In November, *for the Superannuation Fund.*

An assessment is made *towards Expenses of Synod.* (See page 787, Journal XVII.)

All Parochial Missionary collections should be made in each Parish or Mission, and forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer with lists, *by the 30th April, on which day the Synod Accounts for the year are closed, and sums received after this date cannot be printed in the Treasurer's yearly report.*

It is not safe to send money through the post offices, except in the form of post office order, or by cheque or bank draft, payable to order.

The Secretary of the Executive Committee desires to call special attention to the fact that he acknowledges the receipt of all sums sent to him *on the days on which they come to hand.* If at any time such acknowledgment be not received in due course, the person who made the remittance is requested to notify him without delay, in order that inquiry may be made.

THIRTIETH ANNUAL SESSION
OF THE
SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY, 18TH JUNE, 1889.

The Thirtieth Annual Meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal was held on Tuesday, the 18th day of June, 1889.

The Sermon to the Synod was preached by Rev. Canon Mills, B. D., Rector of Trinity Church, Montreal. The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by Archdeacons Lindsay, Lonsdell and Evans, Rev. Canons Mussen and Mills, and W. H. Naylor, Rural Dean of Clarendon.

The Synod assembled at two o'clock in the Synod Hall, when the session was opened with prayer by the Lord Bishop.

The rolls were called by the Secretaries.

It was moved by DR. NORTON, seconded by RURAL DEAN LONGHURST: That the Rev. Cannon Empson be re-elected Clerical Secretary.—*Carried.*

It was moved by MR. C. GARTH, seconded by MR. WALTER DRAKE: That Mr. Richard White be re-elected Lay Secretary.—*Carried.*

It was moved by CANON ELLEGOOD, seconded by CANON MUSSEN: That Mr. James Hutton be re-elected Treasurer of the Synod.—*Carried.*

It was moved by MR. RICHARD WHITE, seconded by DR. L. H. DAVIDSON: That Messrs. G. W. Simpson and S. C. Fatt be re-elected auditors.—*Carried.*

The Minutes of last Synod were considered as read, and were confirmed.

It was resolved that the Offertory at this morning's service be given to the Mission Fund.

The several committees of Synod were then named (see pages 11—14).

The BISHOP announced that there would be a meeting of the Lay-Helpers Association, on Tuesday evening, at eight o'clock, and that the usual missionary meeting would be held in the Synod Hall on Wednesday evening.

The BISHOP read his address as follows:—

HIS LORDSHIP'S CHARGE.

In delivering his annual charge, the Bishop said:—Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity,—I greet you once more, with hearty thanks to Almighty God, who has brought us so far on our way with every cause for rejoicing. I have my usual

report to make of missions visited and episcopal functions discharged, and everywhere I find health and peace and quiet progress in religious life. In other words our church is doing its work on behalf of the souls of men under circumstances of outward happiness. The year has been free from epidemic sickness, from famine, from great public loss and trial of every kind. I have visited, apart from the city, ninety-five parishes, missions and mission stations, and administered the right of confirmation in seventy-four churches to 828 persons, of whom 321 were men and 507 were women. I have ordained eight deacons and six priests. It is with great satisfaction that I report the consecration of six churches and one burying ground. Four of the churches and the burying ground are in the district of Bedford, namely: St. Philip, South Roxton; St. John, West Shefford; St. John, Eastman; and St. Augustine, East Farnham. This progress in things material speaks well for the earnestness and carefulness of Church people in Bedford district. One mission there has been raised to the rank and independence of a rectory, namely, West Shefford, and another, in the deanery of Hochelaga, has reached the same position. Of the two churches consecrated besides, one was at Leslie, in the mission of Thorne, the generous gift of R. A. A. Jones, Esq., and called St. James, the other was at Lacadie, and called Grace church. The temporalities of the country churches do not in all cases receive quite the attention which is due. I should like to see a greater sense of responsibility on the part of incumbents and church wardens, to whom is committed the care of churches, parsonages and other real estate. It would be well, I think, to appoint a committee on "dilapidations," whose business it would be to enquire into the whole matter, and advise as to the best means for awakening trustees and others to the duty of maintaining the Church property in at least as good a condition as they receive it. The archdeacon is the Church officer to whom the oversight in general appertains, but he needs some machinery of synod to enable him to make practical use of his powers. Church property raised and set apart with devotion and self-denial by one generation must not be neglected and squandered by another. That which comes to us easily we are too apt to treat lightly, and I fear that in some instances a little longer neglect will result in the loss of things substantial necessary to the progress of the Church's external life. Since our last meeting the results of the Lambeth Conference have been published, to the edification of the Church throughout the world. The tone of the encyclical letter is eminently practical, and claims our reverent and intelligent attention. The subjects for discussion were prepared in committee, and then presented to the conference, which, after due consideration, adopted the reports with such modifications as seemed desirable to their united wisdom. I propose now to give you certain extracts from the Encyclical letter, which touch more especially upon our own peculiar needs, while commending the whole document to your grave and careful perusal. The first place in their deliberations is given to the subject of temperance, which strikes the keynote of all the rest, for to temperance is added purity, and to purity the questions concerning the sanctity of marriage, and the difficulty surrounding the heathen practice of polygamy, with its bearing upon the Church's converts in the mission field. On the observance of the Lord's day the Conference speaks as follows:—"The due observance of Sunday as a day of

rest, of worship, and of religious teaching has a direct bearing on the moral well-being of a Christian community. We have observed of late a growing laxity which threatens to impair its sacred character. We strongly deprecate this tendency. We call upon the leisurely classes not selfishly to withdraw from others the opportunities of rest and of religion. We call upon master and employer jealously to guard the privileges of the servant and the workman. In 'the Lord's Day' we have a priceless heritage. Whoever misuses it incurs a terrible responsibility." These questions are then taken up in succession: Socialism, emigration, inter-communion of Churches, and authoritative standards of doctrine and worship. But to return to temperance. It is most encouraging to workers in this portion of the Lord's vineyard to find the highest authorities in the Church fully awake to the importance of their labor. If the Bishops are not all at one concerning the remedies to be applied, they are quite united as to the danger to the Christian community if this madness is to be allowed to increase, unrestricted and unchecked. I will now quote from the Encyclical: "Noble and self denying efforts have been made for many years, within and without the Church, for the suppression of intemperance, and it is our earnest hope that these efforts will be increased manifold. The evil effects of this sin on the life of the Church and the nation can scarcely be exaggerated." The report of the committee styles it "the most mischievous of all sins," and urges upon the Church "the endeavor to ascertain whether any special means can be discovered for effectually dealing with it, or whether it must be left to ordinary agencies used with more than ordinary zeal and persistency." The committee give high but fully deserved praise to Temperance Societies: "The Temperance Societies have compelled the attention of the public at large, and have by so doing profoundly modified public opinion. There can be no doubt that drunkenness is now regarded with much more severe condemnation than before these societies began their work, and the change is largely, if not entirely, due to them. The Temperance Societies have compelled the medical profession to study the subject with more care than before, and the result of this study has greatly influenced both their utterances and their practice. To the Temperance Societies is due the change in the practice of insurance offices. Fifty years ago it was their ordinary rule to require higher premiums from life-insurers who totally abstained from intoxicating liquors. It is now proved that the total abstainers live longer than other men. And this has been confirmed by the experience of the Benefit Societies, among which those that make total abstinence a condition of membership are able to show a much smaller average of sickness than the others. And to all this is to be added the great and still increasing effect of the Bands of Hope which, though in some cases open to objection, are, nevertheless, every year adding largely to the number of pledged abstainers among adults, and bid fair before long entirely to change the public opinion of the classes that live by manual labor." Again they say: "It seems to belong to the Church to use its utmost influence to press on all governments the duty of diminishing the enormous amount of temptation which at present hinders the work of elevating and civilizing the masses. There can be no doubt that wise legislation might do a great deal in this direction. The diminution in the number of public houses, the shortening of the hours of sale, Sunday closing, are instances of legislative mea-

asures that would probably be very beneficial, and a combination between governments might wipe out the grievous stain which now rests on the countries that are counted foremost in the world—the stain of degrading and destroying the weaker races. It has pleased God to make the Christian nations stronger than any other—stronger than all others combined. But this strength brings with it a very solemn responsibility. And this solemn responsibility the Church ought incessantly to press on those who bear authority. It is grievous that it should be possible to say, with any most distant resemblance of truth, that it would be better for native races that Christian nations should never come into contact with them at all. In conclusion, it is of importance to lay much stress on the essential condition of permanent success in this work, namely, that it should be taken up in a religious spirit as part of Christian devotion to the Lord. The work must be done in His name for the sake of His children whom He has bought with His blood.” I should be pleased if you thought fit to devote a brief space of the Synod’s time to the consideration of this subject, founded on the report of your committee. The report on purity was accepted entire “as expressing the mind of the Conference on this great subject.” Temperance and purity are sister virtues, and the practice of the one prepares the way for the habit of the other. I commend this subject to the deep consideration of parents and guardians, with whom more than with any others rest the power, as well as the responsibility, of stopping the beginnings of this sin. It happens often that the young do not fear, because they do not know the evil consequences to themselves of a departure from the line of moral rectitude. The restlessness of youth seeks change and excitement, and not finding it in the monotony of business, or the sameness of home life, looks for it, ignorantly, first in the intoxicating cup or vain parade of finery, and later in evil companionship, and dark, disgusting vice. Society is wrong somewhere, that our young people should find home life irksome, and business life mere drudgery. Pleasure stands on too high a pedestal, and is too distinct (in the mind of youth) from duty and family affection. The natural remedy for much that is wrong lies in early marriage, and for early marriage young men and maidens should be taught to prepare, by the practice of thrifty, industrious habits, moderation in dress, luxury, and other so-called refinements. A prominent place should be given to useful knowledge, order and cleanliness; and a proper self-respect encouraged. These remarks may seem to apply chiefly to the working classes, but I intend them for all individuals in every class of society, wishing to attach themselves to that life of purity, which alone is worthy of a being created in the “image of God.” The vicious in society—those unfortunates whose “sins of impurity,” to use the words of the report, “are not only a grave scandal, but are also festering beneath the surface, and eating into the life of multitudes, in all classes and in all lands, are largely recruited from persons whose gilded youth knew no restraint such as poverty or labor impose, to lay by earnings and prepare for a middle and old age of independence and honor. I will close this part of my review with a rather long but most practical quotation from the report on the subject of purity. “We, on our part, as bishops of the Church of God, satisfied as to the gravity of this matter, and feeling that nothing short of general action on the part of all Christian people will avail to arrest the evil, determine to con-

fer with the clergy and faithful laity of our several dioceses as to the wisest steps to be taken for the accomplishment of the weighty enterprise to which God is calling us. We believe that we may profitably deliberate upon such questions as the following:—

"1. How best to bring about a general reformation of manners, and to enforce a higher moral tone in the matter of purity.

"2. How especially to guard the sanctity of marriage, and to create a healthier public opinion upon the subject, and, to this end, how best to make the celebration of holy matrimony as reverent and impressive as possible.

"3. How most wisely to deal with this difficult and delicate question as regards our children, our homes, our schools and other places of education.

"4. How best to strengthen the hands of those who are striving in the Army, the Navy, and other public services, to create and maintain a high standard of purity.

"5. How best to provide safeguards for these who, from inability to marry, or from other circumstances of their lives, are exposed to special temptation.

"6. How best to bind together, and to encourage by the sense of union, all who desire to help, or to be helped, in the battle against impurity.

"7. How best to purify art and literature, and to repress all that is immodest in language, manners and dress.

"8. How best to enforce or amend the laws framed to guard the innocent, to punish the guilty, to rescue the fallen, to suppress the haunts of vice, and to remove temptation from our thoroughfares.

"We thank God for the readiness, and even enthusiasm, with which the movement in favor of purity has been welcomed by young men of every class. There is a generosity and chivalry among the young which is seldom appealed to in vain, while large numbers are deeply thankful for every aid in the desperate battle against the sins of the flesh. Once more, as witnesses for God, we would, speak to all whom our voice may reach. "Be strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might" Live pure lives. Speak pure words. Think pure thoughts. Shun and abhor all that is not of perfect modesty. Guard with all jealousy the weak and the young. Above all, pray for the sanctifying grace of the Holy Spirit of God, "that your whole spirit and soul and body may be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Of the remaining subjects discussed by the Conference, the care of immigrants has a particular interest for us. The report asserts a very large number of British emigrants are children of the Anglican Church, and as such have a right to expect the Anglican Church will duly minister to them in whatever part of the world their lot may be cast. An enormous responsibility lies upon the Church in this matter, and it is her duty so far as in her lies, to prevent estrangement or any loss of spiritual life in her children, through the accident of their removal from one branch of the Anglican Church to another. Within the last ten years 3,195,660 persons have emigrated from the British Isles, of whom North America has received about 11 per cent.; our own share of the work of reception goes slowly. Perhaps Lower Canada does not offer the most inviting field. Our emigration chaplain, Rev. R. Acton, complains that he does not receive all the encouragement from the clergy, to send

immigrants into the country parts which one would naturally expect. The reasons for this luke-warmness are not apparent. Mr. Acton reports seventy-five families and about 350 single men to have been forwarded to country parts during the past year. He says "they have been visited by representatives of several of the English Emigration Societies, and, according to their published reports, are doing well and are grateful for the change." He adds: "Another very satisfactory feature is the renewed applications I am getting almost daily from farmers and others who have had immigrant help regularly for the last three or four seasons." Under the heading "Mutual Relations," the Lambeth Conference has dealt with the relations which one branch of the Anglican Communion holds to another. It points out clearly that the Book of Common Prayer "is not the possession of one diocese or province, but of all; that a revision in one portion of the Anglican Communion must, therefore, be extensively felt, and that it is not just that any particular portion should undertake revision without consultation with other portions, and especially with the Church at home." It urges on each church in the meantime the duty of precise teaching, especially to the young, of the doctrines of our Church as set forth in its formularies. It does not claim infallibility for these formularies, but it does declare that it would be hard to find many improvements which would be generally and heartily accepted as such. In these days of scientific doubt and scepticism, we find the advice of the Encyclical to the bishops and the clergy sound and practical. The words of the Encyclical are: "We must recommend to the clergy cautious and industrious treatment of these points of controversy, and most earnestly press upon them the importance of taking, as the central thought of their teaching, our Lord Jesus Christ, as the sacrifice for our sins, as the healer of our sinfulness, the source of all our spiritual life, and the revelation to our consciences of the law and motive of all moral virtue. To Him and to His work all the teachings of the Old Testament converge, and from Him all the teachings of the New Testament flow, in spirit, in force, and in form."

