PUT TO DEATH WITHOUT TRIAL

Huerta to Use Extreme Measures With Rebels

SAYS IT IS NECESSARY

Five Leaders Are Executed—American Residents Say Reports That They Sought British Protection During Troubles Are "Detestable Falsehoods"

(Canadian Press) Mexico City, March 1.—That President Huerta does not underestimate the task he has undertaken is indicated by the statement he made at the fall of the government of Madero that there were in the country not less than 50,000 rebels under arms, without counting the numerous groups of bandits, whose number, he said, he could not estimate. Many of these bandits and rebels, the president said, were yet operating in Mexico, Durango, Puebla, Oaxaca, Chiapas, and Chihuahua.

"I repeat," said President Huerta, "that to bring about pacification of the country, which at this time is a supreme necessity, I shall use all the measures provided by law. It will be absolutely necessary to use that power granted under the suspension of the guarantees in certain places. This measure gives to the government the right summary to execute persons found bearing arms or in any manner aiding the rebels or bandits. The execution of five Zapatista leaders in the state of Morelos, has served to indicate the sternness with which the government will deal with the rebels, but the burning of three more haciendas, entailing the loss of a half million pesos, is considered to be an answer to the challenge of the government by one defiant group. Emiliano Zapata and his brother Eufemio have established themselves with their forces in the district about Villa Ayala, Morelos, their home. Pending arrangements with the government, they are reported to be maintaining excellent order in that district, and it is not improbable that President Huerta will accept their cooperation, though possibly it will be necessary for him to pay their forces in indemnity. Nearly 100,000 men in which the forces of Genovevo, Amador Sanchez, and Juan Orejon are operating.

Antonio Limon, the most notorious of the five Zapatista leaders, executed in Morelos, was captured in a district of the state of Oaxaca, and shot without trial. The 11 of Limon's men are not disposed to ally his defeat. In the state of Oaxaca, 1,000, awaiting incorporation in the regular army of Huerta.

"Detestable Falsehoods," Say Americans At a meeting of the residents of the American colony in Mexico City, the statements alleged to have been published, declaring that during the bombardment of the street fighting which recently took place in the capital, American citizens sought safety under the British flag, were denounced by the meeting as detestable falsehoods.

Official reports state 4,000 rebels have surrendered in the state of Puebla and Vera Cruz, 1,000 in the state of Mexico, and small detachments in many other states.

Manuel Calero, former ambassador to the United States, may compete with Felix Diaz for the presidency.

Havana, March 1.—Senora Francisco I. Madero, Jr., widow of the President of Mexico, Senor and Senora Madero, his father and mother, and Ernesto Madero, his uncle, arrived here last evening. There was a great demonstration when the Mexican refugees landed.

MOTHER OPPOSES THE GENERAL OF SUFFRAGISTS New York, March 1.—Among the members of the anti-suffragist party making a trip to Washington to protest against the suffragist demonstration at Mrs. Oliver L. Jones, mother of "General" Roosevelt and of the marching suffragists.

CURE FOR POOR AS WELL AS THE RICH

Dr. Friedmann to Conduct Public Clinic in New York Offices for two Weeks, Beginning on Monday

(Canadian Press) New York, March 1.—The widespread attention drawn to the tuberculosis serum of Dr. Friedrich Friedmann, German bacteriologist, may be brought to a public clinic where the poor as well as the rich will be treated, the serum to be administered free to those who cannot afford to pay for it. It is declared that physicians will be invited to attend the clinic, to assist in diagnosing the cases and to watch them afterward and learn Dr. Friedmann's method.

He has said that within a week the beneficial effects of the serum will be apparent. The doctor says that more than 5,000 applications for treatment have been received.

Toronto, March 1.—"We are greatly interested in what we have heard of Doctor Friedmann's tuberculosis cure, but as we have no money for the purpose we feel that we should like to see the serum in operation. We would like to see some one to investigate and if there is a virtue in the cure, Dr. Friedmann could be invited to come over," said Hon. Adam Beck yesterday.

Mr. Beck is president of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, the Royal Alexandra Sanatorium and the London Health Association.

SEVEN MONTHS OLD BABE FALLS INTO BOILING WATER

Sackville, March 1.—A distressing accident occurred at Duxbury Point, near Grand Smeagoe on Wednesday last, which resulted in the death of the seven months' old child of Mr. and Mrs. Duddy Duxy. The little one was placed in a high chair by the stove to get warmed, and was left in the care of an older child, and in some manner the child fell head foremost into a pot of boiling water on the stove. The child's head and neck were badly scalded. A doctor was summoned, and everything possible done to save the life of the child, but death occurred about two hours after the accident.

London, March 1.—Home Secretary McKenna, in answering criticisms of action taken in releasing Lilian Lenton, who, with another suffragette, Joyce Locke, set fire in Kew Gardens, said his action was taken because Miss Lenton was in imminent danger of death owing to her refusal to take food. Her release was conditional on her undertaking to surrender for trial when she was well enough.

