There were watches in the crowd, and his time was taken at the end of the fourteen laps as 2.52, allowance, naturally, not being made for the two laps which had been finished slower than the others. It was the belief of all his friends that had McCormick skated the finish of that first mile as he was going when he caught Dowd in the twelfth lap, he would have established a record of 2.50, if not lower. He did not, however, know that his time was being taken, or that it might later be given as the rink record.

In those days, said his brother, Ralph, last evening, it was more difficult to make fast time than now. Posts were set about the course, standing three or four feet high, instead of the blocks which are now in use, and it was necessary to allow from eighteen inches to twenty-four in order to pass them at a safe distance, whereas now the blocks can be skimmed very closely. 



CHRISTY MATHEWSON'S NEW BASEBALL SERIES-CROP OF 1913

THE BUSINESS END OF BASEBALL

By CHRISTY MATHEWSON, of the New York Giants (Copyright, 1913, by the McClure Newspaper Syndicate)

In considering the business end of baseball there are two angles, to be taken into account—the player's and the owner's. In writing this story, I am going to try to look at both sides squarely and relate facts without favoring either interest. Of course, I have my opinions, but it is my job, in this article, to set down certain facts and let the reader draw his own conclusions.

With the possible exception of the automobile business, probably none has grown so rapidly in the last few years as the baseball business. The profits from it have been enormous, and several men have become sudden millionaires through their interest in the game. The players have also shared in this prosperity to a degree, and, whereas fifteen years ago a player was fortunate to have money enough, after the season, to winter on, now the good men in the game have considerable wealth. Perhaps wealth is a bad word. Let us say means. But for the rank and file of the game the salaries are not nearly so high as generally supposed.

Fans talk freely and easily of ball players getting \$10,000 annually for spending two hours every afternnoon during six months of the year; having a good time in the open air, but these remarks are made by persons who do not know. The high salaries are given publicity, and little is said of the players receiving wages of two or three thousand dollars a season. I could count on the fingers of my two hands the men in baseball who are getting more than \$6,000.

Playing baseball eats into your leisure considerably more than is generally supposed, too, The actual playing of a game takes about two hours each afternoon, it is true, but the fan does not realize that ball players on Big League clubs are out at the park each morning by ten o'clock, when they are at home, and, for about half of the season indulge in morning practice every day. Always the players must report in the mornings. 