I cannot do better than quote directly the result of the deliberation of the Conference upon the important question, "What steps (if any) can be rightly taken on behalf of the Anglican Communion towards the reunion of the various bodies into which the Christianity of the English-speaking races is divided?" "After anxious discussion we have resolved to content ourselves with laying down certain articles as a basis on which approach may be, by God's blessing, made towards home reunion. These articles, four in number, will be found in the appended resolutions. The attitude of the Anglican Communion towards the religious bodies now separated from it by unhappy divisions would appear to be this: We hold ourselves in readiness to enter into brotherly conference with any of those who may desire intercommunion with us in a more or less perfect form. We lay down conditions on which such intercommunion is, in our opinion, and according to our conviction, possible. For, however we may long to embrace those now alienated from us, so that the ideal of the one flock under the one Shepherd may be realised, we must not be unfaithful stewards of the great deposit entrusted to us. We cannot desert our position either as to faith or discipline. That concord would, in our judgment, be neither true nor desirable which should be produced by such surrender. But we gladly and thankfully

recognize the real religious work which is carried on by Christian bodies not of our Communion. We cannot close our eyes to the visible blessing which has been vouchsafed to their labors for Christ's sake. Let us not be misunderstood on this point. We are not insensible to the strong ties, the rooted convictions, which attach them to their present position. These we respect, as we wish that on our side our own principles and feelings may be respected. Competent observers, indeed, assert that not in England only, but in all parts of the Christian world there is a real yearning for unity—that men's hearts are moved more than heretofore towards Christian fellowship. The Conference has shown in its discussions as well as its resolutions that it is deeply penetrated with this feeling. May the Spirit of Love move on the troubled waters of religious differences." These are but short extracts from a letter embodying matters of world-wide interest. The bishops of the Anglican Communion form one of the most enlightened and experienced religious houses to be found in Christendom, and all members of the Communion must receive their advice with reverence and thankfulness. The number of Colonial bishoprics has increased from 7 to 77 since the accession of Her Majesty Queen Victoria; add these to the Bishops of the United States, and the Bishops of the Mother Country, and you have a college of learned men representing every place and circumstance of interest to English-speaking people—North America, as a whole, Australia, and many places and portions of the earth in other parts of the world. Their practical sagacity, as well as the moderation of their declarations, are the result, no doubt, of the width of their united experience and judgment.

The report of progress in all things essential made by the Revd. Principal of the Montreal Diocesan Theological College is highly satisfactory. The college has passed beyond the feeble, uncertain steps of infancy, and awaits with confidence the action of the Provincial synod (touching degrees) to take its place with the most dignified, as well as useful, of the teaching bodies. We are indebted to that generous and helpful Society, the S. P. C. K., for the gift of several scholarships, which enables us to assist promising and pious young men to devote themselves to preparation for the ministry, with a thoroughness which might not otherwise be possible. Our college, affiliated as it is to McGill, affords the advantages of classical and scientific studies, a thorough training in biblical and doctrinal learning, joined to the practical knowledge which comes from the serving of churches and stations, subject to supervision and authoritative advice. Under the fostering care of Dr. Henderson, the college has greatly prospered. It has a handsome building, thanks to our kind friend, Mr. Gault. It is incorporated; has a constitution; a small—a very small—endowment; a constantly increasing library; and other valuable possessions. But it could most advantageously use more space, more books, and, above all, more money. I commend this right hand of the Church in Montreal to your sympathy and liberality. I am pleased to be able to state that the Dunham Ladies' college is open and doing good work again. It is carried on at present as a private enterprise, but in the interest of the Church. The excellent ladies who have undertaken this most useful branch of church extension claim our sympathy and support, and richly deserve all the thanks and encouragement which it is in our power to bestow.

The little Asylum for aged women, in University street, will make its first report to Synod this session, and I am sure it will be heard with interest. This charity is not so intimately known as I would like it to be. It has great possibilities of expansion, and I hope it may soon find the substantial as well as kindly patronage of which it now stands in need.

The Girls' Friendly Society has taken a firm hold in many of our parishes, and cannot fail to be beneficial, morally and spiritually, wherever it is established. The first president of the society, Mrs. F. W. Henshaw (having with much toil and self-denial inaugurated the work), decided, to the great regret of the various members, to resign the presidency. She is succeeded by Mrs. Leslie Skelton, who is quite familiar with the work, and who has the full confidence of the members of the society.

LOSSES BY DEATH.

Our portion of the Lord's vineyard has suffered the loss of some valued clergymen and laymen since our last meeting. The Rev. Canon Belcher was taken from amongst us in mature, but not extreme, age, just when his counsels were most useful to us from the respect which his piety evoked, and the trust which his experience justified. It will be long ere parish or diocese ceases to mourn him. Canon Du Vernet and the Rev. J. Merrick had retired from active service some time before their death; not so long ago, however, but that they are gratefully and lovingly remembered for fervent piety and devotion to the Church's work by many of the older Christians to whom they ministered. The last to fall was the Rev. W. D. Evans, a young soldier of Christ, only just commissioned to fight the good fight of faith as a minister under the banner of the Church. An accident by drowling, as unanticipated as it was sad, cut short a promising career, and extinguished a hopeful, sanguine life. We can ill afford to spare the young and strong; the remoter missions tax the strength and try the energies both of body and mind. I have work for all the young men who offer, and without the assistance given by those who have been prepared for the ministry at our invaluable Theological College I could not attempt to extend the missions into the wilderness, for I should not be able to find men to fill the stations I established. Judge Armstrong and Mr. C. J. Brydges closed their useful and honored lives, while their memory is yet green in this synod and the diocese. I should not be able to recount all the good deeds done for the Church in Montreal by Mr. Brydges, during the years he discharged the duties of treasurer of the synod. In energy he was untiring. In helpfulness he was loving and strong. Eloquence and wisdom were the fruit of his lips, and none who heard him will ever forget the tact and judgment with which he gathered up the salient points in each crisis of our diocesan history; brought order out of confusion, and made way for progress and stability. I will not close without a word of thanks to those members of the Church, lay and clerical, who have helped to maintain the mission fund in its present efficient state. We will still endeavor to extend the Church's teaching to the outskirts of the diocese, especially on the Gatineau and the Upper Ottawa rivers, and this, of course, we could not do without men and means. I feel sure, thank God, you will not relax your efforts in home mission work, the very life blood of our own existence. On it our health and strength as a diocese depend.

In each new station, nay more, in each occasional service, held, as opportunity allows, we see the beginning of a new life, the offspring of your own faith, the child of fervent prayer and wise love to Jesus Christ our Saviour. Let us continue to carry the Gospel, as committed to us, wherever the way is open, that our laborers in the spiritual field may gather a rich harvest in due time, in accordance with the promise of that God whose word never faileth. I will detain you no longer. May the spirit of God direct and bless the work of this session.

Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON presented a memorial on the Jesuits' Estates Act; and gave notice of motion. (See appendix.)

Rev. W. B. LONGHURST, Rural Dean, read a report of the Rural Deanery of Sheffield.

Rev. J. F. RENAUD, Rural Dean, read the report of the Rural Deanery of Iberville.

Rev. ROBERT ACTON, Chaplain, read his report on Immigration, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Mr. R. H. BUCHANAN read a report on Sunday Schools, and gave notice of motion.

ARCHDEACON EVANS read a report of the Committee on Superannuation, and gave notice of motion.

ARCHDEACON LINDSAY read a report of the Committee on French work, and gave notice of motion.

Rev. R. LINDSAY read a report of the Committee on Works of Mercy, including a report on the Church Home, and gave notice of motion.

Rev. R. LINDSAY read a report of the Committee on Foreign Missions, and gave notice of motion.

Rev. J. A. NEWMHAM read report of the Girls' Friendly Society, and gave notice of motion.

Moved by the CHANCELLOR, seconded by Rev. J. H. DIXON:

That the Rules of Order be suspended, and the accompanying Canon for the further sub-division of the Parish of Montreal be allowed to be introduced for the consideration of the Synod.—*Carried.*

The CHANCELLOR then moved, seconded by Rev. J. H. DIXON:

That the accompanying Canon on the further sub-division of the Parish of Montreal, signed by the Rectors of the Parish of Montreal, of the Parish of St. Jude, and of the Parish of St. Matthias, be now passed by this Synod.—*Carried. See the Appendix.*

Notices of motion were received from Dr. L. H. Davidson, Dr. Butler and Rev. Canon Mussen.

Dr. BUTLER, by permission of the House, withdrew a motion of which he had given notice.

Rev. CHARLES BANCROFT, by permission of the House, withdrew a motion of which he had given notice, as the object aimed at was covered by the following motion of the Chancellor.

It was moved by the CHANCELLOR, seconded by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON:

That the Synod shall petition the Legislature of the Province of Quebec to amend the Church Temporalities Act of the Diocese of Montreal, in the manner shown by the following draft of Bill:—

Whereas, "The Synod of the Diocese of Montreal" have by their petition prayed for certain amendments to the Act of the late Province of Canada, passed in the 14th and 15th years of Her Majesty's Reign, and being ch. 176, and intitled: "An Act to make provision for the management of the Temporalities of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Montreal, and of other purposes therein mentioned," and it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition, Her Majesty enacts as follows:

I. The name of the said Church, wherever it occurs in the said Act, is hereby changed to that of "The Church of England in Canada;" but such change of name shall not in any way affect any rights, franchises or privileges held or possessed by said Church, or the members thereof, or by the Bishop of said Diocese or by any Parson, Rector or Incumbent of said Church in said Diocese.

II. No person shall be entitled to vote at any meeting of the Vestry of any church or chapel in the said Diocese, unless such person be a member of the said Church of England in Canada.

III. The 23rd Section of said Act is hereby amended by adding thereto the following clause:—

Until after the Easter Monday next after the passing of this Act, it shall be in the power and shall be the duty of each existing Vestry in the various churches and chapels of the said Church in the Diocese of Montreal, in which the pews and sittings are free, to fix and determine the amount of annual contribution that shall be necessary to entitle the members of each such church and chapel to be members of the Vestry, as hereinafter provided.

And afterwards the rate of such contributions shall be fixed, and may, at any time, and from time to time thereafter, be altered by the Vestry to be established under this Act.

After the Easter Monday next following the passing of this Act, the Vestry in each such church or chapel shall consist of and be limited to such persons, being of the full age of twenty-one years, as shall declare themselves in writing (in a book to be kept for that purpose) to be members of the Church of England in Canada, and habitually attending worship in such church or chapel, and to be contributors to the funds of such church or chapel, to the extent fixed by the Vestry of such church or chapel, and not to be in arrears with respect to such contributions as fixed by the Vestry.

It was decided to consider the motion clause by clause. The preamble was then read and adopted.

Clause I. was read and adopted.

Clause II. was read.

It was moved in amendment by Rev. A. FRENCH, seconded by Mr. RALPH C. THORNELOE:

That the word "Communicant" be inserted before "member of the said Church of England in Canada."

At six o'clock the Synod adjourned to Wednesday at ten o'clock.

SECOND DAY, 19TH JUNE, 1889.

The Synod re-assembled at ten o'clock.

The BISHOP opened the meeting with prayer, after which the Minutes of yesterday's meeting were read and confirmed.

The BISHOP read telegrams, conveying warm fraternal greetings from the Dioceses of Niagara, Huron and Algoma, through their respective Bishops.

Canon Anderson and Mr. W. Lynch were requested to draw up suitable replies to the same.

It was decided that the ballots be taken for the elections of Executive Committee, Delegates to the Provincial Synod, and the Diocesan Court, this afternoon at half past two o'clock.

Scrutineers were named as follows:—Revs. W. Sanders and W. H. Naylor, Rural Deans, and Mr. J. W. Marling, for the clerical vote on the Executive Committee; and Messrs. J. S. Hall, W. L. Davidson, and Rev. J. G. Baylis, for the lay vote.