MCCARTHY BROKE AWAY ONCE MORE

Another Lad With Him From Industrial Home

WAS ON BREAD AND WATER

Bigamy Charge Hearing Must Go Over Again—Policeman Gives Evidence of Character of Erin Street House

(Canadian Press) Lawrence McCarthy, aged 16, was arrested on the public court this morning on the charge of attempting to escape from the Boys' Industrial Home at East St. John last week. McCarthy, got out of the building by climbing out of a window. They were found hiding in the hay loft of a nearby barn about twenty minutes after they had escaped.

The witness said that McCarthy had told him that McCarthy had been put on a bread and water diet yesterday on account of his bad behavior. When asked by the court if he wanted to go to Dorchester, McCarthy said that he would rather go there than stay at the Industrial Home on bread and water. He was remanded to jail until he would be taken before Judge Forbes.

Hearing in the case of Joseph Stewart, charged with bigamy, was to have been resumed this morning, but on application of E. S. Ritchie, a further adjournment was granted. He said that he was endeavoring to have a witness come here from Toronto to give evidence, and that he probably would be able to go on with the case next week. Mr. Logan, for the defense, consented. The adjournment was granted with the understanding that if the prosecution is not ready to go on with the case by next Saturday, the prisoner will be released.

William Forster, charged with stealing a pair of boots and shoes from the Y.M.C.A. in the police court. He was remanded to jail until he would be taken before Judge Forbes.

May Johnston, charged with keeping a disorderly house in Erin street was remanded to jail until he would be taken before Judge Forbes.

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Angus Mackay Dead; Former Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in Moncton

Moncton, March 1.—Angus Hugh Mackay, secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in Moncton, N. B., died yesterday. He was longed for by his friends. He was employed on the I. C. R. at West River, and Hopedale, later on he engaged in the Y. M. C. A. work being secretary at Pictou, N. S., Moncton, N. B., and afterwards in Hamilton, Ont.

Moncton, N. B., March 1.—Mr. Mackay came here in the fall of 1890 and assisted in securing subscriptions for the new Y. M. C. A. building. He was the first secretary of the association in Moncton.

CONDEMNED MURDERERS PELTED WITH CONFETTI

Paris, March 1.—The auto bandits condemned to death were transferred today to the State Prison, where the execution will take place. The four who were sentenced to be guillotined, were placed in chains and hoisted into a van, which was escorted by a squad of mounted police. The mob which was taking part in the carnival, pelted the van with confetti. The incident was typically Parisian.

The general opinion is that the acquittal of the three women was a gross miscarriage of justice.

MRS. CORNWALLIS WEST CASE TO BE TAKEN UP NEXT WEEK

New York, March 1.—A Tribune cable from London says: Mrs. George Cornwallis West had petition for restitution of conjugal rights against her young husband set for hearing on Monday. Application was made in private chambers before the divorce judge today for the case to be expedited on her behalf. The judge instructed that the action be placed first on the next week.

"I did not inflict any injuries whatever to the boy, said the superintendent, and if he had any cut on his head, it was a fall from a window."

STRIKE ROW IN BOSTON STREET

Police Club Way Through and Escort Strike Breakers to Benches—May be Trouble in Montreal

(Canadian Press)

Boston, March 1.—A party of non-union workers who have taken the places of the striking men garment workers, were attacked by a crowd of several hundred persons as the men arrived at the shops today. Several persons were injured and one was carried away in an ambulance. Police reserves clubbed their way through the crowd and, rescuing the assaulted ones, gave them safe escort to their benches. They then turned their attention to the strike sympathizers who were handled roughly before they gave way. Two of the crowd were arrested.

Montreal, March 1.—Nearly 1,000 operators, a large percentage of them women and girls, members of the Cloak and Skirt Makers' Union of Montreal, will walk out in a body if the union on Tuesday, definitely decides to call a general strike. Higher wages and better working conditions will be the incentive to the walk-out, if it takes place.

EARL OF ASHBURNHAM SAILS FOR CANADA

Frederickton, March 1.—The Earl of Ashburnham, who has been in England looking after his estates, sailed for Canada yesterday.

The value of goods entered at this port during February was \$88,670, and the duty collected was \$2,050. For the corresponding month last year the imports totalled \$72,734 and the duty was \$4,984, which was \$1,662 less than for February 1912.

ON GROUND OF VALUE IN CITY DEVELOPMENT

An effort is being made to enlist the support of the Board of Trade in aid of the Suburban Railway project on the ground that the extensions which the company propose to undertake would be of great value in assisting the development of the city.

HON. MR. HUGHES GIVES A BRILLIANT MILITARY DINNER

Ottawa, March 1.—The minister of militia, Hon. Col. Sam Hughes, laid out a brilliant banquet in the House of Commons restaurant.

The Duke of Connaught praised the splendid spirit that he found everywhere existing among the millionaires of the city. There was an noble work done by preparing oneself to defend the native land.

Hon. Colonel Sam Hughes said that there were now upwards of 50,000 men in Canada desiring to enroll in the militia, but could not be received because there was not sufficient equipment.

GERMANY TO SPEND MUCH ON HER NAVY AND ARMY

Berlin, March 1.—According to the Lokal Anzeiger, the new German military bill involves an expenditure of nearly a billion marks (about \$250,000,000), spread over three or four years, and thereafter there will be an annual increase in the army budget of from 200,000,000 to 250,000,000 marks. The newspaper says a large part of the billion marks will be devoted to building forts on the eastern frontier and that 10,000,000 marks will be used for new barracks.

