


farming became more general. The fact that Manitoba has organized such a league ought surely to make more emphatic the demand in New Brunswick for a progressive immigration policy. Af-ter the league had been organized in Winnipeg, the province was divided into districts and each district organized with its own officers and committees. The Manitoba government and the Depart-ment of the Interior at Ottawa were ap-proached and are taking an active inter-est in the movement, as are also the three big railway companies\_operating in the DEFAL DASSION

est in the movement, as are also the three big railway companies operating in the province. The provincial government gave a grant of \$5,000, but funds are also rais-ed by a membership fee of \$1, and in Winnipeg in one day more than 3,500 citi-rans paid \$1 each to become members of the league. The funds will be spent in a general immigration campaign with judi-pious advertising in the old country, and t is proposed to extend the campaign over at least five years.
