los Angeles and communicated it to rats, which, in turn, probably transmitted it to the first human victim through the intermediary agency of a flea, Dr. Kellogg said in discussing the history of the plague in the United States.

The outbreak, according to Dr. Kellogg, is an indirect heritage from the Oakland plague of 1919.

It was in Oakland, where 13 cases, all fatal, were reported, that the pneumonic form of pleague first made its appearance in the United States, the doctor explained. Heretofore there had been cases of bubonic plague, an allied malady, which reached San Francisco from the Orient in 1900, and years later appeared in New Orleans and Galveston.

Radio Station, 10,000 Feet Above Sea Level, Opened; To Spread Weather News

Tarbes, France, Nov. 3-The highest radio-telephonic station in the world has been opened at the observatory on the Pic du Midi some 10,000 feet in altitude. The station uses a 350 metre wave length and has an antenna capacity of 300 watts.

## WAR ON THE RATS, SAYS DR. MELVIN

Health Official Gives Striking Interview on Plague in Los Angeles.

Dr. George G. Melvin, medical health officer, interviewed by The Times-Star this morning, in regard to the outbreak of pneumonic plague, in Los Angeles,

form of the most fatal disease in the world. It kills from 75 to 98 per cent. of those who are attacked. It may easily be mistaken at first for pneu

"A few years ago it nearly depopu lated several sections in Eastern Asia especially in Mongolia and Manchuria.

The Japanese, who happened to be in authority at that time, by their activity and good health administration suceeded, after a time, in controlling the plague. For this purpose they burned down many homes and some villages particularly affected. The Two Forms.

"This plague consists of two forms or types, bubonic and pneumonic. The bubonic form is also very fatal, but not nearly so much so as pneumonic. It is quite readily distinguished by the peculiar swelling of the glands, neck and groin. The pneumonic type is much more difficult to distinguish at first, and, as already noted, is quite the more fatal of the two.

"The plague is propagated by and carried from place to place by rats. They are very susceptible of the disease, and as every rat without exception is infected with fleas, these become infected with the poison of the disease. As soon as the rat dies the fleas leave its body and make every endeavor to attach themselves to human beings, thus infecting man and producing the most dreadful of all diseases.

Destroy the Rats.