The Vorwaerts covers its front page this morning with a protest to the German and French socialist parliamentarians against the heavy burdens of taxation proposed in Germany and France for military purposes.

McCarthy Tells Story to Court—Superintendent Denies Part of It

McCarthy was brought before Judge Forbes this morning. His Honor asked him to explain what the trouble was. He said that when he went back to the institution the other day he was given bread and water for his meals; on Thursday he had had the customary meals and when Mr. McDonald saw him putting molasses on his bread and not being given the bread and water diet, and he replied that he was not ordered to have bread and water; whereupon the superintendent told him that he would that that time on.

McCarthy said he then told another lad in the institution that he had been put on bread and water and had been beaten up. The other lad said he would go with him and McCarthy told him he could come or stay as he pleased. His Honor then asked the boy if he had been insolent or had done anything wrong since he had gone back and the boy said that he was given bread and water for escaping the first time. Mr. McDonald, he said, accused him this morning of winking at the other boy across the table but he did not, he said.

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SEES PEACE TIME DRAWING NEAR

London Paper Reports Situation Brighter

TURKEY'S CASE TO POWERS

Story That They Will Treat For Her With Allies—Blizzard Interferes With Fighting—Krupp Guns For Turks

(Canadian Press) London, March 1.—The Daily Telegraph claims special information regarding the Turco-Balkan situation in which it is said that peace is nearer than at any time since the beginning of the conflict on December 3. Turkey is about to enter her cause unconditionally to the powers, who will treat directly with the allies.

The Daily Telegraph's correspondent at Bucharest telegraphs that Rumania has absolutely refused the suggestion of the powers to arbitrate the dispute between Rumania and Bulgaria instead of to mediate.

A despatch to the Times, from Constantinople says that a blizzard has blown for four days over the Gallipoli peninsula and the eastern theatre of war, rendering rapid military movements impossible. Both armies are suffering from the cold and another result of the weather has been the temporary breaking up of Enver Bey's army, and the stopping of any attempt of the Greeks to land at Belek Bay or Avlona.

According to a despatch to the Chronicle from Constantinople, the Krupp has supplied to Turkey eighteen batteries of four guns each on credit. The correspondent says heavy firing was heard in the region around Balair on Thursday night.

Athens, Greece, March 1.—Heavy losses were inflicted on a Turkish detachment which was routed yesterday by a Greek force near Volos, to the north of the fortress of Corin, after a severe battle, according to despatches published here.

The fight is said to have lasted six hours and the Greeks declare that they buried on the field 112 Turks, including eight officers, besides taking 130 prisoners. The Greek losses are given as "only four wounded," but independent observers here regard the story with some skepticism.

Bombs From Airship

Berlin, March 1.—The Zeppelin airship Hines made a bomb dropping today yesterday. The bombs hit fixed targets every time while the soldiers tried in vain to locate the airship.

The funeral of David Lorch took place this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from his late residence, Paradise Row. The body was taken to Holy Trinity church where Rev. J. J. Walsh conducted the burial services. Interment was in the old Catholic cemetery. Mr. Lorch's five sons acted as pall bearers. Among a cross of roses from the employees of Manchester, Robinson, Allison, Ltd., a cross of roses from the members of the St. Vincent's Rest Club and a wreath of bay leaves and purple violets from Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Golding.

The funeral of Donald G. Mackenzie, who died in the General Public Hospital, had officiated and interment was in Fernhill.

COUNTY COURT

The hearing in the case of Hum Ying vs. Hum Foo was commenced this morning before Judge Forbes and the following jury—John A. Davidson, Thomas J. Finnigan, John Kingsmill, S. H. Sherwood, Jr., and Fred S. Stewart. This is an action brought to recover \$120 on promissory notes. The defendant alleges conspiracy and says the notes were forged. The plaintiff Hum Bo Thomas and Hum Ging were examined this morning, closing the plaintiff's case. The court adjourned until this afternoon. D. Mullin, K. C. is for the plaintiff and J. A. Barry for the defendant.

WAS BORN IN ST. ANDREWS

The death of J. Frederick Babcock, retired dentist of Bangor, occurred on Thursday night. Dr. Babcock was one of the best known retired professional men of the city and had a wide circle of friends and acquaintances. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Babcock, and was born in St. Andrews, N. B., in 1846; his parents removing to Bangor when he was very young.


The annual social of the Sunday school and congregation of St. David's church was held last evening. Supper was served and an interesting programme followed.

**Soft Water a Beautifier**

Since in most cases one might as well attempt to catch and house a rainbow as the water that falls upon us from the clouds, we must try to be practical and concentrate our thoughts on water softeners.

Borax and ammonia are frequently used to soften water, but a great many people prefer to buy the ready prepared compounds which come in dainty bottles and jars and sell for a trifle. These "softeners" are usually cleverly riddled off so that one may know exactly what amount of powder to use in a given quantity of water.

A dainty lotion which, when added to hard water, renders it ideal for bathing purposes, is made, by combining, in two ounces of alcohol, one-half dram oil of lavender and one-half of an ounce of ammonia.

