#### DISTRICT No. V .- MR. TASKER.

From St. Charles Borromee Street (not inclusive) to Bleury Street (inclusive). From Dorchester Street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

#### DISTRICT No. VI .- MR. GIBSON with MR. MOORB.

From Bleury Street to Union Avenue (not including either). From Dorchester Street (inclusive) to the Mountain.

#### DISTRICT No. VII .- MR. MITCHELL.

From Union Avenue to McGili College Avenue (both included). From Dorchester Street (inclusive) to the Mountain.

#### DISTRICT No. VIII .- MR. PROCTOR.

From Bleury Street to St. Genevieve Street (not including either).

- PUBLIC WORSHIP on the Lord's Day, at Eleven A.M., and at Seven P.M.

### Report of Kirk-Session.

Beyond the changes which have taken place in the Congregation during the past year, by deaths and removals, there is little calling for remark from the Kirk-Session at this time. By these changes, however, we are reminded that time is short and life uncertain, and we are admonished to greater diligence and faithfulness in the discharge of duty.

In our last report it was mentioned that the Rev. W. R. Cruikshank was associated with Dr. Jenkins as assistant-minister. Mr. Cruikshank's connection with St. Paul's Church ceased in the month of April, in consequence of his receiving a call to St. Matthew's congregation in this city, where, we are happy to learn, his ministry is highly appreciated and has been emineatly successful. During the summer vacation the pulpit was supplied for two Sabbaths by the Rev. Dr. Taylor of Wooster, Ohio, and by the Rev. Robert Campbell of Renfrew for two Sabbaths. For three Sabbaths the Church was closed, for cleaning and repairs. At the invitation of the office-bearers, the Rev. James Mackie, M.A., a minister of the Church of Scotland, entered upon an engagement for six months as assistant-minister on the 1st October last, since which time he has discharged the duties of his office with great faithfulness and assiduity. Excepting the months of June, July, and August, when many of the familiesremove to summer quarters, the average attendance of the Congregation at the Sabbath morning services has been very satisfactory; but the Kirk-Session have still to complain of too many vacant seats at the Sabbath evening services, and also at the Wednesday evening prayer-meetings. At the three Communion seasons the attendance of members was as follows :-

The alterations made last year in the interior of the Church, especially the lowering of the organ and the erection of a screen at the entrance have added much to the beauty and comfort of the edifice.

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The contributions by schedule, with a special collection, for the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of the Church amounted to \$3,600.88. The collections for charitable and other Session purposes were \$914.51. The payments made toward the endowment of Queen's College by individual members were \$3,654. The amounts paid over to the Treasurers of the Mission Funds of the General Assembly are about the same, in the aggregate, as last year :- namely, for Home Missions, \$848.50; for Foreign Missions, \$250; for French Evangelization, \$200; for the Colleges, \$600; for the Lumbermen's Mission, \$50; for the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund, \$226.75. In this connection, it is to be noted that, by the the showing of the Schedule Committee, scarcely one half of the members of the Congregation contributed through this channel to any of these purposes. It cannot therefore be said that the Missionary contributions of St. Paul's Church have yet reached what may be fairly called the measure of its ability. The Kirk-Session take this opportunity of inviting all the members of the Congregation to unite in this method of contribution as one which, in their judgment, seems best suited to the circumstances of the Congregation.

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The ordinary Sabbath collections have been, on the average, about \$40 per Sabbath. A trifling increase of the offerings "on the first day of the week" by each member would add considerably to the revenues of the Church, and would more easily than any other way maintain the equalization of ordinary revenue and expenditure. In addition to a mortage of \$4,000, the Trustees report a floating debt of \$2,317.69 due to the Treasurer. By the liberality of a few individuals, this floating debt has been paid, and the Kirk-Session hope that before next annual meeting measures will be taken to cancel the mortgage also.

The appended reports shew that the Sabbath-schools and Bible-classes, the Young Men's and Young Women's Associations, the Dorcas Society, and other agencies, are well organized and actively engaged in the promotion of Christian work in the Congregation.

In consequence of a resolution passed at the annual meeting in 1878 that the financial year of the Congregation should thereafter correspond with the calendar year, the account of the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, hereto appended, covers a period of sixteen months.

## The Schedule System.

This plan of obtaining contributions towards the Missionary and benevolent work of the Church, is now in the third year of its operation. The following extract from the last report of the Committee speaks for itself, and is commended to the earnest consideration of every member of the Congregation.