For Delegates to the Provincial Synod, Rev. Canon Ellegood, Archdeacon Evans and Mr. J. Tough for the clerical vote; Messrs. Henderson, Drake and Rev. E. McManus for the lay vote.

For the Diocesan Court, Revs. W. B. Longhurst, Cunningham and Mr. E. R. Smith for the clerical vote; Messrs. G. F. C. Smith, E. L. Bond and Ralph C. Thorneloe for the lay vote.

Rev. J. L. P. Roberts was added to the Committee on Church Provision for the Lumber Districts.

REV. CANON HENDERSON read the report of the Committee on Education and gave notice of motion.

Mr. EDGAR JUDGE read a report on the Quebec plan of paying missionaries, and gave notice that he would move its adoption.

REV. W. H. NAYLOR, Rural Dean of Clarendon, read a report of the Committee on Church Work in the Lumber Districts, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. CANON MILLS read a report of the Committee on Domestic Missions, and gave notice of motion.

Rev. W. P. CHAMBERS read a report of the Committee on Immigration, and gave notice of motion.

Rev. CANON ANDERSON and Mr. LYNCH reported the proposed reply to the greetings received from other Synods in Session. The report was adopted,

A copy was telegraphed to each of the above-named Dioceses.

Rev. W. SANDERS, Rural Dean, read a report of the Rural Deanery of St. Andrews.

Notices of motion were given by Rev. J. W. Garland, Mr. J. W. Marling, Mr. E. R. Smith, Dr. L. H. Davidson, Rev. R. Lindsay.

Dr. T. P. BUTLER moved a suspension of the Rules of Order to enable him to move the following resolution.—*Carried.*

Dr. BUTLER then moved, seconded by Rev. J. G. BAYLIS:

That this Synod do, and does hereby sanction the Decree issued by his Lordship the Bishop of Montreal, on the eighteenth day of June instant, separating the Parish of Longueuil from the old Patent Rectory of St. Johns, and constituting the said Parish a distinct and separate Parish, and defining the boundaries of the said Parish of Longueuil.

That this Synod do, and does hereby sanction the decree issued by his Lordship the Bishop of Montreal, on the eighteenth day of June instant, separating the Parish of St. Lambert from the old Patent Rectory of St. Johns, and constituting said Parish a distinct and separate Parish, and defining the boundaries of the said Parish of St. Lambert, and that the said decrees be entered in the report of proceedings, as Canons.—*Carried.*

Mr. EDGAR JUDGE moved a suspension of the Rules of Order, to enable him to move the confirmation of the Canon passed at the last Session on the Quebec Scheme.—*Carried.*

He then moved, seconded by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON, the confirmation of the Canon on the Quebec Scheme.

The LORD BISHOP drew the attention of the Synod to Section 17 of the Constitution, which enacts that a two-thirds majority of both clergy and laity then present is required for the confirmation of an alteration of the Constitution, Regulations, Rules or Canons.

The BISHOP appointed Messrs. Marling and Judge Scrutineers of the voting by orders.

The ballot for members of the Diocesan Court was taken.

A letter from the Diocese of Toronto, in reference to Sunday School lessons, was read by the Clerical Secretary, and was referred to the Committee on Sunday Schools, with a request that they report to this Synod.

By permission of the Synod the following resolution moved by Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q. C., was carried unanimously and by a standing vote:

That this Synod, noting with extreme regret the absence from this Session of Synod of their esteemed Treasurer, James Hutton, Esq., through illness as they are informed, desire to express their hearty and loving sympathy with him, and to express their hope that under God's blessing his health may soon be completely restored, and that he may long be spared to fill up the full measure of his already long continued, faithful and invaluable services as Treasurer of this Diocese, extending to him their most sincere thanks and high appreciation of his past services.

That the Secretary of the Diocese be instructed to forward this resolution to Mr. Hutton at the earliest moment possible.

Discussion of Rev. A. French's amendment was resumed, and on a demand made by Messrs. Binmore, Hannaford and Archdeacon Evans, the vote was taken by orders, the names to be recorded.

At one o'clock the Synod adjourned.

Nevertheless in any "free-seat church" (duly declared such by a resolution of the Vestry thereof, at the first meeting duly held after the passing of this Act, or at any subsequent Easter Monday meeting), which shall determine that in future the Vestry thereof shall be composed of such persons, being of the full age of 21 years, who shall be either communicant members of the Church of England in Canada, or habitual attendants at the services of said church, and of no other, for the space of six months during the year prior to the date of such meeting, such persons shall compose the Vestry of such free-seat church.—*Carried unanimously.*

Moved by Mr. A. D. NICOLLS, seconded by Rev. Canon Mills:

That the following clause be added to the Draft Bill to amend the Church Temporalities Act:

V. The said Synod is empowered to restrict the rights defined in section two, to communicant members of said church, by vote at any annual meeting of the Synod.—*Carried.*

The Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay read the memorial.

Moved by DR. L. H. DAVIDSON, seconded by REV. G. O. TROOP :

That this Synod, having taken into consideration the several memorials presented in regard to the Jesuits' Estates Act, and the incorporation of the Society of Jesus (acts of the legislature of this Province of Quebec), yields its assent to the principles and declarations therein contained; that further this Synod strongly protests against the recognition by incorporation of the Society of Jesus, and its re-establishment within this Province and Dominion, the principles, teaching and conduct of said Society as evidenced in its past history being inimical to, and imperilling civil and religious liberty, and the existence of said Society endangering the peace and well-being of the Church and State, and being it is believed in contravention of the principles of the British Constitution.

That, further, this Synod most earnestly protests against the Act known as the Jesuits' Estates Act, as being in violation of the principle on which alone the Secularization of the Clergy Reserves can be justified, and of the whole course of legislative action since, as well in the Old Province of Canada as in the Dominion, and also involving an illegal and unjust appropriation of public funds of this Province, received for and assigned to the purposes of education, and being, it is believed, unconstitutional and illegal.

That, further, this Synod records its distinct disapprobation of any change which may have been allowed in the oath of Supremacy, as administered to those in official positions in this Dominion and the Provinces thereof.

And this Synod most urgently joins in respectfully asking the disallowance of said Jesuits' Estates Act, if the same may still be constitutionally done—and failing this, that the constitutionality and legality of said Act should be tested in the highest Court of the Empire; and further that this Synod would urge resistance to said act in every legal and constitutional manner.—*Carried* on Division 70 to 29.

Moved by the CHANCELLOR, seconded by REV. DR. NORTON :

That the report on page 2 of the Executive Committee be adopted.

Moved by Rev. W. H. NAYLOR, seconded by REV. W. P. CHAMBERS :

Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON, seconded by Mr. RICHARD WHITE, moved the adoption of the following resolution on Sunday observance.—*Carried.*

That this Synod strongly urges upon the members of the Church in this diocese the necessity of using every endeavour jointly and individually, by conduct and influence, to preserve the sanctity of the Lord's Day, and that a petition to the Governor-General, Senate and House of Commons, in the form following, be signed by the Lord Bishop of the diocese under the seal of this Synod, and be presented in due course.

PETITION FROM THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

WHEREAS the due observance of the Lord's Day as a day of rest is essential to the best physical, intellectual, moral and social welfare of man; and WHEREAS the sacredness of the day is in many ways imperilled in our land, and not a few of our fellow-citizens are already deprived of its inestimable blessings, we the members of the Church of England in this Diocese of Montreal in Synod assembled do hereby earnestly petition YOUR EXCELLENCY AND YOUR HONORABLE HOUSE that such further laws may be enacted as will secure the better observance of the Lord's Day in the Dominion, in all matters pertaining to general railway traffic, the management of the Postal Service, and the management of the railways and canals belonging to the Dominion, as well as in all other matters over which the Parliament has control, and that the laws presently in force as to the Lord's Day be carefully maintained; and we humbly beg to press upon Your consideration that the proper observance of the Lord's Day is in the highest sense necessary to the promotion of peace, order and good government in a free Christian land; and your petitioners will ever pray.

Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Mr. W. J. WHITE :

The Synod re-assembled at ten o'clock on Friday, 21st June.

The BISHOP opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and confirmed.

It was moved by Rev. A. FRENCH, seconded by Rev. CANON MUSSEN :

To insert in the resolution on Vestries in free seat churches adopted yesterday, between words

"Communicant members of the Church of England in Canada" and "or habitual attendants"

The following words :

"habitually attending the services of said free seat church and of no other, for the space of six months during the year prior to the date of such meeting."—*Carried.*

Mr. E. JUDGE moved that the Committee on the Quebec schemes be continued.

The Bishop named the same Committee as last year.

Dr. DAVIDSON read a report of the Committee on Books and Tracts, and gave notice of motion.

Dr. DAVIDSON gave notice of motion.

Rev. R. LINDSAY moved the adoption of the Report on works of Mercy, including Girls' Friendly Society, Church Home and the City Missionary, seconded by Rev. G. OSBORNE TROOP.—*Carried.*

Rev. R. LINDSAY moved the adoption of the Report of Committees on Foreign Missions, seconded by Rev. G. OSBORNE TROOP.

Moved in amendment by CANON MUSSEN, seconded by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON :

That so much of the Report of the Committee on Foreign Missions, as assigns all unappropriated collections for Foreign Missions to work in the Diocese of Madras, be not concurred in, and that all such unappropriated funds be forwarded through the Domestic and Foreign Mission Board to the S. P. G.

It was decided to allow the matter to remain over till next year.

Moved by Rev. R. LINDSAY, seconded by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON :

That this Synod learns with extreme pleasure and thankfulness of the several works of mercy now being carried on in this Diocese, under the control of different organizations and societies, and wishes them all God-speed in their good work, and will have pleasure in receiving from time to time further information and reports from them.—*Carried.*

Rev. CANON HENDERSON moved, seconded by CANON MUSSEN:

That this Synod, whilst adopting the Report of the Committee on Education in regard to Church Schools, expresses its surprise and deep regret at the condition of these schools as disclosed in the Report of the Committee, and strongly urges greater care and attention on the part of the Parishes and Missions to this matter; and that a committee, consisting of Dr. Davidson and E. Judge, Esq., be appointed as a Committee to examine further into the condition of the Church Schools referred to, and to ascertain full particulars as to the property of said schools, to suggest remedies for existing difficulties, and to report at next session of Synod.—*Carried.*

Rev. W. H. NAYLOR moved, seconded by Rev. W. SANDERS:

The adoption of the report of the Committee on Church Provision for the lumber districts.—*Carried.*

Moved by Rev. W. SANDERS, seconded by Rev. W. P. CHAMBERS:

That the recommendation of the Committee on Church Provision for the lumber districts, with regard to the appropriation of funds for literature, be referred to the Committee on Books and Tracts.—*Carried.*

CANON MILLS moved, seconded by ARCHDEACON LINDSAY:

The adoption of the report on Domestic Missions.—*Carried.*

Rev. W. P. CHAMBERS moved, seconded by Rev. ROBT. LINDSAY:

The adoption of the Report of Committee on Immigration, and that petitions be sent to the different Church Societies in England engaged in immigrant work, to ask them to aid in sustaining the Immigrant Chaplain, and also that the Dominion Government be petitioned to erect sheds at Montreal for the temporary accommodation of immigrants.

Moved in amendment by Mr. RICHARD WHITE, seconded by Mr. E. L. BOND:

That the Bishop name a member of this Synod to work with the Committee of the City Council and Board of Trade, in making better provision for the emigrants arriving in Montreal.—*Carried.*

The BISHOP named Mr. Richard White to act under the above resolution.

Rev. J. F. RENAUD moved, seconded by Mr. CHARLES GARTH:

That in future the Reports of the Rural Deans be printed before the meeting of Synod if so received by the Bishop, and be distributed amongst the delegates of Synod.—*Carried.*

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Rev. R. LINDSAY, Rural Dean:

That in order to give effect to any recommendation or principle embodied in any Report of a Committee of this House, and intended to bind this Synod, a specific resolution setting forth the rule or principle do follow and be adopted by this Synod.—*Carried.*

Under the head of "order of proceeding," Section I, That all the words that occur after the words "preceded by" be struck out, and the following be substituted therefor: "a public Celebration of Holy Communion in the morning, when the Bishop may deliver his charge, and on the same day there shall be public Evening Prayer with a sermon—the offertory collections to be devoted to Missionary or such other purposes as the Synod may direct."—*Carried.*

Moved by Rev. W. B. LONGHURST, Rural Dean, seconded by CANON MUSSEN:

That that portion of the Bishop's charge relating to Church Dilapidations be referred to the Executive Committee.—*Carried.*

Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Rev. CANON EMPSON:

That clause 5 of the Constitution be amended by striking out the words at the end of the first clause, "his successor is appointed," and inserting instead thereof the following "until the following Easter."—*Carried.*

Attention having been called to clause 4 of the Constitution, the Chancellor and Dr. Davidson were requested to report at next Synod as to the effect of this clause in the case of vacant parishes.

Rev. J. F. RENAUD read a second report of the Committee on Sunday Schools, and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. GEORGE ROGERS.—*Carried.*

Rev. R. LINDSAY, Rural Dean, and Dr. L. H. Davidson were named a deputation, in accordance with the recommendation of the report.