It will suffice to add one teaspoonful of this compound to a large basinful of water.



**Daily Hints For the Cook**

**PEACH CUSTARD PIE.**

Have the peaches and place in pie plate after lining it with pie crust canned peaches will do if you haven't the fresh. Put a little sugar into the center of each half-peach. Then make custard as for custard pie, and pour over peaches, filling the dish (deeper the better), and bake as usual.

**CHOCOLATE COOKIES.**

Cheap and good. Beat to a cream nearly a cup of shortening, gradually beat into this 1 cupful of sugar; then add 1 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon of cinnamon and 3 tablespoons of cocoa. Now add 1 well-beaten egg and 1/2 a teaspoon of soda dissolved in 2 tablespoons of milk. Stir in flour to roll and bake in a quick oven.

**IN THE LEGISLATURE**

**The Street Railway and Rodney Wharf—Agricultural School—The Oyster Bill**

Fredericton, Feb. 28—Two bills relating to the budget were taken up when the house sat this afternoon. These were the measures to increase the salaries of the premier and the clerk of the executive council.

The measure to establish the agricultural school at Speack in accordance with the provisions of the federal grant was introduced by Dr. Landry.

Some opposition to the bill to promote the cultivation of oysters developed and the territory to be leased was limited by excluding Kent county, and part of the coast in Westmorland county.

There was a sharp discussion between F. R. Taylor, representing the St. John Railway Company and Mr. Baxter, M. P. for St. John, regarding a bill requiring the St. John Railway Company to provide for protection at the company's expense on Rodney Wharf. Hon. John E. Wilson took the stand that the company should not only provide protection but assume liability for the accident. This bill and that concerning the appointment of the chief of police of St. John will be heard in committee again tomorrow.

Dr. Price presented a petition in favor of bills respecting taxation and water rates of Hampshire Unimolable Underwear, Ltd., and Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company in Moncton.

Hon. Mr. McLeod submitted a statement of the bonded debt of the city and county of St. John, and the annual report of the Hotel Des, Fredericton.

Dr. Price presented a petition in favor of a bill to authorize the city of Moncton to sell and convey certain lands in the city and parish of Moncton.

Hon. Mr. McLeod presented a petition of the county of York in favor of a bill to authorize the appointment of a stipendiary or police magistrate and the erection of a lock-up in the parish of McLeod.

Dr. Price presented petitions in favor of bills to amend the act incorporating the city of Moncton and relating to salvage corps and fire police of Moncton.

Mr. Stewart (Northumberland) presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the town incorporation act, inasmuch as it is related to the town of Bathurst.

Hon. Dr. Landry introduced a bill to establish agricultural schools in New Brunswick. He explained that the bill met the desire of the federal minister of agriculture in asking that subsidies granted the various provinces for agriculture should be used as largely as possible for agricultural education. He read the first paragraph of the bill, which would afford honorable mention to the idea of what was proposed to undertake at agricultural schools. It was the intention to give instruction in the theory and practice of agriculture, horticulture, forestry characteristics, care and management of farm animals, butter and cheese making, domestic science and other matters relating to farming interests.

Dr. Price presented petitions in favor of bills to authorize the city of Moncton to issue debentures for the construction of permanent streets and sidewalks and for other purposes, and relating to the purchase of the Moncton Exhibition Association property.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer presented a petition of the Charlotte county council in favor of a bill to fix a valuation for assessment purposes of Canadian Sardine Co. Ltd.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced bills respecting the executive council and the clerk of the executive council.

Dr. Price presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the act relating to levying of rates and taxes in the city of Moncton. The house went into committee, with Mr. Stewart (Gloucester) in the chair, and considered a bill to amend the Lancaster sewerage act. Progress was reported.

The house went into committee with Mr. White (Victoria) in the chair, and agreed to a bill relating to the estate of Lewis P. Fisher, of the town of Woodstock; also a bill to confirm in Elizabeth Combesher title to certain real estate in the town of Campbellton, with amendments.

This mammoth organization, founded by Dr. Charles Harris, representing forty or more London choirs, which opened the Empire Festival in 1910 and the Shakespeare Exhibition last year, has been invited by the Ghent Exhibition authorities under the auspices of King Albert and the Belgian government, to appear at the Ghent Universal and International Exhibition next May. The Imperial Choir on this occasion will consist of 2,000 singers, and they will give two concerts entirely of British music. The concerts will take place in the Grand Halle des Beaux Arts. The choir will be the guests of the city during their stay in Ghent. The full strength of the Imperial Choir is 4,200 voices.

Home Rule For Ontario Municipalities London, Ont., March 1—Assessment reform was discussed at some length by the Associated boards of trade yesterday and by a small majority it was decided to ask the government to adopt legislation allowing the municipalities some measure of local option in the matter of legislation.

Russia's Pressure on Finland Helsinki, Finland, March 1—The news from Russia marks a new and significant advance in her persistent efforts to undermine Finland's constitutional liberties. THE PROBLEM OF CRIME

Much has been written of late about the value of the parole system and of the humane and sympathetic treatment of persons convicted of crime. There can be no doubt that kinder methods of dealing with such persons have produced results which fully justify the policy, when it is judiciously administered. There are, however, times, however, and occasionally the fact that too much leniency has been unwisely extended causes a reaction and leads to deductions not wholly justified. This emphasizes the fact that each case must be dealt with on its merits, for there are certain persons who have no intention of living a better life, and who welcome leniency as something which enables them to continue in their evil course. The parole system has been much favored and much practiced in Chicago of late, and evidently there has not been a reasonable discrimination.

