CAUSE OF RAID ON METROPOLITAN

Suit Against Police Brings Out New Evidence

WRY INDICATED ROOM

Lucas Says He Told Him He Would be in 28 with Hattie Wheaton—Instructions as to Another House to Break up Intimacy of Girl and Young Man of City

The case of Hopper vs. W. W. Clarke, chief of police and other policemen was resumed in the circuit court this morning before Mr. Justice Barry and a jury.

Policeman Chas. H. Rankine, one of the defendants, was called by Mr. Mullin, he said that Sgt. Campbell was in charge of the party of policemen. He learned at 3 a.m. that he was to make the raid.

Q. How did you affect an entrance? A. I do not know.

Campbell and Lucas, he said, were in the hall. She went to the rear of the building. After this the front door was opened from the inside. The witness did not know who opened the door.

He thought that Campbell had a key but was not positive. After the door was opened he went into a room and found Arthur and Otty Clark, Hattie Wheaton, Besie Ferris and an unknown man in one room.

Who was the other man? A. I heard since it was Rupert Wry. After that the witness took the occupants of the room, with the exception of Wry, to the police station.

Q. Why did you not arrest Wry? A. Lucas said he would look after him. Policeman Rankine then said he went back to the hotel and, with Marshall and Lucas, accompanied by Messrs. Maggie McFarlane, Miss Hopper and Mrs. Goggin to the guard room.

The arrest book containing an entry of the arrest was then put in evidence. That part of the entry relating to Miss Hopper was in the Chief's hand writing.

Cross-Examined Q. Cross examined by Mr. Baxter witness said that the Clark, Hattie Wheaton and Rupert Wry were not dressed. Besie Ferris was dressed and Otty Clark was drunk. Brown and Maggie McFarlane were not dressed.

Mr. Baxter: "What is the reputation of the Metropolitan hotel?" Mr. Mullin: "I object on the ground that the character of the house cannot be established by hearsay evidence."

Mr. Baxter: "It goes to damages; this plaintiff, a girl of good repute, found in a house of ill repute, the damages would be materially reduced."

A long legal argument then ensued and the question was allowed, subject to objection.

Mr. Mullin further contended that the police should have a search warrant before entering this house.

Q. "What is the general reputation of the house?" A. "Bad. Bad girls go there with men."

Q. "Of the Ferris girl?" A. "Bad. She was a reputed street walker. Hattie Wheaton also had a bad reputation. Mabel Nairn, now in gaol. Lou Dillon, a girl named Belong, Lena Adams, Lil Nickerson and others of bad reputation frequented this house."

Q. "Within what time do you say that these people frequented the house?" A. "Within the last year."

Mr. Mullin in re-examination named two respectable citizens who roomed there and asked this witness if he knew anything about them.

Ans. "They are decent people."

Cause of Raid? The witness said that he had heard that the raid was arranged to capture Hattie Wheaton. He also said that Wry was in the deal. This was talked over among the policemen.

The witness said that he had in mind the names of these girls at the time of the raid.

Q. "All of them?" A. "Not all of them."

Q. "Name one."

Ans. "Lou Dillon."

Judge Barry: "Lou Dillon is the name of a fast trotting horse."

The witness said he heard that she frequented the hotel. The first room visited was that occupied by Rupert Wry.

Q. "Were any other rooms visited?" A. "Yes."

Mr. Baxter: "Who instructed you that night?"

Ans. "Sergeant Campbell."

Q. "Anyone else?" A. "No."

Night Detective Lucas Night Detective Lucas was called by Mr. Mullin. A little before midnight, he said, he saw several persons enter the Metropolitan hotel. One of these was Rupert Wry. Wry told him that he would be in Room 28 with Hattie Wheaton. As a result

of this information he kept surveillance of the hotel.

Q. "Did you consult with your superior officer?"

Ans. "No."

Q. "Did you have any conversation with Chief Clarke about this?"

Ans. "Not about the Metropolitan, I had instructions from Chief Clarke to watch Hattie Wheaton in the Brussels street house."