Moved by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON, Q.C., seconded by Mr. E. L. BOND:

That in accordance with the prayer of the Memorials presented to this House, in regard to the Jesuits' Estates Act and the Incorporation of the Society of Jesus, the Synod do petition the Provincial Synod of Canada at its next Session to duly consider said matters, and to take such action thereon as in its wisdom it may deem best; and that to this end a memorial as follows, having been duly signed and authenticated by the officers of this Synod, be presented to the said Provincial Synod at its next Session.

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Mr. CHARLES GARTH:

That the report of the Committee on Books and Tracts be adopted.—*Carried.*

Moved by Rev. CANON MUSSEN, seconded by Rev. CANON MILLS:

That a petition be presented by this House by the Provincial Synod, respectfully requesting that the Provincial Synod do publish in its report a tabulated statement of all funds and of all statistics, as found in the reports of Synod and in other authenticated documents of the various Dioceses, subject to the Provincial Synod so as to exhibit the state of the Church as a whole in this Ecclesiastical Province.—*Carried.*

ARCHDEACON LINDSAY moved, seconded by Rev. J. F. RENAUD:

That a Committee be named for the purpose of preparing a Statement of all moneys raised in this Diocese, the same to be published in the Annual Report of this Diocese.—*Carried.*

The BISHOP named as members of the Provincial Board of Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, The Dean, Rev. R. Lindsay, M.A., Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q.C., and Mr. Charles Garth.

Rev. W. P. CHAMBERS moved, seconded by Rev. R. LINDSAY:

That the thanks of this Synod be rendered to the proprietors of the daily papers for copies of their papers, and for their reports of the proceedings of this Session; also to the proprietor of the Church Guardian for copies of that paper; and to the several railway and steamboat companies, for the privilege accorded to members of travelling at reduced rates.

Moved by Rev. CANON ANDERSON, seconded by MAJOR E. L. BOND:

That the best thanks of this Synod are due in a special manner, and are hereby tendered to Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q.C., for his much-prized, able and devoted customary attention (at the expense of much self-sacrifice on his own part, both of his private and his professional interests) to all the interests of this Synod and of the Diocese at large, as manifested conspicuously by the intelligent advice and valued assistance habitually and perseveringly given, from the commencement to the close of every Session, and specially at this Session, to all the varied affairs (ever widening) and interest of the Synod and of the Diocese at large.—*Carried.*

On motion by Rev. Dr. NORTON, a cordial vote of thanks to the Bishop for his able and impartial conduct in the chair was unanimously adopted.

Dr. DAVIDSON moved that the thanks of the Synod be tendered to the Secretaries.—*Carried.*

The Minutes of the fourth day were then read and confirmed.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee beg to make the following report of their proceedings during the year ending the 30th April, 1889, to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, at its thirtieth annual meeting in June, 1889.

MEETINGS.

The appointed quarterly meetings were held. There was also a special meeting on the 22nd day of June, 1888, after the close of the Synod, at which meeting the various sub-committees were named, and an adjourned meeting was held on the 6th June, 1889.

The vacancy caused by the lamented death of the Hon. Judge Armstrong was filled by the Bishop appointing Mr. W. H. Robinson.

GRANTS.

New Glasgow & Kilkeny.—A grant of \$350 was continued to this mission, the Rural Dean having reported that the required statistics had been furnished.

Laprairie & St. Lambert.—The grant of \$100 for one year only was continued.

Alleyne.—A special grant of \$50 was made for one year only, and on condition that the mission should raise a like sum of \$50, beyond and in excess of the \$110 already promised by it towards the stipend of the missionary. This special grant to be payable on receipt of the Missionary's voucher for the local contribution.

Aylwin.—The grant of \$400 was confirmed.

Iron Hill.—The grant of \$300 was confirmed.

St. Hyacinthe.—The grant of \$360 was confirmed.

Warden.—A grant of \$300 was made, the people promising to raise \$200, and Archdeacon Lindsay engaging to raise a further sum of \$100 towards the stipend of the Missionary.

It was also resolved that Warden be a separate Mission.

Vacant missions.—The Bishop, when making appointments to vacant parishes or Missions for which no grants have been provided, was authorized to arrange on the basis of the grants last made to the parishes or missions concerned.

INTEREST ON PAROCHIAL ENDOWMENT FUNDS.

It was resolved, in accordance with a requisition received from several of the Rectors whose parochial funds are invested with the Synod, that the interest on these funds be in future paid quarterly instead of half yearly as hitherto.

The Treasurer was authorized to sell and transfer the twenty-five shares of the stock of the Bank of Montreal, and the twenty shares of the stock of the Montreal Gas Co. belonging to the Episcopal Endowment fund, and to invest the proceeds in mortgage.

REQUESTS.

The sum of two thousand dollars, bequeathed by the late Miles Williams, Esq., to the Widows and Orphans fund of the Diocese of Montreal, has been received from the Executors of the Estate, Mrs. Williams and Mr. A. F. Gault.

The following form of a Bequest was drawn up by the Chancellor at the request of this Committee.

FORM OF REQUEST.

I give, devise and bequeath unto "the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal" the sum of.....(or, as the case may be, the following immoveable property), (or, as the case may be,.....shares of the capital stock of.....), to be held, possessed and enjoyed by the said Synod as its own absolute property forever.

MEM.—Should the testator desire to endow a particular fund, introduce after the word "Montreal" these words: As a special endowment of its "Mission Fund" (or, as the case may be, its "Superannuation Fund"), (or, as the case may be, its "Widows and Orphans Fund").

It was resolved that a Record of Bequests and Donations should be kept, a book to be provided in which should be written a list of all bequests and important donations to the Church in this Diocese. The Rev. Canon Mussen was requested to compile as complete a list as possible, and this he kindly consented to do.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

An application to be superannuated was received from the Rev. J. D. Borthwick, a medical certificate accompanying the application. The application was granted on condition that he first comply with the provisions of the Canon on Superannuation.

OBITUARY.

The Committee have to record the deaths during the year of the Rev. Canon Belcher, for many years rector of Grace Church, Point St Charles; of the Rev. Canon DuVernet, late rector of Chambly; of the Rev. Joseph Merrick, late incumbent of Adamsville and East Farnham, after long and faithful service rendered to the Church in this Diocese; of the Rev. W. D. Evans, for four months incumbent of Buckingham, accidentally drowned in the River Lievre; also, of the Hon. Judge Armstrong, for many years a member of this Committee.

Three churches fully insured. St. Mark's, Bristol, not used for service, by the sanction of the Bishop.

The parsonage, also insured, is in good repair.

A new barn has been built during the past year, at an outlay of \$160, and paid for.

The only endowment fund in the parish is the "Jubilee Endowment Fund, of twelve dollars, invested in the Synod.

PORTAGE DU FORT—

Everything remains in *statu quo* as last reported.

RAWDON—

There is no endowment of any kind here.

A new window has been put in the church by the Rev. Canon Rollit, in memory of his father. A new bell has been put up in the steeple.

The church property is insured to the amount of \$1,500. A new kitchen, a wood shed and a carriage shed have been built at the parsonage, at a cost of \$170.

The church-yard has been put in order.

RIVER DESERT—

A village lot, $\frac{1}{2}$ acre more or less, designated as No. 6 Pakenawatik Street, Maniwaki, rented and leased from Department of Indian affairs, annual rent \$11. Lease renewable at the end of 20 years from May 17, 1883.

On the lot stands the Mission House, a small dwelling house with chapel attached, not yet completed, but in use since Autumn, 1888.

Insured for \$750, in Hartford, Conn, Insurance Co. Policy holds till June 26, 1891.

SOREL—

No change in trusts and endowments since last report.

SOUTH STUKELY—

St. Matthew's church; the property of this church remains the same as when last reported, except that there have been some improvements made in the parsonage. St. Matthew's Dorcas Society is preparing to remove the horse-barn and stable. For this purpose the Society has laid up \$38.

St. John's, Eastman—

This new church is now about complete. The land property consists of $1\frac{1}{2}$ village lots 6 rods front, and 8 rods back, making 48 square rods. It is a corner lot, a street in front and on south side. The land cost \$100.

The church is a wooden structure with tower and spire on the south side. The vestry is built on the outside with entrance to the chancel. The chancel is fitted with chair seats, prayer-desk, small pulpit and lectern. The inside of the church is all finished in brown ash, oiled and varnished. The outlay when contract is finished will be \$1,025. Heating apparatus, lamps, etc., will cost probably \$150 more.

ST. ARMAND EAST—

No change during the year.

ST. ARMAND WEST—

No change.

ST. JOHN'S—

The church property consists of the following:—

One brick church known as St. James'.

One two-story with basement brick building and lot, rented to the trustees of the Dissentient Board as a school and academy, at a present rental of \$320 per annum. Building and lot valued at \$5,000.

One two-story brick house known as the Rectory or parsonage house, built three years ago on the site of old rectory, at a cost of \$4,500.

One frame brick-cased building at rear of the rectory, now known as the Baldwyn Hall, used as a Sunday School and public lecture room, the upper story being occupied by a pensioner of the congregation. This building with its iron roof is valued at \$1,200.

Two cemeteries, one immediately joining the church, the other situated about a mile from the church, and just on the town limits.

One town lot containing about $\frac{1}{4}$ of an acre, and rented at present for the sum of \$6.

All the above property is situated in the town of St. John's. The buildings are covered by insurance, and all in good condition. This state of repair and order is due to the energy and self-denying efforts of the Ladies' Aid Association, and the untiring zeal of Mr. John Donaghy, late people's warden.

A newly erected frame church at Lacadie, costing about \$600.

A cemetery adjoining.

A frame church at Savanne.

Property in Laprairie and Longueuil under the patent of the Rectory of St. John's.

CANON

ON THE FURTHER SUB-DIVISION OF THE PARISH OF MONTREAL.

Whereas it is advisable further to sub-divide the Parish of Montréal, in the manner hereinafter mentioned, be it therefore enacted, under the authority vested in the Synod by The Provincial Statute 36th Victoria, Chapter 19, that the said Parish shall be, and the same is hereby sub-divided as follows:—

1. All that portion of the Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit: to the Southwest, the East side of St. Paul Street, in the Town of St. Henry, and its continuation Northwesterly until it intersects the main track of the Atlantic and Northwest Railway; to the Northwest, the Southeastern side of said main track; to the Northeast, the Southwest side of Greene avenue, and its continuation Southeasterly until it intersects St. James Street; and to the Southeast, the Northwest sides of the streets which form the Northwestern boundary of the Parish of St. Jude, as presently constituted, the whole as colored red on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall be added to, and shall hereafter form part of the said Parish of St. Jude.

2. All that portion of the Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit: to the Southwest, the East side of Claremont avenue; to the Northwest, Dorchester Road and its continuation to Claremont avenue; to the Northeast, the West side of Greene avenue to where it intersects the main track of the Atlantic and Northwest Railway; and to the Southeast, the said main track, the whole as colored slate on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall be added to, and shall hereafter form part of the Parish of St. Matthias.

3. The Parish of Montreal shall consist of all such parts and portions of the Parish of Montreal as presently existing, as are not included in the portions of said Parish so added to and hereafter to form part of the said Parishes of St. Jude and St. Matthias.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND TRACTS.

The Committee on Books and Tracts beg to report, that during the year past the Committee has held several meetings, as occasion required and opportunity offered, and have kept up the supply of Prayer Books and of Tracts for general distribution. They received, including balance, at the beginning of the year, \$196.25, and expended on their work for books and freight and charges thereon a sum of \$253.27; leaving the balance of \$42.98 available for use this year. Sales of books amounted to \$191.22. Requests have been made by the Sunday School Committee of the Diocese, that larger supplies of Sunday School requisites (books, maps, etc.) should be kept on hand in the Depository; and your Committee consider that in order to answer the demands made upon them, and to render their work more effective, a sum of at least \$500 will be required, and they would respectfully ask that the Executive Committee be authorized to pay to the said Book and Tract Committee, from the Mission Fund, a sum not exceeding \$500, as the same may be required during the year.

REPORT ON THE CHURCH HOME.

In presenting to the Diocesan Synod a brief notice of the Church Home, the Managers desire to report favorably. The funds of the Institution are in a more satisfactory state than has been the case for several years past; the working is smooth, and the general character such, we trust, as could be desired, in addition to which the sanitary condition of the house has been investigated, and the building put into good repair.

At the present time there are fourteen inmates exclusive of Matron and servants, and two more aged people will in all probability be received this month.

The management does not exclude the better class of poor women unable to pay. A thorough investigation is made of new applications, which, when found satisfactory, are received as far as accommodation permits. We feel grateful to the clergy and laity who so kindly assist us in divers ways, and who have of late shewn increased interest in our welfare.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROVISION FOR THE LUMBER DISTRICTS.

Your Committee desire to report as follows: Work amongst the lumbermen has been done in three widely separated districts of the Diocese: 1. In the

district of the Desert River. 2. On the Black River. 3. By the Rev. W. Harris of Arundel.

The Rev. H. Plaisted, of River Desert, reports having made trips in three directions in the months of January and February: first to Lake Petawagama, secondly up the Gens de Terre River to Lepine, and lastly up the Eagle River to Lake Pitongo, involving in all a drive of 300 miles.