A municipal judge recently made the assertion that "almost any crook may escape punishment by parole or otherwise." When his statement was challenged he gave the record of a man who in twelve years was once convicted of assault, six times convicted as a pickpocket and arrested four other times on the same charge, but who had never served a term in prison. He was either paroled or fined or released on bond. It is charged that crime is increasing in Chicago. Perhaps if the authorities were a little more careful in selecting the subjects for parole or for lenient treatment, there would be a different story to tell.

One cannot, however, give thought to this subject without viewing it from another angle and considering the question of prevention. That takes us back to the period of the boyhood of those who have become the criminals of the country, and brings us forward again to a consideration of the manner of life of the boys of today who may become the criminals of tomorrow. What is society doing for the benefit of these boys as an insurance against the crimes which may be committed if society remains indifferent to their welfare? We have in the city of St. John today many hundreds of boys growing up with very little consideration on the part of the majority of people as to whether they shall be good citizens or the opposite. Many of them have home surroundings which will not tend to develop in them the best traits of character. Outside of the churches and the Sunday schools there are many children who should be befriended by somebody, and there are many youths and young men who would be the better if older persons would manifest a kindly personal interest in their welfare at a period in their life when they are peculiarly amenable to temptation. It is a pity saying that a course of prevention is better than a pound of cure, but it is eternally true.

NO FAITH IN CANADA

The British government has got itself into a tight place in connection with the naval bill. It is attempting to persuade parliament and the country that the cost of constructing vessels in Canada would be prohibitive. Everybody would agree with the statement that the cost would be somewhat greater at the outset, but a great industry would be established, and that is an important consideration. Mr. Borden submitted certain figures which he said were compiled by experts of the marine department, and certain other figures supplied by the shipyard. Hon. Dr. Pugsley promptly pointed out that the tender submitted by Cammell, Laird & Company for constructing the vessels at St. John was about \$800,000 less per vessel than Mr. Borden's estimate. An attempt to get from the government the basis of their estimates was not successful. In the end Mr. Borden promised to look around and see what information he could get on this point. Dr. Pugsley again reminded the government that at Quisey, Mass., immense ship yards are today constructing the largest vessels where twelve years ago there was an open field. Mr. MacDonald, of Pictou, directed the attention of the house to the fact that Australia is beginning to construct her own naval vessels, and added that what Australia can do can be done by Canada. The government got decidedly the worst of the argument in yesterday's debate.

SATURDAY, MARCH FIRST.

The Hon. J. P. B. Casgrain, senator of the Dominion of Canada, reaches his forty-eighth birthday today. Born at Quebec, he became a civil engineer and was for several years chief engineer of the Montreal and Pacific Railway. He has always been interested in transportation problems and is the author of a book "The Transportation Problems of Canada." He was called to the senate in 1900 and was chairman of the railway committee of that body.

His Honor H. T. Kelly, justice of the High Court of Ontario, was born on March 1, 1838, in Simcoe County, and after graduating at the University of Toronto, took up the practice of law, entering into partnership with the Hon. J. J. Foy. He has taken a deep interest in the affairs of the Toronto public library and was for several years chairman of its board. He was elevated to the bench in 1912.

SUNDAY, MARCH SECOND.

The Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of public works in the Borden cabinet, is forty-nine years of age today. He was born at Lakeside, Que., and went west as a young man, where he engaged in mercantile pursuits. From 1890 to 1911 he represented Manitoba in the Manitoba legislature, during most of which time he was minister of public works. On the accession of the Conservatives in 1911, he became minister of the interior at Ottawa, and took his present portfolio on the resignation of Hon. Mr. Monk.

His Honor W. E. Middleton, justice of the high court of justice of Ontario, is fifty-three today. He was born in Toronto on March 2, 1860. He became a barrister and actively practiced his profession in Toronto for several years prior to going on the bench. He was regarded as a leader of the Ontario bar and was entrusted with many important cases. He became a judge in 1910.

Lieut. Col. L. Edye, a retired army officer of long experience, now resident in Montreal and actively associated with numerous interests there, was born on this date, 1848, at Rio de Janeiro. He entered the Royal Marine in 1869 and reached his colonelcy in 1895, retiring in 1897. He saw much service in the Sudan. He is also a barrister and author of two books on military subjects. He is now commissioner in Montreal of the Trust and Loan Company of Canada.

### TOWN PLANNING

"Canadian cities, towns and villages are growing swiftly, without planning any convenient street system," said T. D. Le May in a paper on "Diagonal Street Surveys in Great Britain and Canada," at the Ontario Land Surveyor Association's annual convention in Toronto this week. "The larger cities are now beginning to consider a re-arrangement of their streets on the diagonal system. The smallest village should be laid out properly, for the villages of today are the towns and cities of tomorrow. When they have reached a certain stage of expansion it is a matter of expense and inconvenience to alter their street systems."