Q. "Did you have any conversation with the chief relating to Rupert Wry?"

Ans. "Wry's name mentioned."

FAMOUS GEMS OF PROSE

PURCHASING SEATS IN IRISH PARLIAMENT

From his criticisms on "the speech from the throne" in the Irish house of commons, January 19, 1792.

THIS new practice whereby the minister of the crown becomes the common borough-broker of the kingdom, constitutes an offence so multitudinous and in all its parts so criminal, as to call for radical reformation and exemplary punishment, whether the persons concerned be Lord Buckingham or his secretary, or those who become the objects of his promotion, because they had been the ministers of his vices. It was a conspiracy against the fundamental laws of the land; and sought to establish, and, in a degree, has established, in the place of a limited monarchy, a corrupt despotism; and if anything rescues the persons so concerned from the name of traitors, it is not the principles of law, but its omission, that has not described by any expressed provisional statute, the patrie of which, these men in intention, and in substance, are guilty. They have adopted a practice which decides the fate of our parliamentary constitution. In vain shall we boast of its blessings and of its three estates, the king, the lords, and the commons, when the king sells one estate to buy the other and so contaminates both. The minister has sent one set of men packing into the peers and another set of men packing into the commons; and the first he calls the hereditary council, and the latter the grand council of the nation, and both, that once great and august institution—the parliament. Such a condition, I say, puts the constitution of Ireland, not below a republic, but any other form of genuine and healthy government.

I allow the British constitution the best, and arraign this model as the worst, because practically and essentially the opposite of the British constitution. The British minister has given an account of the English constitution which he wishes to extend to the Irish constitution; "aristocracy," he says, "reflects lustre on the crown and lends support and effect to democracy, while democracy gives vigor and energy to both, and the sovereignty crowns the constitution with dignity and authority. Aristocracy is poison," he says; "gives an infusion of royalty;" the Irish minister can answer him; he who sold the aristocracy and bought the democracy; he who best understands in practice what is this infusion of nobility; he who has infused poison into this aristocratic and this democratic division of power, and has crowned the whole with corruption;—he well knows all this, as far as Ireland is concerned, to be theatre representation, and that the constitution of the country is exactly the reverse of those scenes and farces which are acted on the public stages of imposture and hypocrisy.

By this trade of parliament the king is absolute; his will is signified by both houses of parliament, who are now as much an instrument in his hands as a bayonet in the hands of a regiment. Like a regiment, we have our adjutant, who sends to the infirmary for the old, and to the brotel for the young; the men thus carted as it were into this house to vote for the minister are called the representatives of the people. Suppose General Washington to ring his bell and order his servants out of livery to take their seats in congress. You can apply this instance.

FRENCH-CANADIANS NEED BRITAIN'S SUPREMACY, SAYS SENATOR CASGRAIN

Under Any Other Flag French Institutions Would Not Flourish in Canada He Maintains—The Nobsicite on the Navy Policy an Insult

(Montreal Herald)

Predicting a closer bond of union between the United States and the British empire, based on Canada's influence, and the naval policy of the government, Senator Casgrain, in a speech made at St. James' Literary Society last evening.

"I believe we can build ships of war in Canada. But we must have shipyards, located near ports, or else inland. We must get experts from the admiralty, and employ our own less skilled workmen. I don't believe in giving our money to foreign workmen. We have the raw material for ship-building. We have the steel in Sydney and the coal, and the nickel. There has been found no substitute for nickel for hardening armor plates."

"In a year we will be celebrating the centennial of peace with the United States. This has been a blessing, a century so important as the Hundred Years' War; this Hundred Years' Peace. If knowing Americans better than they do in England, we could be a bond of union between the two great Anglo-Saxon nations, and could bring them together, what nation would not respect an alliance of the sort? It would make for the peace of the world."

"I believe there is no immediate cause for alarm," said the speaker, alluding in conclusion to the war scare. "When we think of the British empire, we do not need to fear for anything."