He visited 11 shanties and 2 Depot Farms, belonging to the firms of Gilmour & Co., McLaren & Co., and Edwards & Co.

313 persons were visited, classified as follows:

183 English speaking, 130 French speaking.

217 Roman Catholic, 96 Non-Roman, of whom 30 to 40 belonged to the Church of England.

The services consisted of a plain address to the men, followed by prayer. Some Christmas letters kindly sent by Mrs. Capel of Mansfield Street, Montreal, were found very useful.

Mr. Plaisted acknowledges the greatest civility and kindness on the part of both Romanists and Protestants. He closes his report with the words: "It seemed to me that God was working with me, I trust that at the last it will not have been in vain."

The Reverend Messrs. Bourne and Mills spent the first two weeks of February visiting the shanties on the Black River. Their journey involved a drive of 250 miles. They visited 8 shanties and 6 depots. At Fraser's shanties, about one half the men were Protestants. At Mr. E. B. Eddy's shanties, and at Perley's shanties the majority of the men were Protestants. Services were held at all the shanties and depots, and papers and books distributed.

The Rev. W. Harris visited 4 shanties seventy miles up the Rouge River from Arundel. He held services and distributed literature at each place. About half the men were Protestants.

Your Committee believe this to be an important work, and they make the following recommendations:

1. That when practicable two clergymen go together to visit the lumbermen.
2. That efforts be made this ensuing winter to extend the church's work to the shanties on the Coulonge and Du Lievre Rivers.
3. That the Executive Committee be instructed to make an appropriation to meet the expenses, if any, incurred in supplying the Sunday services of clergymen absent from their parishes in this work, as well as for the purpose of obtaining a supply of literature for distribution. Your Committee desire to thank those kind friends in Montreal and elsewhere who have furnished papers and books for this work, and ask for a continuance of their kindness.

REPORT OF DIOCESAN CHURCH OF ENGLAND TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

The C. E. T. S. council of the Diocese beg to report that some further steps have been taken in the re-organization of the Diocesan Temperance Society as follows :—

The Council met on 13th November, to draw up a constitution in accordance with the C.E.T.S. rules elsewhere. The Lord Bishop presided, and nearly every member was present. After careful comparison of the Rules and By-Laws of the Society in England, and its branch in Toronto, a constitution was framed with By laws, etc., which it is expected will be in your hands to-day.

The Bishop also appointed a Temperance Sunday, and a circular was issued to the clergy, directing them on that day to preach against intemperance, and asking for the collections that day for the expenses necessary in formation of a working C.E.T.S. Diocesan branch. We regret to say that in answer to your Lordship's circular, the Secretary has only received \$17.45, which came from only (11) eleven parishes.

The Council would call the attention of the clergy to this matter, and to the evident fact that the progress of the C.E.T.S. work depends more upon the clergy at large than on the council. Without co-operation on the part of the parishes, and funds supplied by them, the work cannot be spread nor the Council carry out your instructions as to printing and circulating necessary information.

The Secretary has been in correspondence with a few of the clergy, and has tried to assist them in starting parochial branches, but he has been much hindered by the absence of any provision for supplying pamphlets, badges, etc., and has had to refer them to Toronto for these. Many clergy seem to think that the Secretary can procure a stock of blue ribbon, badges, pamphlets, etc., without any funds, or that he can find time to write in full for them the information they could obtain from tracts costing a few cents each. However, the council can report that a few more parishes have organized on C.E.T.S. basis, and they hope that the earnest words in your Lordship's charge will produce practical results in the Diocese, in this direction. The Secretary is also representative of the C.E.T.S. in England for this Diocese, and has been in correspondence with the Gen.-Secretary in London.

A clerical agent or deputation is to be sent by the Mother Society this Fall, to travel through this Ecclesiastical Province, and hold meetings wherever desired; to lay before our people the methods and successes of the C.E.T.S.; to arouse a greater interest in this line of Temperance Work; and to draw closer the bonds between the Society at home and the branches in the colonies. The Council hopes that the Rural Deaneries will take steps to profit by this opportunity, and would suggest that any Rural Deans or Incumbents, desirous of holding meetings to be addressed by this deputation, should send their names and wishes to the Secretary, Rev. J. A. Newnam.

The Council feel the desirability of having a list of clerical and lay speakers on Temperance, who would be willing to go into the missions, and address meetings, and help the Incumbent to organize branches, upon application from such Incumbents.

The Council would suggest that the Lord Bishop be requested to appoint a

Temperance Sunday in the Fall, the date to be fixed hereafter, if possible to be the same as that appointed in England.

It has been represented to this Council that very few Bands of Hope exist outside of Montreal and the larger villages, and the Committee would strongly urge the formation of Bands of Hope for our children in every parish and mission, in connection, if possible with the Day or Sunday Schools; and that arrangements should be made for co-operation and association between the Bands of Hope of each Deanery.

The attention of the clergy is called to the fact that the C.E.T.S. interests itself in the proper enforcement of liquor laws, the reduction in the number of taverns, the selling of liquor to minors, etc., and the clergy are asked to help on the cause of Temperance by using their influence in their localities, to secure the election of suitable temperance men to the smaller municipal offices.

In conclusion the Council express very great satisfaction at the careful consideration of this whole question at the Lambeth conference, and at the expressions of the Encyclical with regard to it; and in view of this and of the reference by the Lord Bishop in his charge, they would suggest that a memorial be presented to the Provincial Synod, urging the formation throughout this Ecclesiastical Province of Societies on the basis of the C.E.T.S., and the formation of a General Provincial Organization. The Council looks forward with greater hope to the coming year, and trusts that at the next Synod they will be able to report far more progress and practical work throughout the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF DOMESTIC MISSIONS, 1888-9.

The amount which has been reported to the Secretary of the Synod, as contributed by this Diocese for Domestic Missions this year, is \$2,493.55.

This, though \$300.03 less than was contributed last year, as will be seen by a comparison of the Reports, is nevertheless an increase in the amount contributed for general work in the North-West, for which no special appeal has been made, of over \$600.

Last year, the Rev. Mr. Brick, by a special canvas of this city, collected in behalf of his work \$718.94, while Rev. Mr. Wilson collected for his Indian Homes \$326.91. This, with a grant of \$100 from the Women's Auxiliary, aggregated the large sum of \$1,145.85 above ordinary offerings. This year, the only special appeal which has been made is that of the Rev. Mr. Bourne, who has recently been amongst us, and has reported having received \$233.87.

Still, the amount is far below what it ought to be,—what the needs of the work demands, and what the Church in the Diocese ought to give, and could give, if its members only realized as they should their duty in the matter, and acted up to it.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

MY LORD,

Your Committee beg to report that the Church Schools of the Diocese are gradually diminishing in number. The schools at St. Johns, P.Q., the Missisquoi High School and others have ceased to retain their Church character.

In the Deanery of Hochelaga the following have been reported, viz., the French School at Sabrevois, St. John's private school, the school at Berthier, and the Diocesan Theological College.

In the Deanery of Bedford, Canon Davidson's private school for boys continues to prosper, and the Dunham Ladies' College has been reopened with prospects of good success.

In the Deanery of Clarendon, there are efficient schools at Thorne East and Danford Lake. In the Deanery of Iberville there is the parish school at Iberville. No Church school exists in the Deanery of St. Andrews, and no report has been received from the Deanery of Shefford or Brome.

The Ladies' College at Dunham is favorably spoken of by the Government Inspector. He says: "I was very much pleased with the Latin class, as also the French. The surroundings of the school are all that could be desired."

Sabrevois school has had a successful year. Five of its students have passed the University Matriculation Examination, and are candidates for admission to the Theological College.

St. John the Evangelist School for boys has had an increased attendance during the past year. New buildings are being erected with a view to accommodate 25 boarders and 75 day scholars. A debt of \$20,000 remains on the building.

The Diocesan Theological College continues to prosper; a resident tutor has been added to the staff of Teachers; 400 volumes have been added to the library during the year; an increase in the number of students demands an increased accommodation in the building; steps are being taken towards the promotion of a French department. The total number of students during the year was 27, of whom 4 obtained high distinctions in Hebrew and in Mental and Moral Philosophy at McGill University.

There are certain school properties known to your Committee to be in existence, concerning which no report has been received, viz., the property belonging to the High School at St. Johns, P.Q., the Missisquoi High School, the Academy at Knowlton, the Trust at Granby, and the property at Bolton Centre. Your Committee earnestly suggest that an enquiry be made as to the foundations on which these properties rest, and the use which is at present being made of the same.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Two years since the Committee reported to Synod, and urged direct Mission work. In last year's report it again urged direct work, and it was agreed that all unappropriated collections should be sent directly to the Bishop of Madras, which has been done. The letter from the Bishop of Madras has been received and circulated throughout the Diocese. It contains a great deal of valuable information in the working of Foreign Missions, important to be understood by all the members of our Church.

India has peculiar claims upon us. It presents facilities for foreign mission work which we have not in other places. It belongs to our own Empire. They are our fellow subjects, our Missions and Schools have all the protection that the British Government can give them. Most of those in authority are Christian people. Education is highly prized by the people. In India the great heathen religions of the world are largely represented. Hindooism, Mahomedanism and Buddhism. In Southern India our Church has been longest at work and has accomplished the greatest results. The mission there began in 1760 by Schwatz, he labored forty years, and has been succeeded by eminently fitted men, to whom long life has been vouchsafed.

The present Bishop of Madras has been twenty-eight years Bishop; and his two assistant Bishops have been as missionaries and Bishops, each fifty years.

There has been a long steady persevering work, and as a result all the machinery for missionary work is fully equipped. One of the assistant Bishops, Bishop Caldwell, is for the mission of the S.P.G.; the other, Bishop Sargent, is for the O. M. S. Missions.

Bishop Caldwell of the S. P. G. reports: 13 European clergy, 70 native clergy.
Bishop Sargent of the C. M. S.: 20 European clergy, 63 native clergy.

The Bishop of Madras reports in his own Diocese 31,000,000, and in two tributary provinces beyond him 12½ millions, and a Church membership of 100,000.

One very interesting item of Church working is given by the Bishop of Madras. He writes, the Diocese is divided into pastorates (very similar to our Rural deaneries), a certain tract of country is given to each pastorate, and a grant made to the pastorate. The native clergy, with a European clergyman generally as the Chairman, meet and arrange for the ministrations in the pastorate, with the understanding that five per cent. reduction must be made annually. In this way a large number of the native clergy are self-sustaining. Then a large number of those pastorates by representation meet quarterly, at what is called a District Council, presided over by one of the Bishops.

To show the growth of these works, an account is given of the Mission of Telugu. It began in 1844:

The Bishop of Madras asks for men, who in addition to the zeal for missions have the gift of acquiring languages, and with some knowledge of the medical science. The Bishop adds, "I hope your Diocese will continue the grant."

The Bishop of Madras states that he purposes to send his chaplain, the Rev. S. Morley, and hopes he will be permitted to address the Provincial Synod in September, and do any other work to awaken interest in his great diocese during the short time that he can stay in Canada.

For a long while our work must be so purely tentative, that our opportunities will be only found in the conversations we may have from house to house, and the inquirer who comes to the clergyman of the Parish.

Ignorance of the language is a fatal hindrance from which the future clergy of the Church should be delivered.

That there is no insuperable difficulty in acquiring this power admits of no denial, and the clergy of the Church in the Diocese of Montreal should be able to speak to their French Canadian brethren in their own tongue.

Your Committee rejoice to announce that the schools in connection with Sabrevois have been very successful during the past year.

A colporteur was employed during last summer in the Townships, and we are encouraged by the fact that a sum of money has been placed at the disposal of the Bishop for sustaining a colporteur, in whose work the Committee have the greatest hope.

No progress has been made in the settlement of the mission of Sabrevois as to its becoming a charge on the Executive Committee.

The committee find the collection of funds for special missionary work to be almost impossible, so long as the debt on Sabrevois College remains, in addition to the money required to carry on the work of the Institution, and they devoutly pray that this debt will soon be paid, and means supplied to the committee for carrying on the grand Evangelistic work, upon the success of which, in our opinion, so largely depends the future of the Church in the Diocese of Montreal. And your Committee would suggest that in the case of some weak missions, wherein sufficient work does not offer for the employment of the clergyman's time, and where such arrangement can be carried out, the clergyman render such services as may be requisite for the efficient working of his mission, and for the other portion of his time, be available for duty in any parish of the Diocese where the knowledge of the French language can be usefully employed.

A branch has been started at Lachine, but on account of the severe illness of the Rector, the Rev. Mr. Winterbourne, no report has been received. The annual sermon to the members was preached by the Bishop, in the Cathedral, on 14th Jan., and the Festival held in the Synod Hall on the following Tuesday, which was largely attended, about 200 present. The Girls' Friendly Society still rent a room in the Immigration Home on Mansfield Street, where the members can have a quiet resting place in case of sickness or being out of a situation; and at the Home, those members newly arrived from England can be welcomed and enlisted in some city Branch. There have been many recruits to our ranks this spring from those coming from the mother-country, some have gone on farther west, and their letters of commendation sent on to other branches, so that they are not lost sight of. It was suggested at the closing meeting of the committee that a card be prepared, on which should be plainly printed a cordial invitation to girls coming from the country to the city, the same to be given to the clergy at the meeting of Synod, and that they should be requested to place it in the country Post Offices, or other conspicuous places, so that girls might know to whom they could apply for advice and information on arriving in the city, if they have no friends of their own there.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON IMMIGRATION AND COLONIZATION.