Mr. Le May illustrated his address with plans of such cities as Paris, Vienna, Berlin, Washington and Philadelphia. In these places there are diagonal street systems, which greatly increase the access to different points in the city.

**Rumored Change in Borden Cabinet**  
Advices from Ottawa to Montreal state that the Hon. L. P. Pelletier, postmaster general, is about to resign and will be succeeded by Hon. P. K. Blondin, deputy speaker of the House of Commons. The proposed successor to Mr. Blondin, is Dr. Paquet, M.P. for L'Islet. The reason given for the resignation of Mr. Pelletier


is the continued antagonism with which he is met by the Quebec members. It is thought that the county of St. Maurice would be in favor of a contribution to the navy on the Borden plan and there Mr. Blondin would seek re-election and test the feeling of the province of Quebec regarding the navy in 1908. Mr. Blondin was elected as a staunch Nationalist, and in 1911 he opposed the Laurier navy. Hon. L. P. Pelletier would keep his seat in the house for a while after which he would be appointed to the bench.

## TAKE LITTLE ORPHANS FROM MURDER SCENE

Three Montreal Tots Have New Kind-faced Mothers to Take Care of Them

(Montreal Star).  
Three little testamental orphans were put to bed last night next door to the house in which their father and mother, Frang Vautour and his wife, were murdered in Point St. Charles last Sunday. Three little bright-eyed orphans awoke this morning in new homes, with new kind-faced mothers bending over them, with new clothes awaiting them, and everything around them like a fairy-land of which children dream.

Women yearning for little children in their own homes eagerly competed last night for the possession of these three orphans. Inside of an hour three of the women were successful; the three little children whose adoption was decided upon were forthwith awakened, and before they could really understand what was happening to them they were being carried away to new surroundings.

Far removed from the scene of the terrible tragedy which has been hanging over them, the children will now be reared in separate homes and the memory of the crime will gradually be forgotten amid happier surroundings.

First to carry off her adopted child triumph was Mrs. Gedeon LeBlanc, of 189 St. Dominique street. It was a little boy she wanted, and so little six-year-old Gilbert, of the chubby face, was decided upon.

All Were Excited  
Little Albert had to say good-bye to his twin sister, Bella, and this was a sad parting, indeed, but they kissed one another bravely, although both were too excited to know exactly what all the commotion was about.

Next, Mrs. Wilfrid Morin, of 687 Ontario street, Montserrat, arrived on the scene, being directed to the house by Captain Coleman, of the Grand Trunk street station. She, too, wanted a little boy, and when she looked at four-year-old Edwidge asleep in his cot, the kind woman bent forward and kissed him on the forehead. Opening his sleepy eyes in wonder, Edwidge was taken from his cot, given over to Mrs. Morin, and taken out in the night to his new home.

Already one of the twins had disappeared, and soon the other was to go. It was an exciting night for Mrs. Raymond, the aunt of the six orphans, for the door-bell rang again, and another kind-faced woman entered the house in the person of Mrs. Martignac, of 22 Fabre street, and she forthwith decided that six-year-old Bella was to be her daughter, and that no other would do, so Bella, too, left the scene of the tragedy, as her twin brother had done a few minutes before, only it was to a separate home.

Such a scene as this rush for adoptions has never before been equalled in Point St. Charles, the police say.

Now only three of the orphans are left behind, but three-year-old Germaine will soon follow her example, because Mrs. Joseph Labelle has already set her heart

on the youngest child, and will return in a few days for her.

**Fidest For Institutions**  
That will leave only the two oldest children, Theodore and Victor, aged nine and seven. As their father had a \$1,500 insurance policy, they will be well looked after, and will soon be sent to an institute to have their education looked after.

In their new homes, it is believed, that the other children will soon forget about the terrible crime which bereft them of both their parents at once. At least, the memory of the scene last Sunday will soon grow dim, like a vague dream of the past.

Meanwhile, the police announced this morning that not a single new discovery tending to solve the crime had been discovered since the inquest was adjourned last Sunday, and the guilt of Fred Mitchell, the uncle, arrested for the murder seems clearer than ever.

The fire started about five o'clock and the all out alarm was not sounded until after six. The barn was rented by Charles Crawford who had four horses and several wagons and sleighs in it. Mr. Crawford went to the barn shortly before five o'clock and on going to the hay loft found it ablaze. An alarm was rung in and the department responded quickly.

The fire had gained considerable headway the flames having reached the portion of the log where about three tons of hay was stored. The firemen managed to keep the fire confined to the barn. Several times it looked as if the adjoining houses, occupied by several families, would catch, but the good work of the department prevented greater damage.

The four horses were rescued with some little difficulty, but the wagons and sleighs were damaged. Mr. Crawford places his loss at several hundred dollars. The building was insured. It is not known how the fire started.

A Fredericton special to the Times says: D. B. Donald and Frank J. Talking to the Times correspondent this morning Messrs. Leonard and Donald said that the proposed league would be recognized by the large clubs and it would be in a position to sell its players to other leagues.

