

When Captain Victor Gordon, High Commissioner of Newfoundland in London, presented a pair of binoculars in the name of the Government of Newfoundland to Captain James Gillies, C.B.E., and to Staff Captain R. When the S.S. "Empress of Scotland" was about 270 miles east of Halifax, N.S., the schooner "Clintonia" was observed flying a signal of distress and on approaching closer she was found lying derelict with spars and sails all carried away. Her crew of six men, helpless and perishing with the bitter cold were huddled together among the wreckage. A lifeboat with volunteers in charge of Chief Officer Robert MacMurray, as he then was, was at once launched from the "Empress of Scotland" and, at considerable risk to themselves, they came within hall of the "Clintonia." Realizing the futility of getting the lifeboat alongside owing to the violent pitching of the schooner, Chief Officer MacMurray passed a line and lifebuoy to the men on the schooner's deck, enabling them to the violent pitching of the schooner, Chief Officer MacMurray passed a line and lifebuoy to the men on the schooner's deck, enabling them to flump one by one into the sea and be hauled aboard the lifeboat, and afterwards to safety on the "Empress of Scotland". It was, however, impossible to save the lifeboat, and it shortly afterwards disappeared. The rescue was worthy of the best traditions of the Brotherhood of the Sea, and the Government of Newfoundland recognized how greatly they were indebted to the two gallant British seamen for their splendid services.