A successful harvest in the mother-country has had the result of encouraging a great number of farming people to remain at home, who would otherwise have emigrated to Canada this Spring, and this committee has accordingly not much to report to Synod in the way of work done this year. Some applications for workmen were received and forwarded. The township, reported to last Synod as at the disposal of the committee for settlement, has not been settled as yet. The class

of men required there, tenant farmers with a little capital, is proverbially cautious, and requires to be fully convinced of the certainty of success before embarking in new enterprises; and a long correspondence with emigration workers in England shews that in view of inducements offered in the Northwest, there is, under present circumstances in England, little chance of persuading desirable churchmen to buy wild bush lands and settle in the older provinces.

For good farm hands there is always a demand. But the majority of those who are assisted to emigrate, or come out as ordinary passengers, are not found to be such as could well be introduced to parties asking for work people, who shall go to them recommended by a Diocesan Committee. Organizations already exist for the oversight of those who are flung upon our shores by enterprising agents and steamship companies. The committee hope to have suitable persons selected in England for places chosen for them within this Diocese.

A good deal of attention has been directed towards the domestic servant question; but although a department, having this branch for its special object, has been organized on the other side, at present nothing more favorable is promised than that upon the rate of wages being forwarded with the passage money, attempts will be made to send suitable girls under proper protection, and judging from past experiences, and the unconquerable kindness of Parish workers, who see chances of new lines and great possibilities for their *protégés* in a far away country, the guarantee appears to be all on our side.

The whole question of Immigration seems to require most careful consideration, especially among churchmen in the country, who can do much towards assisting the Church in England and in this Diocese, by either directly or through the Clergy keeping the Committee informed of openings for reliable well chosen work or other Church people.

Your Committee rejoice in the admirable work done by the Immigration chaplain whose work will, we are glad to say, from henceforth be in connection with this cause.

IMMIGRATION CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

In presenting my third annual report of this branch of the work of the Church, I am deeply thankful for the larger sphere of usefulness in which under Divine Providence I have been permitted to engage.

The object of this work is, primarily, the spiritual care of those members of the Sister Churches in Great Britain and Ireland, who, in the Providence of God, arrive as immigrants at the port of Montreal, intending to settle within the Province. Naturally, they are beset with difficulties, and the opportunity is then embraced of giving to them friendly counsel and advice. Many of our immigrants, after bearing the unusual expense of the sea voyage, land here with but little money, and unless they are more than usually spiritually-minded, the struggle for bread becomes the one engrossing object and subject of thought; their religious obligations are not indeed wholly forgotten, but they are subordinated for

the time being to the more pressing temporal needs of themselves or their families. Experience has therefore shown, that in order to induce them more readily to harken to spiritual things, it is advisable to help them in material things. Speedy employment for them must be obtained; then a small house or lodgings. Sometimes it is necessary to write to the country parts in search of openings, and when successful, to assist them in getting there. Whilst our own Church people claim my best attention, I have given to others, as far as possible, assurances of ready welcome, coupled also, when time permitted, with offices of friendship and good will. Thus the many despondent spirits that have been cheered; the many poor that have been hospitably entertained, by introducing them to our charitable organizations; the many who landed with anxious fears because loved ones were left behind, and this was a land of strangers, yet went to their adopted homes with new light in their eyes and quickened hope in their hearts, because they had felt the touch of a friendly hand, and had listened to assuring words from a brother's lips; these and many like results have no place in my records, yet are among the most satisfying items of this work, viewed from a benevolent and christian standpoint.

But coming to statistics, our records show that there landed in Montreal last year, for local settlement, 5,898 persons. Of these more than one half were settled in the adjacent country parts, and the remaining portion in the city.

Of the Protestants the great majority (about 3,000) were adherents of the Church of England. A portion of these were however Church people in name only, and could not be recommended as such.

The distribution of families, exclusive of single persons, was as follows:

In the city proper,	128

Of servant girls—a much needed class—several superior parties were sent out by the Church Emigration Society in charge of a matron. The total number was 513. We hope to see more.

Of late, several of the Ocean steamships have brought their passengers through to Montreal direct, instead of landing them at Quebec as heretofore, and thus an excellent opportunity is afforded me of dealing with the Western immigrants; who, by this new arrangement, have missed the opportunity of meeting with the S. P. C. K. chaplain at Quebec.

Owing, however, to the inconveniences of the immigrants (much inconvenience), measures are now being taken, to induce others, to induce them to provide accommodation at Quebec.

A noticeable feature of the largely through class of emigration is the selections that are made, also to provide them with the means to pay their way until they reach the emigrants' friends.

Owing, however, to the complete lack of landing accommodation at this port, the immigrants (with the exception of those landing by the Beaver Line) suffer much inconvenience and hardship. I am glad to say, however, that vigorous measures are now being taken by representatives of the associated charities and others, to induce the Government to remedy this deplorable state of affairs, and to provide accommodations for immigrants landing, equal at least to those at Quebec.

A noticeable feature of the emigration this year is that it is being carried on largely through the instrumentality of the several Emigration Societies. This class of emigration is daily growing in favor, owing to the judicious and careful selections that are usually made by them. These Societies generally take care also to provide their emigrants with sufficient landing money, to enable them to pay their way until the first wages are earned. For this purpose I have paid out to the emigrants from one Society alone this season over \$700.

The Church Emigration Societies are also doing an admirable work, by forming as they do an important link between the Mother Church and the Church in Canada. To us it is of the first consequence that those who come from the other side should be God-fearing and well instructed Church people, and it is one of the main objects of these Societies to accomplish this. To the Rev. John Bridger, the active and efficient Secretary of the S. P. C. K. Emigration Committee, at Liverpool, is committed the important work of consolidating the several parties arriving there, providing them with a chaplain for the voyage, and making many other important arrangements for their spiritual and moral welfare.

As a result of these various agencies for good, and also the withdrawal of the Government assisted passages, which were granted indiscriminately, it is not surprising that the immigrants now arriving are of a decidedly better class, and leave but little further to be desired. "The flinging upon our shores" of undesirable and worthless immigrants is happily a thing of the past.

I have again to tender my warmest thanks to Mr. Marquette, our Local Immigration agent, for his kindness in rendering me every facility for carrying on this work. Also to the Lord Bishop and the city Clergy, for their constant interest and valuable assistance in all matters pertaining to the welfare of immigrants. Also to the Montreal Branch of the British Bible Society, for donations of copies of the Scriptures; and to the Lay Helpers Association for their willing assistance.

In closing this report, while sadly conscious of many imperfections, I would yet express my great thankfulness to Almighty God for what has been accomplished, and also express the earnest hope that with the continued Divine blessing, and the cordial co-operation of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, this agency may be enabled to do its full share in supplying that need so long and so sorrowfully experienced: "The spiritual care and oversight of immigrants who, in the Providence of God, have been directed to the advantages of our land, and to the charge of our Church."

2. Your Committee have obtained a detailed statement from a large proportion of the schools of the Diocese, and although in many cases incomplete, they have been able to get an idea first of the schemes of Lessons in general use, a list of the schools with and without libraries, the amount of the children's collections, and whether devoted to Missionary purposes, or otherwise; and, further, have learned some of the requirements of the distant and poorer schools, which are unable to support or help themselves. From the information gathered from these reports, your Committee strongly recommend that more attention and prominence should be given by the "Books and Tract Committee," to the better establishment of a Depository, where the Clergy and Superintendents can apply for, and obtain at the most reasonable rates, such Sunday School requisites as they need, at the lowest possible prices and without the inconvenience and extra expense of writing several places first, and in some cases going without, simply for not knowing where such requisites are to be obtained. They feel that if a list of Bibles, Prayer Books and Catechisms, also suitable Sunday Schools Books, was printed and sent to each Clergyman in the Diocese, it would go to supply a greatly-felt want. Further, they recommend that the larger City Sunday Schools should be asked to contribute a small amount, as Missionary Work in the Diocese, for supplying Bibles, Prayer Books, etc., to any Country Schools, which have not sufficient means at their disposal for this purpose, and that any Clergyman applying to this Committee for aid in this direction will be supplied according to the means at our disposal.

3. This Committee further recommend that the last Sunday in September of each year be set apart by His Lordship, the Bishop, as Sunday School Sunday, and that in all Churches the Collections made on that Sunday at all services, as far as deemed advisable, be applied specially to the Sunday School expenses of that church, with the desire that as large a proportion as possible of the Children's Collections be applied to Missionary purposes, in order to promote, as is most desirable, a deeper interest on the part of the Children in Missionary giving; the Committee feel that the adoption of this plan when fairly tried will prove suc-

MEMORIAL IN RE JESUITS' ESTATES ACT.

*To the SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL IN SESSION ASSEMBLED.

The memorial of the undersigned Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Montreal, RESPECTFULLY REPRESENTS:

That at the time of Ordination, each of the Clergy of the Church of England, your memorialists of the Clergy amongst the number, solemnly took the following oath:—"The Queen's Majesty hath the chief power in this realm of England, and other of her Dominions, unto whom the Chief Government of all estates of this realm, whether they be Ecclesiastical or Civil, in all causes doth appertain, and not, nor ought to be, subject to any foreign jurisdiction,—and that the Bishop of Rome hath no jurisdiction in this realm of England."

That your memorialists of the Laity are, as loyal subjects of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, bound, by their Oath of Allegiance to protect Her Crown, Dignity and Rights; and as loyal Churchmen are bound to uphold the true faith and interests of the Church.

That your memorialists believe that the Act lately passed by the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, and known as the "Jesuits' Estates Act," is derogatory to the Queen, Her Crown and Dignity, and is unconstitutional and dangerous to the peace and welfare of the Church and State, and for the following amongst other reasons:—First, Because, as it appears to them, this legislation violates the Oath of Supremacy already cited of the 1st of Elizabeth, which has been accepted by the Church of England, which is emphasized in the 37th of her 39 Articles, and which is solemnly sworn to by all her Ministers. And it is also contrary, as, your memorialists believe, to the Oath of Allegiance, the Oath now taken by the different functionaries of the Crown in the Dominion of Canada. And how far this Oath agrees, how far it differs from the Oath of Supremacy, may be judged from the following official printed report intituled, "Return to an Address of the House of Commons, dated 30th January, 1884, for copies of the Oath, or Oaths, required to be taken by the Governor-General of Canada, by Lieutenant-Governors of the Province of Quebec, etc., before entering upon the discharge of their duties as such. Signed by command, J. A. Chapleau, Secretary of State."

The said Oath of Allegiance is to the following effect:—"I do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Victoria, and will defend Her to the utmost of my power against all conspiracies and attempts whatever which shall be made against Her Person, Crown or Dignity, and I will do my utmost to disclose and make known to Her Majesty, Her Heir and Successors, all treasons and conspiracies which may be formed against Her, or them; and I do faithfully promise to maintain, support and defend, to the utmost of my power, the succession of the Crown, which succession by an Act intituled, "An Act for the further limitations of the Crown, and better securing the rights and liberties of the subject," is and stands limited to the Princess Sophia, Electress of Hanover, and the Heirs of Her Body, being Protestants, hereby utterly renouncing and abjuring any obedience or allegiance unto any other person claiming or pretending a right to the Crown of this realm. And I do declare that no foreign prince, person, prelate, state or potentate hath, or ought to have, any jurisdiction, power, superiority, pre-eminence, or authority, ecclesiastical or spiritual, within this realm. And I make this declaration upon the true faith of a Christian. So help me God."

But the preamble to the now notorious Quebec Jesuit Bill will, upon examination, sufficiently show how hopelessly at variance has been and is, this legislation with the Oath of Fealty and Allegiance to our beloved Sovereign, and the consequent necessity of raising our voices in united and most solemn protest against the grievous wrong; and the further necessity of using all such legal and constitutional means as may be in our power to have this wrong promptly and effectually redressed.

Secondly. That your memorialists, as at present advised, affirm that under the treaty rights, conveying the former French possessions in America to the Crown

of England, the Roman Catholics were guaranteed the right of practising their religion only in "so far as the laws of Great Britain permit." And they humbly submit, that neither the Treaty of Paris, nor the Quebec Act of George III ch. 83, permitted then or permit now (as a reference to the modified oath will show) the establishment of Jesuitism in our midst, or the recognition of the Ultramontane principles of the Encyclical, and the Syllabus of the Pope of Rome conveying, as these do, the practical negation of the Queen's Sovereignty, and the recognition, on the part of Her subjects, of any Joint Sovereignty, or co-ordinate jurisdiction, in their allegiance.

Thirdly. That the record of the Jesuits is one of such a character as to have led to the suppression of their order by one of their own Popes, Clement the XIV., and repeatedly, to their expulsion from almost every Roman Catholic country under heaven; and to the still existing legal prohibition of their order in England, rendering their legal recognition here, or in any British possession, unconstitutional.