HUGH McCORMICK'S FAST MILE IN "VIC"

His Brother Ralph Recalls Race With Dowd

NORTH END FIRE ALARM

A New Turn is Given Matter By Salvage Corps Men's Request—Temple of Honor Band Re-engages Leader

It has been said by some since the championship meet held on Thursday evening in the Victoria rink, that the time made in the mile race between Blyden and McLean was but four seconds slower than that by Hughie McCormick, as the rink record some twenty or more years ago. Chatting last evening at his home in Main street with a Times' reporter, Ralph McCormick, brother of the former champion, said that Hughie had never skated for the rink record, but he thought the race referred to was a five mile match with Dowd, a flyer from Montreal.

Many of the older followers of the sport in St. John will recall this race. It was witnessed by a large concourse of people. McCormick at that time was the idol of St. John skating fans, as it was just about that time that he was given a valuable gold watch by admiring citizens, and the various other testimonials in honor of his performance on the blades. The race started with Dowd soon forging into the lead. Both men were whistling by the crowd of onlookers like a speeding train past telegraph poles. In the twelfth lap of the five mile McCormick caught Dowd, but instead of passing him, stayed behind until nearing the finish of the five miles, when he forged ahead and won.

In this first mile there were two laps to go before it would have been completed, but McCormick slackened his speed somewhat when he caught Dowd and thus his time was slower for the mile than it would otherwise have been, had he continued with the same magnificent stroke as in the first twelve laps. There were watches in the crowd, and his time was taken at the end of the fourteen laps as 2:32, allowance, naturally, not being made for the two laps which had been diminished slower than the others. It was the belief of all his friends that had McCormick stated the finish of that race as he was going when he caught Dowd in the twelfth lap, he would have established a record of 2:20, if not lower. He did not, however, know that his time was being taken, or that it might later be given as the rink record.

In those days, said his brother, Ralph, last evening, it was more difficult to make watches in the crowd. Posters set along the course, standing three or four feet high, instead of the blocks which are now in use, and it was necessary to allow from eighteen inches to twenty-four in order to pass them at a safe distance, whereas now the blocks can be skinned very closely. Some of the skaters, said Mr. McCormick, had the art down so fine that they could fairly graze the poles in getting by, knowing within the fraction of an inch just how much leeway to allow to pass without striking.

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

MR. HAZEN PUT ON HIS DEFENCE

Dr. Pugsley Brings Him To Task in House

BLOW STRUCK AT ST. JOHN

The Cancelling of the Plans For Shipbuilding Here—Sir Wilfrid Says St. John Would Have Had Works if Liberals Were Returned

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—At the opening of today's sittings, Hon. Dr. Pugsley drew the attention of the government to the needs of St. John. He asked Premier Borden and Hon. Mr. Hazen if the government had taken any action on the request of St. John for increased accommodation for shipping, and wanted to know if he had been approached by the city authorities for increased wharf accommodation upon the western side of the harbor.

He said that one of the great needs of the port was for a powerful crane to assist in the loading and discharging of heavy cargo. The commerce of the port was growing rapidly and there was real need for additional facilities. In reply, Hon. Mr. Hazen said that he understood the matter had been called to the attention of the government and was receiving its consideration. He understood that representatives of St. John were making arrangements to discuss all of these matters with the minister of public works. At present he could not go further than to say that these matters were being considered by the government.

Dr. Pugsley—"Would the honorable gentleman say that these matters are being favorably considered by the government?" Mr. Hazen said that some of the matters mentioned were subject for fair consideration. Hazen's Hard Blow to St. John. There was a warm exchange between Hon. Dr. Pugsley and Hon. Mr. Hazen in parliament tonight. Hon. Dr. Pugsley arranged the Borden government for the former secretary of the United States treasury, A. J. Stewart, of the York Card & Paper Company, York; C. H. Hutchins, of the Crompton Knowles Loan Works, and Mr. Lathrop, of the Leigh Coal and Navigation Company; H. O. Risout has been conducting the investigation for the capitalists.

Dealing with the government claim that shipyards could not be established in Canada, Dr. Pugsley urged Premier Borden to visit Quincy (Mass.), before he repeated the statement, and personally inspect the Fore River Company's works there. 

(c) Cost of living to the workmen, with a sufficient minimum wage to meet the necessities of the workman and his family as a first change upon the industry.

The scheme has not yet been submitted to the workmen for their consideration. At the last annual meeting of the federation such proposals were not even mentioned.

The National Council of the Miners' Federation of Great Britain is not tied down to the execution of the instructions of the annual delegate meeting. It is well within its power and practice to initiate as well as to carry out changes; and in an unofficial way some reforms as those referred to in the present variation as between one district and another.

But this is the first occasion on which the Miners' Federation of Great Britain have officially identified themselves with the movement and given expression to it in a definite set of proposals, and this step probably will be to take the views of the organized miners of the country. It is not likely that that step will be taken immediately. Action, except perhaps by way of academic discussion, may be delayed till the more important of the agreements now in force expire, but according to Mr. Brace the proposals mentioned present "the considered judgment" of the executive authority of the Miners' Federation of Great Britain, and he warns the coal owners of the country that they will be expected to "treat them in a serious manner."