The number of Schedules returned is 135, out of over 300 sent out. In view of this comparatively small return, the new Committee will have to consider how non-contributors are to be reached. The Committee deeply regret that the members of the Congregation generally should not yet have seen it their privilege to fall in with a system which has proved so successful.

One of our lady teachers left for Europe another for the Southern States, while one of the gentlemen had also to leave in search of health. We may safely say that the School has never suffered so much from illness as during the past few months. Five of our teachers during that time have been compelled to relinquish their duties. Most of these have been permitted, in the goodness of our Heavenly Father, to resume their labours of love; yet we have to mourn the loss of one—Mr. John Mackintosh—who was called from us on the 28th of October. He was for many years connected with the Sabbath-school, and took a special interest in advancing the interests of Mission schools in different parts of the city."

The collections for missionary purposes during the year 1879 were \$527.21—the largest amount yet collected by the School. Of this amount, \$32 were collected by the Bible-classes; \$28.48 by the Infant classs; \$280.15 were the proceeds of a Bazaar held in aid of the Hervey Institute. The Sabbath-school receives an annual grant of \$250 from the funds of the Church collected by the schedule system. This amount covers the ordinary expenses of the School for books and periodicals and also the cost of the annual Festival.

The Library has been carefully examined during the past year, and a number of books of doubtful utility have been removed. In lieu of these and the worn-out volumes, one hundred new volumes will be added shortly. This will make the number 900 in all. The International Series of Lessons continues to be used in the School. The collection of Hymns is that of Gall & Inglis, Edinburgh.

The scholars, accompanied by their teachers and a large number of friends, had a very pleasant excursion in the month of June to Isle Dorval. The annual Festival was held in the School-room, on the evening of the 6th February, on which occasion there was a full attendance of teachers, and scholars, the members of the Bible-classes, and also of the parents and friends of the scholars.

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### The Bible-Classes.

Mr. J. Murray Smith continues to conduct the Young Women's Class, and is encouraged by the regular attendance and the interest in their studies of the International Lessons by the class. The number on the roll is twenty-nine. The Young Men's Class has been conducted by the Rev. James Mackie since October. The attendance has not been so large as it ought to have been. There are at least one hundred young men and women in the Congregation who might be expected to avail themselves of such excellent opportunities as these classes afford for a profitable study of the Scriptures. To the want of suitable class-rooms may be attributed in some measure the limited attendance referred to. The young people of the Congregation, as well as those of maturer years, are earnestly invited to connect themselves with these classes.

Mr. Kinloch's Bible-class for young women has 16 names on its roll; that of Mr. Evans, for young men, has 19: both are progressing most satisfactorily. In December last, one of the scholars undertook and carried out successfully arrangements for a concert, the proceeds of which were applied to painting and otherwise improving the Chapel, A proposal is now under consideration for the enlargement of the building so as to allow room for conducting the classes more advantageously.

The Missionary collections for 1879 amount to \$78.29. The school supports an orphan in India at the cost of \$20 per annum. Sabbath evening services are conducted in the Chapel under the management and and at the expense of St. Matthew's congregation, Point St. Charles.

(3) They make clothing for the inmates of the-Hospital, as for example, dressing-gowns for the adult patients, and blouses for the children's ward. (4) They assist in the cooking of soups. beef-tea and jelly to be distributed to invalids under the auspices of the Young Women's Christian Association. (5) They also visit the deserving poor at their homes, and supply them with clothing, medicine, and nourishing food. (6) They have sent clothing and money to assist the Protestant settlers in the Namur district, where much suffering has existed in consequence of the failure of crops. (7) In connection with the Young Women's Association they held a very pleasant and successful Social Meeting in the course of this winter.

This Society meets regularly during the winter months, from two o'clock till four, on Tuesday afternoons, and its members have spent many pleasant hours together while working for the benefit of the poor.

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The calls upon the funds of the Society during the past year have been more numerous than usual, owing no doubt to the depressed state of trade and the consequent scarcity of employment. The clothing distributed was as follows: 64 warm and suitable garments; 19 pairs boots and shoes; one piece of cotton, ond one of wincey. In several instances aid was requested by Rev. Mr. Cruikshank for some deserving poor ones connected with the Victoria Mission, which the Society very cheerfully granted. During the summer, the usual monthly allowances for rent, &c., were made, and the members who remained in the city were privileged to administer substantial aid to an aged and much respected member of the congregation during her protracted and last illness.

The annual report makes honourable mention of the ladies who so faithfully each year assist in collecting subscriptions, and as they are now called upon to renew their efforts, the Society bespeaks for them the same kind reception and generous response which they have always met with from the members of St. Paul's Church.