Fourthly. That the illegal and unjust appropriation of a large amount of the Public School Funds, given by the Crown, and accepted in trust by Canada and by the Province of Quebec, for the purposes of superior education, and now diverted from those purposes, in part to satisfy the unfounded claim for compensation made by the Jesuits, and the large remainder turned into the general revenue of the Province, for any purpose whatsoever, under Section 7 of the Jesuit Estate Act, is, in the judgment of your memorialists, an act, of political dishonesty, and a breach of trust and faith utterly to be deprecated.

Wherefore, your memorialists pray that this Synod may take this memorial into its earnest consideration, and take such action in regard to the matters therein referred to as its wisdom may determine;

And further, your memorialists pray that this Synod may, in such manner as may be determined best, submit the matter also to the consideration of the Provincial Synod of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, to be holden in this city of Montreal, in September now next.

And your memorialists will ever pray.

REPORTS OF RURAL DEANS.

RURAL DEANERY OF BEDFORD.

MY LORD,

In submitting the annual report of the Rural Deanery of Bedford, I am happy to state that the statistics received from the various parishes, with but one or two exceptions, indicate a healthy condition, both as regards the spiritual life and material progress of the church within their bounds.

NEW BUILDINGS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

The parsonage at Abbotsford and Church Halls at Stanbridge, East and West Farnham, have been completed and occupied during the year. All these are substantial and commodious buildings, admirably adapted to the purposes for which they were designed. The church at Bedford has been thoroughly renovated at a cost of \$525, which has been defrayed by the free will offerings of members of the congregation. Several improvements have been made in the internal arrangements of the church at Cowansville. A new roof has been placed on the church at Pigeon Hill, in the Parish of St. Armand west.

INSURANCE.

All the Church property in the Deanery is insured, with the exception of the church at Noyan.

PAROCHIAL ENDOWMENTS.

Additions have been made to the Parochial Endowment Fund of Abbotsford, of \$102, and to that of Dunham, of \$200.

MISSION FUND.

Missionary meetings have been held, and the prescribed collections taken up in every parish except Clarenceville. The contributions to the Mission Fund have in nearly every instance exceeded the assessment, and where this has not been the case, the failure has been due to exceptional local causes.

CLERICAL CHANGES.

The Reverend Canon Robinson, after more than forty years of earnest and useful labor in this Deanery, has felt compelled by the pressure of advancing years to retire from active ministerial work, but we rejoice to know that he will continue to reside amongst us, and that we shall still have the benefit of his wise counsel and genial intercourse. On the retirement of Canon Robinson, Abbotsford became a self-supporting rectory, with the Rev. W. P. Chambers as its first rector. Mr. Chambers has since been appointed to the rectory of Knowlton.

The Rev. John Ker has resigned the rectory of Dunham, and the rev. Charles Trotman that of Clarenceville. The Rev. George Johnson has been appointed to Dunham. Abbotsford and Clarenceville are vacant.

RURAL DEANERY OF BROME.

MY LORD,

The regular annual meeting was held on 17th May, at West Shefford, which although outside the limits of the Deanery proved to be a place of meeting, for the Clergy of the Deanery, on the interesting occasion of the consecration of its Parish church. There were three clergy present out of six,—three parishes being vacant at the time, three Lay Readers, and three Lay Delegates.

The parish of Knowlton, then vacant by the resignation of Rev. J. J. Scully, has since been filled by the Rev. W. P. Chambers, B.A., and the mission of Adamsville and East Farnham is to have shortly the services of the Rev. H. C. Bernard, B. A., from district of Quebec. The mission of Bolton, vacated by the removal of Rev. W. P. Chambers, is having the services of a Lay Reader, Mr. P. E. Judge, a student of the Theological College. The church of St. Augustine, having the small debt resting upon it removed, was duly consecrated to the worship and service of God, on Monday, 7th May.

The Deanery has gladly recognized the hand of Providence in restoring to active service the Rev. Chs. Bancroft, M.A., and who having been appointed Rector of Sutton was inducted therein, surrounded by the brethren of the Deanery and others, by your Lordship on the 23rd of May. We all wish him continued health and God-speed.

The Deanery desires to express its unanimous opinion that \$568, as reported, was altogether insufficient as a stipend for the incumbent of Potton, and \$584 too little for the incumbent of Glen Sutton, and that the attention of your Lordship the Executive Committee, and the missions concerned should be called to it.

The reports from some parishes are unavoidably imperfect, seeing that either partially or wholly such parishes as Knowlton and Sutton, and such missions as Bolton and Adamsville, have been without the regular services for parts of the year, of one in Holy Orders. In such as have reported we are able to note an increase over last year in the amount contributed to the Mission Fund, in the parish of Brome, and the mission of Potton; also a very commendable increase in the frequency of the celebration of the Holy Communion in Bolton, Brome and Potton.

In the way of improvements of and additions to Church property may be mentioned the following: In Bolton, 4 acres of land have been acquired at a cost of \$140, to be used as a burying-ground and glebe, the portion for the first use having been consecrated by your Lordship at your last visitation. The parish school-room is now used for guild meetings and classes, and has been fitted up with maps and pictures illustrating Church history, and by a generous donation from Mr. Carsley of Montreal the whole room has been carpeted.

In Sutton the rectory has been put into thorough repair, and the property refenced in a suitable manner. In Glen Sutton, by subscriptions from friends in Montreal, the missionary has been enabled to repaint the church and to repair it within. The parsonage still requires repairs and overhauling to make it habitable with any comfort through the winter; in the meanwhile it has been made to look more presentable in the interior.

Having but at this present Synod received the appointment of Rural Dean, this report is scant and defective, but as it is, it is respectfully submitted.

RURAL DEANERY OF CLARENDON.

MY LORD,

I desire to present the following report of the Church's work in the Rural Deanery of Clarendon:

The Annual Meeting of the Rural Deanery was held at Portage du Fort on the 22nd day of May.

The reports of the several parishes and missions were read, from which the following particulars appear:

1. There have been 13 clergymen employed in the work of the Church, serving 23 churches, and 26 other stations, that is virtually 49 separate congregations.
2. There are reported 1361 names upon communicants lists, an increase of 243 since last year; but the actual number of communicants is no greater than last year, being 1001, 360 communicants have neglected their greatest privilege.
3. There are 246 Baptisms reported, an increase of 81 upon the numbers of the previous year, 140 persons were confirmed; 52 more than in the previous year.
4. There are 741 scholars in the Sunday-Schools; an increase of 204 since last year.
5. All Diocesan Funds except Diocesan and Foreign Missions have received enlarged contributions from the Rural Deanery. There is a falling off of \$58.00 in offerings to Diocesan Missions.
6. The Parishes of the Deanery have raised for all purposes \$7,920.29, or \$1,322.22 more than last year.
7. The offertory continues to be largely used for contributions to Church purposes; a larger sum has been given in this way than ever before.

WORK IN THE LUMBER REGIONS.

The Rev. H. Plaisted has visited the Lumber Works on the Gatineau, Lake Petawagama, Rivers Desert and Gens de Terre, the Eagle River, and Lake Pitongo.

The Revs. N. A. F. Bourne and S. A. Mills visited the Lumber Camps on the Black River.

THE MISSION FUND.

It was resolved to hold Missionary Meetings during the months of September and October.

The grants from the Mission Fund to the Missions of Alleyn and Bristol, and the abilities of the Missions, were carefully discussed, and the Rural Deanery passed a resolution, urgently requesting the Executive Committee to make a grant of \$500.00 to the Mission of Alleyn, and one of \$450.00 to the Mission of Bristol.

S. P. C. K.

It was resolved to make collections in the several parishes of the Rural Deanery, upon the last Sunday of July, or as soon after as possible, for the very important work of the "Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge." The Rev. F. R. Smith, S.P.C.K. secretary for the Rural Deanery, reported the sum of \$18.40 contributed during the past year.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

It was resolved to hold a Sunday School Teachers' Institute at Aylmer, early in September, when it is hoped a fresh impetus will be given to Sunday School work.

PAROCHIAL ENDOWMENTS.

This subject was very fully discussed. The Rev. F. R. Smith stated that the present good endowment of Hull was obtained at a very small original outlay. It was resolved by the Rural Deanery, that if possible a collection should be taken up in every parish in behalf of a Parochial Endowment.

CHURCH BUILDINGS.

A new Rectory is approaching completion at Hull, new Parsonages are being built at Alleyn and Shannonville. The Mission House and Chapel at River Desert is sufficiently finished to be occupied. The Parsonage at Chelsea is completed, but there is a debt of \$270.00 upon it. By a very liberal donation of the Rev. Geo. Abbott Smith, and of Mrs. D. Smith, a house and three village lots have been secured at Bristol for a Parsonage and glebe. The Church at Leslie, built by the gift of R. A. A. Jones, Esq., was consecrated last August at your Lordship's visit.

Both in spiritual and material ways, I am persuaded, the work of the Church is being vigorously prosecuted by a noble and self-denying band of Missionaries and Parish Clergymen.

CHANGES.

The Rev. W. Raven has succeeded the Rev. Geo. Abbott Smith at Eardley, and the Rev. J. L. Puleston-Roberts has succeeded the Rev. N. A. F. Bourne in Thorne. Chelsea is vacant by the appointment of the Rev. Geo. Johnson to the Rectory of Dunham. He has done a noble work at Chelsea. In recording my sense of the loss which the Church has sustained in the death of Mr. Swithin Lane, student of the Diocesan Theological College, and Catechist in Leslie, I am sure I express the feeling of all who knew him. He seemed in every way qualified to be a most successful Missionary. In the short time he was spared for his work in Leslie, the people were wonderfully drawn to him, and his influence upon them was most beneficial.

I wish to urge again, My Lord, as I have done before, the great importance of the work upon the Upper Ottawa and the Gatineau Rivers. The fathers are passing away, and a new and vigorous generation is taking their place, who will have no small part in making the future of our Dominion. It is both the duty and the wisdom of the Church to make her influence strongly felt amongst them, to teach them the good and the right way, and enable them to recognize her as, what she is, the Church of Jesus Christ for the Anglo-Saxon race.

CHANGES.

Rev. Dr. Borthwick has resigned the Rectory of St. Mary's, Hochelaga, and the Rev. J. Edgecumbe has been appointed. Rev. John Ker has been appointed to the Rectory of Grace Church, Point St. Charles. Rev. W. Weaver has been appointed to the Mission of Kildare.

MISSION FUND.

The collection from all the City churches has increased. Grace Church did not get its subscription in time, because the Rector was not appointed. Berthier was too late in sending its collections to be reported.

LAY HELPERS' ASSOCIATION.

A Lay Helpers' Association has been formed during the past year, and is entering into active work.

The subject of the insufficient salary of the Immigration Chaplain being considered, it being last year \$360 from the Mission Fund, and \$100 from the East End London Immigration Society, a total of \$460, from which many incidental expenses had to be deducted; it was resolved, that the Lord Bishop be requested to memorialize the S. P. G. and S. P. C. K., and other Immigration Societies, in regard to the stipend of the Immigration Chaplain at Montreal, whose work is constantly increasing in consequence of the transfer of the port of debarkation of emigrants to the Port of Montreal, being nearly 200 miles distant from Quebec, and where assistance is urgently needed. The importance and extent of this work are substantiated by the report of the Rev. R. Acton, Immigration Chaplain, at Montreal.

It was recommended that the Dominion Government be petitioned to erect sheds at Montreal, for the shelter of Immigrants, there being at present no accommodation for them at the port of Montreal.

It was resolved that the members of this Rural Deanery deemed desirable that a depot for the S. P. C. K. publications, Missionary publications, and Church literature generally be established in Montreal.

The Deanery desires to record its deep sense of the great loss suffered by the Diocese by the death of Canon Belcher, also by the death of the aged Rev. Joseph Merrick, who survived but a short time after his retirement from the active work of an earnest ministry, and also by the sudden death of Judge Armstrong, who, through many long years, had been an active member of the Church in this Diocese.

RURAL DEANERY OF IBERVILLE.

MY LORD,

The annual meeting of the Deanery of Iberville was held in the Synod Hall, Montreal, on Monday, the 17th of June. There were present five clergymen, and three laymen. There are in the Deanery 7 Rectories and 4 Missions, comprising 11 cures, served by 10 Clergymen.

INSURANCE.

All the buildings and Church properties in this Deanery are reported as covered by insurance.

RESIGNATION.

The Rev. N. P. Yates, B.A., having accepted the important position of Tutor in the Montreal Theological College, left the parish of Franklin and Havelock vacant.

The Rev. J. C. Garrett, having been called to the parish of Niagara, as assistant to the Venerable Archdeacon McMurray, leaves the Rectory of Lacolle without a pastor.

In both these gentlemen, their respective parishes have sustained a great loss, and the Diocese has to mourn the removal from her ranks of loyal, efficient, and self-denying laborers.

Thank God, we have good men, and true, working in our Mission fields; but already are they too few, and we can ill afford to lose even one. We are often in danger of losing sight of the fact, that country districts, with their varied and extensive requirements, need a clerical staff, endowed with more than average ability, indomitable perseverance, ready adaptability and resource; with a talent for living upon little and being content therewith.