Mrs. Asquith's Speech

Mrs. Asquith, wife of the prime minister, was one of those present at a meeting held at the residence of G. Spencer Pryse, River Court, Hammeath, recently, on behalf of the Hammeath House Club, a social and educational settlement, whose accommodation has become inadequate.

Mrs. Asquith said it was no platitude to say that the work of the club was a noble work. It was not only good, but necessary and inevitable. The future had a terrible problem for her. The rich were sometimes quite willing to help the poor, but they did not understand how to set about it. The rich ought to help the poor. She knew women who had never been inside a hospital, an asylum, or the law courts, or the House of Commons. In fact, they knew nothing about anything. They were good wives and mothers, nice, delightful women, very kind, who would willingly do something, but they did not know what to do.

Whether government was in power, whether Liberal or Conservative, they were thwarted and opposed by every kind of human being, from the shopkeepers up to the bishops. She did not understand exactly why people who were loyal to the Bible and were really deeply religious did not remember the command, "Love thy neighbors as thyself." Some people did not see that, because they did not know how much they loved themselves; but others knew how much they loved themselves.

People were told not only to love their neighbors, but to love their enemies. What a bomb it must have been when the Lord said that. This was the time when there was work to be done, and the rich should be asked to do what they could.

THE BUSINESS END OF BASEBALL

By CHRISTY MATHEWSON, of the New York Giants

In considering the business end of baseball there are two angles, to be taken into account—the player's and the owner's. In writing this story, I am going to try to look at both sides squarely and relate facts without favoring either interest. Of course, I have my opinions, but it is my job, in this article, to set down the facts and let the reader draw his own conclusions.

Playing baseball eats into your leisure considerably more than is generally supposed. The actual playing during the week ends is not so bad, but the real work of the player begins at ten o'clock, when they are at home, and for about half of the season include in morning practice every day. Always the players must report in the mornings. Then they return to their homes, but they are back at the park in New York by half past two on the days there is a single game, and by half past twelve on the days when there are two games. The morning rehearsal is necessarily omitted.



WHAT WOMEN WRITERS READ

Novelists Not Always Found To Be Bookworms

ONE LIKES THE "ADS"

What English Story Tellers Have to Say About Their Favorite Books—Elinor Glyn Hardly Ever Reads a Novel

(London Tit-Bits.)

The idea that famous women novelists are veritable "blue-stockings," whose literary recreation consists of reading the most profound and classical works, is somewhat of a fallacy. Miss Marjorie Brown, for instance, the authoress of those popular romances of history, "The Viper of Milan," "The Glen of Weeping," "The Sword Deeds," etc., candidly confesses that among other things she likes to read the advertisements in the magazine, especially ladies' magazines, and the answers to correspondents in the heart-to-heart and beauty columns. "I love catalogues," she continues, "of old bookshops and museums, and the mystical English poets, Donne, Crashaw, and Vaughan, are included among her favorite reading, while she is so fond of a weakness for reading criticism, trials, and mysteries; "but only the gorgeous, hearty ones—not anything scold or morbid."

Miss M. P. Willcocks, too, appears to have a wide and varied taste in reading. "The one unbearable thing to me," she says, in an interesting symposium article on the subject published in the "Book Monthly," is to have nothing to read, for I can enjoy a sea-man's catalogue or a cookery book. Fielding is her favorite novelist, and George Eliot she knows by heart. "But Dickens and Muffin can still yield a thrill, though, for that, nothing I have ever read can approach Wilkie Collins' 'Moonstone.'"

Personally, Elinor Glyn, "hardly ever read a novel from one year's end to another, and do not know what other novelists—like, Anything, I don't read nearly so much as I used to do. For the moment active life interests me more than books, and I learn most things in this way by contenting myself with the titles of books."

Another great admirer of Thomas Hardy's works is Mrs. C. N. Williamson, who, referring to her husband and herself says that they are both united even in their love for certain authors. "We both care more for George Meredith's novels than any others. A most Olympic person! We are agreed, too, on the subject of Hardy's earlier novels, and could never read 'Far From the Madding Crowd' too often. I am a great reader of novels, though, and my husband isn't. I like to keep up with what is going on in the world of novels, and whenever I see a splendid novel of a new book I buy it. Sometimes, alas! the result is rather disappointing; but I have had great successes, too."

"A judiciously varied diet," writes Mme. Grand, "is recommended as best for the body, and I find in my own case that the same recommendation holds good for the mind. The subject does not matter, that it should be readable—that is to say, made interesting—is all that I ask. The critic's note in condemning a long book, and I understand why, from their point of view—a long book gives them so much more trouble. Personally, I like a long book—one that I can deal with day after day, and far into the night."

Mme. Grand continues that she is a great reader, and in novels her taste is catholic. "But I have moods, and fancy, and certain books which delight me at one time will leave me cold at another. I love 'Pett Ridge,' and I am never without 'Jacob,' Anthony Hope, W. J. Locke, and Edna Phillips satisfy me in varying moods, and long ago I knelt at the feet of Oliver Schreiner; but every now and then I slip away altogether from the modern and go back to my Dickens and to Thackeray, to Walter Scott and to George Eliot, and then once more through the pages of 'Floss' and 'Far From the Madding Crowd' to 'The Oracle' of Richard Ford, and other masterpieces of a more varied mind."