THAT OMINOUS SILENCE

The Standard's Ottawa humorist has discovered another great Conservative victory. The Liberals, he says, had expected the Conservatives to cheer the Nationalist, Gilbert, when he was introduced to the house, but they were too shrewd for that, and remained silent, and the disappointed Liberals indulged in suppressed jeers. It may be true that the Conservative party in parliament, with the eye of the country upon it, did not openly applaud the man who carried Drummond-Arthurs' banner on an anti-party platform. They are silent, however, that Mr. Foster and other Conservatives urged the Conservatives in the Quebec constituency to vote for Mr. Gilbert, and it is said that he received the personal congratulations of Mr. Borden on his victory. Moreover, Mr. Borden has only added a loyal rider to the Monk amendment to the address, and finds it otherwise satisfactory. The very silence with which Mr. Gilbert was received in the House should be the best evidence that the Borden-Monk-Bourassa alliance is bad politics, and contains an element of danger to racial harmony in Canada which condemns it as unworthy of popular support. Mr. Borden is playing with fire.

REVOLT AGAINST BORDEN

The Toronto World is a Conservative Journal which cannot follow Leader Borden in his many changes of policy with regard to the navy. "The Conservatives at Ottawa have had two cracks at defining their position in regard to the duty of Canada to herself and to the mother country in connection with naval defence. First of all they joined with the ruling Liberals in a unanimous declaration for a Canadian navy. This was at the opening of last session. Before the end of the session they withdrew from this position and substantially declared for an immediate vote for battleships and a reference of the question of a navy to the people. They are now declaring that nothing be done in the way of a navy until an appeal to the country has been made. This switching of position and this declaration to do nothing but consult the people is an instance of misguiding policy. Political parties must keep their faith as individuals must." For a party that has the reputation of being conservative and pro-British, and that assumed the responsibility of establishing a militia service for this country to say that it has not a policy in regard to its defence other than what the people of the country may decide on any referendum, is a confession of weakness or it may be the straining after the somewhat doubtful object of putting the other fellow in a hole. But it is not good politics for Conservatives or those who believe in responsible government. Mr. Borden will find some difficulty in answering these statements made by a journal of his own party. The more his attitude is considered the less justifiable it appears.

HOME RULE

The Unionists of Ulster threaten that they will not pay rates or taxes imposed by a Dublin parliament, and have subscribed \$50,000 to organize regiments and purchase arms. This announcement will not disturb the government. Irish home rule is not the bugbear it was some twenty-five or thirty years ago. It may be that Mr. Redmond asks too much, but he will get no more than the country is prepared to give, and the majority of the people of the United Kingdom are in favor of some measure of home rule. Ireland at large will be found willing, as an exchange puts it, to accept a legislature compatible with the maintenance of the union and with the supremacy of parliament. 

IRISH CHILD MARKED WITH SYMBOLS OF THE PASSION
Doctors Who Have Seen the Marks Positive They Are Not Self-Inflicted


Dublin, Nov. 29.—The Mayo News publishes an account of a child in Kiltamagh Convent who is marked with the symbols of the Passion. It says:
"A girl, aged 13, so the story goes, has been a boarder in the convent for the past three or four years. She is described as a docile, affectionate child and is a great favorite with the nuns.
"About three weeks ago one of the sisters heard the child screaming during the night, and when she opened her door she found her lying on the floor, her face marked with the symbols of the Passion. The nun comforted the child, who fell asleep.
"In the morning the child complained that her wrists and arms were sore. On examination it was found that her forearm was marked with a cross in red, underneath the cross were the letters 'I. H. S.' A few days later there appeared above the cross a crown of thorns. Two or three days later there appeared above the crown of thorns a chalice surrounded by a Host, sending forth rays in red; and after the same period there appeared a spear-shaped drawing, near which was written the word 'Lily.'
"The marks extend from the wrist to the upper arm, and have been examined by Father O'Riada, P. P., Kiltamagh, Dr. Madden, Kiltamagh, and very many others. A remarkable feature of the occurrence is that at 3 p.m. on Friday the stigmata disappeared. A careful enquiry is being instituted by the religious authorities, who, while admitting the strikingly weird nature of the phenomena, refrain from any expression of opinion as to its origin.
"Dr. Madden and others who have seen the marks are quite positive that they are not self-inflicted."