There are laymen in more county parishes than one who think it prudent to secure a Clergyman at the lowest possible stipend; all their anxiety being to lessen their individual obligations to the Church, and resenting in no measured terms all appeals for outside objects. We know a parish that preferred to do without a Clergyman for 9 months, in order to save the difference of expense between an incumbent and a student, so that they might liquidate a debt of \$300 without the congregation being called upon to make any special effort. And as a matter of fact, this was done, but at their spiritual expense, for during all these months, families and children are neglected, while strenuous efforts are being made to draw our people into Methodism, and even into the Church of Rome.

CHAMBLY.

It is with sincere pleasure we notice increased interest in Church matters, as manifested by the marked improvement in the spiritual welfare of the Parish generally, also by the large increase of the free will offerings of the people. Owing to the energy of the Rector and willing co-operation of the Wardens and people, the Church is now out of debt. And the generous donation of \$200 from R. A. A. Jones, Esq., will now enable the Wardens to make the long needed repairs to church and rectory.

FRANKLIN AND HAVELock.

This Parish has been vacant, for seven or eight months, but now we are happy to report that it is progressing favorably under the charge of the Rev. W. J. M. Beattie, whom your Lordship appointed on the first of May, 1889, to this cure. The ladies held a reception at the residence of Col. Rogers, tendering the newly appointed incumbent a most hearty welcome.

The ladies of Franklin Congregation, presided over by Mrs. Rogers, have reduced the debt on the new parsonage to \$120, through their diligent work. The Ladies' Auxiliary at Havelock have been and are doing faithful work, having sent off boxes of clothing to various missions. May God continue to prosper their efforts.

CHRISTIEVILLE.

There is the same quiet faithful work being done in this Parish, by the esteemed Rector, who also takes charge of the missions of Lacadie and Savanne. The whole number of families connected with the work here are few in number, but this fact only increases the necessity for perseverance, so that the spiritual work among the few be not hindered.

SABREVOIS.

We can but reiterate our sense of sorrow and shame that such a state of things should exist as in the missions of Sabrevois and Edwardstown, where the respective clergymen are supposed to exist, or perish in the attempt, on the sum of \$385 in the former place, and \$473 in the latter. We earnestly beg that your Lordship will request the Executive committee to take these cases into consideration, so that this disgrace may be removed.

HEMMINGFORD.

The Rev. H. L. Wood is doing good work in this mission. On his appointment the congregation gave Mr. Wood a most hearty welcome, and the subsequent interest as manifested by increased members attending service and the augmented offertory tells its own story.

We trust to hear continued good things of this flock, and that their zeal and liberality may grow in proportion. The quarterly envelope system has been adopted here in connection with the clergymen's stipend and with the best results.

HUNTINGDON.

The faithful and arduous laborers of the Rector of the Parish have been prospered and blest during the past year, although several most promising young men have left for the West, seeing little chance of promotion or building up for themselves a name and home. A new Sunday School has been opened at the Gore; already the work is most encouraging, and will prove a strength to the Church. A good deal of time, money, and energy have been expended upon the basement of the Huntingdon church, which is now complete. The parsonage barn has been re-shingled, and fencing repaired. The offertories for the Diocesan Mission fund, and the other funds, have been liberal. Only in the important matter of the clergymen's stipend do we feel that the parishioners of this wealthy, vigorous, and growing parish are remiss. Surely the sum of \$800 can without any special effort be raised among 104 families. Indeed, this has been admitted more than once, and now the several vestries and wardens should see that the clergyman be not the one to suffer loss and bear the penalty of their remissness and inertness.

ST. JOHNS.

The report from the Parish of St. Johns differs but slightly from that of last year in temporal matters. As regards Church property, the parish may be congratulated upon the satisfactory condition it presents; church, rectory and school premises are in thorough repair. And this again is due to the energy and perseverance of the Ladies' Aid Association, which has been from its commencement the rector's unfailing stay. The other organizations in the Parish have been maintained in their usual efficiency. The Sunday school, under the guidance of its faithful superintendent, averages an attendance of 80, with 12 teachers and 2 librarians. A very valuable addition of over 100 volumes has been made to the Library, which are read and prized by young and old. The St. Johns' Temperance Society and Band of Hope have held their usual fortnightly meetings in the Baldwyn Hall which are well attended, and exercise a steady and quiet influence. While our Church work is thus active it is with pleasure we notice an increased interest in Missionary work at home and abroad. On the one hand, there is always a generous contribution to the Diocesan Missions, and on the other the Missionary Diocese of Algoma comes in for a share of the interest taken in the North West, and this chiefly through the efforts of St. Johns' Branch of the Women's Auxiliary.

No year passes without change and loss. Four useful and valued members have passed away. One long known and loved for his unfailing gentleness and kindness, as well as highly esteemed for his medical skill. He leaned with undoubted faith and confidence upon his Saviour's love, and in the midst of a long and severe illness, patience had its perfect work. One long a member of the Church reached an esteemed old age, while another was called in the prime of manhood. And one who had long known and loved her Lord, ever diligent in every good work, has also been called.

We have sustained losses also from changes and emigration, which are not replaced, yet we have many causes of thanksgiving, trusting wholly in Him, whose we are and whom we serve.

At your Lordship's special request the Rev. E. McManus and myself visited the Rural parishes in the Deanery, as a Missionary deputation, in the month of March.

We were received most cordially by our brother Clergy, and welcomed warmly and listened to attentively by the people. Your deputation advocated the tithe system, or at least a systematic, proportionate, weekly offering as a solution of all monetary difficulties in the Parish. Mr. McManus is an able advocate and an enthusiastic believer in tithes, and conscientious in practicing what he preaches. Diocesan and Domestic Missions were not forgotten. And we had good proof of practical results by being able to hand to the Secretary-Treasurer the sum of \$40.12, as the result of 8 addresses.

The Deanery desire to place on record their deep sympathy with the Rev. E. J. Sutton of Edwardstown, in the loss of his daughter, who has been early called into the Kingdom of Grace; she sought by precept and example to recommend to others that faith and love so satisfying to her own soul,—Miss Mary Sutton, particularly gifted as a teacher, whose constant aim was to make all education,—

The Sunday school is growing in number, and is well managed under the fostering care of Mr. Lockhart, assisted by a faithful band of teachers. A new organ has been placed in the church, and paid for. We notice an increased interest taken in Mission work. And your Lordship had the pleasure of confirming one of the most interesting classes outside the city.

The Deanery desire once more to place on record the advisability of dividing the parishes of Huntingdon and Hinchinbrook, whenever your Lordship can make the necessary arrangements.

MY LORD,

I beg to present the Annual Statistical Report of the Rural Deanery of Shefford for the past Synodical Year.

The Review of the Church's work in this Deanery is promising and encouraging to more than an ordinary degree.

The rapid erection of two Church edifices at Eastman and S. Roxton in the Missions of S. Stukely and N. Shefford, followed by their consecration, and the consecration of St. John's Church in W. Shefford, along with the fact that this latter mission has now become a Rectory, are alone sufficient to indicate the substantial progress which is being made towards the end we have in view, viz.:—the independence of the older parishes which have been too long a burden on the Mission fund of the Diocese.

No little praise is due to the Incumbents interested in these successes, for the untiring zeal with which they have labored to assist their several congregations to compass the end they had in view—God's greater glory and the material advancement of the mystical body of His well beloved Son.

Enrichments of no mean kind have been added also to the Interior of St. Luke's, Waterloo, and St. George's, Granby, as dear memorials of the Faithful at rest in God's Paradise; and elsewhere in the Deanery we have on every hand clear evidence that the Church's position as an educator is being better understood and availed of, and her Divine mission more gratefully realized.

We report an increased number of persons baptized and confirmed, and a proportionately larger number of communicants availing themselves of churchly privileges.

The attendance at our Sunday schools is also on the increase.

The Parochial indebtedness has been during the last year nearly rolled away. Our arrears of stipend are merely fractional, and have ceased to wear any serious aspect. But at the same time the stipends themselves in the cases of three of our Parishes, viz. : of Biscobel, South Stukely and North Shefford, still remain painfully inadequate, especially when we consider the tried faithfulness of the men who hold these posts.

For any considerable betterment of these and similar cases in the Diocese, the Graded Salary system seems to us the only feasible solution, for lack of which we run considerable risk of our tried men being prematurely worn out or lost to us through removals.

To the Quebec scheme adopted by the Synod at its last session, we hope to see an honest trial given, trusting that no obstacles, arising from prejudice, fear or insufficient knowledge of its working power, will be thrown in the way of its being offered to the Diocese as an experiment, but rather that it may be found to prove as unquestionable a success as in the case of those Dioceses, where it has been with more or less modification adopted with very happy results.

The contributions to the Mission fund and other Diocesan funds are in excess of those of past years, and the total amount of moneys collected in the Deanery for the Church's works is largely so.

In making their annual returns of the Statistics, it is felt desirable that a dual report should be rendered,—that the strength and position of the integral portions of our county cures may be recorded, that the whole Church may become better informed, and that these may be credited with bearing their proper portion of the Parochial burden.

No changes have been reported. But the Mission of Warden, set off as a separate cure, and under the present charge of Mr. Jas. Elliot, Lay Reader, promises to do well. We look forward with hope to an extension of Mission work—possibly of French Mission work—in this direction.

The Church property in the Deanery is all well and carefully insured.

We have been greatly blessed in our united and uniting work as Clergy and Laity together, of the One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church of the Ages. The strength which has come to her through ways of quietness and confidence has been all of God. To Him be all the praise.

MISSION FUND.

It is satisfactory to observe that the amount raised for the Mission fund is nearly \$36 over the assessments, and about \$60 better than that of last year, being \$395.99 as against \$332.81 for 1887-8. No change was made in the assessments for the ensuing year.

MISSIONARY MEETINGS.

Missionary Meetings were held in every Mission during the past winter.

CLERICAL ASSOCIATION.

A Clerical Association has been formed in the Deanery which meets quarterly and it is expected that the organization will prove a great benefit to the Church as well as to the clergy in many respects.

CHANGES.

Rev. H. Hackenley resigned the mission of Buckingham last August, and has left the Diocese. He was succeeded by the late Rev. W. D. Evans, who was ordained to that place in December. Mr. Evans was drowned at High Falls on the Lievre River on the 9th of last month. Mr. Hy. Jekill, a student of the College, is conducting services in the vacant mission. Portland is still vacant; Mr. S. B. Blunt, a student, has been sent there for the summer. Rev. A. J. Greer resigned the charge of Grenville in August, and Rev. W. Harris succeeded him, entering upon his duties at Easter, thus leaving Arundel vacant, which is being supplied by Mr. Jas. Thompson of the College. Rev. R. F. Taylor, who has been residing in Mille Isles for the past two years, and taking lay reader's duty there, was ordained to that Mission in March. Rev. L. G. A. Roberts was ordained in September, and appointed to the assistantship of Vaudreuil. Rev. R. B. O'Sullivan, who resigned the rectorship of St. Andrews, has been succeeded by the Rev. N. A. F. Bourne.

CHURCH PROPERTY.

Portland.—Christ Church has been considerably improved inside and out. It is proposed to build a small church at Blanche Lake this summer, and have it ready for consecration when his Lordship pays the Mission his annual visit in September. A very good organ has been purchased by the Christ Church congregation.

Grenville.—St. Matthew's congregation expect to make extensive repairs on their church almost immediately, which are much needed.

Lachute.—A very comfortable parsonage has been built at a cost of \$3,000.

Lakefield.—As a result of special efforts upon the part of the Incumbent and people, a good parsonage now takes the place of the old one long since unfit for habitation.

Arundel.—The value of the Church property in Arundel has been increased during the past year, by the erection of a thoroughly good shed and hall at the rear of the church. The shed measures 50 feet x 20 feet. Over the standing

room of the horses, a hall or Parish room has been built. This room is not quite finished. A Library of 200 volumes has been procured for the Sunday school by a grant from the Church of England Book Society. A considerable quantity of lumber has been secured for the erection of a parsonage. In Laurel good subscriptions in lumber have been given towards putting up a church. In Brookdale an acre of land, on which is a small Mission church, has been presented to the Church. Since receiving this property the interior of the building has been improved.

NEW STATION.

Rev. L. G. A. Roberts of Como, in October last, commenced a week night service at Cote St. Henri, which was carried on with great success during the whole winter, the attendance being excellent. This work was carried out by the kindness of the Methodists, who volunteered the use of their chapel for the purpose.

WORK IN THE SHANTIES.

Rev. W. Harris visited 4 shanties on the Rouge River in the month of February. The most distant shanty was about 70 miles from Arundel. In each shanty he received the kindest treatment. Short services with sermon were held at each shanty, and reading matter was distributed. All the men seemed very grateful for the visit paid.

DEATH OF THE REV. W. D. EVANS.

The startling tidings of the death of the Rev. W. D. Evans, Incumbent of Buckingham, by drowning, not only cast a gloom over his parish, but excited general sympathy throughout the Deanery for the bereaved friends. At the annual meeting the following resolution was passed:

"That this Deanery desires to record its regret caused by the loss of the valuable and energetic services of the late Rev. W. D. Evans through drowning, and that the Secretary is instructed to convey its sympathy to the relatives in their affliction."