13,000 TRAINS OF 70 CARS TO HANDLE GRAIN

A United States Consul Reports on the Moving of the Golden Crop From Canadian West

Washington, Nov. 29.—The task of handling grain from the Canadian west to the head of the upper lakes through Fort William and Port Arthur is described in a report by Consul A. C. Seyfert of Owen Sound, Ont., in which he says:
"From Sept. 1, 1909, to Aug. 31, 1910, 89,000,000 bushels of grain passed through these ports; the preceding year 65,000,000 bushels and the year before 47,000,000.
"The combined harbor has 18 grain elevators with a storage capacity of 30,000,000 bushels. The 4,000,000-bushel one belonging to the Grand Trunk Pacific is the largest in the world and the unit of 10 that that railroad is building. The Canadian Pacific has 10,000 cars, or 15,000 trains of 70 cars each. The busy times are the spring and late fall, when 20 to 40 of the great lake freighters are alongside the elevators with grain pouring into the vessels' holds.
"The Canadian government takes an important part in handling the grain at this trans-shipment port. An act of parliament provides for the grading of the grain and government inspectors pass on every carload in the assembling yard before it goes to the elevator for unloading. The grain has must pass one inspection at the starting point, and the second, inspection at the elevator terminal, is performed to confirm the western grade.
"The inspectors are on hand again when the grain is shipped out. They watch the weighing and see that the grade is what is called for. Every car that clears with a cargo of grain carries a certificate signed by a government official showing the quantity and quality of the grain it contains."

MEAT DEALERS GET IN COURT

Two Cases Under Pure Food Act Before Judge Ritchie—O'Neil Brothers and F. E. Williams Co.

Two cases of violation of the pure food law were dealt with this morning in the police court before Judge Ritchie, one against Frank E. Williams & Co., and the other against O'Neil Bros., of the city market. Daniel J. O'Neil and Charles F. O'Neil, on behalf of the latter firm, pleaded guilty, while there was no one present to represent Mr. Williams, although E. H. McAlpine, who appeared for the prosecution, said that he understood a plea of guilty was to be entered in this case also.

The charges against O'Neil Bros. are that they shipped to the West Indies on June 7 last five barrels of pork and four half barrels, without their being inspected, and also that on the same lot they placed government legends or stamps bearing the passmark, "Canada Approves." In the case of Mr. Williams it is charged that he shipped to the West Indies a quantity of pork, and labeled it "fish," the pork not having passed an inspection.

The cases were brought to court through Reginald E. Murray, of Coastville, Ont., travelling inspector appointed by the Dominion government under the meats and canned foods act, in connection with the pure food law. Mr. Murray was in court this morning and said that when the regulation came into force a few years ago copies of the act were distributed broadcast, and he thought every dealer was familiar with it. Although there was no inspector here, it cost nothing to have the matter attended to if application was made in the right way. He asked that a fine be struck.

The full amount of the fine in the charge of shipping without an inspection is \$300, and in the case of selling that wrongfully, \$100. His Honor said he would look into the matter, and the case against Messrs O'Neil was allowed to stand until Monday next at 2 o'clock, while that against Mr. Williams will be heard on Thursday at 9:30 a. m.

MADE HARD FIGHT

Henry Merriman Has Several Charges to Answer, Including Resistance and Tearing Policeman's Coat

Henry Merriman, aged 29, was arrested between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning, by policeman Crawford and Sheehan on a charge of drunkenness, creating a disturbance in his neighbor's home in Charlotte street, resisting the police, and tearing Crawford's coat. The prisoner was remanded.

James Beers was fined \$8, and Stanley George \$4 on charges of drunkenness.

INSURANCE IN THE WOODSTOCK FIRE

A meeting of the representatives of the insurance companies holding risks on the Council machine shop in Woodstock, which was burned yesterday, was held this morning in the fire underwriter's office. It was stated that the total amount of insurance on the plant was \$21,000 and it is expected that the loss will be about 50 per cent. Edgar H. Fairweather was appointed adjuster, and will leave for Woodstock tonight.


